Speaking of sports, the USA Olympic Team has met with some problems this week in Seoul, Korea, but the kids are making a good show of it, in spite of all.

The years of body-breaking training, the money spent, the miles traveled, the joy of winning, the heartbreak of defeat. All these things make for the intense drama of the Olympic games which we all enjoy so very much every four years.

We are glad to see that some of the exceptionally stringent rules are beginning to be relaxed just a little bit this year. Bill always says, "The Olympics are the games where our best amateurs compete against the best professionals from all the other countries around the globe."

It is nice to learn more about the Korean culture as a sidelight of the Olympic events. They have done a super job of rolling out the welcome mat to the rest of the world.

It is almost as much fun to watch the proud parents up in the stands, yelling and waving their American flags, as it is to watch the actual events.

Those darling little girl gymnasts, who are always the sweethearts of every Olympiad, seem to be getting younger every year. The officials finally had to put a minimum age of 15 on this event. That would mean that most of them are sophomores in high school. They start their training by age six or eight and risk a lot of injuries along the road toward the elusive gold medal.

Dr. Robert Malina of the University of Texas says, contrary to rumors about too much exercise stunting their growth, the overall growth rate of young athletes in training is not slowed by intensive exercise. However, he notes that these young female gymnasts do suffer some problems related to speed combined with intricate movement. Frequent shocks to the growth plate of the wrist can cause the two bones in the forearm to grow unevenly and back injuries are also common.

America's 14-year-old Denise Parker is probably the youngest contender in this Olympiad. You may have seen this bubbly, unaffected young lady on the Johnny Carson Show last year as she demonstrated her fantastic abilities at the sport of archery. She will be competing against women more than twice her age.

It is about 5,000 miles from the West Coast of the U.S.A. to Seoul, Korea. But the traveling Olympic teams don't have anything over the traveling teams of Parmer County. Our football districts seem to be getting larger, or at least more spread out, every year.

At the end of this football season, the Friona team and its opposing teams will have traveled the highways of Texas for nearly 1,500 miles for the privilege of competing in the sport of football.

Bovina football players and opposing teams will have even farther to go. They will total close to 2,000 miles in their travels. These two teams and their opposition will rack up 3,500 miles going to and from football games this fall. That's half the distance to Korea where the Olympic teams are competing.

Board Sets 1988 Tax Rate

The Board of Trustees of Friona Independent School District met in regular session on Thursday, September 15 at 7:30 p.m. Highlights of the meeting included:

*Received the 1988 tax roll values as certified by the Appraisal Review Board. Net taxable value for 1988 is \$150,130,138.

*Passed an ordinance setting the 1988 tax rate at 77¢ per \$100 value. The 1988 rate is the same as the 1987 rate and will require the school district to spend approximately \$175,000 out of the district's fund balance.

*Superintendent Hal Ratcliff reported on school enrollment. As of September 15, 1289 students were enrolled, which is an increase of one student over the corresponding date in 1987.

*Approved student transfers who were not eligible to complete transfer request by May 1, 1988.

*Discussed Teacher Appraisal Methods for 1988-89.

*Danny Black was selected as delegate and Kathryn Goddard was selected as alternate delegate to the TASA/TASB Convention.

Fire Truck Request Is Ignored

The Parmer County Commissioners unanimously approved a county tax rate of .3035 per \$100 at its Monday meeting.

The new rate is up .0091 from this year (.2944).

The new budget's expenses are expected to be at \$2,170,915, up from this year's \$1,997,915. The county currently has a surplus of funds but will need to dip into it early next year until the bulk of the tax money comes due.

The commissioners spent the bulk of the 2-hour meeting talking with Friona officials and members of its volunteer fire department.

Before the discussion, the commissioners already had decided to change a recent decision involving subsidies to county ambulance crews. Previously, the amount for Friona had been cut and made the same as for Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie.

But last week, Friona officials asked the commissioners to reconsider that cut, noting the number of calls they make in the county. Monday, the commissioners approved \$800 to Friona for ambulance subsidy, and \$400 each to Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie.

Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe, speaking for the group, told the commissioners that the re-instated ambulance subsidy was now adequate, but the Friona group was asking for help toward buying a \$35,000 fire truck.

Monroe and Beelee Goodwin, Friona city manager, were the main speakers for the Friona folks.

Reception For Beards Is Tuesday

For the most part, farmers are anxious for the weather to clear off, so they can get on with their harvest operations.

