## STENGAL'S HOMER WINS FOR GIANTS

Star Centerfielder Scores Only Run of Game When He Parks Ball in Seventh For Second Time

### GRUELING PITCHER'S BATTLE

Jones of Yanks Yielded Only Four Hits While Nehf Allows Five—Ruth Gets Single

YANKEE STADIUM, Oct. 12.—The wicked willow of Casey Stengel stowed the third game of the World Series safely into the Giant's bag along with the first game, making the count two and one in favor of the klan McGraw.

Stengel's homer in the seventh was the only run scored by either side in a game that was a gruelling pitcher's battle throughout. Nehf tamed the great Ruth, walked him in a pinch and struck him out once.

Jones for the Yankees yielded only four hits while his team mates gathered five from the offerings of the Giant moundsmen.

### TRAIN HELD UP

Four Trainmen Killed by Oregon Bandits—\$2,500 Reward Offered For Capture

REDDING, Calif., October 12.—Open threats of lynching if captured were being made in connection with the search for bandits who killed four trainmen in their attempt to hold up the San Francisco express on the Southern Pacific 20 miles west of Ashland, Oregon.

The entire country south to Redding is enflamed over what has been characterized as one of the most brutal holdups in the west. It was first thought that only two men were implicated but it developed later that several men were seen to board the blind baggage of the train at Siskiyou a short time before the holdup.

It has been definitely determined that the bandits obtained no loot. Their eagerness to wreck the safe frustrated the attempt.

Many mail sacks and their contents were burned by the explosion. The force of the blast wrecked the portals of Tunnel 13 and it was three hours before the track was cleared. Many passengers were overcome by the explosion.

Posses are working in squads in the mountains around the scene, with national guardsmen and hundreds of citizens aiding in the manhunt.

The Southern Pacific has offered \$2,500 reward for any information.

## WALTON'S PROBE IS FIRST ITEM

Oklahoma Legislature Passes Unanimous Resolution Providing For Complete Investigation

### ANTI-KLAN BILL IN SENATE

Senator Leedy Offers Substitute For Measure Proposed by Walton—Covers Same Ground, He Says

By The United Press. OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 12.—Governor Walton is standing pat on his offer to resign with the passage of a bill unmasking the Klan and the revelation of the members on record, persons close to the executive indicated today.

The bill scheduled for introduction in the Senate today by Senator Leedy provides for the unmasking of the Klan but does not require the publication of the membership.

Senator Leedy's measure provides fines ranging from \$25 to \$1,000 with jail sentences. Sentences of one to fifty years in the penitentiary for the assembly of ten or more persons for hogging purposes are also provided in the measure. County officials who fail to prosecute violations of the law are subject to removal by the attorney general.

OKLAHOA CITY, Oct. 12.—Immediate investigation of the acts of Governor Walton who took the oath as chief executive nine months ago was in prospect today following the unanimous adoption of the Bisney-Tolbert resolution calling for the immediate investigation of the executive, judicial and legislative departments of the state.

Further action along this line is expected today, when the legislature goes into session again shortly afternoon.

The introduction of a substitute measure for Governor Walton's proposed anti-Klan legislation is expected in the Senate. The measure has been prepared by C. E. Leedy, who characterized the governor's measure as expensive and burdensome.

Leedy described the measure prepared by him as providing a law that was "simpler and less expensive and yet covering the same ground and insuring enforcement."

## OFFER IS OPEN

Henry Ford Still Planning on Muscle Shoals—Questions Sincerity of Secretary War Weeks

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 12.—Henry Ford has not given up hope of obtaining Muscle Shoals, it became known today in the first statement the automobile man has made since the sale of the Gorgas power plant to the Alabama power interests.

Ford's offer is still open to Congress, he intimated, saying: "My offer for Muscle Shoals is still before Congress and I shall not withdraw it."

Ford indicated that his engineers have gone ahead with plans for the development of the project despite the sale of the Gorgas plant.

