BLACKWELL IS TO HEAR REV. ADAIR

Noted Evangelist Will Begin Series of Meetings Sunday Night in The Methodist Church There.

HAS CONVERTED 90,000 PERSONS

Whole Counties Have Been Swept Into Churches By His Eloquence—Speaks in Sweetwater Sunday.

Who will begin evangelistic services at Blackwell Sunday night. Rev. Adair is one of the leading evangelists of the nation with over 90,000 conversions to his credit in the 20 years that he has been in the work. L. G. Morony. Rev. Morony prevailed upon the evangelist to speak at least once in Sweetwater and he consented to hold services Sunday morning at the Baptist church, T. E. Vaughn, the singer who is accompanying him, his son, Elmore Adair, and a daughter, Mrs. M. H. Starnes, who is coming from Lubbock, will also be at the Sweetwater church Sunday morning.

NEW YORK 'WET' BY CLOSE SHAVE

National Events Some Times Hinge on Very Small Things. This Reveals.

DAMP BY ONE VOTE MARGIN

NEW YORK, July 6.—National events many times hinge on small things. Here's a story of an insignificant shave that figured in an event that has turned the country inside out—politically.

Culviller of this city. He put it in early during the last session at Albany. And it was pigeonholed.

In the State Senate the Donegan bill was introduced. It also called for a repeal of the Mullin-Gage law, the legislative name of the state enforcement act. On the final day of the session the Donegan bill was resurrected.

Ex-Barkeeper Missing. The Senate O.K'd it. But because a former bartender was absent from his seat in the lower house the bill failed.

Wet leaders were panic-stricken, and it was then that someone thought of the Culviller bill. A searching party determinedly set out to look for the missing ex-barkeeper. Luckily as the party hove in sight of the barbershop, the assemblyman was being powdered.

He was rushed to the voting chamber, and his vote made the Culviller repealer possible—a vote that has started the nation talking, and has changed the aspect of the pending presidential campaign.

Culviller is confident the Volstead law is doomed.

Wants Temperance. "We will always have and we should have temperance. But we eventually will not have prohibition as it is today," he says.

"Our repeal has made it certain that prohibition will be the dominant issue of the next national campaign. I introduced my bill because I felt the time had come to modify the Volstead law, which is fanaticism, pure and simple.

"I am a Virginian and I have always been opposed to man-made laws eradicating nature's laws. That is what was done in putting over prohibition during the hysteria of war.

"Each state has a right to say what is intoxicating and what is not. The constitution is not a law but a chart to guide government."

KILLED IN WRECK.

Cattle Train Enroute to Chicago Unloads Stomping Stock.

By The United Press. FREEPORT, Ill., July 6.—Five men were killed and a dozen injured when a cattle train was wrecked on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway near Fairdale last night.

Most of the killed and injured were negroes. Some of them were in care of the cattle being shipped from Omaha to Chicago and others were harvest hands riding the brake rods. Many were injured by the stomped cattle which were turned loose over a score of loaded cattle cars turned over.

REWARD OFFERED IN LANG SLAYING

Acting Governor Davidson Says Something is Wrong in Burleson County in His Opinion.

ARRESTS ARE EXPECTED SOON

Ranger Captain And Sheriff Busy On Case—Lang Had Disgruntled Employees Who May Be Guilty.

By The United Press. FARMERSVILLE, July 6.—Arrest will be made immediately in the murder of Otto Lang.

This was the message received over long distance telephone here this morning from Caldwell from R. W. Aldrich, Texas Ranger Captain, and Clint Lewis, sheriff of Burleson county. Lewis and Aldrich are expected to arrive here today. They were ordered here by acting governor T. W. Davidson following the murder of Otto Lang, who was shot by three masked men following his refusal to accompany them from his home Monday.

A new theory has been advanced concerning the death of Lang. He is said to have been on very bad terms with some of his employees.

Acting governor Davidson has offered a reward of \$500 for the arrest of the slayers of Lang and another \$500 for the arrest of the slayers of Ed Thirber who was murdered here last November. No arrests were made, and no bills returned by the Grand Jury in the case of Thirber.

