August Is Wettest Month Here

AT THIS TIME each year, our sympathy goes out to all those dedicated teachers across the land, who this week went back to the task of trying to drill some knowledge into the brains of our progeny.

While back, some scientist declared that the human brain is growing smaller and softer as the human race travels through the eons of time. Well, we already knew that. Just ask anyone who is on the downhill side of middle-age and can't remember where they put their car keys thirty minutes ago.

With the exception of seed caps on farmers and ten-gallon Stetsons on drug-store cowboys, people just don't cover their heads up much anymore. And knowing the fact that the Ming Dynasty of China was overthrown in 1644 by Manchu invaders has no bearing at all on whether or not there's going to be enough money left over at the end of the month to pay the mortgage bill. Life goes on!

Just when you may get to feeling pretty good about yourself, there's nothing quite as apt to burst your bubble as having to help your kid with his homework. All that wonderful knowledge they stuffed into your head when you were in school is now out-dated.

For instance, we learned that the shortest distance between two points is a straight line. Somebody figured that out from watching crows fly from one place to another...hence the term "as the crow flies." Then later someone said a straight line was the small segment of a very large curve.

If you should happen to wander into a math class after school starts and watch the youngsters trying to figure out the length of a straight line, you'd be amazed. All the figuring that goes on could take up an entire blackboard. (Only they aren't blackboards anymore...they are green.) Back to the shortest distance being "as the crow flies"...the quickest way to figure out the distance of the straight line would be to pull the calculator out of your pocket and punch a couple of buttons. Methinks we think too much!

Friona registered 1.20 inches of rain during the past week, to push the total rainfall for the month of August above the four-inch mark and make the month the wettest thus far in 1989.

Rainfall was measured as follows: .41 inches on Monday morning, August 28; .24 inches on Tuesday morning, August 29, and .55 inches Wednesday morning, August 30. Actually, the .55 inch total was registered between the hours of 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. Tuesday, which is just after the daily reading is made.

The total rainfall in the city of Friona came to 4.18 inches for the month of August. This makes August the rainiest month so far, surpassing June's total of 3.39 inches of moisture.

Rainfall was logged on 12 calendar dates during the month, with at least a "trace" recorded on five other dates, as mornings started out on the wet side for the most part during the month.

The total rainfall received for the year now stands at 11.19 inches, still somewhat below normal. It is unlikely that the 1989 total will match or surpass the 19.99 inches measured here in 1988.

Jerry Butman, manager of Friona Co-op Gin, said that this week's rainfall should pretty well "lay the cotton by."

Dennis Printz, Holly Sugar Corp. executive, said that the nice rains this week should also be a big help for the area's sugarbeet crop. "We have a good crop underway, and the moisture should help the beets considerably," Printz said.

The latest round of rain seems to have been fairly general. Jim Dixon of the Rhea community said that he had received about 1.5 inches during the past week, which compares favorably with that registered in Friona.

At a meeting on August 28, the Friona Independent School District Board of Trustees voted unanimously to set the 1989 tax rate at \$.77 per \$100 value. The tax rate will remain the same as in 1988.

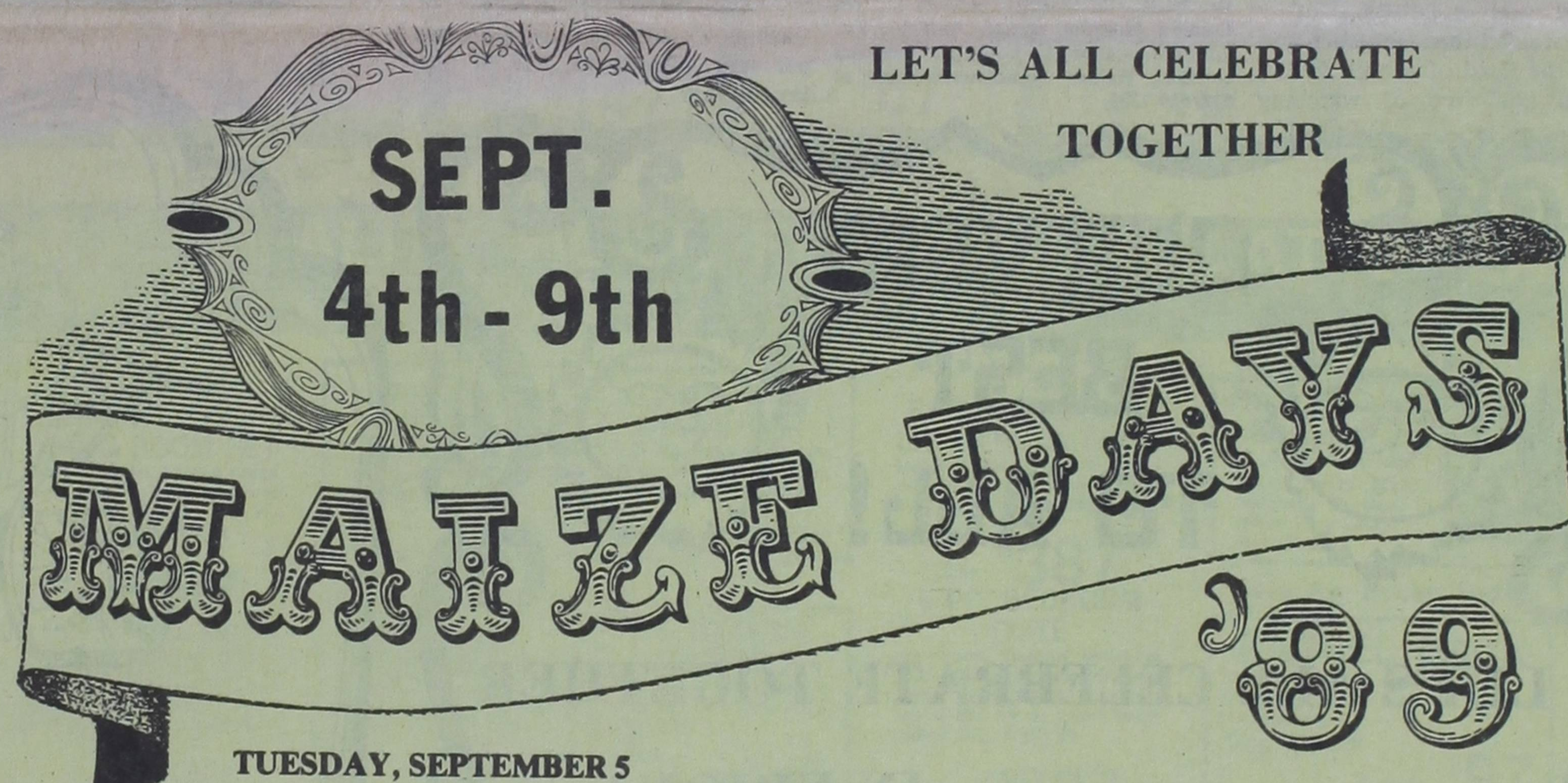

Be Creative: Don't Read This

In the June 1989 edition of *Management Review*, David Fagiano, executive vice president of the American Management Association, wrote elegantly on creativity. He says that many college students choose a career in marketing, "because it's so creative." Business students use words including copy, art, design, point of purchase, and packaging to describe a marketing career. They confuse cleverness with creativity.