"We have learned to send power a long distance without leakage. If I get Muscle Shoals I shall run power lines for 200 miles in each direction. I say this now for the benefit of international financiers who are with the Alabama power company and are trying to get the Shoals in their grip."

The sincerity of Secretary of War Weeks in the negotiations with Henry Ford for the disposal of Muscle Shoals was questioned by Ford, who said: "I have a very strong conviction that while we have been negotiating with Secretary of War Weeks for the plant, we have not been negotiating with the United States government. Week's repeated assertions that I would never get Muscle Shoals either with or without the Gorgas plant is evidence that he has not been considering my offer but that of other parties best known to the secretary of war."

## LIGHTNING KILLS A COTON PICKER

Louis Snye, 36, From Bell County Killed Instantly When Bolt Hits Home Near Palava

### WIFE, TREE CHILDREN UNHURT

Heavy Rain Totaling 1.98 Inches Falls In Sweetwater—No Moisture South As East—Heavy North

Louismythe, from Bell County, was instantly killed Thursday night by a bolt of lightning which also killed his dog and injured the house herein he and his family were living near Palava. His wife and the small children were unharmed.

The Smythe family had come to West Texas to pick cotton and were working in the Finis Byrd place near Palava. The family had retired for the night but during the storm a door blew open and rain was flooding in. Smythe got up to sweep out the water and close the door when he was hit by the sizing celestial bolt.

He was to have been buried Friday afternoon at Palava.

A deluge of rain that measured 1.98 inches at M. C. Manroe's raugeage fell in Sweetwater Thursday night accompanied by vivid electrical displays that more or less disrupted telephone toll service for a few hours. The total rain for the year in Sweetwater now measures 26.40 inches.

The rain extended very little south and east of town. Rain was reported as far east as Trent, but only showers east of that point. There was but little or any rain south of town, residents of the south side reporting that the storm seemed to turn and come back over town to the north again.

Reports from the T-P indicate the rain was nearly as heavy as at Sweetwater as far west as Big Spring, getting less heavy from there.

The Santa Fe report heavy rains as far northwest as Snyder but no farther.

The Orient reported no rain south of Maryneal, and none was reported on the Boothe ranch south of town.

Reports indicate the rain was heavy north of town in Fisher County as far north as Hamlin.

Telephone lines were out of action in many directions Friday morning, due to lightning it is thought.

The West Texas Electric Company lost some transformer fuses by lightning and the west and north sides of town were without light for a short time on that account.

### TO FILM HOUSTON

Plan to Take Scenes On Bayou Nearby

## CIRCUS COMING!

Advance Car Al G. Barnes Wild Animal Show Arrives With Posters Which Are Spread Everywhere

Advertising car No. 1 of the Al G. Barnes 4-ring wild animal circus in charge of W. J. Erickson and carrying 22 hippoposters arrived in Sweetwater this morning from San Angelo. Flaring posters advertising the coming of the Barnes circus on Friday, Oct. 26, greet the eye in all parts of the city as a result of the efforts of this crew while four automobiles carried advertising men into the country for 40 miles in all directions to post bills announcing the big event.

"Big Bill," as Erickson is known, is one of the outstanding figures in the circus world. He stands six feet and tilts the scales at better than 300 pounds. In spite of his bulk he is known as the "fastest-stepping advertising manager in the show business."

He has been with the white tops for more than 20 years, and has traveled more than 400,000 miles in a bill car—which is some record.

According to Frank A. Cassidy, press agent for Mr. Barnes, the circus comes this year in greatly enlarged form with three special trains of all-steel double-length cars loaded to capacity with mammals and circus novelties.

The big feature of the program is "Alice in Wonderland," described as a "wonderland" with four prima donnas, a singing and dancing chorus, hundreds of animals and almost countless people. The four corners of the earth were combed for novelties for this extravaganza, the press agent declares, and the music and dances were especially arranged for the spectacle.

