## **MILLIONAIRE DIES**

William Goodsell Rockfellow, Nephew of John D., Succumbs To Pneumenia On Sunday.

By The United Press. NEW YORK, Dec. 1.-William Goodsell Rockefeller, one of the world's richest men, died here Sunday night from double pneumonia. He was a nephew of John D. Rockefeller.

William Goodsell Rockefeller was born in New York in 1870. He was graduated from Yale University in 1892 and married Miss Elsie Stillman, daughter of James Stillman of New undertaken, York, in 1896.

He was treasurer of the Standard time being at least. Oil Company of New York until December 4, 1911, when he resigned to become a director of the Brooklyn Gas, Company. Prior to his death he was a director of the Union Pacific rail. road; the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company; and the Saort Line Railroad Company of Memphis.

Mr. Rockefellow ranked high among the capitalists of the United States and among the rich men of the world.

FORMS THE PROGRESSIVE BLOC

Unite to Abolish Electorial College And Others.

WASHINGTON, D . 1.-President Harding, in his annuar message next Tuesday to Congress, will present a financial legislation, worked out by Republican senators and the Agricultural Department.

Harding approved this legislation in principle at a conference in the White House on Thanksgiving Day, which was attended by a dozen senators.

The plan involves increasing the loan limits of the Federal Reserve tion, to deal with loans in live stock; the Amendment of the Federal Farm Loan Act to provide for the rediscount of agricultural production and marketing power and add two mem-bers to the Federal Farm Loan Board.

### FRANZ PETER SHUBERT, (Pronounced "Shoe-Bert.") (1797-1828.)

Franz Peter Shubert was born at Lichtenthal, near Vienna, January 31, He received his first instruction from his father, a shoolmaster, Ar Business Colege eleven of Abilene the age of 11, he began to sing in the village choir, but he had such a beautiful voice that he was placed in the Emperor's Choir.
