Best Way To Keep Out of Prison Say Arkansas Pen Warden

LITTLEROCK, Ark., Nov. 16 .- If you would keep out of prison take a University or College course. 'That's the advice of the Warden of Arkansas penitentiary.

The prison report just made public

shows that 1,302 persons at the institution during the fiscal year, July 1. 1921, to June 30, 1922, only 15 were of University or College training.

Of the total number committed, 235 were illiterate, while 175 had completed only the fourth grade in grammer

Three hundred and fifty were committed fo rviolation of the liquor laws and 195 for murder, manslaughter and assault to kill. The greatest number was convicted of burglary, robbery and larceny—559, or 42.9 per



On Friday night, November 3, the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Associa-tion had actually sold 18,155 bales of cotton at an average price of 24c per peums. Information gathered from all over the state shows that the av-erage price paid the farmer by the cotton buyer up to that time to have cotton from 11 to 22 cents p been around 20.50. Here is a differ-ence in favor of the Association of spectable level throughout 3 1-2 cents per pound.

Of course the costs of operation aust be reduced from the sale price before final returns are made to the to the farmers. There is so ques tion but that, when the cost of op-eration is deducted, the prices thus far recieved are still greatly in ad-vance of the average prices received by farmers who are not members of the Association. Further, in view of the fact that the association still has on hand some four-fifths of the total cotton received, and the farmers on the outside only have about one-tenth, and the price of cotton steadily growing higher, it would seem reawould steadily increase us the sea-

Practically all farmers who joined this association did so with the extheir crop than they might receive if they sold their crop at home. This will undoubtedly happen in the case of the vast majority of the membership, although it will never happen

The reason for this is that each association member receives the average price of the season's sales for his grade of staple. 