"Tusko the mastodon," a pachyderm that stands a foot taller than did the famous "Jumbo," and weighs ten tons, is the king of the Barnes menagerie. Twin baby elephants a year old will have an especial appeal to children as will a dozen or more baby animals of various kinds, including the world's smallest horse.

There are 110 acts in the Barnes program, the thrills being provided by the hundreds of fierce jungle-bred lions, tigers and leopards. Acts offered exclusively by the Barnes circus show educated rabbits, reindeer, ostriches, kangaroos, Okapis and llamas.

## RACES FEATURE ANGELO'S FAIR

Automobile Races, Football Game and Other Big Attractions Scheduled For San Angelo Saturday

### TO RUN A SPECIAL TRAIN

Low Round Trip Rate Being Offered By Orient—Train to Leave Sweetwater Saturday Morning

SAN ANGELO, Oct. 12.—Four automobile races with a score of drivers, some of them of national reputation, participating, polo, a rodeo, the fourth game of the World Series played on a giant electric score board and, perhaps of more interest to San Angelo neighbors to the north, a football game between the Sweetwater and San Angelo High School football elevens will be offered Saturday, the closing day of the All-West Texas Exposition here.

Unlike at most fairs, the last day here will be one of the biggest in the number and variety of attractions, and to accommodate visitors from points north the Orient railroad will operate a special train from Hamlin to San Angelo and return. The roundtrip rate will be \$2.80. The special will pass through Sweetwater at 6:30 o'clock and will be due to reach San Angelo at 9:20. The special will leave San Angelo at 10 o'clock Saturday evening returning.

In anticipation of a big crowd, the San Angelo Boy Scout Band will meet the train at the station and will lead a parade of the visitors downtown, a distance of only three blocks. From this line will form a parade by members of the Traveling Men's Club, an auxiliary of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. With its disbanding the band will continue to the fair grounds to play throughout the day.

water-San Angelo High school football clash, starting at 10 o'clock. All fair exhibits will remain intact and will be open at that hour. At noon, the salesmen will be guests of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at a luncheon at the St. Angelus hotel.

The automobile races will start at 2 o'clock and interspersed between them will be polo, broncho busting, calf roping and branding and free acts from the John T. Norton Shows, which will entertain on the fair grounds Saturday afternoon and night with twenty-two major shows and six riding devices including the caterpillar, which has made as great a hit as did the whip when it was introduced a few years ago. Flaying of the World Series Baseball game on the San Angelo Standard's score board will start at 1 o'clock. The board is in direct communication by telephone with the news office downtown where a telegraph connection from the playing field in New York terminates. This insures flashing the plays within a minute after they are actually made.

San Angelo High barely defeated Sweetwater in football here last fall, 6 to 3, and its 1923 gridiron warriors are looking forward to just as tough a scrap Saturday. They do not discredit Sweetwater's strength one iota because Sweetwater was beaten last week by Cisco, but believe the visitors will fight all the harder to avenge last year's loss and to remain in the running for the District 3 title. The result will be as important to the local Blue and Gray eleven in its district No. 8, as to Sweetwater. The standing in the Interscholastic League districts is based this year on percentage, one reverse not eliminating a school, as formerly. But a defeat by a member school in another district counts in this percentage; consequently, the importance attached to Friday's engagement.

To date the San Angelo team has played two games, capturing them both without being scored on. Balling or fell an easy victim two weeks ago, 59 to 0, and Junction was vanquished last Friday in a hard fought affair, 13 to 0. Coach C. H. Kellam, four-year letter man of the Southwest Texas Teachers' College at San Marcos, appears a worthy successor to Gralley Higginbotham, whose local proteges last fall dropped but one game, that to Abilene. The squad of 17 men averages around 145 pounds in weight, while the eleven that will start may tip the scales for a 148 to 150-pound average. The Sweetwater team averages approximately 145 pounds.