A Mexican youngster brought by her parents to Brownsville, Texas, she quit school at the age of 12, after intelligence tests indicated she had an I.Q. of 64, some 30 points below average. This test was given in English when Dr. Quintanilla only spoke Spanish.

When her children needed her help to overcome the same problem, she wanted to go to school herself to learn how to help them learn. She then found out her records showed that she was "mentally retarded."

With a lot of persistence, she did go back to school. Taking classes in basic English, basic math and typing at Texas Southmost College, she started her education.

Her appetite for knowledge was insatiable. Three days a week, she studied at Texas Southmost; two days she attended classes at Pan American University in Edinburg,

70 miles away. After three years, she received both her junior-college degree and a Bachelor of Science degree, with honors, from Pan American.

She then cast her eyes on the University of Houston, where she could study Spanish literature. In 1971, she received her Master's degree; in 1977, her doctorate in education. In the years that followed, she became the first Latina to win the American Council of Education Fellowship.

The grade school dropout without a high school diploma is now Assistant Provost for the University of Houston.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill,

Last week in the Mayor of Friona's letter to the editor we were all made aware that 50% of fire calls made by the Friona Volunteer Firemen were outside the city limits of Friona. There wasn't any mention made of the dollars and cents required to operate and maintain this fire department.

In the City of Friona's budget hearing held September 12, 1988, it was revealed that the city was planning on allowing the fire department \$17,500.00 for the fiscal year 1988/89 (Oct. '88 thru Sept. '89). This figure is somewhat low as the city council voted to include the volunteer firemen with worker's compensation (which they previously did not have). This is to give the firemen some protection against total loss of income if a fireman was seriously injured in performing this duty. The cost of this insurance is approximately \$3,470.00 annually.

Additionally, the city provides firemen with water, sewer and trash at an estimated value of \$1,200.00 per month. This adds an additional \$14,400.00 a year to maintain the fire department. The city's monetary obligation now stands at \$35,370.00.

This seems like a lot of money and it is. However, it still takes

more to adequately clothe, equip, train and maintain the fire department. Through donations and fund raisers, the firemen try to ease the financial burden to the city as much as possible.

From September 1987 to September 1988, the Friona firemen spent \$13,275.73, mostly for training schools and aids. \$4,700.00 was spent for the air compressor that we use to fill our breathing bottles. The total now stands at \$48,645.73. This figure is without any major capital expenditures.

We now find, that in order to remain an accredited fire department, we must buy a new fire truck in 1989. The City of Friona doesn't have the funds available to absorb a \$70,000.00 expenditure. We took our problem before the Parmer County Commissioner's Court to see if they couldn't assume more of the financial burden of keeping up all the county's fire departments. We were amiably received and graciously given an extra \$500.00 per year for each department in the county.

This makes the county's contribution to each fire department \$4,000.00 annually. This amount is less than 1/10th of our annual budget needs when we make 1/2 our calls to the rural

areas outside the city limits. Again the county commissioners were approached during their budget hearing on September 12, 1988. This time there was no offer to help buy a truck or anything else.

Something is grossly unfair when the county commissioners and county judge control \$720,000.00 of taxpayers' money and won't turn loose of a small part of it to make sure their constituents are adequately protected if their places should catch fire. If you agree this seems unfair let your county commissioners or county judge know. Also, if you agree with their views, let them know.

