SEARCHING FOR TRAIN WRECKERS

Two Men Who Shot at Fort Worth Salesman Between Ft. Chadbourne and Blackwell Answer Description

H. M. FERRILL TELLS THE STORY

Tells of Two Men Who Watched Him Cash Checks at Bronte Bank—Believed Wanted at Cisco.

The territory from Bronte to Blackwell is being combed assiduously by Sheriff Hawley Allen of Coke County and local authorities for two men who shot at a traveling salesman between Fort Chadbourne and Blackwell Wednesday afternoon, and whose descriptions tally with the men wanted by the authorities at Cisco in connection with the wreck of Texas & Pacific passenger trains, Nos. 15 and 16 recently.

The salesman who dodged so narrowly is H. M. Ferrill, leathergoods, with headquarters at Fort Worth. Mr. Ferrill visited Robert Lee Wednesday, made some sales and some collections, and ate lunch late at Bronte. He asked two men standing near the lunch room where the bank was. He noticed that they followed him to the bank and observed him place currency given him in his pocket in exchange for checks from merchants, although he paid no attention to them at the time.

Leaving Bronte, he called on a merchant at Fort Chadbourne, filled his car with gas and water and drove on. About half way between there and Blackwell, a shot rang out and a bullet grazed the back of his neck, he said. He did not stop to argue the matter, but drove right on, hurriedly a little further up the road, he came to a motorist fixing a flat tire, and asked him if he had seen anyone in the vicinity where the shooting had been done. Said motorist had, and described the two men Mr. Ferrill had observed earlier in the day at Bronte.

Reaching Sweetwater, Mr. Ferrill related the incident to W. W. Gibson, local Texas & Pacific passenger agent and it was Mr. Gibson who remarked upon the resemblance of the men to the ones wanted in connection with the Texas & Pacific wreck at Cisco.

Local authorities were promptly notified and also Sheriff Hawley Allen of Coke County and the description of the men wanted broadcast. The Texas & Pacific railroad is offering \$5,000 reward for the arrest and conviction of the men wanted at Cisco.

FIX SALARIES.

School Board Discusses Budget; Adjourns Until Friday Night.

The School Board met in session Wednesday night, and after an evening of hard work on the budget for next year, adjourned to meet again Friday night. The Friday meeting will be the third within the week.

At the Wednesday night meeting, salaries of teachers were fixed as follows:

Grade teachers, \$90 per month. Ward School principals, \$115 per month.

High School teachers, \$125 per month. Mexican teacher, \$75 and negro teacher \$55.

Election of teachers for the ensuing year had been planned for this meeting, but the Board did not get to it at this meeting.

TO BRIDGE LAKE

Bridge Across City Lake Fork to Cost Over Two Thousand Dollars. Will Open West Side.

Work was started this morning on the bridge across the South arm of the City Lake, and when this bridge is completed, it will open up the West shores of the lake to campers and travelers and in addition, will afford a beautiful site for picnics and outings.

The bridge is being built by the Austin Bridge Company of Dallas, and Mr. Wilson of that company is in Sweetwater, personally supervising the construction of the structure. The bridge will cost the city of Sweetwater \$2,270, according to Mr. Wilson.

Mr. Wilson declared that the bridge would have been completed some time ago, but for railroad conditions and a scarcity of material. The last car of material arrived last night and practically all of the material is now on the ground. These materials were delayed five weeks.

The bridge is to be 140 feet long and 15 feet high. The drive-way for vehicles will be ten feet wide and there will be sidewalks on each side four feet wide. Only one car can cross the bridge at a time, but as the bridge is short it will cause no trouble. Mr. Wilson stated that the bridge was to be a very substantial structure, and of the best of creosoted material and would last for years. The bridge will probably be completed within the next thirty days.

BADGER WETS WIN

Wisconsin Assembly Approves Tucker Repeal Bill After Two Hours Of Debating—Vote Close.

By The United Press. MADISON, Wis., June 7.—The Wisconsin Assembly struck the first blow in the west against prohibition when it today approved the Tucker bill, a repeal of the prohibition amendment, and is subject to an engrossment of 47 to 43 votes.