"This is the second brutal murder in Burleson county and for which responsible parties have gone unpunished. If necessary I intend to go into this county myself and determine the reason for this affair," Acting Governor Davidson said.

LITTLE SPEAKS

Baptist Evangelist Tells What is Necessary for Salvation—Good Congregations Are Attending

Preaching from Mark 17:10, Rev. Phil J. Little delivered a sermon Thursday night on sins and what was necessary for a man to do to get right with God. He stated that merely "a good moral near" would not get a man to heaven but that a person must surrender their selves to God.

"There are men here tonight going to hell," declared the evangelist, "because they have a very good moral near." Your moral heart won't save you. You must give up sins and surrender to Christ.

"When you come to Christ he always demands that you give up the sins that you have been fighting him with. The time to accept Christ is when you feel that he is talking to you and you are talking to him.

"The trouble with you tonight is not your money, not your petty sins, but the fact that you want come to Christ you are willing to live in sin."

After today there will be no morning services at the tabernacle. The meeting will close Sunday night.

A fair sized congregation was present last night and there was one addition to the church.

Rev. Little will preach tonight on "Sweetwater's Greatest Enemy."

KEMPER NAME NEW OIL FIELD TOWN

West Texas Wildcat Parent of Town Being Laid Off 6 Miles West of Big Lake, Near Santa Rita.

STREETS ALREADY LAID OFF.

Receiver of Orient Honored by Site for Texas City—Business Houses Seek Location.

The West Texas wildcat is parent of another oil field town. Kemper, Texas, is its name.

The townsite named for W. T. Kemper of Kansas City, receiver of the Orient, is located 7 1/2 miles west of San Angelo, 6 miles west of Big Lake and 7 miles east of the recently discovered Santa Rita oil well of the Texon Oil and Land Company. The townsite laid off on land belonging to Fayette Mayer is being opened by a local real estate firm, announcement of which appears in today's paper.

Streets were laid off Monday, and it is understood several business firms are dickering for position in the newest Texas oil field town nearest the prospective producer.

An abundant underground water supply at a depth of 26 feet has

W. T. Kemper, receiver of the Orient, who has devoted his energies to saving this road for West Texas without remuneration other than the hope of meriting the appreciation of a grateful people, is honored in the naming of the newest Texas oil field town, now being opened up a short seven miles east of the Santa Rita. Kemper, the new town, is destined to be worthy of Kemper, the man, say the promoters, who assert that several business firms have already made proposals for building sites, made this the principal watering station on the Orient, between Fort Stockton and San Angelo, and makes for an ideal location for a town, being readily accessible to this oil field in the making.

The Santa Rita is making an average of three to four flows daily at the present time, and is seemingly growing stronger, indicating that earlier reports that the field would be the salvation of the Orient and make the University of Texas the richest school in the United States were not without foundation. Two additional tests are to be put down near the present location as soon as possible and smaller casing is being run in the Santa Rita, which, when completed, it is believed, will cause the well to flow steadily.

The townsite is on the nearest patented land to the University tract and the nearest location where the buyer can actually get title to the land in fee simple.

COMMISSION WILL BUILD A PIPE LINE

Six Inch Main To Be Laid Two and One Half Miles to New Plant of United States Gypsum Co.

PASS WHOOPING COUGH LAW

Children Afflicted Forbidden to Attend Public Gatherings—Audit Bills At The Commission Meeting.

The building of a water main from the corporation limits to the new plant of the United States Gypsum Company occupied the principal portion of the afternoon at the regular meeting of the City Commission Thursday.

The City Fathers did not actually get water flowing through the new six inch addition to the city's pipe line mileage, that day, but they did get some definite ideas as to cost, probable amount of time required in construction, and in turn submitted a definite proposition to the United States Gypsum Company for financing said construction, to be repaid in water. The new line will cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$20,000 and the best time estimate was six weeks. Mr. Rathjen said he wanted 50 gallons per minute delivered down to the plant site just as quick as he could get it and would start pouring concrete the week he got it. Inside of a few months, Mr. Rathjen said the plant would be using 100 gallons a minute or 144,000 gallons a day. The plant will be operated on a 24-hour a day schedule.