## BIGGEST STATE FAIR READY FOR OPENING SATURDAY, OCT. 13

Grounds at Dallas in Finest Condition—Race Meet and Rodeo  
Big Features—Agricultural Exhibits in Profusion

Everything is ready for the opening of the thirty-seventh State Fair of Texas at Dallas, Saturday, Oct. 13, for the sixteen days' exposition of 1923. The grounds are in the finest condition, it is declared, and the program is replete with new amusement features.

In full keeping, there has never been a larger or more varied list of fine cattle; of poultry and pot stock, swine, sheep and goats. The barns, on the basis of entries in hand to Oct. 1, will be filled to overflowing, it is asserted. County and agricultural exhibits are also larger and more representative of the State's production possibilities.

All the latest model cars will be seen in the automobile show, and "action displays" in large number will feature the manufacturers' division of the new Automobile and Manufacturers' building. More than thirty acres of space will be occupied by the interesting, instructive demonstrations of farm machinery and power devices.

The big features of this year's Fair will include the seven days' race meet—six running races daily, on Oct. 13, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20, and the Rodeo, depicting cowboy sports of pioneer days in Texas, Oct. 21 to Oct. 23, inclusive. A horse show will be given on the nights of Oct. 22 and Oct. 23, and there will be three days' kennel show of high-bred dogs.

The "Marigold Garden Revue," a big musical extravaganza, with a company of seventy-five people, beautiful costumes and magnificent scenery, will be offered in the Coliseum, with Art Laney's big Chicago jazz band and many other features. Before the grandstand each night "India," the fireworks spectacle of the famed Durbar of Delhi, with a company of 500 people and a herd of elephants will be given and each afternoon and evening there will be more than twenty circus acts, including acrobatics, aerial work, tumblers, etc., with at least two big trained animal acts.

Seven football games are scheduled for athletic stadium, chief of which will be A. & M.-Sewanee, Oct. 13 and Texas-Vanderbilt, Oct. 20.

Low round-trip rates have been granted by all Texas railroad lines, particularly for the three week-ends, good for trains arriving in Dallas each of the three Saturdays. Returning, visitors may leave Dallas as late as midnight the following Sunday nights.

### MUNICIPALITIES DAY AT STATE FAIR OCTOBER 24

Mayors and officials of many Texas cities will attend the State Fair at Dallas, on October 24, which has been designated as League of Texas Municipalities Day, at the request of Mayor W. E. Lea of Orange, head of the league. Mayor Cockrell of Fort Worth, was president last year, when a highly interesting program was carried out on Municipalities Day at the Fair. A similarly instructive program will be given this year.

### TEXAS' OIL INDUSTRY SHOW TO BE STATE FAIR FEATURE

A comprehensive exhibit showing every detail of the production and handling of oil and products, is to be one of the interesting displays at the State Fair of Texas, Dallas, Oct. 13-23 by the Humble Oil and Refining Company of Houston. The Humble Company has secured space 28x30 feet on the main driveway at the Fair Grounds, and its exhibit will detail the complete workings of the great deep field in the Corsicana area, where the company's holdings are very large.



"We recommend only light high-grade gas engine oil. Heavy and inferior oils have a tendency to carbonize quickly, also 'gum up' the piston rings, valve stems and bearings."



LET us show you exactly why your Ford engine operates best on a clean-burning oil, such as Gargoyle Mobiloil "E."

First, you pour in the oil. Your Ford manual tells you to open the top pet-cock on the oil reservoir, and to pour oil into the filler until it runs from this top pet-cock.

Suppose you pour in an oil heavier than "E." It is easy to supply too much, unless the oil flows out freely when the upper pet-cock level is reached. Heavier-bodied oils flow sluggishly. Consequently there is a danger of over-supply.

(POINT 1)

But possibly you do not think that this over-supply of oil makes any difference. Well, let us see what happens.

You notice that there is no splash trough for the rear cylinder. It is lubricated by the fly-wheel splash. (The third cylinder also receives some of this splash.)

If there is too much oil in the reservoir there will be too much oil splashed to the third and fourth cylinders. From the cylin-

der walls this excessive amount of oil reaches the combustion chambers where it is burned up. With an over-supply of oil heavier than "E," don't be surprised if you find extra heavy carbon deposits in these rear cylinders.