The question of final passage is expected to go through in its favor by virtue of 47 to 43 votes.

After final passage, the bill will go to the senate. A hard fought battle which lasted two hours preceded the victory for the "wets."

HELP OTHERS IS GERMANY MAKES MEADOR'S THEME PUBLIC NEW NOTE

Says People Who Live Upright And Honorable Lives Can Do the Most Good in World.

REVIVAL ATTRACTING CROWDS

Large Crowd Attends Morning Service—Many From Out of Town—Will Preach To Women Friday.

In his sermon Wednesday night, Rev. C. B. Meador made an appeal for the people of the nation to begin to make some effort to do some good in the world, to help those who need friendship and love and for people, to simply "be a friend to man."

"Every man and woman in the world can help make the world a better place to live in," he said. Rev. Meador urged that people develop character and let their own lives be beyond reproach so they might influence others.

"Until your sons and daughters develop character that can stand the test, there will never be any civilization," declared Meador. "One thing that is winning men and women all over the country, is the beautiful life of christian people."

There was a large congregation at the Wednesday night service as well as the service Wednesday morning where many out of town people were present. The special sermon for women will be Friday morning.

By his sincere and heart-to-heart messages he is delivering, Rev. Meador is attracting large crowds each night, and all who have heard this speaker can profit by attending the meetings at the tabernacle on Lamar street.

VISITS BIG LAKE WELL.

C. W. Hughes of Carteret Oil Company Says Well is Producer.

C. W. Hughes, petroleum engineer and geologist, was in Sweetwater Thursday morning enroute to Tulsa, Okla. Mr. Hughes, who is with the Carteret Oil Company, has just returned from Crockett and Reagan Counties where he has been in the interest of his company.

While in Reagan County he visited the new wildcat oil well which recently blew in west of Big Lake. "The well is certainly a producer," declared Mr. Hughes. "I saw it flow for 32 minutes without a stop. In that time it flowed from 75 to 100 barrels. It will certainly be a blessing for that county, if they open up an oil field there," he said.

He stated that wells were being drilled fourteen miles south of the Big Lake well, in Crockett County, and one rig was on the ground five miles west of the well in Reagan County. Representatives from many large oil companies are reported visiting the scene of the new producer.

HIT FORT WORTH.

Government Investigation Oil Stocks Decreases Postal Receipts.

Proposes Payment of 1,200,000,000 Gold Marks Annually On Reparations To The Allies.

IT IS EQUIVALENT TO \$300,000,000

To Raise Money By Mortgages On National Railroads And Factories And Luxury Taxes.

BERLIN, June 7.—The Germans proposed a payment of 1,200,000,000 gold marks annually on the reparations.

According to Chancellor Cuno, the money will be raised as follows:

1.—Five hundred million marks will be raised through a mortgage on the national railroads.

2.—Another 500,000,000 marks to be raised on the mortgage of commerce and factories, etc.

3.—And 200,000,000 marks by luxury tax.

The lesser amount would increase according to the economic conditions of the country.

The amount in marks which Germany proposes is the equivalent of \$300,000,000.

The note makes it clear that the German industry would be mobilized.

OIL AT HERRING

Orient Asks Permission To Cut Employee Wages

CHICAGO, June 7.—Texas oil flowed into the hearing before the railroad labor board of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway's application for permission to reduce wages of sixteen classes of employees approximately 20 percent, when U. B. Kent, an engineer, told of a new well being brought in recently at Big Lake Texas.

Kent who operates a passenger train out of San Angelo, was used as a witness by union and brotherhood leaders who sought to show that development of a new oil field would mean heavy business and new revenues for the road which now is being operated by a receiver.

Representatives of the road did not evidence any special enthusiasm over the oil well at Big Lake, but without depreciating, merely called attention to other prospective oil fields which had failed to produce and indicated that it was too early to compute the revenues their railroad might obtain thru development of a new field.

AT ABILENE.

Farm Bureau At Work On Second Poultry Pool.

ABILENE, June 7.—The Texas Farm Bureau Federation of Dallas has its state organizer of the poultry producers, Freeman Neal, in Abilene to begin work on organizing the Abilene unit.

The first unit for Texas has lately been organized with Sweetwater as Unit Head and Charter was already being granted this year by the State. Being incorporated under the name of Southwestern Farm Bureau Poultry Producers Association. This organization has under contract 160,000 hens and they are still adding new members daily.

ENGINE FAILED.

Sunshine Special Delayed Thursday Morning West of Toyah.

It was noon Thursday before the Sunshine Special, eastbound, passed through Sweetwater. The side rods on the locomotive dropped at Boracho, which means "Too Much Drunk" in Spanish. Anyway, the conductor had to walk from there to Vent, ten miles, in order to summon another engine from Toyah, thirty miles east.

Two Seriously Injured When Street Car And Auto Collide.

It was pointed out that all schools make an itemized account of all money spent at time of appropriations.

APPORTIONMENT IS \$100.

AUSTIN, June 7.—A \$1 per capita apportionment to public schools was made by the state board of education late yesterday. This brings the allotment for the school year just ending to \$12.50. The apportionment yesterday totals approximately \$1,300,000.

CUT APPROPRIATIONS.

AUSTIN, June 7.—After cutting \$11,900 from the eleventh appropriation bill the house late yesterday finally passed the measure by a vote of 97 to 10. As passed, the bill carries items amounting to \$6,470,000, a reduction of \$755,000 from the appropriation made by the last session and voted by Governor Neff. The miscellaneous claims appropriation bill also was passed.

SLAYER SOUGHT

Ten Girls And Women Quizzed In Connection With Murder of R. C. Tesmer.

CHICAGO, June 7.—A dozen or more girls and women were quizzed by the police who are in search of the bandit murderer of Richard Tesmer, insurance adjuster last night.

The attorney notified the police that if the slayeress is caught that she will be speedily tried and given a death sentence.

Mrs. Tesmer failed to identify three of the women. They are looking for the girl "with blue eyes and a peculiar laugh."

"That cold blooded wanton laugh of the girl who shot my husband, I will never forget. It haunts me," said Mrs. Tesmer.

Tesmer was returning home with his wife after a short visit with her sister. Just when he started to back his automobile into the garage, the girl and a man stepped out from the shadows and commanded the couple at the point of pistols to put their hands up and get out of the car.

In an attempt to take Mrs. Tesmer's wedding ring off, Mr. Tesmer interceded and without a word the girl swung around and fired. He fell, dying instantly.

"Blackwell, Texas, June 2, 1923. Editor Reporter: Since an editor is supposed to know something about most all things, I am writing you to ask you a question or two.

"We live on a farm in the Blackwell territory, consisting of 200 acres. One hundred acres are in cultivation. There are seven of us in family. Two boys and three girls, my husband and myself. We all work in the field, yet we can hardly get by. We have our taxes to pay in January. My husband has a premium on his life insurance to pay in March. We pay to the land bank \$63 in June. In October my husband has another life premium to pay, and in December, we have another payment on our land to the Federal Land Bank of \$63. During this time we must be clothed and fed. When we have met these bills, we have very little left. We want to put our oldest girl in school. We need a new house to live in and my old man certainly needs a barn for his stock and his feed. We need a yard fence and some good lot fences. My husband talks of dropping his life insurance, but for the children's sake I would rather not, even if it is a burden upon us.

"Old age is surely creeping upon us. These debts must be paid. The children ought to go to school and be able to put up a better fight in the world than we have.

"Now, I have told you of our condition. If we could meet our obligations and feed and clothe the family without going into our cotton money, we could fix our farm up like a home and educate these boys and girls of ours. Can you tell me how to do it? "Thanking you for any suggestion or advice you may give us. I am,

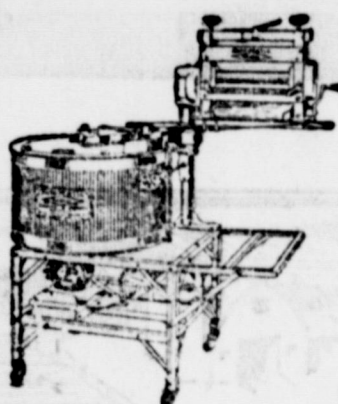

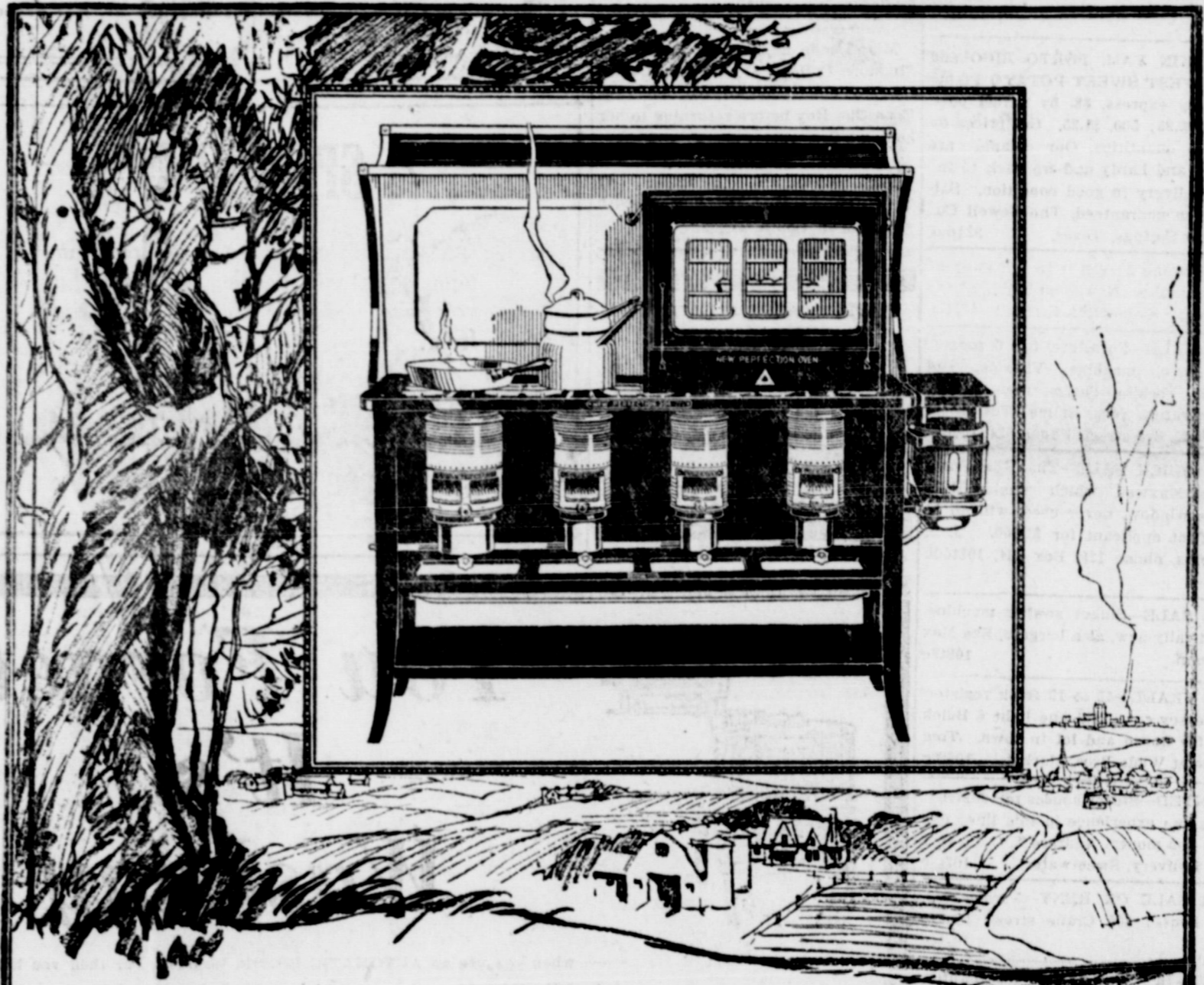

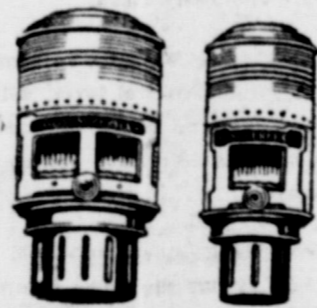