An ordinance prohibiting the presence of children with whooping cough in public gatherings, theaters, etc., was introduced and passed first reading. The penalty to be assessed is \$25. The ordinance was prepared at the suggestion of city health officials, owing to the present epidemic of the disease raging here.

The ordinance providing for the special election August 8 for the issuance of \$35,000 worth of filtration plant bonds passed second reading. These bonds will add 10 cents on the hundred to the taxes of the city.

The City Commission decided to postpone the election for raising the salary of the street commissioner, originally called for the same day as the bond issue. It developed that the charter can only be amended every two years, and some changes that would be required before street paving on a credit basis could be done will be looked up and probably presented voters at the same time as the street commissioner salary increase.

M. N. O'Bryan presented an affidavit of ownership of a horse and mule sold by the city pound keeper recently and asked for the balance of the money received over and above the expenses. The money, amounting to about \$30 was ordered turned over to him.

Bills were audited and ordered paid and the commission recessed to meet again Friday afternoon for further consideration of the water line construction. This project occupied the major portion of the time, with different pipe line salesman contractors, etc., appearing and presenting their propositions. The other business transacted was sandwiched in between discussions.

WHOOPIING COUGH.

The action of the City Commission prohibiting children afflicted with whooping cough from attending public gatherings is in line with advanced medical thought. The old idea was that children were bound to have measles, mumps and a score of other child hood diseases anyway and the sooner they had them, the better. But medical science has pointed out that it is unnecessary for anyone to have any disease, and no matter how trivial, that these diseases frequently lead into other complications of a most disagreeable nature, and not infrequently death.

Whooping cough is a disagreeable disease, but not necessarily fatal, except to the very young. It is, however, apt to leave the child's body weakened so that pneumonia or other disease may have a clear field for its deadly work.

It has been shown that prevention of any disease is a whole lot easier, and more successful than any treatment that has ever been devised. Hence the practical stamping out of yellow fever, smallpox, and many other scourges of man kind, and the decided lessening of typhoid ravages, as cases in point.

While it may be something of a sacrifice for parents with afflicted children to remain at home with them, we are sure that when they understand the situation, they will take the new ordinance in the right spirit and obey it for the benefit of the children of their neighbors, and do unto others, etc.

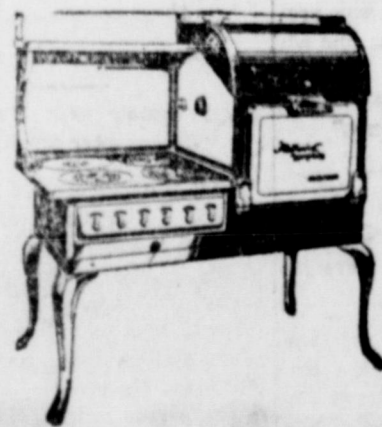

CHICKEN PIE

CORN ON COB PARSLEY POTATOES HOT ROLLS VEGETABLE SALAD CHOCOLATE

PEACH ICE CREAM CAKE ICED COFFEE

STRAWBERRY COCKTAIL.

Into each glass put several large crushed strawberries. Over them pour the juice from one orange and a tablespoon of pineapple juice, and sugar to suit the taste. Just before serving, add a tablespoon or two of shaved ice.

CHICKEN PIE.

Prepare chicken as for stewing, simmer in water seasoned with salt and pepper, for 30 minutes. Remove the chicken and thicken the broth with flour, adding egg yolk and parsley. Line the sides of a pan with pie crust, put the stewed chicken in pan in layers and moisten with the gravy. After all chicken is used, cover with pie crust and pour on the remaining gravy. Cook for about an hour in a slow oven.

CORN ON COB.

For a change in cooking corn, and to make it a bit sweeter, boil the corn in equal quantities of milk and water until tender. Immediately after the corn is done, remove from boiling water onto large platter. Then butter and serve warm.

