Union Opens Bank

ST. LOUIS, July 15.—Organized labor has opened its second national bank west of the Mississippi river.

It is owned by the Order of Railroad Telegraphers. Deposits totaling more than \$1,500,000 were made on the opening day, recently. The new institution has a capital stock of \$500,000 in addition to surplus of \$100,000.

The Telegraphers' National Bank had its inception in a resolution adopted at the national convention of telegraphers held in May, 1921, at Savannah, Ga.

It was provided that officers of the organization devise a plan for establishing a bank whereby the union would own 51 per cent of the stock and sell the remaining 49 per cent to members—none being allowed to own more than 10 shares.

In January of this year plans had been completed and the specified amount of stock sold at \$120 a share—\$100 par value and \$20 on each share for a surplus.

The bank will be run on a co-operative basis and earnings divided between depositors and stockholders. E. J. Manion, president of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers, also

will act in a similar capacity with the institution. Leonard J. Ross, secretary and treasurer of the union organization, will serve as the bank's first vice president and cashier.

"It is the second labor bank to be opened west of the Mississippi river, one having been opened recently at Minneapolis," Manion said.

It is the second of two banks owned by international unions in the United States, he declared, the other being the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers at Cleveland, O.

AN ORDINANCE.

A motion was made by Joe H. Boothe, Mayor, and seconded by W. T. Trammell, Commissioner No. 2, that paragraph No. two (2) of Section three (3) of "an ordinance pertaining to electric wiring and electric apparatus" adopted and approved by the City Council of Sweetwater, August 16th, 1916, be amended so that paragraph No. 2 (2) of Section three (3) thereof shall read as follows:

The City electrician may inspect or cause to be inspected any old wiring or electrical apparatus in any building within the corporate limits of the City of Sweetwater, and shall thereupon issue a certificate if the work is in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. In case the work does not comply with this ordinance, the city electrician shall issue a written statement as to the changes necessary to bring the work up to standard.

Under no consideration shall a certificate be issued on work that is concealed in such manner that it cannot be examined.

The motion was declared to have carried, Mayor Joe H. Boothe voting aye, Commissioner W. T. Trammell voting aye and Commissioner L. E. Musgrove voting aye.

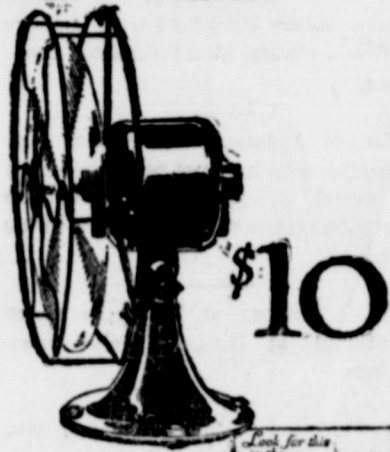

AN ORDINANCE.

KEEPING OF HOGS WITHIN CERTAIN LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SWEETWATER, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR ITS VIOLATION.

Be it ordained by the Commission of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, that it shall be unlawful for any one to keep any hogs within the limits of that part of the City of Sweetwater, Texas, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the southwest corner of block No. 19 in the eastern addition to said City of Sweetwater:

THENCE north along the east boundary of Block Number 19 in the Eastern Addition to said City of Sweetwater; THENCE North along the east boundary line of Halley Street to the Southwest corner of Block Number 16 in the Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE west along the north boundary line of North Third Street to the Southwest corner of Block Number 7 in the Eastern Addition to said Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a northerly direction along the East boundary line of Deall street to a point in the South boundary line of the old J. F. Newman home premises, same point being the Northwest corner of Block Number 7 in said Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a westerly direction along the North boundary line of Section No. 48, Block No. 22, T. & P. Ry. Company's Survey, to the Northwest corner of Block Number 5 in said Eastern Addition to said Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a northerly direction following the East boundary line of said Ragland Street a distance of 425 feet to the Northwest corner of a 4 acre tract platted by J. F. Newman, a plat of which 4 acre tract was filed in the office of the County Clerk on June 27, 1883;

THENCE south 77° west to a point in the East boundary line of Crane Street;

