CREATE HAVOC IN HOG POPULATION

City Commission Adopts Ordinance Forbidding Hogs to Be Kept Within Defined Limits.

NEGOTIATE WITH THE T. & P.

Culvert, Crossing Watchman And Depot Matters Under Discussion—First National Bid Highest.

Creating havoc in the hog population was the principal item of business at the regular meeting of the City Commission Thursday afternoon.

Other items included the selection of the First National Bank as city depository, several items for continued negotiation with Texas & Pacific railroad officials and other matters.

The hog ordinance passed first reading. It will have to be read again which will make it effective about July 1. It provides that no hogs shall be kept within the limits prescribed in the ordinance under penalties provided there, each day after the ordinance becomes effective constituting a separate offense.

The limits are briefly as follows:

"Beginning at the Texas & Pacific railroad tracks at Haley street, running north to North Third, west to Beall street, north to the J. F. Newman property, west to Ragland street; north one block, west one block to Crane, north on Crane to 12th, west to Oak street, south on Oak to 10th, west one block, south on Pecan to 6th, west to Mulberry, south along the east boundary of the Western Addition to Orange street, south to the Texas & Pacific track, east along North First to the middle of block 23, south on Galveston street to South Second, east to Nueces street; south to South Fourth, east to El Paso, north to B. Street, east to middle of Archer addition, north to the boundary of the Archer addition, east to Musgrove street, north to North First Street, and east to place of beginning."

City Depository.

Only two bids were submitted for keeping the city's funds. The City National Bank offered two and one quarter per cent interest on daily balances, and the First National Bank offered three per cent.

An ordinance changing the period of time for adding ten per cent penalty to water and sewer bills and cutting off service for non-payment of bills from 60 days to 15 days was adopted.

Confer With T. & P. Officials.

Matters under negotiation with the Texas & Pacific railroad include the culvert under the tracks east of town which the railroad has agreed to install, a resolution asking that a crossing watchman be maintained at Galveston street, where one or two deaths were reported to have occurred, and consideration of a request from the Texas & Pacific for use of the passenger station platform by service car drivers, etc. On the latter point, Mayor Boothe is writing Superintendent A. E. Pistole at Big Spring requesting a conference so that matters can be arranged.

Dairy Condition In Bad Shape.

A recent inspection of the dairies supplying milk to the city by City Health Officer Dr. A. H. Fortner and Sanitary Inspector Dr. O. Stephenson, were discussed. Some of these dairies were reported to be in very bad shape from a standpoint of sanitation and an inspector from the State Health Department has been sent for.

A resolution requiring property owners adjacent to the Christian Church to build sidewalks was adopted.

Can't Turn In Middle of Street.

A traffic regulation prohibiting auto drivers from turning around in the middle of the block in front of the postoffice was also adopted. According to Chief of Police Johnson, it will be necessary to go to the end of the block before turning.

Plans for the filtration plant were discussed, but members of the commission stated that they were dissatisfied with the plans submitted by George Duren, engineer in charge, and asked for additional proposals.

TWO MEN ARRESTED.

Local Authorities Hold Suspects For Texas & Pacific Officer.

G. N. and E. A. Jones are being held by local authorities for inspection by Texas & Pacific Agent Father, who is aboard Train No. 23.

The men were asleep in a box car in the Santa Fe yards when picked up Friday morning and their resemblance to the men wanted in connection with the Texas & Pacific wreck at Dehan some weeks ago led to their being held.

According to their story, they were employed at the Swenson Ranch at Stamford from May 19 to 31 and the wreck occurred on May 23. Their story is partially confirmed by Chief of Police Flournoy at Stamford. The men say they were on their way to Utah.

DONATE LAND.

City and County Add to South Ward Playground Space With Block.

Nolan County and the City of Sweetwater have deeded to the School Board a block of land lying immediately south and adjoining the land occupied by the South Ward school. The block is known as Block 18, Highland addition.

Playgrounds available for the school are thereby much enlarged.

PHELPS IS BURIED

Father of Mrs. B. L. Clayton of Sweetwater Dies At Abilene—Rev. D. B. Doak Preaches Funeral.

ABILENE, Texas, June 8.—S. L. Phelps, a resident of Abilene for fifteen years and one of the best known real estate men in this section, died at a local hospital at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon after an illness extending over a period of nine weeks.

The funeral was held at four o'clock Thursday afternoon conducted by the Rev. D. B. Doak of Sweetwater, former pastor of the First Methodist church here. Burial was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. The pall bearers were Jim McGee, J. W. Wade, J. I. Walker, Wiley Dodd, J. L. Lovelace, H. T. Hodge and J. L. Lasby.