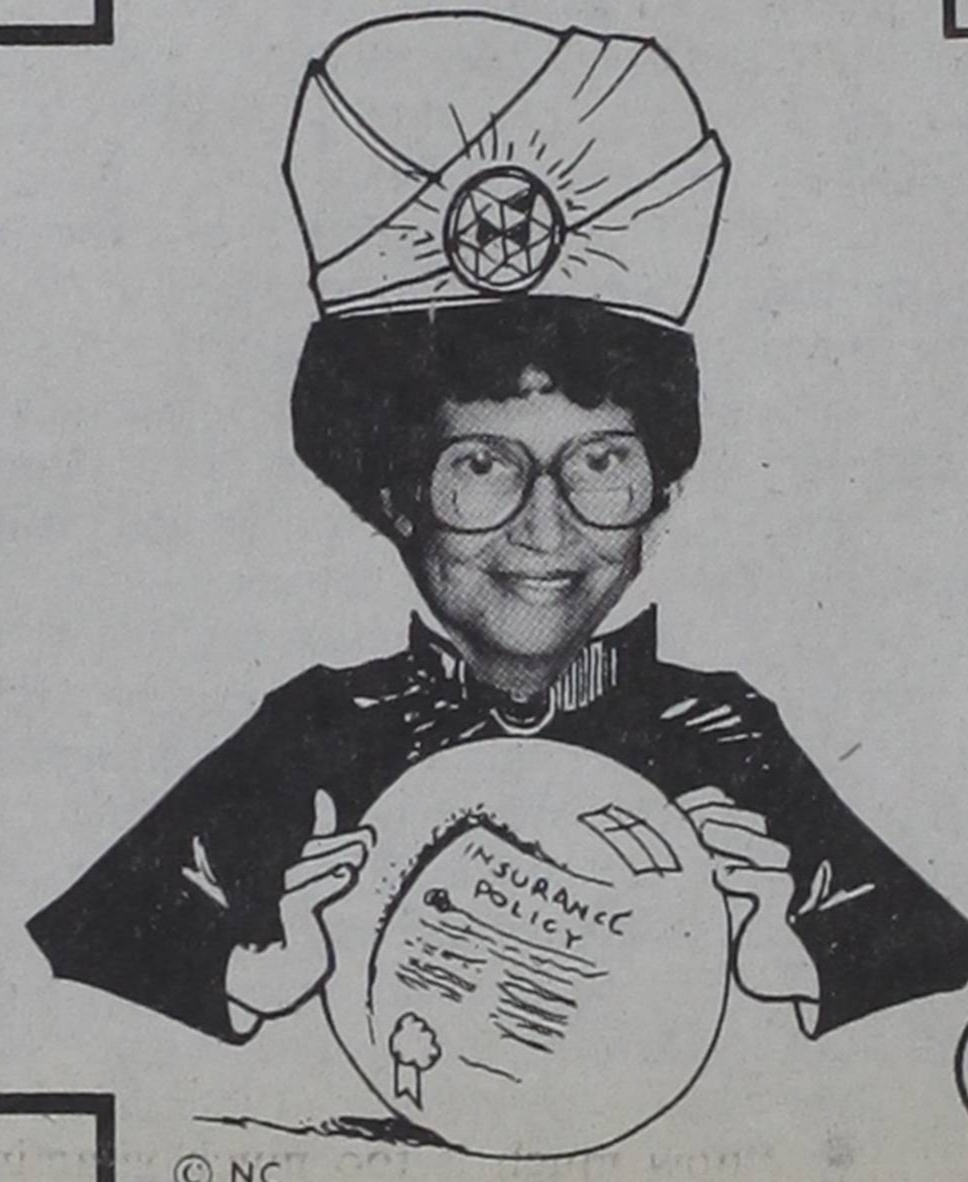

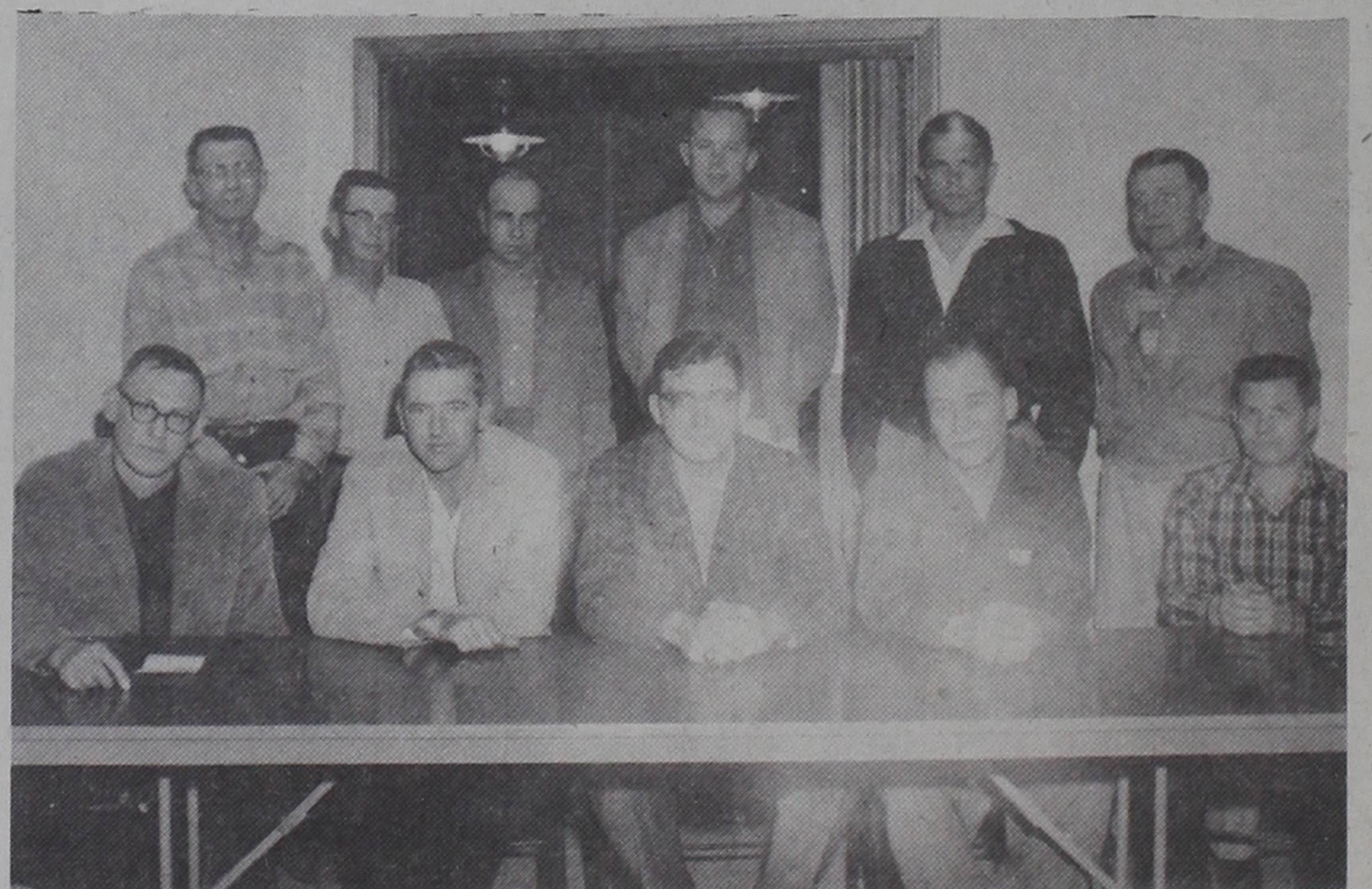
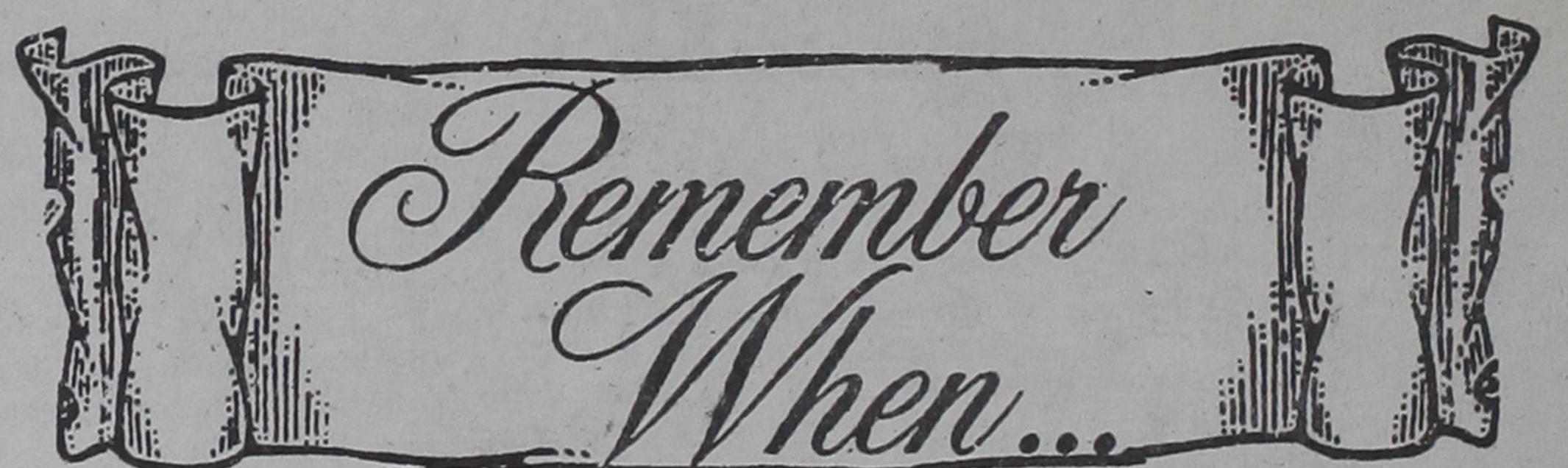

Scholarship Bank To Aid Students

Students and future students in need of supplemental funding for college were urged today to write to The Scholarship Bank for a free financial aid planning calendar and information on private scholarship sources.

