Democratic State Committee Says He Is Safest and Strongest Man For **Democratic Nomination**

TAN ED UP ON MAYFIELD

Barry Miller Opposes Angeloan's Resolution Endorsing Texas Senator -It Passed Unanimously

DALLAS, Dec. 15, -Governor Pat M. Neff was endorsed for the Democratic nomination as candidate for the presidency in resolutions adopted by the State Democratic committee here this morning.

The resolution said that Governor Neff was the safest, wisest and strong est man in the ranks of Democracy to

The vote was 25 to 3 with two pres ent and not voting.

Waco was selected as the 1924 Convention City for the Democratic Party of Texas.

Mrs. Monae Boren Mahoney of Dallas was selected as the National Committee Women from Texas to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Cone Johnson, resigned.

Mrs. Mahoney said that she was opposed to the formation of a Woman's party and thought women should line up with either of the two major political parties. The 18th and 19th amendments are fundamental parts of the constitution and no candidate who favored tampering with either would have her approval.

A resolution strongly endorsing Earle B. Mayfield and condemning efforts being made to unseat him was offered by Charles B, Metcalfe of San Angelo. Metcalfe declared the party should endorse Mayfield owing to his overwhelming victory of last year. Bar ry Miller of Dallas said such a resolution would neither help nor harm Mayfield and that it was not up to the committee to take any action at this time. Mayfield had caused enough trouble already he said, and offered a resolution to adjourn. This was tabled and Chairman Frank Davis declared that inasmuch a sthe resolution had Mayfield not to pass it. The resolution was adopted without a dissenting vote. Barry Miller did not vote, saying he held a proxy and had not consulted his principal.

Wrapping and Packing

All parcels must be securely wrapped or packed in order to reach their destination in good condition. In wrapping ordinary parcels strong paper and heavy twine should be used.

Fragile Articles

Articles easily broken or crushed must be crated or securely wrapped. se liberal quantities of excelsior or like material, in, around, and between the articles and the outside container. Glassware fragile toys, crockery, must be wrapped so as to prevent the escape of particles or pieces if broken in transit.

All articles easily broken or damaged must be marked "Fragile," P'erishable Matter


Story of a Stocking That Was So Empty

DESERT HOLLY

Though not profuse enough for general gathering at Christmas time, and not as sultable as the regular holly for wreatn-making purposes, the desert holly (Perezia nana) of the Southwest is a peculiar little plant with stiff, smooth, dull bluish green leaves with prickly edges, like holly leaves, but not so stiff. The plant bears one light purplish-pink flower, the head about an inch long, with purplish bracts. The plant grows but two or three inches high, and looks somewhat like s little sprig stuck in the sand. Christmas gifts addressed to points within one day's travel should be mail in two day's travel, not later than De cember 18.