(POINT 2)  
The exceptionally clean-burning character of Gargoyle Mobiloil "E" minimizes the tendency toward carbon formation in the combustion chambers.

Next let us look at the connecting rods and splash troughs. Cylinders 1, 2 and 3 are lubricated by the dipping of the connecting rods into the troughs underneath. consequently, any oil carried up by the piston rings is forced into the valve chambers. A heavy oil does not burn up readily, but remains to gum the valves.

(POINT 4)  
Gargoyle Mobiloil "E," being a clean-burning oil, is readily consumed and expelled. It does not remain to foul the valves, seats, and stems.

The Ford multiple disc clutch runs "wet"—is continually in a spray of engine oil. All manufacturers of this type of clutch recommend an oil which will give positive, quick engagement with no slipping, and an instantaneous release.

Heavier oils used in Ford engines cause a drag between the clutch plates. "Creeping" is the result. The car starts ahead when the engine starts, although the clutch is released.

(POINT 5)  
Gargoyle Mobiloil "E" gives positive and immediate clutch engagement and disengagement. There is no "creeping."

Just a word about the transmission. In the Ford you have a Planetary transmission employing three *close-fitting* sleeves, mounted on an extension of the crank-shaft. A heavy-

bodied oil is not well adapted to work into and thoroughly lubricate the sleeves and bearings.

(POINT 6)  
The body and character of Gargoyle Mobiloil "E" enable it to distribute thoroughly and meet this lubrication need perfectly.

As to the transmission gears: There are three sets of triple gears mounted on close-fitting pivots. These gears are bronze bushed. The bearings fit tightly—in fact, so tightly that oil heavier than "E" is handicapped in working into and correctively lubricating the bushings and pins.

(POINT 7)

Chattering of Ford transmission bands comes from incorrectly adjusted bands or worn out linings, and is aggravated by unburned fuel mixed with the lubricating oil. In such cases the diluted oil should be replaced with fresh oil and the bands correctly adjusted or the linings renewed. To attempt to remedy such mechanical conditions by the use of so-called "anti-chattering oils" containing foreign

material which may separate, or lard oil, wool grease or other animal fats which decompose under heat, is obviously wrong and likely to cause gumming of the valve stems, carbon deposit and other troubles.

(POINT 8)  
Gargoyle Mobiloil "E" is free from foreign material and animal fat. Its use and proper attention as the adjustment and renewal of the bands will give the greatest possible freedom from chattering. At the same time it will correctly lubricate the engine.

To the Resident Property Tax Paying Voters of Nolan County, Texas:

Take notice that an election will be held on the 20th day of October, 1923, within Nolan County, Texas, to determine if said County shall issue bonds and if a tax shall be levied in payment thereof in obedience to an election order entered by the Commissioners' Court on the 15th day of September, 1923, which is as follows:

On this the 15th day of September, 1923, the Commissioners' Court of Nolan County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Sweetwater, Texas, all members of the Court, to-wit:

Being present, came on to be considered the petition of Louis Horn and 322 other persons, praying that bonds be issued by said Nolan County, Texas, in the sum of \$600,000, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed five and one half per centum (5 1/2 per cent) per annum and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty (30) years from date thereof, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof, and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of Nolan County subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity, and.

It appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpaying voters of said Nolan County, Texas; and

It further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Nolan County, Texas;

IT IS THEREFORE CONSIDERED AND ORDERED BY THE COURT that an election be held in said County on the 20th day of October, 1923, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said County shall be issued in the amount of \$600,000.00 bearing interest at a rate not to exceed five and one half per centum (5 1/2 per cent) per annum, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty (30) years from date thereof; and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said County, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Articles 627 to 641, inclusive, of Chapter 2, Title 18, revised Statutes, 1911, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 203, Acts of 1917, Regular Session.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of this County, and who are resident property taxpaying in this County, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:
