TO SELL WHEAT

By The United Press. WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—A wheat export corporation to aid in the disposal abroad of the surplus American wheat was recommended by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace in his annual report to President Coolidge today.

Secretary Wallace urged that this corporation be empowered to dump its product on foreign markets at whatever price possible to get for it and the loss so incurred to be distributed over the entire crop.

COMMISSION MET

Grant Franchise to Postal Telegraph Co. on Condition Office is Opened in Sweetwater

An ordinance granting a franchise to the Postal Telegraph Co. to extend their line through Sweetwater passed first reading at the regular meeting of the City Commission Thursday afternoon. The franchise was conditioned upon the Postal agreeing to open an office in Sweetwater.

The commission also plan to get in touch with the American Railway Express Co. relative to extension of the delivery limits of the city. The same limit as observed by the postoffice will be asked. It was pointed out that the Express Company now have the same limits they had 15 years ago.

Bills were audited and ordered paid. A release was also granted in conjunction with the county for the sale of some of the city and county land known as the Pepper land.

OBREGON MOVES BALDWIN FORCES AGAINST REVOLT LOSE ELECTION

Large Bodies Federal Troops Being Sent Against Vera Cruz It is Reported at Laredo

OBJECT TO DICTATION

Rebel Wanted De La Huerta as President Instead of Calles as Favored By Obregon

By The United Press. LAREDO, Dec. 7.—Vague reports concerning the movements of large bodies of Federal troops to combat the revolution, based in Vera Cruz have drifted into Nuevo Laredo opposite here today. The reports are not confirmed and there is no definite information concerning the scope of the revolt.

The lower Mexican border is quiet and there is no indication of any disturbance.

AGAINST CALLES

By The United Press. VERA CRUZ, Dec. 7.—In a statement, Guadalupe Sanches, Mexican rebel leader announced today that a Mexican insurrection had been started to prevent president Obregon from dictating the election of P. Vas Calles as his successor.

The proclamation said that the Federal government was attempting to impose a successor upon the nation and consequently Adolfo de la Huerta, liberal candidate was impelled to protest against such action.

The revolt was started by military leaders and politicians at the home of Sanches last night which lasted until after midnight. Then a message was sent to President Obregon, announcing the rebellion.

The rebels then proceeded to put their own men in charge of the principal federal offices of the Port, the customhouse, mails and telegraph.

The rebellion of the state has caused and Eduardo Loyo named provision al governor.

MINE IS FLOODED

Lives 250 Men Endangered When Pneumatic Drills Penetrated Body of Water Underground

By The United Press. BELLEVILLE, Ill., Dec. 7.—At least three coal miners were drowned it was established today in checking up on the flooding of the mine of the Radium Coal Co. near here late yesterday.

Two bodies have been recovered. There were 250 men in the mine.

Flooding took place when pneumatic drills in the hands of miners pierced through a wall into a large body of water.

BALDWIN FORCES CONSERVATIVES FAIL TO RETURN MAJORITY OF SEATS IN PARLIAMENT IN ELECTION FIGHT

Conservatives Fail to Return Majority Of Seats in Parliament in Election Fight

MAY BE A COALITION

Joint Conservative Liberal Ministry is Foreseen as Result of Losses Sustained

By The United Press. LONDON, Dec. 7.—The Conservatives have lost their majority in the House of Commons.

Returns from the election held yesterday showed late this afternoon that Premier Stanley Baldwin had failed to attain 300 seats and that none of the three parties had a majority with which to control Parliament.

Conservative-Liberal coalition is the forecast.

Stanley Baldwin, present premier is leader of the Conservatives with Lloyd George of the Liberals. Just who the next premier will be is very problematical.

LITTLE FOLKS DIE

Bad Air From Stove Without Flue Proves Fatal to Girls

PONCA CITY, Okla., Dec. 7.—Myrtle Meek and Pearl Cason, 13 year old school girls are dead and Pauline Behar, seven, is in a serious condition as a result of inhaling fumes from a gas stove in a bathroom at the home of Mrs. J. C. Behar here.

The older girls had been left with Mrs. Behar's two children while she went to a town near by. When she returned she found the Meek and Cason girls dead and her daughter unconscious. A two-year-old son asleep near an open window was uninjured.

GAS KILLS MAN

Office and Warehouse Oklahoma Lumber Co. Ruined by Explosion and Resulting Fire

By The United Press. TONKAWA, Okla., Dec. 7.—One man was killed and two seriously injured when the office and warehouse of the Harry Craig Lumber Co. were destroyed by an explosion of gas which had accumulated under both buildings.

The identity of one of the dead men and one of the injured had not been determined.

Firemen succeeded in extinguishing the flames with a loss of \$40,000.

TWO CONVICTED

District Court in Colorado Passes Sentence Upon Men Arrested in Sweetwater Last Year

COLORADO, Dec. 7.—J. A. Jackson and R. J. (Dick) Pitts of Scurry county drew penitentiary sentences by juries trying them on bootlegging charges in District Court here this week. The Pitts case drew a sentence of two years in the pen; Jackson was given three years.

