PLANS CAMPAIGN TO CLEAN-UP CITY

Tech Committee Meets With B. C. D.—Suggestions And Support Is Offered The Committees.

ANGELO TRIP PLANS ARRANGED

Special Pullmans Favored to Make The Trip—Committee in Charge Continued—Everybody to Go.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention at San Angelo, The Texas Tech College, Clean-Up and many other things were discussed at a combined meeting of the Board of City Development and the Sweetwater Tech Committee held in the offices of the Board of City Development, Monday night. The Board, incidentally, sang its swan song, this being the last meeting as organized. The terms of office of all the members expires automatically and it is up to the mayor to appoint a new Board.

A real clean-up campaign was one topic that was closest to every member of the Board and Tech committees. With the filing of the Brief, the whole situation now revolves around local conditions at Sweetwater. It was pointed out that much had been accomplished along clean-up lines and that many had already co-operated with the committee. It was also pointed out, however, that many had not co-operated, with vacant lots and other odd nooks and crannies needing attention.

A general closing up of the town either for a day or half day, with organized effort on the part of everyone was discussed. The whole proposition was finally referred back to the Clean-Up Committee for action, with the promise of definite support from the others present in any course of action they may map out. This committee meeting Tuesday and their report will be published as soon as word is received.

To San Angelo. A delegation to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention at San Angelo, May 21, 22, 23, was another topic of interested discussion. Special Pullmans as used to Plainview last year, were favored by those present, as costing no more than hotels and being much more convenient. The Orient Railroad can furnish Pullmans if given sufficient notice, it was reported.

The band will be taken and at least three Pullmans used in addition to the many who will drive through in their cars. A committee composed of W. E. Wade, A. Levy, Rufus Wright, B. C. McCall, M. C. Manroe and L. G. Geer was continued in action to secure the pledging of attendance and arrangement of other details in connection with the trip.

A report was also rendered on renewals to members in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The committee asked for a little more time on this, reporting that satisfactory progress was being made.

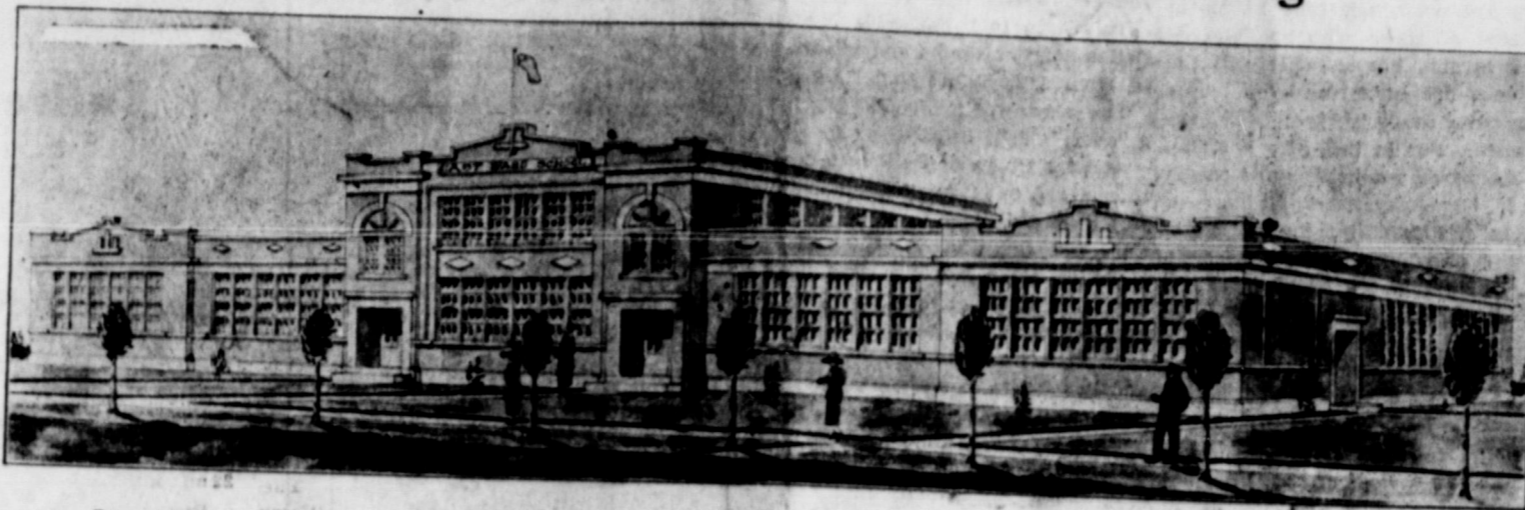
The committee on the Fisher County road reported favorably. Some weeks ago, Fisher County officials asked Sweetwater for financial aid in opening a new road from the end of the present pike past the oil mill north to Rotan, tapping territory in Fisher County that had never before been reached.