Mr. Fagiano defines creativity as "the ability to take two or more apparently unrelated elements...and put them together to form something new." Probably the best definition of creativity is Buckminster Fuller's: "Creativity is rearranging the old in a new way so that the old becomes obsolete."

To be creative we must see connections between things when everyone else sees only separation. How does one learn to be creative? First, creativity requires knowledge. A creative person wants to know about all kinds of things: ancient history, 19th Century mathematics, hog futures, current manufacturing techniques, baseball statistics, gardening, and flower arranging. Creative ideas come from old concepts rearranged in a new way.

Knowledge, alone, of course, won't make you creative. The more you know, however, the more flexible you can be in your thinking and the more you'll be able to turn things upside-down and inside-out. You can alter your knowledge and experience into practical new ideas.

Gutenberg, for example, combined two previously unconnected ideas, the wine press and the coin punch, to create the printing press. A creative marketing person labeled Seven-up "the Un-Cola," creating a new beverage category in consumers' minds, an alternative to dozens of colas on the market. Picasso took the seat and handlebars of a bicycle, welded them together and created the head of a bull. Nolan Bushnell got tired of watching

television and got it to respond him, creating Pong, the first video game.

Roger von Oech, in *A Whack On The Side Of The Head: How To Unlock Your Mind For Innovation*, gives some suggestions on developing creativity:

*Study English and American literature. Why? Because reading allows you to see life from a different perspective. (All you English teachers please stand and take a bow.)

*Look for the second right answer. Keep looking for different approaches and alternatives to the old way of doing things.

*Try to see similarities among things—a river is like life, for example, with many twists and turns, smooth places and rough.

*Break the rules by questioning the reasoning behind them. Why did this program come to be? Do the reasons for this program still exist? Who really benefits from this? Who picks up the tab? Alexander untied the "Gordian Knot" by chopping it in half, while others had failed for centuries because they followed the rule and tried to untie it.

*Become impractical by asking "what if" questions. Einstein conceived the theory of relativity by asking, "What if one could ride a light beam."

*Think ambiguously. Heraclitus said, for example, "Harmony consists of opposing tension." If engineers had read Heraclitus they could have constructed the Brooklyn Bridge sooner.

*Make mistakes. Errors indicate you're trying something new. If you don't make a mistake from time to time, you won't achieve anything new—and you'll be so boring.

I just realized this column on creativity may be lacking in creativity. I can find no similarities, rule breaking, impracticalities, or ambiguities here. Maybe you should cut it out and paste it upside down on your refrigerator.

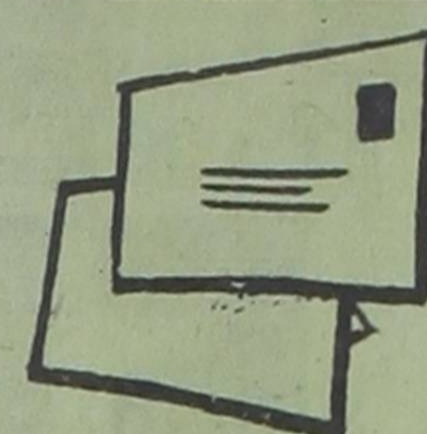
KELLEY CASH presented a vocal solo for her talent in the Miss Friona pageant last Saturday.

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 17, 1934

Information from the president of the local board of school trustees, states that the Friona Schools will open for the term on Monday, August 3, that being two weeks from the coming Monday. A complete faculty of teachers has been secured, which includes practically all who were here last year, with at least one additional teacher, the instructor of vocational agriculture. The fleet of eight new school buses has already arrived and the long garage or shed for their protection has been erected on the newly acquired school property.

50 YEARS AGO--AUG. 18, 1939

This territory and much of the surrounding counties were visited Sunday night by a good and much needed rain, which gave a fall of from three-fourths of an inch to an estimated inch and a half, as reported from the various sections of the territory from a few miles north and west, to the southern limits of the county.

45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 11, 1944

The Republican County Convention which met in Friona, Saturday, July 29, was called to order by Temporary Chairman F.W. Reeve, and by unanimous vote, the temporary organization was made permanent. F.W. Reeve was unanimously elected as County Chairman for the coming two years, and he was also appointed as delegate to the State Convention in Dallas on August 8, with L.S. Hobbs of Amarillo, as alternate. Mr. Reeve was also appointed as delegate to the Congressional Convention with George McLean as alternate. The following candidates were nominated for county officers: Marvin Todd of Friona Precinct, for County Judge; Carl Schlenker of Bovina Precinct, for Sheriff-Assessor-Collector; and Thomas Hartwell of Bovina Precinct, for County and District Clerk.

35 YEARS AGO--AUG. 12, 1954

The Parmer County Fair Committee met July 26 at the Villa Nu Court Cafe for a steak supper and to discuss plans for the coming county fair setting the dates as September 13, 14 and 15.

Gubernatorial candidate Ralph Yarborough made a brief stop Tuesday evening at the Friona airport, being met by a local delegation and one from Hereford. Though scheduled to speak at Hereford, Yarborough was forced by delay in plane flights to omit the Hereford visit.

30 YEARS AGO--AUG. 13, 1959

A.T. Eiland, 81, of Olton Route, Plainview, was reported to be improving at Parmer County Community Hospital, Tuesday, following a collision Thursday about noon at the Hub corner. Eiland was driving a 1955 Oldsmobile toward Dimmitt when his auto was struck by a 1953 Mack diesel truck loaded with potatoes which was going south toward Muleshoe as the vehicles met in the Hub intersection. The truck, which was driven by J.I. Reames of Amarillo had loaded with potatoes in Hereford and was headed to Midland.

25 YEARS AGO--AUG. 13, 1964

The Friona City Council gave preliminary approval Monday to a \$278,869 annual budget for the fiscal year beginning next October 1. The proposed budget compares to that of \$247,484 adopted for the present fiscal year.

The Friona Star was a winner in the West Texas Press Association's annual contests. The Star was awarded the first place plaque in the "Best Editorials" division. It received the second place award in the "General Excellence" contest.

20 YEARS AGO--AUG. 14, 1969

Mary Rando, Friona High School graduate, currently a freshman student at West Texas State University, placed in the top ten of the "Miss Grain Sorghum of

the Nation" contest at Dimmitt last Saturday night. Sponsored by the Parmer County Farm Bureau, Miss Rando presented a reading of "Freedom-My Responsibility."

15 YEARS AGO--AUG. 11, 1974

Fran Dodd Tucker, a native of Friona, was among the 316 students who received their degrees from Eastern New Mexico University in summer commencement exercises at the university on August 2.

Donnette Carlton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.L. Carlton, Sr. of Friona, attended the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar recently at Baylor University, Waco, Texas.

