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MAY REVEAL AN ANCIENT PEOPLE

Important Expedition Departing For Maya Region In Old Mexico to Study Ruins of Old Civilization

MAY BE OLDER THAN EGYPT

Possible That Development in Yucatan Peninsula Proceeded the 4,000 Year Old Work in Nile Valley

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—One of the most important scientific explorations probably ever undertaken and one which may resurrect a civilization antedating that of ancient Egypt will begin soon, in accordance with a contract recently signed between the Mexican Government and the Carnegie Institute of Washington.

This will be a complete exploration into the ancient civilization of the Maya race of Mexico. The Maya civilization flourished in Yucatan, Mexico. The impending exploration is regarded as of the greatest importance and significance to the scientific world.

The group of scientists who will undertake the exploration probably will be headed by Dr. S. G. Morley. Dr. Morley has lived and studied many years in Yucatan and is the possessor of the most profound knowledge on the Maya race. It is expected that at least he will be in charge of the archeological phase of the exploration.

Work is now in progress in Yucatan to clear away the woods and brush that have grown up around the ruins of the Maya civilization in order to facilitate the investigations of the scientists.

A great human aid for the impending exploration has been discovered in Yucatan—a Maya boy, who is a direct descendant of the last Maya king, according to word received here. It is said that this boy is able to read some of the ancient Maya writing and he will be employed to aid the scientists in their efforts to translate these thoughts of the hidden centuries.

The world has been able only to guess at the achievements of the Maya civilization. But now the scientific exploration led by the Carnegie Institution is to make the most complete investigation of all phases of the civilization of the Mayas.

The great Maya cities will be in part restored, the lives of the people will be delved into and the conditions under which they flourished will be studied to determine how this mysterious race was able to achieve its progress. The Maya treasures will be salvaged and after the work has been completed this ancient resurrected civilization will be preserved for posterity.

As an example of the great attainments which the Mayas developed, it is said at the Carnegie Institution here that the so-called ball court of the ancient Maya city of Chichen-Itza, on which the coming explorations will center, was constructed in such a manner and its acoustics so arranged that the voice of ordinary pitch spoken in one corner of the court could be distinctly heard and understood opposite, about sixty yards away.

The greatest scientists in the world on the subject of the Maya civilization will be asked by the Carnegie Institution to take part in the explorations.

FORD'S PARTNER PAYS RESPECTS

United States Senator Couzens Ridicules Ford's Presidential Aspirations in Detroit Speech

RAPS BACK AT BEER CHARGE

Says The Very Idea of Henry Ford As President is Ridiculous—No Training—Recalls Peace Ship

DETROIT, Nov. 1.—Henry Ford and United States Senator James Couzens pioneer partners in the Ford Motor Co. and long associated together in other enterprises, came to a parting of the ways here today.

In addressing a meeting of Republicans of Detroit, Couzens made no secret of the fact that Ford had cut him to the quick when he declared that "Couzens knows better than to advocate a return to the old days of plenty of beer."

In return Senator Couzens ridiculed Ford's presidential aspirations, questioning his motives in the Muscle Shoals negotiations and defended Secretary of War Weeks in his sale of the Gorgas Steam Plant to the Alabama Power Co.

"Ford wants to be president. His failure to withdraw his name from the Nebraska primaries proves that," Couzens declared. Continuing he said "Ford's presidential aspirations will be as great a failure as his Peace Ship Ford for president! How ridiculous! How can a man over 60 years of age who has never done anything except make motors, without training and without capacity, aspire to such an office!"

NO TIME FOR ANY SCOUT MEET HAS POLICY CHANGE BEEN POSTPONED

Premier Poincare of France Stubbornly Reiterates Position on Reparations at Unveiling Speech

AMOUNT FIXED TO BE PAID

France Not Satisfied With Treaty of Versailles But Intends to Stay With It—It is Declared

PARIS, Nov. 1.—"This is no time for any changes in French policy" Premier Poincare of France declared today at the unveiling of a memorial to the French war dead at Nevers.

"The expert advisory commission must not set the amount of the German reparations. We are anxious to solve this problem in full accord with our allies in a problem in which we are much more interested than they but we do not want to be trapped.

"We will not abandon our rights nor give up our guarantees. We will not tear up the treaty of Versailles which was signed by so many nations nor will we agree to any settlement other than the question of whether Germany shall pay now or in a short time. This is the only sanction that any commission of experts can expect from us.

"They may find new ways of payment and they may find means to restore Germany's finances.

"How unjust it would be for Germany to disavow her debts and then in a few years return to humiliate and crush us.

"France signed the treaty of Versailles, although we were not satisfied with it. We were promised the aid of other powers in the event of future aggressions and we were promised that returns for all our debts. But within so short a time the stones of this magnificent structure have fallen down."