PARSLEY POTATOES

Wash, pare, and dice potatoes. Place them in a pan of cold water and let them stand for about forty-five minutes. Drain and place in a vessel and let them steam until soft place in a dish and swab with butter, then immediately season with salt and garnish with shredded parsley.

VEGETABLE SALAD

For this salad, which is so pleasing in the summer, use any combination of vegetables which you have always with an eye to color. For instance, fresh cooked green peas, new carrots

cut into large cubes, make a good mixture. Make a well seasoned dressing of oil, vinegar salt, paprika, mustard finely chopped onion. Pour a little over each vegetable, and allow to stand in a cold place until time to serve. Arrange on a platter, having peas in center, carrots at one end and potatoes at the other end of the dish. Garnish with lettuce or water-cress.

CANE SEATS.

Cane seats in chairs can be cleaned and tightened by rubbing them with hot soapsuds on the top and then on the underside, thoroughly soaking the cane, then drying them in the air.

WHITE GLOVES.

Put a little ammonia, say a tablespoonful to two quarts of water in the water in which you wash your white silk gloves and white stockings. They will not become yellow if you do.

GILT FRAMES.

When your gilt frames are new, if you will go over them with white varnish, you will not change the appearance, but you will make a surface that can be very easily cleaned.

RENOVATING CLOTHES.

When renovating an old garment, sponge it carefully on the right side, then press on the wrong.

ROSE BUSHES.

Rose bushes are said to thrive if you water them with soapsuds. In order to keep your rose bushes in a healthy condition, keep all dead under and over branches cut away, also take a long prong rake and stir the surface around the bush occasionally, this gives the roots an opportunity to get the moisture more rapidly.

REFINISHING FLOOR.

If a floor has been badly stained, it is wiser to remove the old finish with a paint and varnish remover before you attempt to refinish it.

HOT BRAN CLEANER.

Hot bran will clean brocades and tapestries. It should be applied with a clean flannel cloth, and be removed with a clean brush.

CANARIES.

Give your pet canary plenty of gritty sand to work with. Occasionally sprinkle in a little sulphur which will keep off the insects.

HAIR RESTORER.

If your hair is beginning to fall out and you realize that you are going to

become bald headed, this can be easily stopped without any sort of liquid whatsoever. Each night at your retiring hour, take your finger tips and press against the scalp, and work in four directions until the entire head has been gone over at least three times. When you rise in the morning give the same application. Never let the finger nails scratch the scalp while giving the finger massage treatment. But be sure the scalp is thoroughly flexible at each time before you cease massaging. Keep this scalp exercise up until you have regained your hair. It will grow out in renewed strength in from four to six weeks. If more and thicker hair is desired keep up the treatment. This treatment has proved successful in many instances, but it is not guaranteed in every case. Try it, anyway.