10 YEARS AGO--AUG. 12, 1979

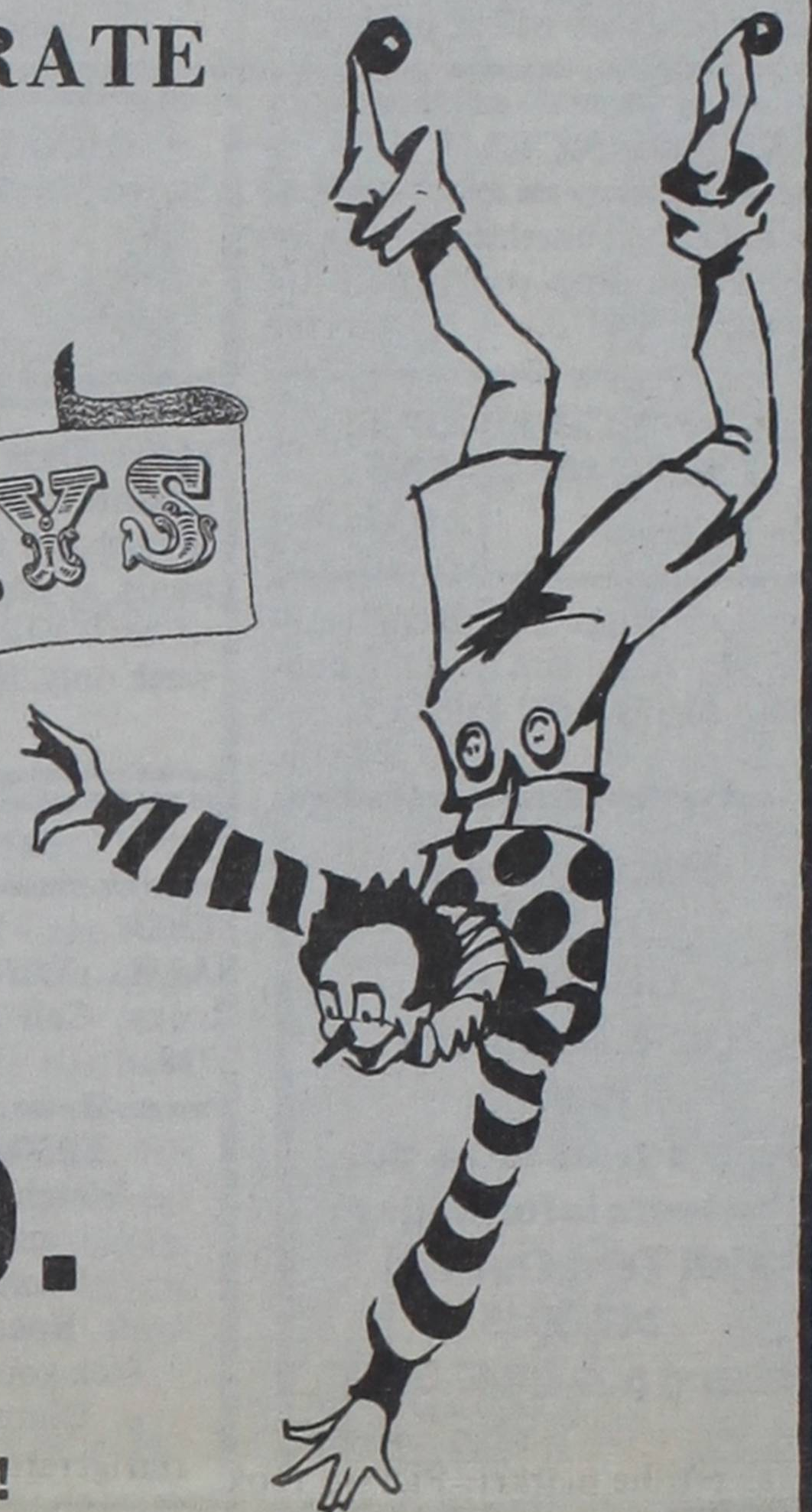

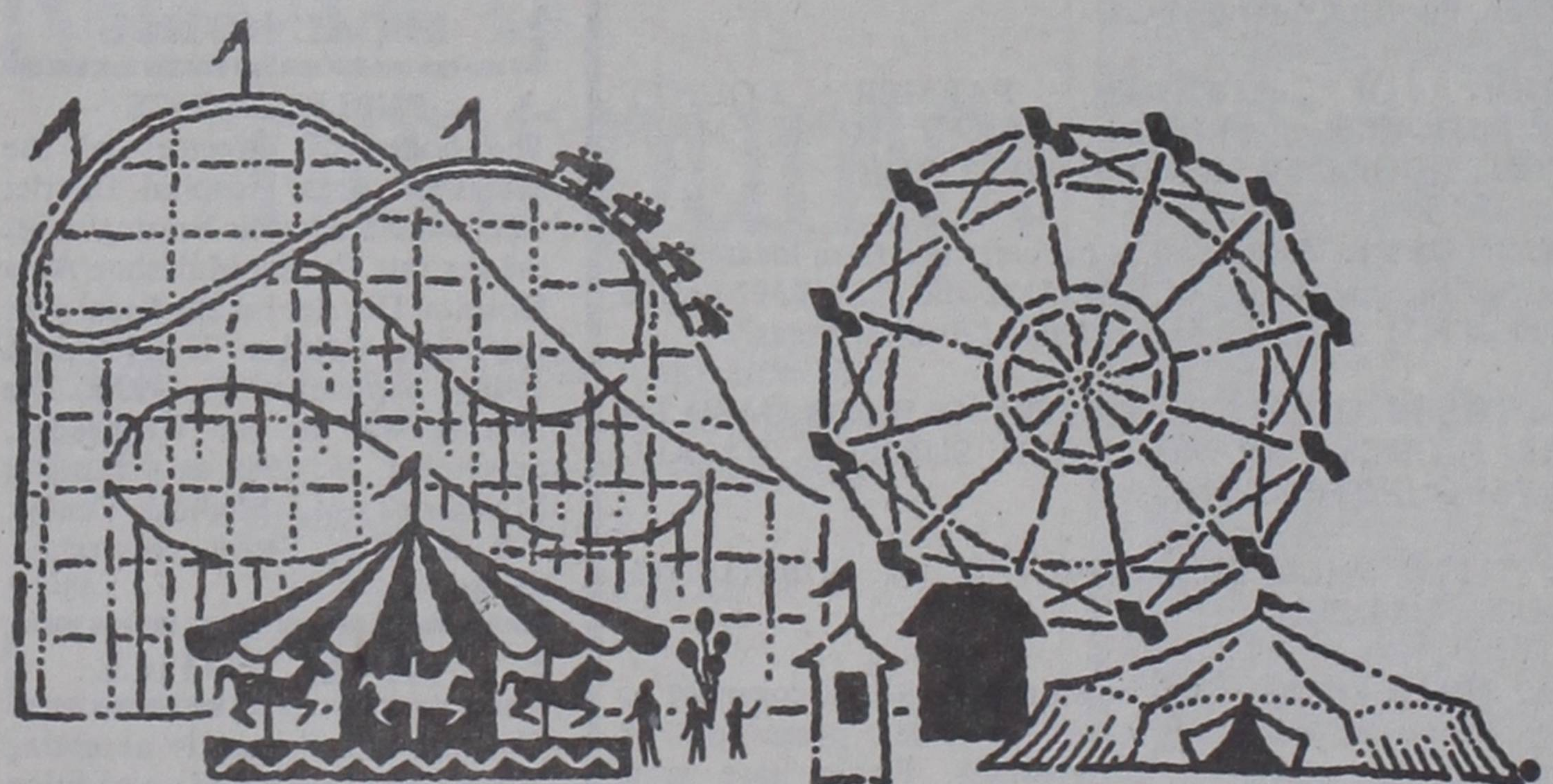

Members of the Friona School Board who signed the seniors' diplomas were T.J. Crawford, president, and H.T. Magnus, secretary.