RENDER HONORS TOTAL RAIN 10.11

Greatest Gathering Masons in History Present For Laying of Cornerstone of Washington Memorial

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—George Washington the first president of the United States and a Mason, has been honored as few men before him have ever been honored.

Today, in the presence of his 29th successor, Calvin Coolidge, Chief Justice Taft and Thousands of Masons from all over the world, the cornerstone of the great Masonic Shrine Memorial was laid on Shooter's Hill overlooking Alexandria.

Seldom if ever has there been a greater gathering of Masons. Every Grand Master was present or represented. It is estimated that fully 30,000 were there.

MINING INCREASES

Brazil Increasing Exports Diamonds Other Minerals

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 1.—Mining operations are steadily increasing in development every year in Brazil, chiefly in the state of Minas Geraes, which is one of the richest regions of the world in gold, iron ore, manganese and diamonds.

In 1920 Brazilian exports of mineral products amounted to 277,044,130 kilograms. Diamonds to the value of about \$1,000,000 were exported during the course of the year.

The gold and silver output does not figure in the mineral export statistics for the past few years, as the entire production of the mines has been taken under contract by the federal government.

Bad Weather Prevents Inter-County Meet at Hotel Wright Scheduled For Tonight for Organization

ARE RAISING THE MONEY

More Than \$1200 Sweetwater's Quota Had Been Subscribed Wednesday Night in Spite of The Rain

The meeting scheduled for tonight at the Hotel Wright to perfect the Four County Scout Council has been postponed owing to the weather and road conditions. This was done by W. M. Elliott of Colorado after making a survey of the situation and finding that many representative men would be unable to get here. This meeting will be held as soon as feasible.

In the meantime the work is progressing most satisfactorily, although the rains and bad weather have delayed it somewhat. Colorado, the first to raise their quota of \$1200 have planned to go on and get \$2,000 for the work.

Here in Sweetwater a total of \$1200 had been subscribed up to Wednesday night, although the formal drive for funds was not scheduled until Thursday. Interest here has become increasingly aroused over the project and it is not considered that there will be any difficulty in raising the balance.

E. E. Voss arrived in Sweetwater from Colorado and Big Spring Wednesday night, and left Thursday morning for Fisher County. Roscoe has not yet raised its quota of \$500 owing to weather conditions but interest there is said to be such that there will be no doubt of its going over. Robroy Price, the other scout executive working with Mr. Voss in this field, left Thursday morning for Wichita Falls, where another big Scout project is underway.

Conditions in Scurry County are said to be coming along very satisfactorily.

In the meantime plans are going forward for the Scout film at the Palace Sunday afternoon at 3. It is probable that the Boy Scouts will attend it in a body in uniform.

This city has been operating with only one night watchman since early in the year when the City Council dispensed with the services of one as a measure of economy.

Officials say however that one night watchman is not sufficient to patrol the town. Mr. Brown assumes his new duties tonight.

WALTON DEFENSE GIVEN SENATE

Appears on Trial For Impeachment Charges After Motion For Continuance is Voted Down

WILL ASK FOR DEMURRER

Motion to Quash Whole Proceedings And For The Disqualifying Of Certain Senators Argued

OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 1.—Governor Walton's answer to charges of impeachment before the Oklahoma Court of Impeachment were heard this afternoon at 1:30.

The hearing was agreed upon shortly before the court recessed at noon and after a motion for postponement by the defense had been voted down.

Walton and his staff of attorneys appeared before the bar of the Senate at 10 o'clock this morning at which time the Senate with Supreme Court Justice J. G. Manson presiding, convened.

Only a small crowd was on hand. Walton glanced about the chamber and greeted friends here and there. He talked in low grave tones with his attorneys.

Speaking before the court, Attorney S. E. Riddle for the defense announced partial plans for the defense.

Certain members of the Senate will be asked to be disqualified. No reason was given for this action.

A motion to quash the impeachment will be filed by the defense and a demurrer to certain portions of the charges will also be filed.

PERMITS RETURN

German Government Will Allow Former Crown Prince to Return to His Fatherland to Live

BERLIN, Nov. 1.—The German government has agreed in principle that the former Crown Prince may return to live in Germany, it was learned today from reliable sources.

The Crown Prince has agreed to give notice to the government if ever he decides to return to live, officials declared here. It was stated that he did not intend to return immediately.

The idea of the Cabinet was that the former heir to the throne could live in Germany quietly and unmolested like the former King of Saxony, who now lives in Silesia. Socialist members of the Cabinet have agreed to the proposal it was learned.