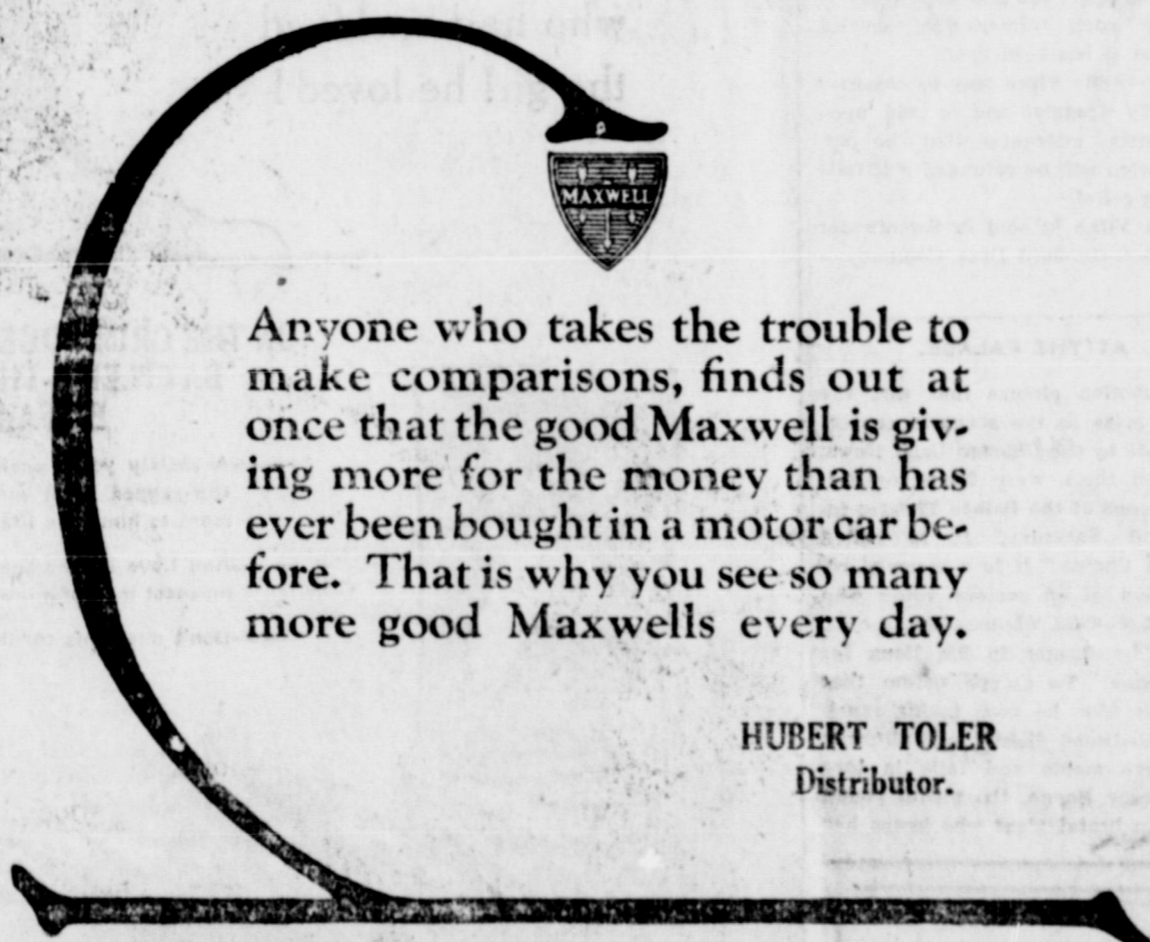

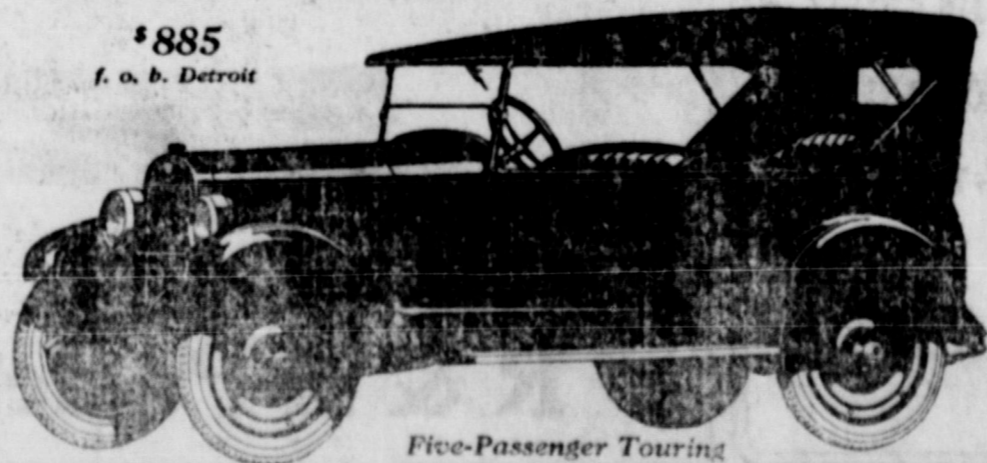

AN ORDINANCE,

KEEPING OF HOGS WITHIN CERTAIN LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SWEETWATER, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR ITS VIOLATION.