Officers of the 1939 class included Martin Todd, president; Lauretta Griffith Brookfield, vice president, and Lydia Marie Spring Sylvester, secretary.

Todd was also the class valedictorian, and Kathaline Thompson was the salutatorian.

Class sponsors were C.D. Holmes (who also was the football coach), and Miss McAllister. Class mothers were Mrs. Spring and Mrs. Hinds.

Members of the graduating class were Doug Short, James Ray Coleman, J.T. Green, Ted Houlette, LeRoy Price, Johnny Stockton, Lyndon Stephens and Martin Todd.

Also, Roy Hughes, J.T. (Sonny) Guinn, Ray Frederick (Bud) Buchanan, C.L. Vestal, James A. (Bob) Wyly, June Chapin, Nell Childs Stockton, Mildred Garrett Elliott Turner and Lauretta Griffith Brookfield.

Also, Virginia Guyer Bayless, Geraldine Hinds Sherrieb, Charlene McFarland Jones, Lydia Marie Spring Sylvester, Grace Miller Parr, Maxine Shackelford Price, Alice Wyly Whaley, Kathaline Thompson Henderson and Fay Ellen Roberts.

Another local resident who went most of the way through school with the 1939 class is John Terry. Joyce Barker Coffman of Farwell was a member of the class for 11 years before moving to Farwell, where she graduated. Martin Bussell was another member who went most of the way as a class member, but did not finish at FHS.

Texas Tech University Has Cotton Videotape

Texas High Plains cotton farmers may want to add a television and VCR to their farm inventory—or at least a videotape entitled "Profitable High Plains Cotton Production."

The videotape is targeted specifically for cotton producers in the Texas High Plains, where one-half of the Texas cotton and one-fourth of the U.S. cotton is grown. Current research and the newest cotton production techniques are explained and demonstrated in the videotape.

The videotape is comprised of nine segments, each five to ten minutes in length. Topics discussed include land preparation; seed testing, varieties and stand establishment; growth and development; fertility; weed control; insects; irrigation; and termination.

James R. Supak, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) and committee chairperson for the project, said qualified experts wrote the scripts and consulted in the production of the segments concerning their areas of expertise. Contributors' names are listed after each segment so viewers can contact them for additional information.

Boosters To Meet Tuesday

The Booster Club will hold their first meeting of the year next Tuesday night, September 5 at 7:30 p.m. at the High School Cafeteria.

Everyone in Friona is invited to come out for a "Meet the Chiefs" night. The event will be topped off with a watermelon feast, free to all.

The 70-minute program is a joint venture between TAEX, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Tech University College of Agricultural Sciences and the U.S. Department of Agricultural Research Services. The Foundation for Agronomic Research funded the video project.

Pam Creel Alspaugh, manager of the broadcast bureau at Texas Tech's Office of News and Publications and producer of the series, said the program draws from 27 hours of footage obtained from area cotton fields, test plots and gins.

"The videotape is not just a review of standard production

practices. Each segment focuses on new research and new techniques," she said. "For instance, the segment about irrigation demonstrates the new Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) irrigation system and the segment on land preparation deals with conservation tillage."

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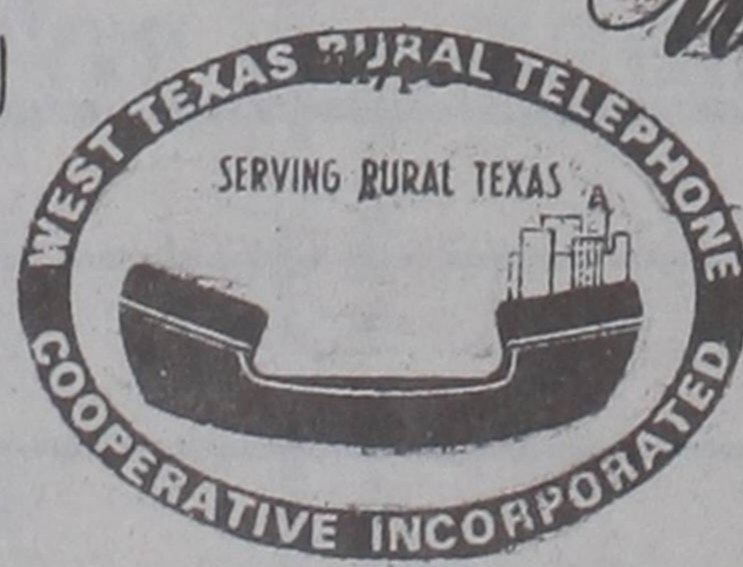