According to the director of this national, non-profit foundation, an estimated half-billion dollars is available to high school and college students, many of whom may not know that they are eligible.

Funds are contributed by corporations, trade, civic and non-profit groups and are normally awarded on such basis as academic standing, college major, geographic preferences, areas of special interest and even on the student's willingness to consider a special research project. Parental factors such as union, employer or past military experience are also considered by some donors.

The Scholarship Bank works with financial aid counseling

offices throughout the U.S. to assist in distribution of the information on the approximately 3,500 scholarship sources. Each scholarship has a value of at least \$1,000 and many are renewable yearly.

Graduate level grants with values of up to \$25,000 are also available. All students receive from 20 to 65 different aid sources for which they are potentially eligible. For the 1988-89 school year, a number of new aid sources are available to students majoring in law, business, health, engineering, computer sciences and the humanities.

Setting The Record Straight On Vit. C

Many people have a tendency to believe "if a little is good, a lot is better." Consumers may use this adage when taking vitamin and mineral supplements, but the practice can often be dangerous.

Vitamin C is needed by the body for collagen formation, healing of wounds and resistance to infection. In addition, the absorption of iron is enhanced when vitamin C and iron are eaten together. However, Shelley Fillipp, outpatient dietician at Methodist Hospital, warns against the "megadosing" of vitamin C.

For example, pregnant women who take high doses may give birth to babies with unusually high vitamin C requirements. Unborn babies often adapt to the mother's high blood levels of vitamin C causing their own bodies to destroy the vitamin. This creates a need for larger amounts of the vitamin after birth.

Ms. Fillipp noted that other possible side effects of megadosing include gastrointestinal problems such as nausea and diarrhea, high uric acid content in the urine and interference with the white blood cells' activity in destroying bacteria.

How then do we determine, "how much is too much vitamin C?" According to Ms. Fillipp, side effects are often reported in the 1,000 mg or higher dose range.

However, she stated that side effects seem to be highly individual causing adversity for some, but not for others.

The following fruits and vegetables are outlined as excellent sources of vitamin C as well as other beneficial vitamins and minerals: red pepper, broccoli, brussel sprouts, green peppers, orange juice, kale, grapefruit juice, strawberries, one orange, raw oysters, cauliflower, turnip greens, mustard greens and collard greens.

The dietician noted that one cup portions, unless specified otherwise, provide more than 100 per cent of the recommended daily allowance of vitamin C.