At a previous meeting of the Board, it was voted to extend financial aid not to exceed \$300 from the funds of the Board if this could be legally done if not then by private subscription. The Fisher County authorities were advised the financial aid would be forthcoming and work will be started as soon as the territory dries up sufficiently to work.

A report from the hospital committee revealed a small deficit in the funds raised by private subscription to equip this institution. Funds raised originally took care of the work that had been planned with some addition, but some unforeseen expense had occurred, notably in connection with the installation of the new sterilizer. This instrument cost Miss DeBerry. It was brought out, some \$1,100. The cost of installation was \$73. The Board instructed the financial committee to attempt to raise this amount.

It was emphasized that Sweetwater now has a first class hospital in every way, one with equipment and organization second to none anywhere. Everyone who has not visited the insti-

SUGAR CLIMBING

Answer To Government Attempt Comes In Form of Highest Prices Since June, 1920, Announced.

The United Press. SAN FRANCISCO, April 24.—The answer to the United States government's attempt to stabilize the sugar price, came today in the form of new high prices, the highest since June, 1920.

The price was increased here for the second time in 24 hours today. The Western and Spreckels Sugar companies announced an additional advance of five cents on the hundred pounds.

SUGAR JUMPS.

By The United Press. SAN FRANCISCO, April 24.—Cane sugar prices advanced 20 cents per hundred pounds here, making the new price \$19 to wholesalers at the refinery. This is the highest price since June, 1920.

MAN DROPS DEAD

W. M. Hagen Enroute From El Paso to Fort Worth Succumbs Here Heart Trouble Reason.

A man identified as W. H. Hagen, about 38 years old, and enroute from El Paso to Fort Worth, dropped dead on the sidewalk in front of the Texas Hotel Monday night about 6 o'clock.

Heart trouble and tuberculosis were given as causes of death. Papers found in the man's clothing gave the clue as to his identity and gave the address of a brother, Ben I. Hagen at Fort Worth. His only lodge affiliation seemed to be with the Eagles.

Orders were given the Wright Undertaking Company to ship the body to Fort Worth Tuesday night.

HARDING OPENS BROTHERS UNITED FIGHT FOR LEAGUE AFTER 37 YEARS

Served Notice On Members of Republican Party That He Was Irrevocably Committed To It.

Explains Three Fold Plans Houlton Changed His Name

Tells Newspaper Men at Associated Press Luncheon He Believes Step Necessary to Stop Wars.

NEW YORK, April 24.—President Harding today opened the campaign for American adhesion to the Court of the League of Nations, by serving notice on the members of his own party who have lined up in opposition to the proposal that he is irrevocably committed to it.

In the first speech he has made on the Court Plan since he submitted it to Congress early this year, the president intimated that he was determined to carry out his plan to the end.

To clear away the fogs of suspicion and doubt from the public mind. Enlist the whole people behind him and the plan, which he believes a step toward war prevention.

The statement of Harding was intended to answer and silence men high in the councils of the Republican party, whether because of hostility to Hagen who is suspected of wanting to get the United States into the League of Nations, or for other reasons opposing the court plan.

President Harding spoke at a luncheon of the Associated Press.