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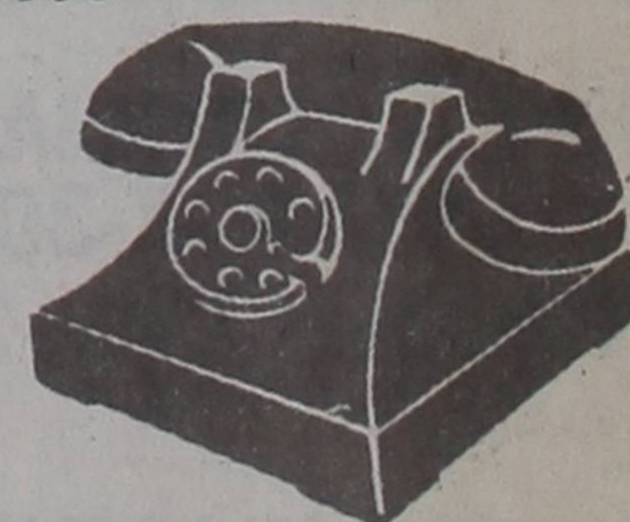
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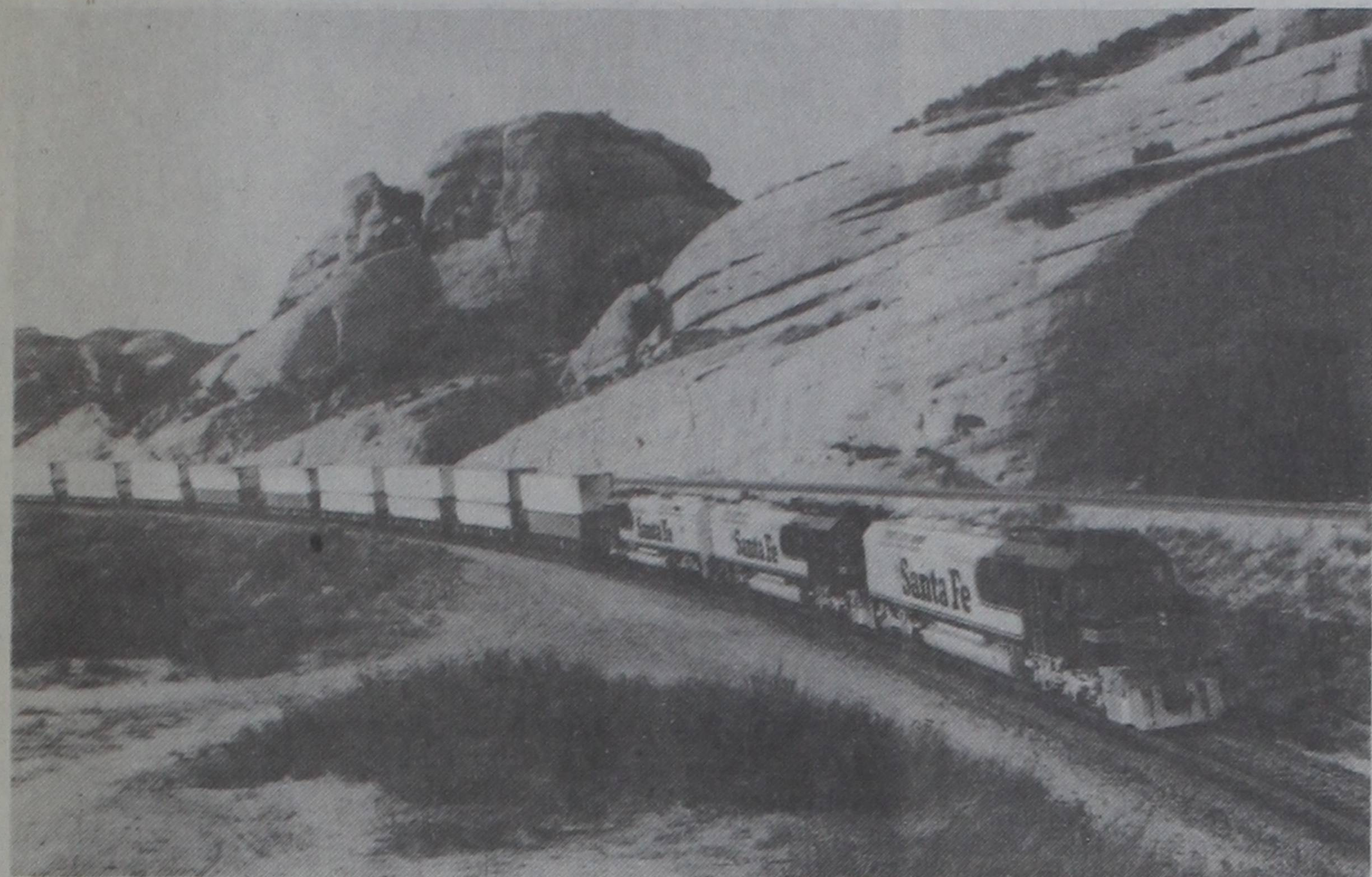

"Super Chief" Look Returns To Santa Fe

Locomotives bearing a paint scheme reminiscent of diesels that pulled the railroad's former Super Chief luxury passenger trains will power Santa Fe Railway's premium service intermodal trains, announced Santa Fe President Michael R. Haverty.

The new paint scheme, a modified version of the "war-bonnet" designed by General Motors and Santa Fe personnel for

introduction of the Super Chief in the late 1930s, will be applied to 100 new locomotives valued at \$140 million which are scheduled for delivery in 1990. "The Super Chief represented the very highest service quality and standards for equipment and personnel that Santa Fe offered," Haverty said. "In an obvious play on words, we are renaming our freight service the 'Super Fleet', to

symbolize our commitment to our freight customers."

Beginning in the second quarter of 1990, 40 Electro-Motive Division (General Motors) GP60 locomotives and 60 General Electric Dash 8-40B models will be delivered in the new livery of red and silver with black and yellow trim.

"We plan to use the new red and silver locomotives on our high-speed intermodal trains, to distinguish them from our other trains, which will continue to operate with our standard blue and yellow locomotives," Haverty said. "These new locomotives will help us ensure that customers who want premium quality service get just that." Intermodal freight traffic now accounts for 40 per cent of Santa Fe's freight revenues.

The Super Chief was Santa Fe's flagship passenger train, operating between Los Angeles and Chicago from 1936 until Amtrak assumed passenger service on Santa Fe routes in 1971. It was a favorite of movie stars, and offered premium service on a schedule under 40 hours for the 2,200-mile trip.

In late June a pair of Santa Fe locomotives built in 1967 as part of the last order of diesels for use on the Super Chief were repainted in the red and silver design at the company's shops in San Bernardino, California. The remaining six locomotives of this class are also being repainted in the new design, for use on special trains as well as regular service until the new locomotives are delivered.