Be it ordained by the Commission of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, that it shall be unlawful for any one to keep any hogs within the limits of that part of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the southwest corner of Block No. 19 in the eastern addition to said City of Sweetwater:

THENCE north along the east boundary of Block Number 19 in the Eastern Addition to said City of Sweetwater:

THENCE North along the east boundary line of Hatley Street to the South-west corner of Block Number 16 in the Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE west along the north boundary line of North Third Street to the Southwest corner of Block Number 7 in the Eastern Addition to said Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in a northerly direction along the East boundary line of Beall street to a point in the South boundary line of the old J. F. Newman home premises, same point being the Northwest corner of Block Number 7 in said Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in a westerly direction along the North boundary line of Section No. 48, Block No. 22, T. & P. Ry. Company's Survey, to the Northwest corner of Block Number 5, in said Eastern Addition to said Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in a northerly direction following the East boundary line of said Ragland Street a distance of 425 feet to the Northwest corner of a 4 acre tract platted by J. F. Newman, a plat of which 4 acre tract was filed in the office of the County Clerk on June 27, 1883:

THENCE south 77° west to a point in the East boundary line of Crane Street:

THENCE in a northerly direction along the East boundary line of Crane Street to a point North 77° East of the Northwest corner of Block Number 77 in the Orient Addition to the Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in a westerly direction along the South boundary line of North 12th Street to the Northwest corner of Block Number 81 in the Orient Addition to the Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in a southerly direction along the East boundary line of Blocks Nos. 111 and 126, in said Trammell & McCaulley Addition and along the East boundary line of Block No. 107 in the Original Town of Sweetwater to Addition to the Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE south 77° west along the North boundary line of Block Number 110 in the Trammell & McCaulley Addition to the Town of Sweetwater,

THENCE in a westerly direction along the North boundary line of North Sixth Street to the Southeast corner of Block No. 56 in the Western Addition to the Town of Sweetwater: THENCE in a southerly direction and along the East boundary line of

Blocks Nos. 53, 52, 49 and 48 in the Western Addition to the Town of Sweetwater, to the southeast corner of Lot No. 3 in the S. C. Glass Sub-division of Block No. 43 in the Western Addition to the Town of Sweetwater: THENCE in a southerly direction and along the center line of Grape Street to the South boundary line of North First Street:

THENCE in an easterly direction and along the South boundary line of said North First Street to a point which is North 30° West from the North east corner of Block No. 26 in the Original Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE south 30° east and along the East boundary line of Block No. 26 in the Original Town of Sweetwater to the Northeast corner of Block No. 39, Original Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in an easterly direction along the South boundary line of South 2nd Street to the Northeast corner of Block No. 33 in the Original Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in a southerly direction along the West boundary line of Nueces street to the southeast corner of Block No. 41 in the Original Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in an easterly direction and along the North boundary line of South Fourth Street to the Southeast corner of Block No. 45 in the Original Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in an easterly direction and along the North boundary line of B Street in the Mineral Wells Addition to the Town of Sweetwater, to the Southwest corner of Lot No. 5 in the Archer Addition to the Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in a northerly direction and along the Western boundary line of Lots Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 in said Archer Addition, to the Northwest corner of said Lot No. 10, Archer Addition:

THENCE in an Easterly direction and along the South boundary line of Block No. 42 in the Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater to the Southeast corner of said Block No. 42, said Eastern Addition:

THENCE North 20 degree West along the Eastern boundary line of Blocks Nos. 42, 39 and 29 in the Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater, and extending in same direction to the South boundary line of Block No. 23 in said Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater:

THENCE in an Easterly direction and along the South boundary line of Blocks Nos. 23, 22, 21 and 20, said Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater and on to the Southwest corner of Block No. 19 in said Eastern Addition, the place of beginning.

If anyone shall keep or permit to be kept any hogs within the above and foregoing limits such party shall be fined in the sum of One Dollar, and each day that anyone shall keep or permit to be kept any hogs within said limits, shall constitute a separate offense. Provided, that this ordinance shall not apply to the keeping of hogs in shipping pens maintained by the railroad companies for shipping purposes.