Mr. Phelps was born in Collins County, Texas, fifty-three years ago. He lived there until he grew to manhood. In 1891 he was married to Miss Angie Scarbrough of Bosque county. They lived at Dublin, Texas, for many years before coming to Abilene in 1908. Besides the widow two daughters and three sons survive him, as follows: Mrs. B. L. Clayton, of Sweetwater, Miss Lois Phelps, Royal Phelps and S. L. Phelps, Jr., Abilene, and Aquilla Phelps of Greeley, Colorado.

Mr. Phelps was engaged in the real estate business throughout his residence in Abilene, until about nine weeks ago when ill health overtook him. He had a large acquaintanceship in this section and leaves many friends to mourn his departure.

Out of town relatives and friends attending the funeral were Mr. P. Scarbrough of Electra; Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Wade of Sweetwater; Joe and Dock Miller, uncles of Mr. Phelps, from Comanche county.

BODY IN CULVERT.

Fashionably Dressed Woman Murdered In Youngstown, Ohio.

ILLINOIS HAS "WET" BILL, TOO

Too Late to Pass This Session Legislature—Wisconsin Senator Missing—Foul Play Suspected.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 8.—A bill to repeal the state prohibition enforcement in Illinois was introduced in the state legislature here today by Representative O'Grady of Chicago and was referred to a committee.

The bill provided for a referendum. There will not be time for the bill to pass this session, as the legislature is due to adjourn within a few days. Several "wet" bills have been defeated previously during this session.

SENATOR MISSING.

Moran has dropped utterly out of sight and cannot be located either at his home or in his customary haunts.

HAVE NO PLAN

WASHINGTON, June 8.—With bootleggers on the Canadian border pouring thousands and thousands of gallons of liquor into the United States as the result of the repeal of the New York state enforcement laws, Federal officials here view the situation with indifference, saying that the gravity of the border situation is grossly exaggerated.

Prohibition Commissioner Haynes in direct charge of the Federal enforcement states that there is no change in governmental plans and who is Haynes' chief, states that if Secretary Mellon of the Treasury there are any plans for enforcement with reference to the situation in New York state he has not been advised.

HUNTWIFE BEATER

Dallas Police Search For Man Who Beat Up 14-Year-Old Bride—She Is In Hospital Seriously Hurt.

DALLAS, June 8.—Police are searching for George Caven, 26, auto rent car driver, whose 14-year-old bride is in a hospital in a serious condition from a beating she claims he administered to her.

The two separated recently. She states that she attended a movie alone last night and when returning was accosted by Caven. Under the threat of death, she got into his car and was taken to a lonely lake and beaten until she fainted.

TWO GIRLS DISAPPEAR.

Two Men Arrested In Connection With Their Alleged Kidnapping.

RANGER, June 8.—Two Ranger men were arrested at Gainesville in connection with the disappearance of Winnie Lee Harper, 14, and Odessa Aeren, 17. Both girls live at Cheaney, ten miles south of here and have been missing since late Monday night.

No clues have been obtained as to the whereabouts of the girls and authorities and relatives are using every effort to throw some light on the mystery.

Both of the arrested men deny any connection with the affair.

Reduction in Appropriation of Educational Bill Is \$1,400,000—Total Amount Is \$10,450,504.

PROPOSERS HASTEN ACTION

Proposed Amendments Are Sidetracked—Senate Passes Sulphur Production Tax Bill 17 to 6.

AUSTIN, June 8.—Without a single deduction on the floor of the House, the General Educational Appropriation bill finally passed the House early today.

As passed, the bill carries with it an appropriation for the next biennium of \$10,450,504, a decrease of \$1,400,000 as passed by the second called session.

Proponents of the bill were well organized and all amendments were shut off.

After engrossment amendments offered were voted down.

The bill taxing sulphur production was passed in the Senate by a vote of 17 to 6.

The Baugh bill amending the Rural Credit Act passed at the regular session was also passed.

He was taken to a hospital and is in a precarious condition.

Another letter was found addressed to Mrs. K. K. Isbell, Whitewright, Texas, and a statement therein read: "Because my girl has shattered my heart."

CREWS RESCUED

Two Steamers Pile Up on Rocks of Crikoff Island South of Alaskan Peninsula In Terrific Storm.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 8.—The crews of two ships, victims of a double disaster at the Crikoff Islands, 100 miles south of Alaskan peninsula, were saved today by the U. S. Ship Cuyama.