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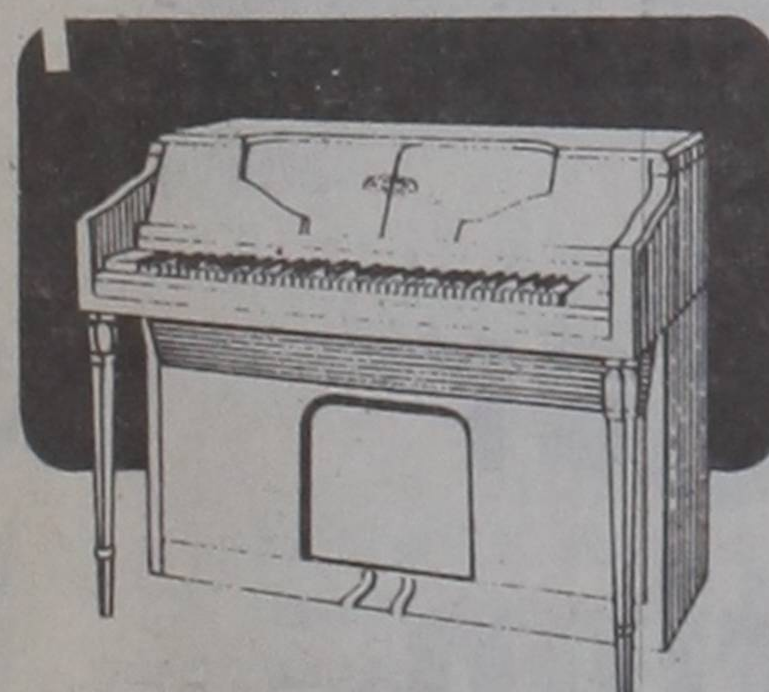
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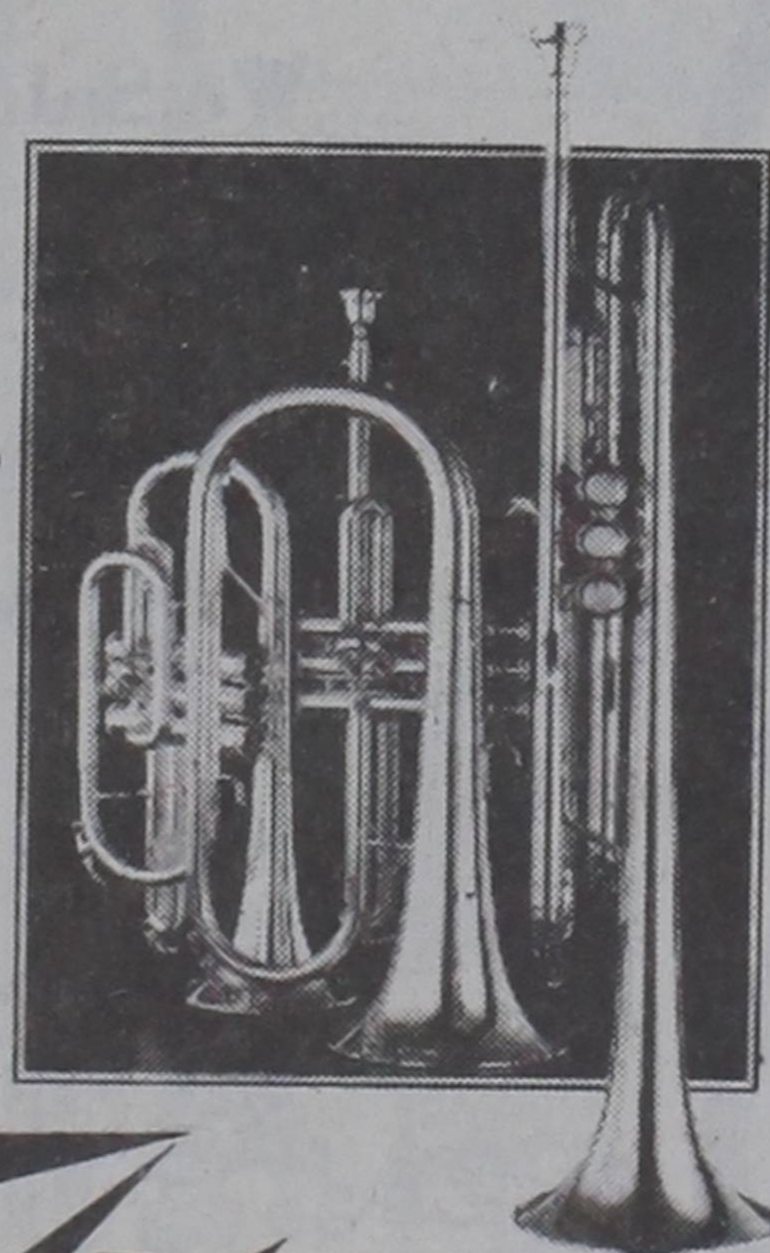

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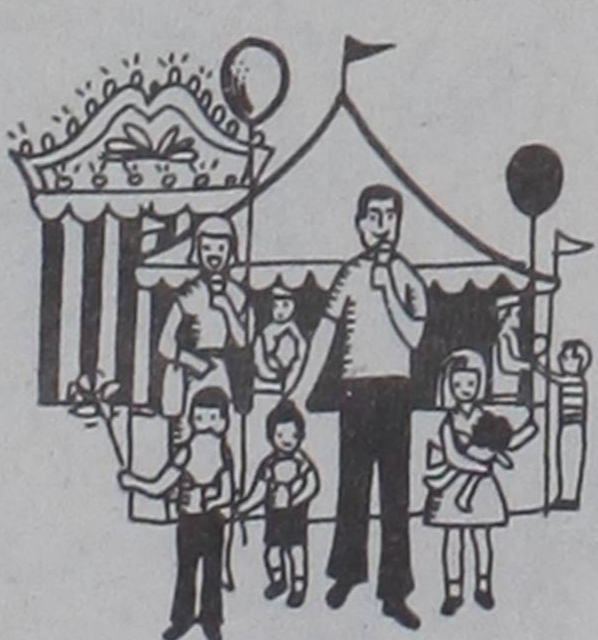

Tax-exempt Bearer Bonds
(Editor's note: This is the first of two articles on tax-exempt bearer bonds.)

Before June 1983, tax-exempt bonds were commonly issued in bearer form without owner registration or name. The bearer, or person who held the bond, owned the bond. Like a dollar bill, if I hold it, it's mine; if you hold it, it's yours.

Issuing bonds in bearer form was simple and inexpensive. It eliminated the need for a transfer agent to change ownership registration each time a bond was bought or sold.

A coupon for each interest payment stated the amount and the date interest was due. Semiannually, at payment time, the owner clipped the coupon from the bond and mailed it to a designated bank for payment. This designated paying agent paid the interest only when the coupon was presented.

Since 1983, however, all new tax-exempt bonds have been issued in registered form. The owner's name must appear on the bond certificates and be registered with the paying agent. Interest checks are automatically mailed to the registered owner on the date due. There's no delay in receiving interest and no chance of forgetting to mail a coupon.

Unfortunately, thousands of bearer bonds are still circulating and will continue to earn interest by coupon until they either mature or are called for early redemption.

If you hold one of these old bearer bonds, there are a few things you should remember.

When a bearer bond matures, you must mail the bond certificate along with the remaining coupon to the paying agent. Only then will you receive your final interest payment and principal. If you fail

to return the bond certificate, your principal will remain in the bank and earn no further interest for you.