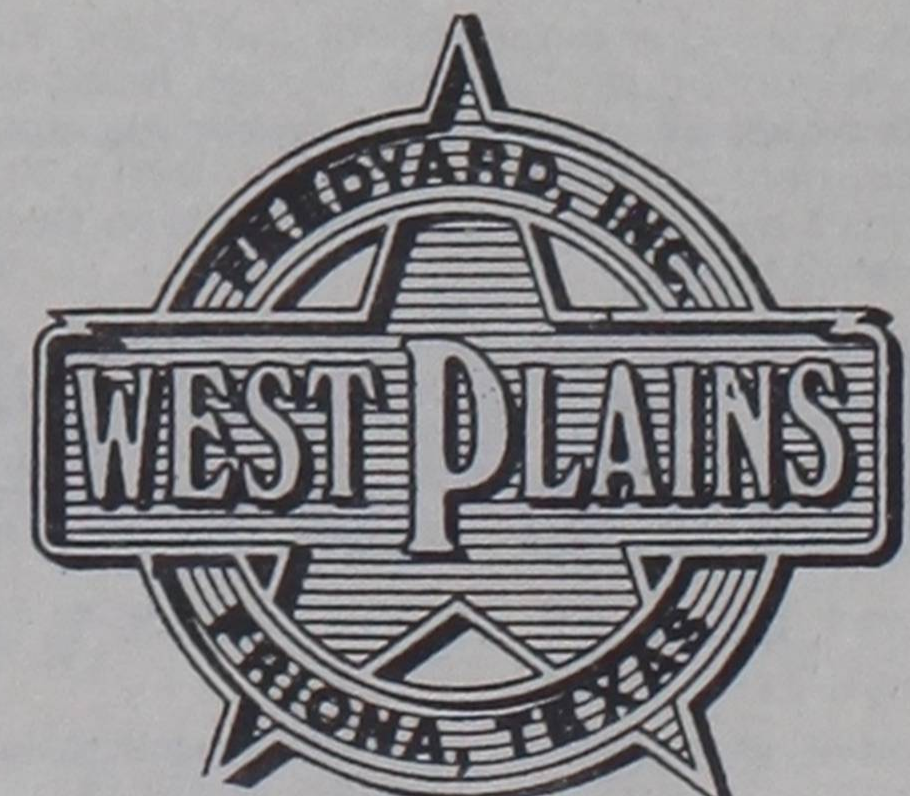

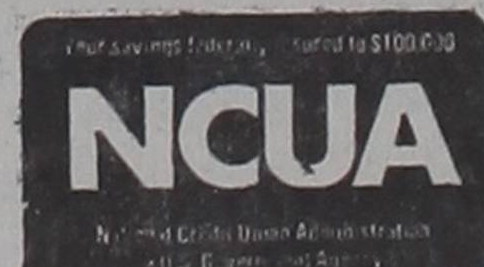

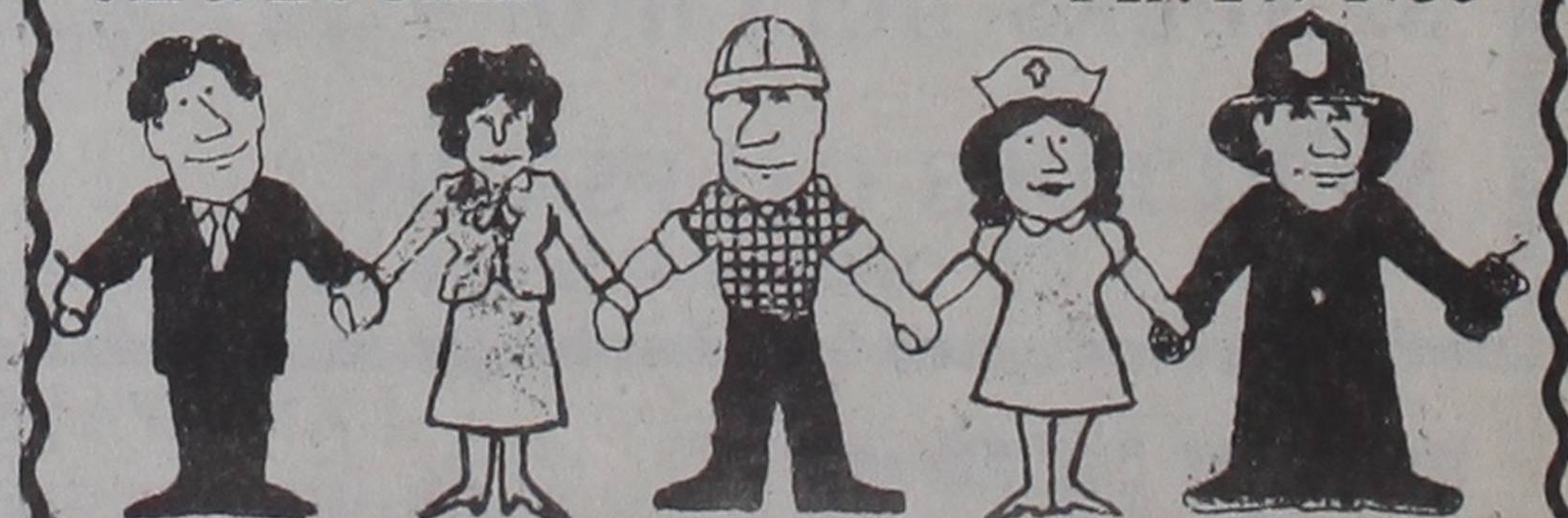

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Canyon Cruises Past Chiefs At H'Coming

At the same time that Hurricane Gilbert was flirting with the Texas Gulf Coast, the Canyon Eagles came up with their own hurricane, and blew right past the Friona Chieftains, 32-0, at Friona's Homecoming Game.

Call him "Hurricane Alexander" if you wish. Senior runningback Deron Alexander of the Eagles rushed for 186 yards, including a 57-yard dash for a touchdown to spark the Canyon win.

