Last Thursday afternoon fire destroyed the four-room residence belonging to R. M. Hollobaugh in the west part of town. The house was occupied by A. L. Chance. The blaze was caused by the explosion of an oil stove, it was stated. The entire contents were destroyed—Roby Star Record.

BONDS ARE APPROVED.

The water works and street paving bonds for Roscoe have been approved by the Attorney General of Texas. Advertising for bids will start soon, but it will be something like two or three months before actual work will begin. It is understood that the city council intends to lay the water mains first and then pave the streets—Roscoe Times.

ROBY ELECTRIC RAILROAD.

Final papers for the electric railway were drawn up Wednesday between Roby and the West Texas Utilities Company, Abilene. It is understood that all the money has not been subscribed to the project, but a major part has been taken, which practically clinches the rest of the amount of money needed. Actual work on the road will begin about July 5, according to Mr. Frye, manager at Abilene. Information is to the effect that several car loads of ties have been ordered to replace the old ones. It is understood that the depot will be built where the present house is located and the old depot will not be used—Roby Star Record.

The work of organization is about complete for the whirlwind membership campaign of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association to be started in Taylor County Monday, according to information received from campaign headquarters in Abilene. 
