Poteet charges that dealers have combined to stifle competition and have agreed to sell their output thru one New York firm, boasting that tney will make back this year what they have lost in the last few years. This, Poteet terms the noblest attempt to exploit turkey producers of Texas ever known.

Statements indicating a great oversupply of turkeys in Texas have been ishued in order to force prices down, Poteet declares. Dealers say Texas wil ship 750 to 800 cars of turkeys this year as compared to 635 cars last year. This is not the case, according to to Poteet. There is really a shortage of birds this year, he said and the supply will fall many cars below the output of last year.

Poteet is urging that farmers pool their turkeys in each locality immediately, forcing independent buyers to bid against organized dealers. When such pools are formed, the Texas Farm Bureau will do its best to secure independent buyers even if it s necesary to go out of the state, he declared.







The convention convened May 15 1922 and has finished most of its work, but will hardly be able to add the finishing touches before the Christmas holidays, it was said.

Adjournment of the convention or er the holidays and until the state le islature has adjourned next spring is being advocated by many of the delegates. At that time, they argue, the constitution can be completed and submitted to voters for their approvwork already completed, the following provisions have been made:

Reorganization of the executive de partment of the state government Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Ass'n Creation of a budget system. Safe guarding of elections against fraud guarding of elections against fraud by facilitating civil and criminal in vestigations.

Prevention of the abuse of the initiative and referendum provisions of the state constitution. Enactment of a workmens' conmensation law.