Canyon quarterback William Langley also had a good game. He

passed for 114 yards, including an 80-yard touchdown play to wide receiver Matt Watson in the visitors' big first period that opened up a 12-0 lead.

The Chieftains won the toss, and elected to let Canyon have the ball first. That was their first mistake of the ball game, as Canyon scored in their first two possessions to quickly break in front.

The Eagles drove 70 yards in 12 plays, capped by a 13-yard run by Tim Brewer with 6:43 on the clock for a 6-0 lead. A bad snap contributed to the PAT misfire.

The Chieftains could make only four yards in three plays and had to punt the ball back to the Eagles, who put it in play at their own 14 after a nice 45-yard punt by Andre Duran.

It looked like Canyon was in a hole on second and 18 from their own 20, but Langley found Watson in the flat, and the 173-pounder bulled his way past a pair of would-be Friona tacklers and lumbered his way 80 yards for the score.

A pass try for points was intercepted by Cody Burney and ran back to midfield. Under a new UIL rule, if Burney had returned

the ball all the way, it would have counted two points for the Chiefs.

The Chieftains finally held and forced a Canyon punt, but they still could not move the ball and had to punt it right back.

Canyon went 59 yards in seven plays, helped along by 25 yards in penalties against the Chiefs, and took an 18-0 lead when Langley again hit Watson in the end zone. A kick made the score 19-0.

Friona's only first down of the first half came after Burney ran nine yards on a keeper play and Ben Osborn bulled for five yards to Friona's 44.

Four plays later Canyon blocked Duran's punt and set up shop on the Friona 45.

Darran Procter recovered a Canyon fumble for a ray of hope for the Chiefs, but three plays found Friona again forced to punt.

That's when Alexander slanted to the outside and raced up the west sidelines 57 yards for a TD. The kick made it 26-0 and that was the halftime margin.

Friona took the second half kick and made an impressive drive. The Chiefs converted a big fourth down play at their own 39 when Osborn picked up the first down.

A few minutes later the 165-pound senior ran five yards into Canyon territory for another first down.

Burney hit Duran for a nifty 19-yard gain to the Canyon 23, as the drive took on a serious look.

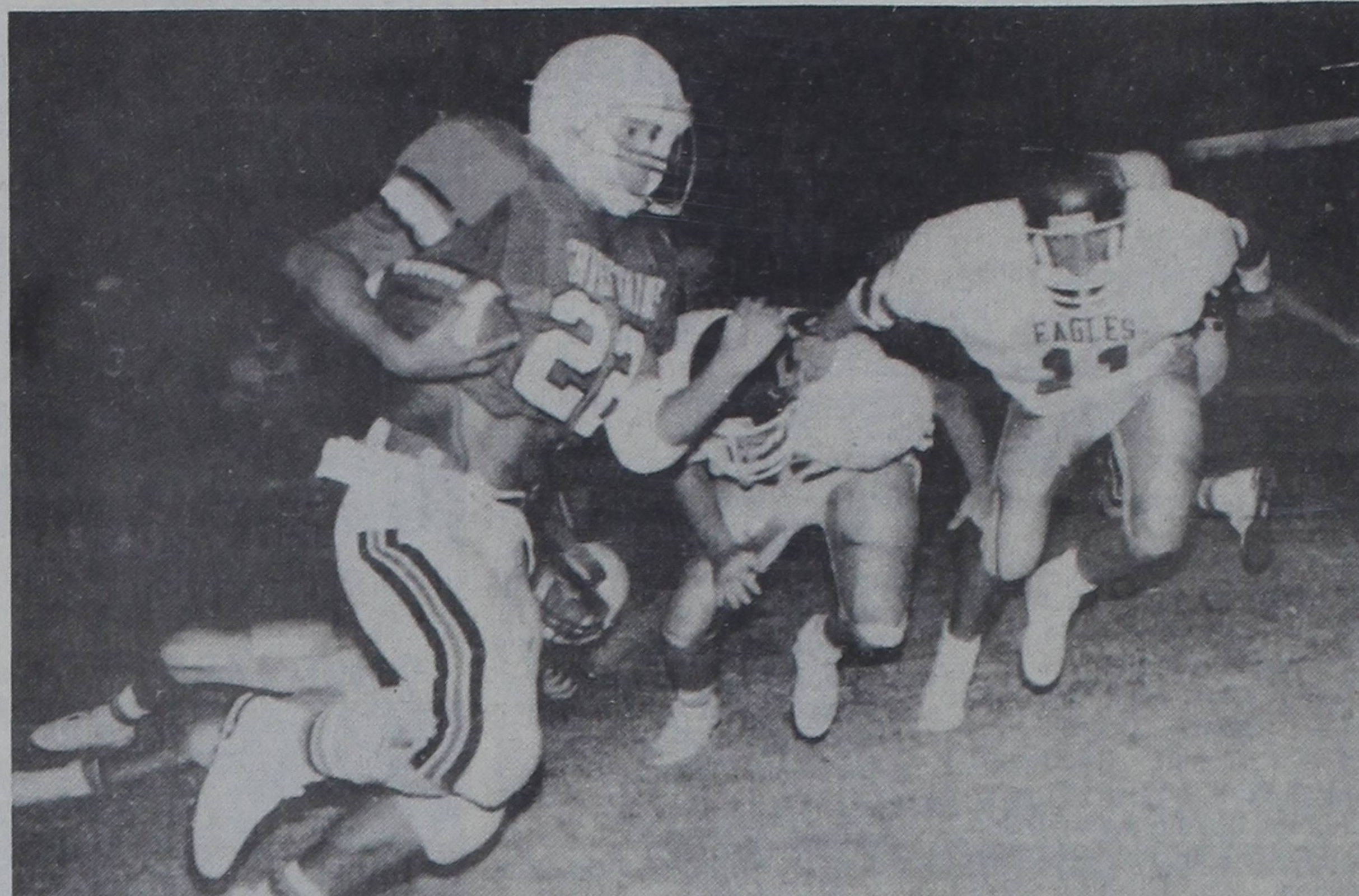
But an offside penalty against the Chiefs slowed the drive and on a second down play Friona lost the ball on a fumble.