ACCIDENTS

Some interesting information on automobile accidents on Wisconsin highways is The Highway Magazine by N. M. Isabella, assistant maintenance engineer, Wisconsin Highway Commission. The commission started in May, 1922, to investigate the number and causes of automobile accidents on the state trunk highways, which comprise 7,500 miles or about 10 per cent of the total rural mileage in the state. The following table from Mr. Isabella's article shows the total number of accidents during the year 1922, and their causes:

RUIN DRUG STORE

Service Cars Ram Through it 40 Times
13 Years

PARIS, Nov. 1.—There is a corner drug store close to the terminus of the Northern Railroad which possesses an irresistible attraction for motor-driven vehicles. Placed just below the meeting point of two rapidly descending streets, it has been wrecked forty times in the last thirteen years. Three months ago a motorcyclist drove through its glass front and died on the spot. A few days later a motor trolley crashed through into the middle of the shop, without causing any fatalities. Recently a taxicab went right through the store, breaking the large red-colored globes that still mark the drug store in France, overturning the counter, and doing about \$1,500 worth of damage to the stock.

CATCH SLAVERS

Two British Warships Active in Red Sea—Capture Slaves in Africa And Sell to the Arabs

By The United Press.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Although the slave trade is commonly supposed to have been suppressed all over the

world, two British warships, the Clematis and the Cornflower, have been engaged in suppressing this traffic in the Red Sea for the last two years. Not only have they succeeded in stopping most of the Red Sea slave trade, but they have also stopped gun-running which was occasionally attempted.

High prices are paid for slaves in this part of the world, who are generally captured from the coastal tribes and sold to the Arabs, who take their victims inland.

A communication from a member of the crew of the Clematis tells an interesting story:

"We had spent a period of two years in the Red Sea," he says, "witnessing very varied scenes of tropical life, and experiencing the almost intolerable



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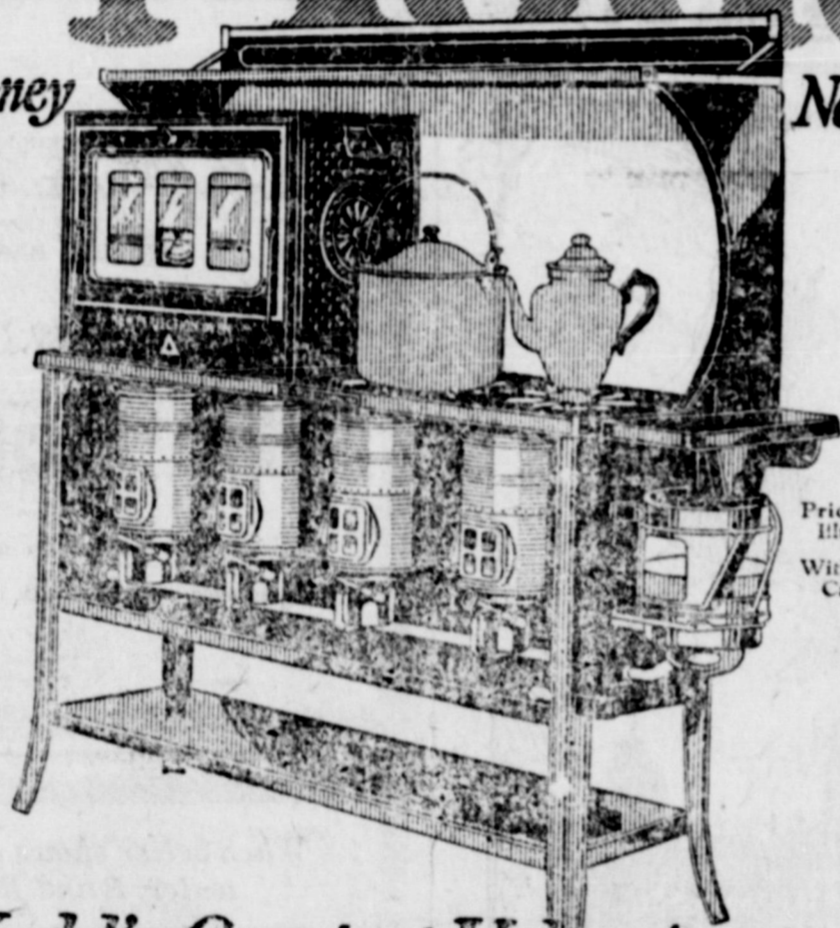

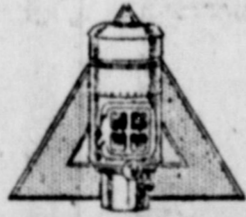

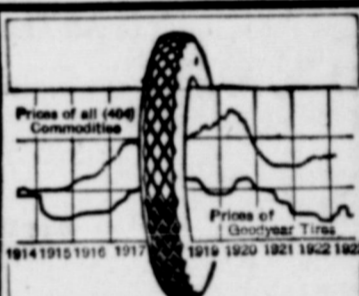

"It was heartrending to stand by and see the hungry mites ravenously attack the bread we gave them. The dhow's crew endeavored to escape by jumping overboard and swimming ashore, but were successfully captured and hopes are entertained that they got their full deserts."