The mine sweeper Cardinal and the Supply Ship Discoverer, were both rammed by the windlashed waves onto the rocky reefs of the island. The Cardinal piled up late yesterday afternoon and appeared to be a total loss. The Discoverer came to the rescue after calls for aid had been sent out and met the same fate.

Crews of both steamers, totaling 135 men, were taken aboard the Cuyama.

NAVAL REVIEW.

United States Navy to Concentrate at Seattle, Washington July 27.

ELECT OFFICERS LUNCHEON CLUB

L. J. Geer Promoted From Vice-President to President—James H. Beall, Jr., Made Vice-President.

ERWIN SELLS COLLEGE SITE

Tells of Advantages Sweetwater Has In Land—Lackey Talks of Poultry and Its Possibilities.

Election of officers, Tech matters, poultry and other matters occupied the attention of the Sweetwater Club at the regular meeting Thursday night which was preceded by one of the best dinners the club has ever sat down to.

Officers elected included L. J. Geer, as president to succeed C. E. Mays; James Henry Beall, Jr., as vice-president, succeeding Mr. Geer, who was promoted and re-election of J. A. McCurdy as secretary-treasurer. A mail ballot of the members to ascertain their wishes regarding noon luncheons instead of evening meetings, during the summer at least, will be taken. Jack Yarbrough presided as chairman. J. C. Babb introduced W. L. Barlow from Austin as his successor in Sweetwater.

J. A. McCurdy reported for the Tech committee as being thoroughly on the job, with frequent meetings and told of the various phases of the work now being done, also briefly reporting for the Clean-Up Committee, Harry Bondies being unable to be present. The town never has presented so clean, spruce and span appearance, nor one so well painted as now, although there is work yet to be done.

C. O. Erwin reported for the site. He told of the nearly 6,000 acres under option, of the building location and the view to be had therefrom, and of the character of the soils to be found in various portions of the large area under option.

"Land is my business and has been my business for years. I know the various kinds of soils to be found in West Texas by intimate study of the various portions of this part of the state. And I tell you frankly that no where can there be found two thousand acres better suited for college purposes than this site chosen by Sweetwater. Here can be shown by actual demonstration how to handle the mellow chocolate loam, the 'tight' land, the rolling, washing hill land; in fact, every kind of soil that West Texas farmers are called upon to till."

Mr. Erwin is West Texas representative for a large Kansas City Land Loan Company and upon his sayso depends loans of thousands and thousands of dollars. And the foregoing paragraph is the way he sums up Sweetwater's site for the Texas Tech College.

G. A. Lackey told of the successful inauguration of Texas' first poultry pool, which now has 800 members signed up in Nolan and adjacent counties and which will need cold storage facilities in Sweetwater in order to function properly.

The financial benefits to Sweetwater merchants accruing from the stimulation of the poultry industry were stressed by Mr. Lackey who said:

"There are 1,000 farms in Nolan County. Not a one of them but what could raise 100 turkeys a year; 500 chickens and eggs galore. Figure it out for yourself what this amount of poultry would mean. Figuring conservatively, it would mean half a million dollars for turkeys, half a million for chickens and another half a million for the eggs. Last year Nolan County produced 15,000 bales of cotton which at \$100 the bale brought \$1,500,000. The same amount could be produced from poultry easily and without in any way interfering with the cotton production."

Mr. Lackey closed with words of appreciation to Sweetwater business men for the co-operation already extended the poultry industry.

H. M. Shade was named chairman for the next meeting.

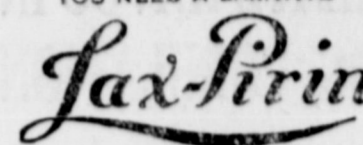

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

ICE CREAM.

There are two general forms of ice cream. One in which the materials are uncooked, the other in which the materials are cooked before freezing. Here are a few receipts. Pick out the one you want and give it a trial, the results will be satisfying if instructions are followed.

CARAMEL ICE CREAM.

Melt half cup of granulated sugar in frying pan, and when brown, add half cup of boiling water, and let simmer 10 minutes. Strain, add a quart of cream, add other half cup of sugar, flavor with vanilla and freeze.

CHOCOLATE ICE CREAM.

Dissolve 2 squares of chocolate in 2 tablespoons boiling water, add this with 3 cups of sugar to 1 pint of hot milk. Boil until it foams stirring, for it burns quickly. Add 4 pints of sweet milk, 1 pint heavy cream. When just lukewarm remove from fire and stir in quickly 1 tablespoon of gelatine in warm water. Let stand in a cool room until set firm, let cool, then freeze.

MEDIUM ICE CREAM.

One quart cream, 1 1/2 quarts sweet milk, 3 cups sugar, 4 eggs, 1 tablespoon of vanilla or lemon. Stir together; freeze.

NEW YORK ICE CREAM.

Two cups of milk, 3 cups of cream, 1 cup of sugar, 1 pinch of salt, yolks of 4 eggs, 1 tablespoon gelatine, 1 tablespoon vanilla or lemon extract. Make a custard of milk, sugar, eggs and salt. Bring to a boil. Remove it from fire and add gelatine, melted in a little warm water, cool, strain and flavor. Whip the cream, add it to custard and freeze after it has become cold.

PLAIN ICE CREAM.

One gallon milk, half pint of sweet cream, 7 eggs, 4 cups sugar, flavor to taste. Stir together; freeze.

STRAIGHT ICE CREAM.

Two quarts pure cream, 3 sugar, 1 tablespoon vanilla or lemon extract.

Stir together and freeze, allowing plenty of room in freezer for expansion.

VANILLA ICE CREAM.

Two cups cream, 2 cups milk 1 1/2 cups sugar, 1 tablespoon vanilla or lemon extract, 4 eggs. Prepare and cook the ingredients in the same general way as given in the recipe for New York ice cream.

FRUIT SHERBET.

Juice of 3 lemons and 1 orange, 1-2 cup of shredded pineapple, 2 1/4 cups of sugar and 1 quart water. Boil

water and several slices of lemon and orange peel, 10 minutes; cool, add juice of lemons and orange and the shredded pineapple; freeze. When almost frozen, add beaten white of 1 egg.

LEMON SHERBET.

One pint lemon juice, 1-2 glass orange juice, 3 quarts water, 2 ounces gelatine. Soak gelatine over night in 1-2 pint water; in the morning add the rest of the water and let come to a boiling point. Strain fruit juice and add with 2 cups sugar, or sugar to taste, and freeze.

LEMON MILK SHERBET.

One quart milk, 2 cups sugar, juice of 3 lemons. Dissolve sugar with milk and add juice of lemons slowly, and freeze.

ORANGE ICE.

Seven oranges, 2 lemons, which of 4 eggs. Boil 2 1/2 pints of sugar in 2 1/2 quarts of water about 15 or 20 minutes. Cool. Add strained juice and let cool; when almost frozen add beaten egg whites, then add the well beaten egg and freeze. This will make 5 quarts of ice. Serve in sherbet glasses or orange cups.

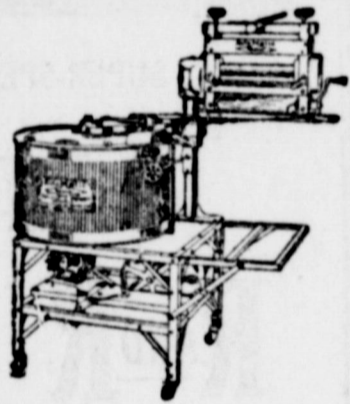

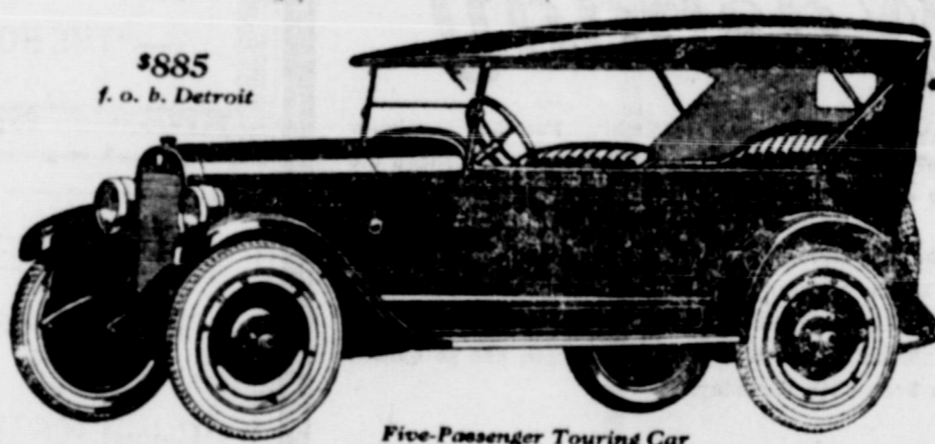