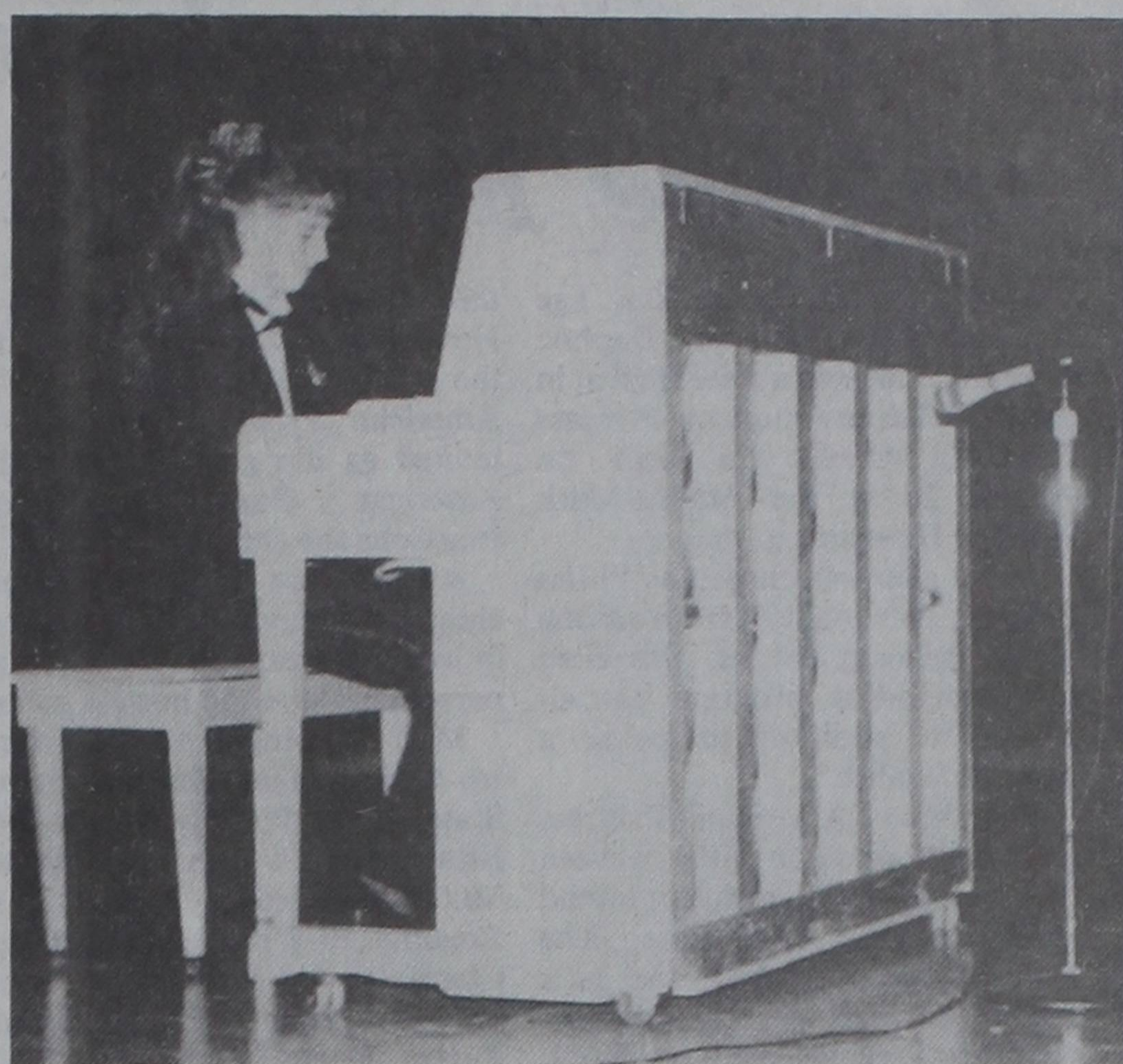
Another fact to remember is that because your name is not registered, the bank will not notify you if or when your bond is redeemed.

Although many bearer bond holders lose interest payments because they forget to return matured bonds, more commonly, interest is lost because bonds are redeemed early without the owner's awareness.

Say, for example, you own a \$10,000 tax-exempt bearer bond that pays 12 per cent interest and will mature in December 1998. Twice each year, in December and June, you mail a \$600 coupon to the bank paying agent. After you receive the interest from your December 1990 coupon, however, the bond is redeemed by the issuer. At redemption, the bond stops earning interest. So, when you mail in your \$600 June 1991 coupon, it's returned with a note from the bank telling you the bond has been called and instructing you to return the bond certificate with all remaining coupons attached. Once you've done this, the bank will return your principal. Unfortunately, you have lost \$600 in interest. Remember, the bond stopped earning interest at the time it was redeemed.

Although it may seem unfair for a bank to withhold your interest, they claim that no one can be notified since there is no name on a bearer bond. The bank must wait until bearer bond owners mail in the next coupons to notify them of redemption.

It sounds like a Catch 22, but there are two ways to receive your interest when due and have your principal returned promptly when a bond is called. Both ways will be discussed in part two of this series.

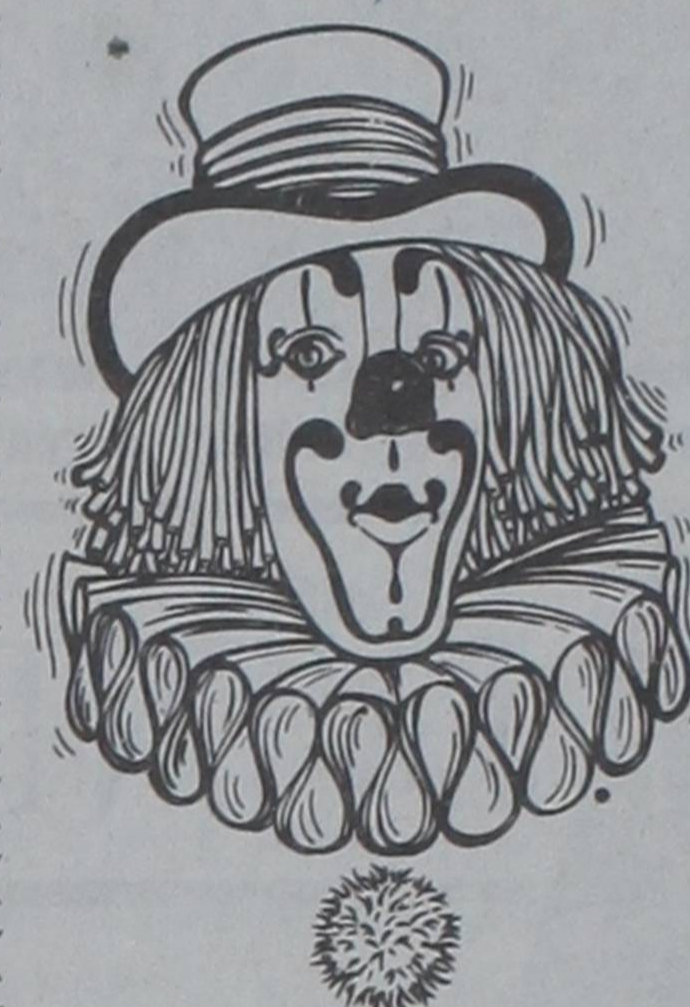
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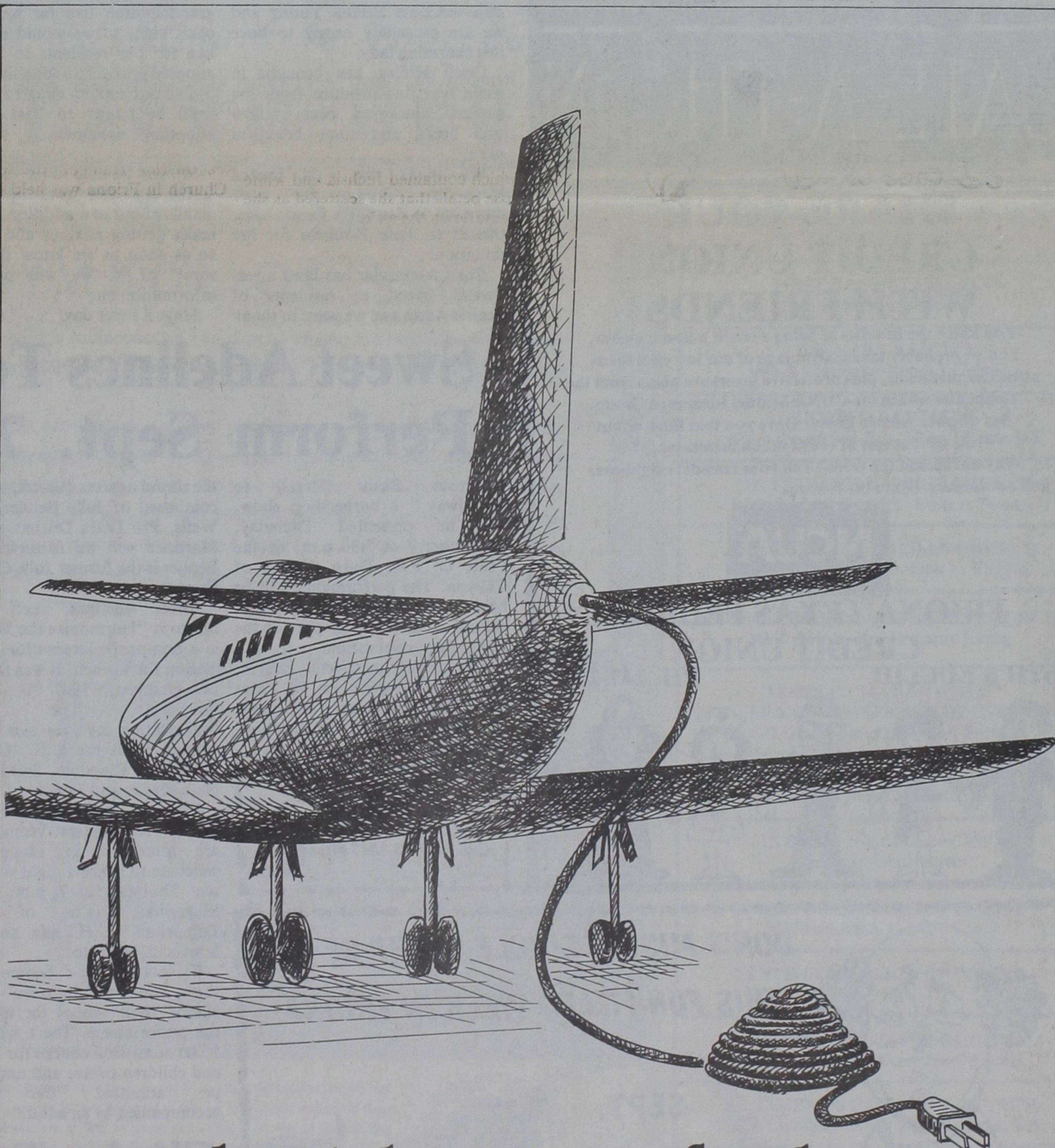