A dippy-doodle play developed when Burney intercepted Langley's pass on Canyon's end of the field, but he fumbled as he was tackled and the Eagles got the ball.

Late in the third quarter, Alexander again broke loose for an 80-yard run for the final margin of 32-0.

A bright spot for the Chieftains was a 62-yard punt by junior Andre Duran, who had a 65-yard kick the week before. Duran averaged 44.7 yards per kick on six punts.

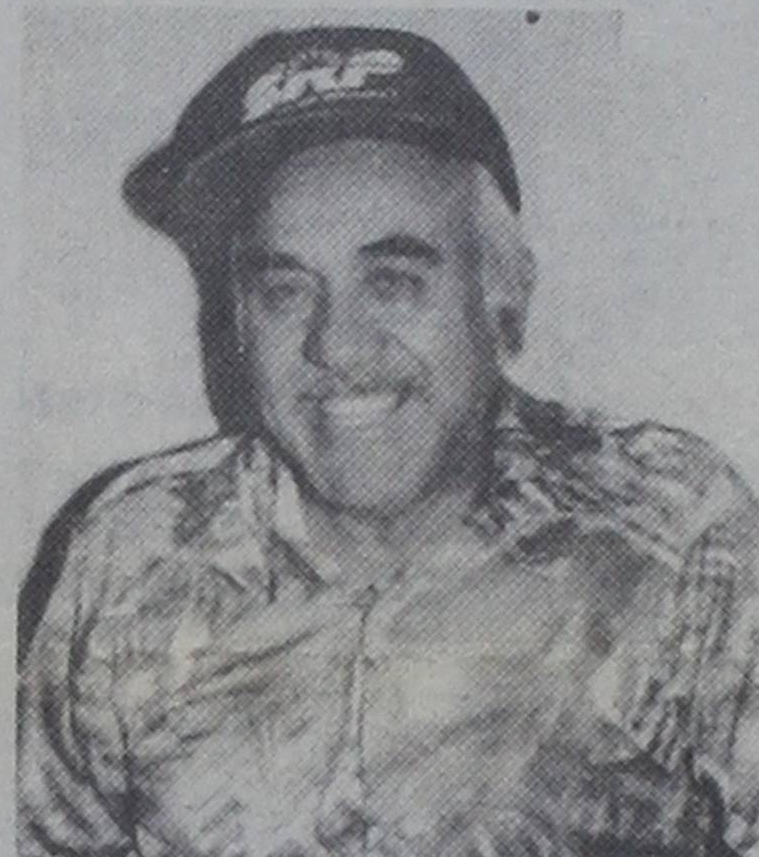
Bennie Trevino recovered a fumble for the Chiefs. Busy on defense were Steven Dickson, Louis Dunnam and Burney.