Jackson was arrested on a freight train at Sweetwater July 2nd by Sheriff Jack Yarbrough of Nolan County after he and a companion named Bedcheck had abandoned an automobile on the street here in which was found 100 gallons of alcohol. The car caught fire near the home of E. B. Smith. Bedcheck fled the scene immediately but Jackson remained and assisted in extinguishing the flames. He then disappeared and a few hours later was apprehended at Sweetwater.

Pitts was arrested at Colorado several months ago by Deputy Sheriff R. C. Dale on suspicion of selling booze and following an examining trail was remanded for probing by the grand jury.

FORSTOLD DEATH

Couple Married 47 Years Die Within 14 Hours

SAN ANGELO, Dec. 7.—"Just a few more hours and I'll be with him," said Mrs. A. W. Howard, age 66, as she was taking the last look at her husband whose body had been prepared for burial, and on the next day Mrs. Howard was laid to rest in the same grave with her husband. A double funeral was held.

Fourteen hours and ten minutes later Mrs. Howard joined her husband in death, death ending a happy married life of forty-seven years. Mrs. Howard had been ill over a year and her husband had been ill about four months. She asked for one last look at her husband after he died, and gazing at him over the side of her bed, she foretold her death which was near at hand.

PASS KLAN BILL IN LOWER HOUSE

Passes First Section Joint Senate and House Klan Measure—First Activity Since Trial

By The United Press. OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 7.—Section 1 of the Senate Klan bill was adopted by a standing vote in the House of Representatives today.

"This is the first definite step the house has taken since the Walton trial."

The section passed renders it unlawful to wear masks except in buildings or on property controlled by the organization. Historical religious or educational pageants are permitted by the measure.

Other sections approved in the joint Senate and House committee do not include publication of officers or membership or the filing of the names with the state authorities.

A recess of the special session will follow closely final adoption of the special legislation by the House.

PROHIBITS MASK WEARING

Does Not Include Publication Membership Rolls of Secret Organizations

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WRECKED OFFICE

Citizens Ask For Special Grand Jury Investigation When Newspaper Office Ruined

By The United Press. STUTTGART, Ark., Dec. 7.—A special grand jury was demanded by local citizens to investigate a raid conducted by 16 men on the office of the Weekly Free Press here during which printing presses and other equipment was destroyed.

The editors R. A. Berry and T. F. Lawson were severely beaten and ordered to leave town. The attack was instigated by articles attacking officers and members of the Rice Growers Association, a co-operative organization.

The editors identified several of the men as members of the association.

ASK LONG TERM

Government Prosecutor Asks for Three Year Sentence For Attempted Kidnapping Bergdoll

By The United Press. MOSSBACH, Germany, Dec. 7.—A sentence of three year for Lt. Corliss Hoover Griffiths of Ohio for his part in the attempted kidnapping of G. C. Bergdoll notorious slacker, was asked by the government attorney here today.

Although Griffiths admitted he was the instigator of the attempt, the prosecutor also asked for a sentence of one year for Spehber and Gargarian and six months for Nelson, the chauffeur.

All of the men took part in the attempted kidnapping at Erzbach last fall.

OTHER ATTEMPTS TO SLAY COBURN

Investigators For State Say Phil E. Fox Planned to Kill Coburn Three Months Previously

TRIAL SET FOR WEDNESDAY

New Evidence Unearthed Expected to Cut Under Insanity Plea To Be Made by Defense

By The United Press. ATLANTA, Dec. 7.—New evidence unearthed against Phil E. Fox, publicity agent of the Ku Klux Klan will go on trial here next Wednesday for the slaying of W. S. Coburn, leader of the faction opposed to Co. Simmons investigators declared today.

Some of the internal warfare of the Klan is expected to be revealed when the case is called in Superior Court. The state will attempt to prove that a previous attempt had been made to murder Coburn some three months prior to the time he was killed. This attempt was frustrated when a revolver was wrested from the hands of Fox. Testimony is being prepared to show where the revolver was obtained and is expected to counteract the insanity plea.

GOVERNMENT FICTIONS

The row in the senate over its organization will amount to nothing. When informed by a distinguished senator that the resolution that made Cummins presiding officer of the senate did so for life, it was asked if it also made provision for Mrs. Cummins and the children. The senator thought not, but he was sure of the life tenure unless the senate sees fit to rescind that action.

The result therefore is that Senator Cummins does not have to be elected. Like Tennyson's book he goes on forever with the government limousine with monogram and chauffeur attached, to say nothing of the \$12,000 salary. This is indeed a pleasing situation—especially for Cummins. With that job safely nailed down he will also retain the chairmanship of the great committee so much coveted by Senator LaFollette.

The only way to pry him loose from either will be an appeal from his own decision. It is not likely that such an appeal will prevail. The senate is a very courteous body. It not only treats tenderly the acts of its own members but all of those who ever have been members. Indeed it is like destroying the pillars of society to reverse a senate precedent. But for all of that it is nevertheless the greatest deliberative body in the world. It is only there the debate can be had on public questions that finally informs the people of what is going on.