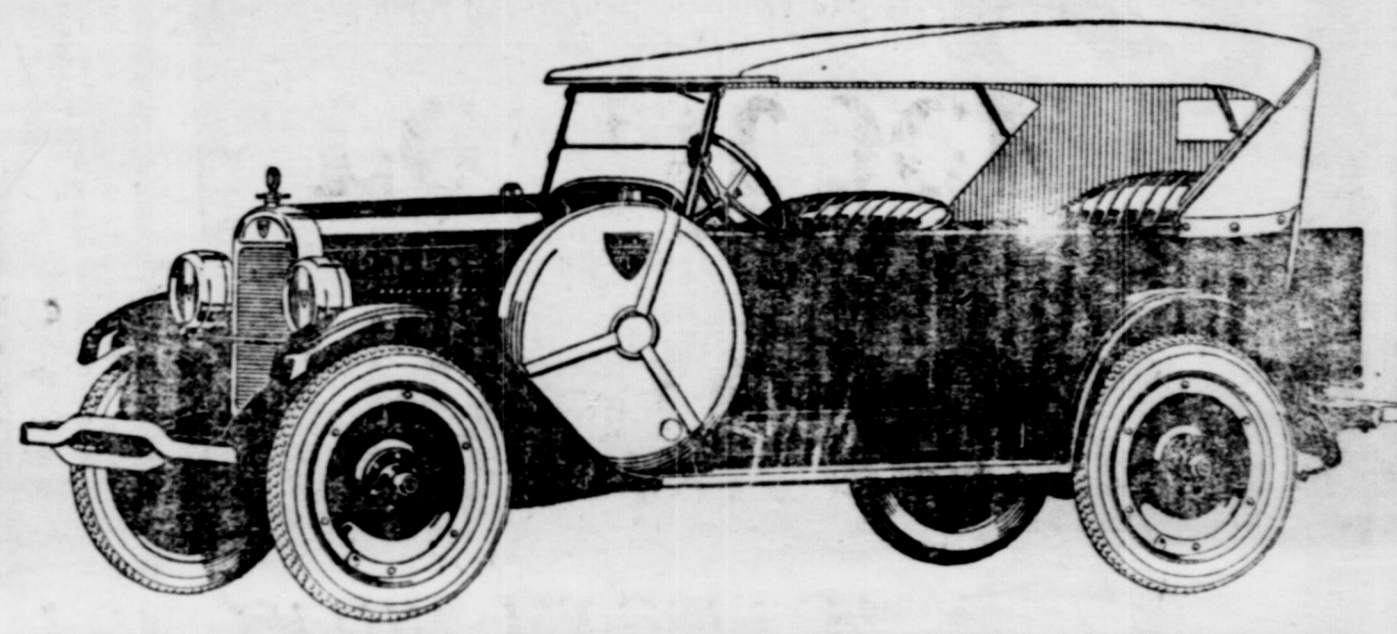

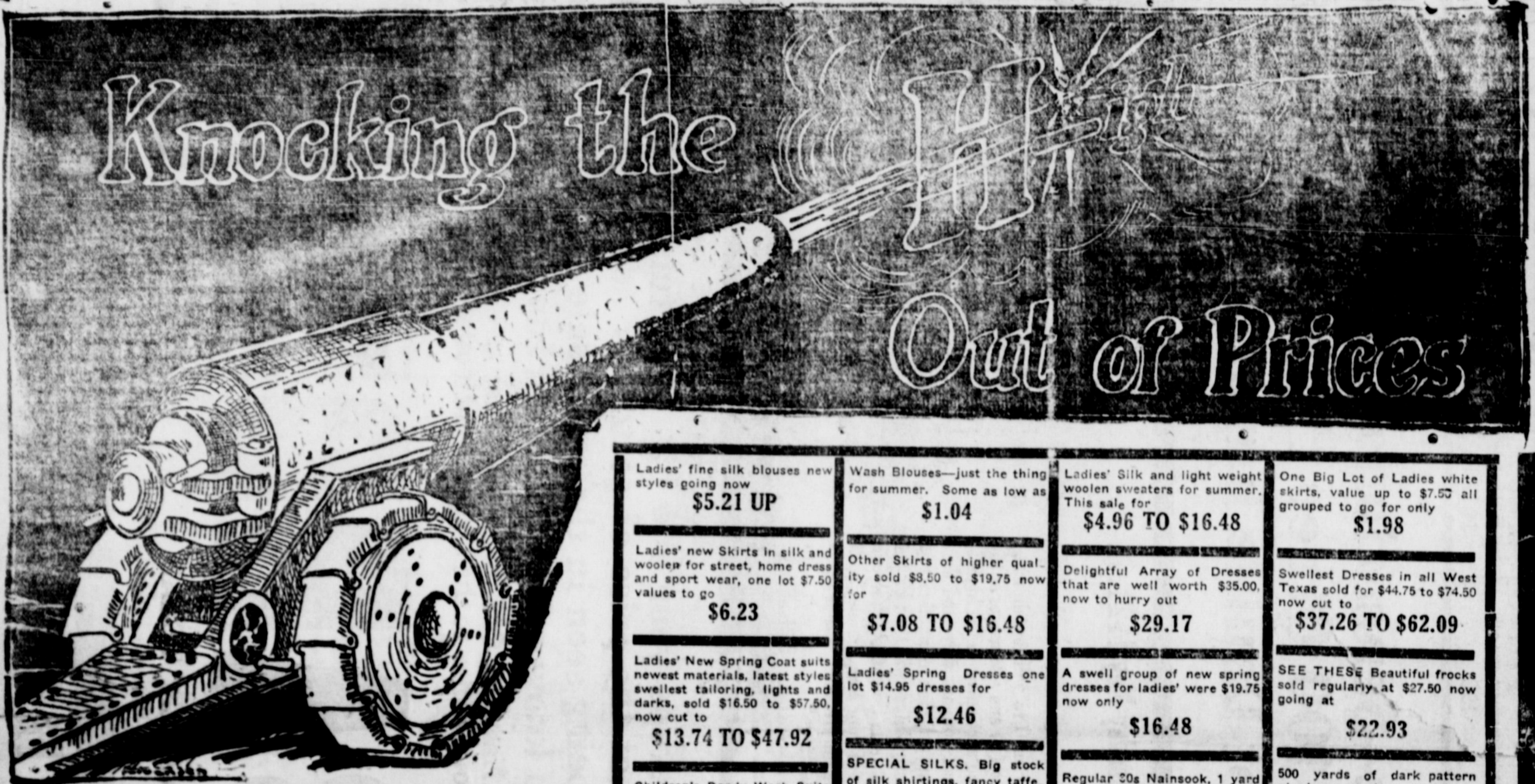