Passed and approved, this the 22nd day of June A. D. 1923.

How to Build Attic Aerials for Your Radio

Attic aerials are easy to construct, and when properly made, the results obtained with them are nearly as good as those obtained with outdoor aerials. Attic aerials should not be confused with loop aerials, as they have no directional effects. They also have an advantage over outdoor aerials in that they do not need a lightning switch.

The end-to-end type of this aerial consists of a number of lengths of No. 14 stranded copper wire, strung parallel to each other, and attached to the uprights at each end of the attic by means of ordinary aerial insulators. The total length of the wire used should not be less than 150, nor more than 200 ft., and the wires should be spaced about 1 1/2 ft. apart. One end is left dead, and the wires are then connected in series, as shown, and the other end is soldered to the lead-in wire, which is brought down to the instrument through a length of flexible loom.

In attics where less space is available, such as those with hip roofs, the aerial can be strung along the rafters, as shown in the upper right-hand drawing. One length of No. 14 wire, 150 to 200 ft. long, is strung in four parallel rows as indicated, the wire being attached to the rafters by means of round porcelain insulators, which can be purchased at any electrical-supply store. One end is left dead, and the other is connected to the lead-in wire, as before.

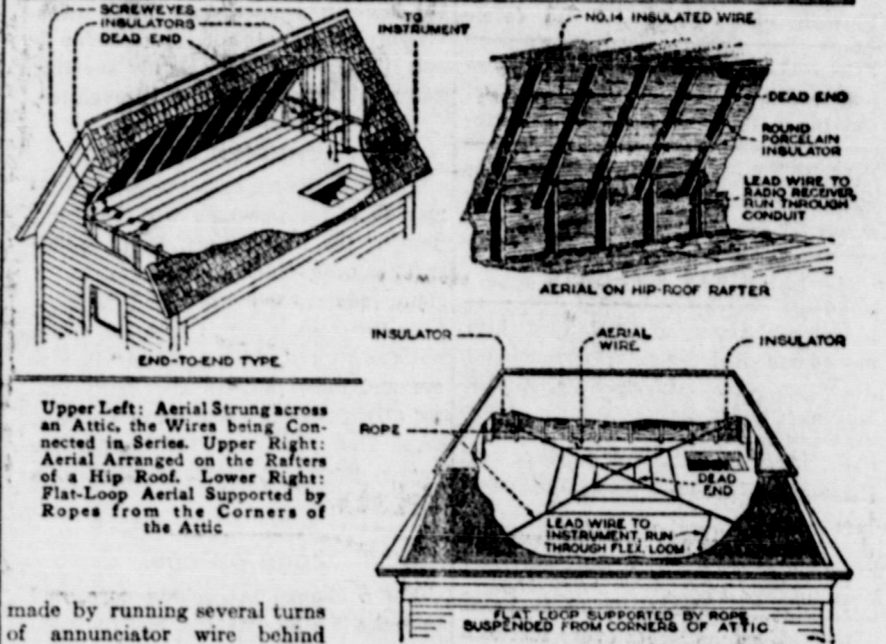
The flat-loop aerial, shown in the lower drawing, is designed for small attics. Two lengths of rope are strung across the attic from corner to corner, and are tied together at the point where they cross. The aerial wire is attached to the ropes, as shown in the drawing, being

tied firmly at every point where it touches the ropes. The inner end is the dead end, and the outer end is connected to the lead-in wire. The turns should be spaced about 1 ft. apart.

In apartments where there are no attics, an inside aerial that gives good results with a tube set can readily be

made by running several turns of annunciator wire behind the picture molding, leaving one end of the wire dead, and bringing the other down to the receiving set. With such an aerial an amateur has received stations 1,000 miles distant, using a two-step spider-coil receiving set.

To obtain the best results with any receiving set, just as much pains must be taken to secure a good ground as to construct the aerial. Number 14 wire should be used, and one end soldered to a water or radiator pipe. A clamp can also be used, the pipe, of course, being scraped where the clamp is attached. Gas pipes