The house intended to be the popular branch of government is in fact nothing of the kind. The Russian Duma was not nearly so autocratic. Free debate has been unknown in it now for many years. Gag rule prevails and a half dozen men, not one of whom even resembles the second cousin of a statesman, run it to suit themselves. Even the committees have been gagged by that clever but thoroughly brutal device to put legislation into the hands of a half dozen men, and which is known as the Rules committee.

Consequently while there are some things that might be altered for the better in the senate one can accept

with some degree of complacency even the fiction that the senate goes on forever when he remembers the performance over in the house. Indeed if senatorial courtesy has its ridiculous spots it is nevertheless the great popular body where debate cannot be stifled, where the truth can be and always is told, and from which the country can know what is going on.

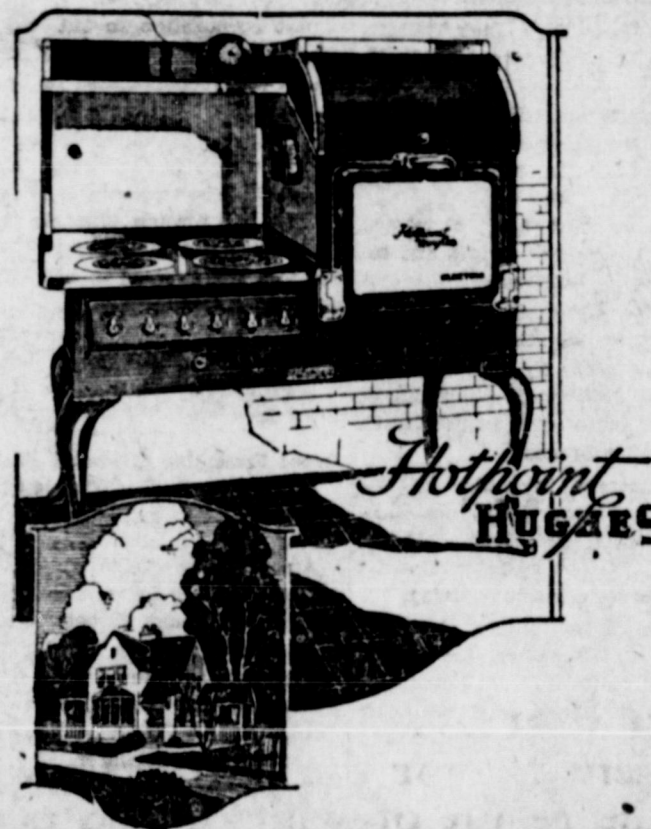

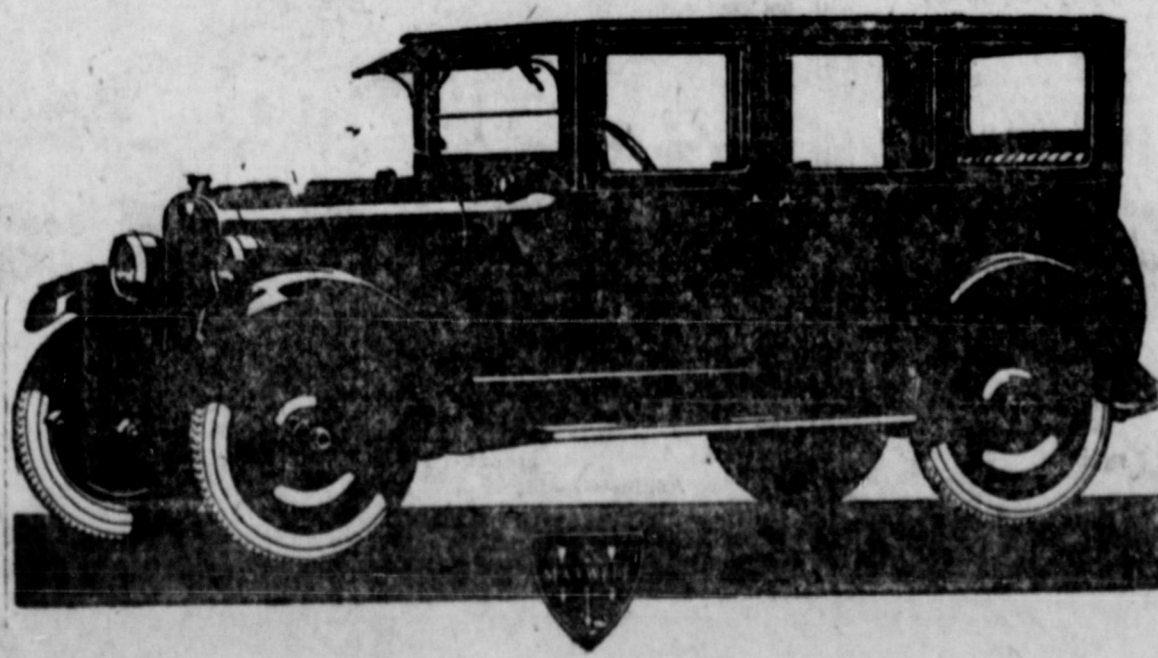