THENCE in a northerly direction along the East boundary line of Crane Street to a point North 77° East of the Northwest corner of Block Number 77 in the Orient Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a westerly direction along the South boundary line of North 12th Street to the Northwest corner of Block Number 81 in the Orient Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a Southerly direction along the East boundary line of said Oak Street to the Northwest corner of Block Number 109 in the Orient to the Northeast corner of Block Number 111 in said Trammell & McCaulley Addition and along the East boundary line of Block No. 107 in the Original Town of Sweetwater to Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE south 77° west along the North boundary line of Block Number 110 in the Trammell & McCaulley Addition to the Town of Sweetwater, to the Northeast corner of Block 111 in said Trammell & McCaulley Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a southerly direction and along the East boundary line of Blocks Nos. 111 and 126, in said Trammell & McCaulley Addition and along the East boundary line of Block No. 107 in the Original Town of Sweetwater to the Southeast corner of said Block No. 107;

THENCE in a westerly direction along the North boundary line of North Sixth Street to the Southeast corner of Block No. 56 in the Western Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a southerly direction and along the East boundary line of Blocks Nos. 53, 52, 49 and 48 in the Western Addition to the Town of Sweetwater, to the southeast corner of Lot No. 3 in the S. O. Glass Sub-division of Block No. 48 in the Western Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a southerly direction and along the center line of Grape Street to the South boundary line of North First Street;

THENCE in an easterly direction and along the South boundary line of said North First Street to a point which is North 20° West from the North east corner of block No. 26 in the Original Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in an easterly direction along the South boundary line of South 2nd Street to the Northeast corner of Block No. 38 in the Original Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a southerly direction along the West boundary line of Nueces street to the southeast corner of Block No. 41 in the Original Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in an easterly direction and along the North boundary line of South Fourth Street to the Southeast corner of Block No. 45 in the Original Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in an easterly direction and along the North boundary line of B Street in the Mineral Wells Addition to the Town of Sweetwater, to the Southwest corner of Lot No. 5 in the Archer Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in a northerly direction and along the Western boundary line of Lots Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, and 10 in said Archer Addition, to the North corner of said Lot No. 10, Archer Addition;

THENCE in an Easterly direction and along the South boundary line of Block No. 42 in the Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater to the Southeast corner of said Block No. 42, said Eastern Addition;

THENCE North 30 degree West along the Eastern boundary line of Blocks Nos. 42, 39 and 29 in the Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater, and extending in same direction to the South boundary line of Block No. 23 in said Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater;

THENCE in an Easterly direction and along the South boundary line of Blocks Nos. 23, 22, 21 and 20, said Eastern Addition to the Town of Sweetwater and on to the Southwest corner of Block No. 19 in said Eastern Addition, the place of beginning.

If anyone shall keep or permit to be kept any hogs within the above and foregoing limits such party shall be fined in the sum of One Dollar, and each day that anyone shall keep or permit to be kept any hogs within said limits, shall constitute a separate offense. Provided, that this ordinance shall not apply to the keeping of hogs in shipping pens maintained by the railroad companies for shipping purposes.

An Underground River.—Drillers at the Hull well No. 1 in the George Hull pasture on the Moses Herrin Survey No. 6, struck a water-bearing sand around the 200 foot level which they estimate will produce at least 33 gallons of pure water per minute or fifty 40-gallon barrels per hour. Six miles east of this point on Survey No. 6 in the Ben Harlen well the same thing occurred. This goes to show that a subterranean river or lake exists underneath the surface in this locality.

At the rate of 33 gallons a minute, if this amount of water was pumped into a tank one acre square

it would cover it 2 inches deep in 24 hours. In 100 days, if the pump was kept going, and the one-acre tank was high enough to hold it, the water in the tank would be 16 feet, 8 inches deep. This amount would cover 1 and 2-3 acres of land 1 foot deep in the 100 days.

If these lands with their proven possibilities were located in places like California where they know the value of good land and water, they would be fortunes to their owners. As it is, it will be left to the younger generation to develop their riches. The day will come when a quarter section of this land will be worth a hundred sections as they stand now because if you give a man plenty of water, the problem is solved.—Sterling News-Record.