Today saw one of the largest consumer responses of the week to offers made by local grocery stores for discounted prices. Across the city, shoppers were redeeming coupons cut from the local paper in record numbers.

"We know any offer we make will be highlighted most by the newspaper," commented a grocery store spokesman. "Our goal is simply to inform the consumers that these discounts are available. We are confident they will respond if they see it in the paper." His statement was backed by recent Consumer Data Service reports that indicated grocery store ads triple volume on discounted items and double volume on regularly priced items. It also revealed grocery ads are read by well over 70% of newspaper readers.

Grocery store representatives unanimously agreed that newspaper advertising was the only way to get immediate consumer response. One grocer remarked, "Most people read the paper, and a bunch of those readers clip our coupons. It's that simple." His comments reflect the well known Manufacturer's Coupon Center report which stated that over 80% of all families use coupons.

"When consumers want more for their money, they always go to the

newspaper," a grocery official said. When pressed by reporters for the best offer he could make to the consumers he replied, "Look in the paper, it's all right there. Green leaf lettuce, two heads for 79¢... with a coupon of course."

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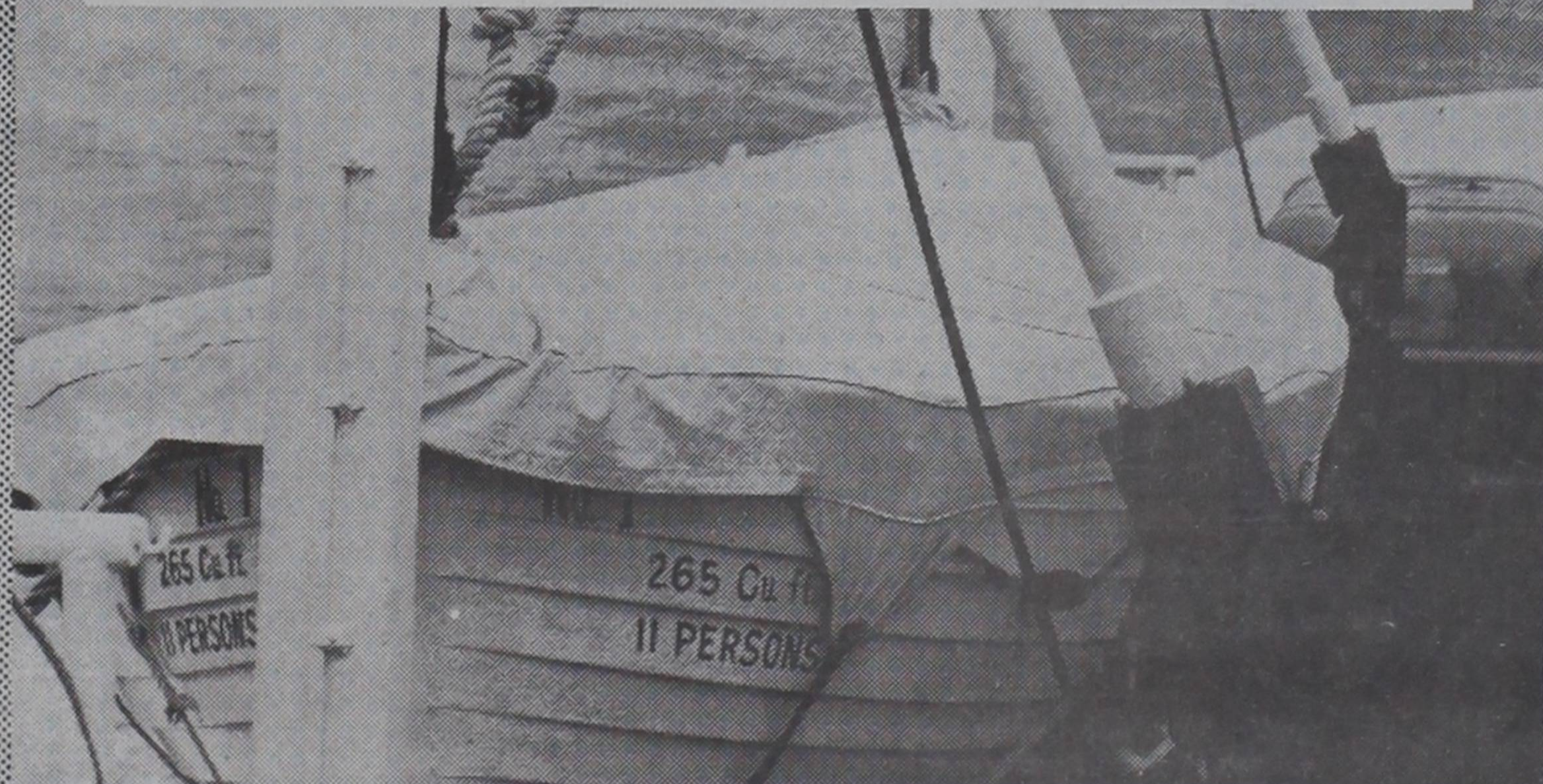

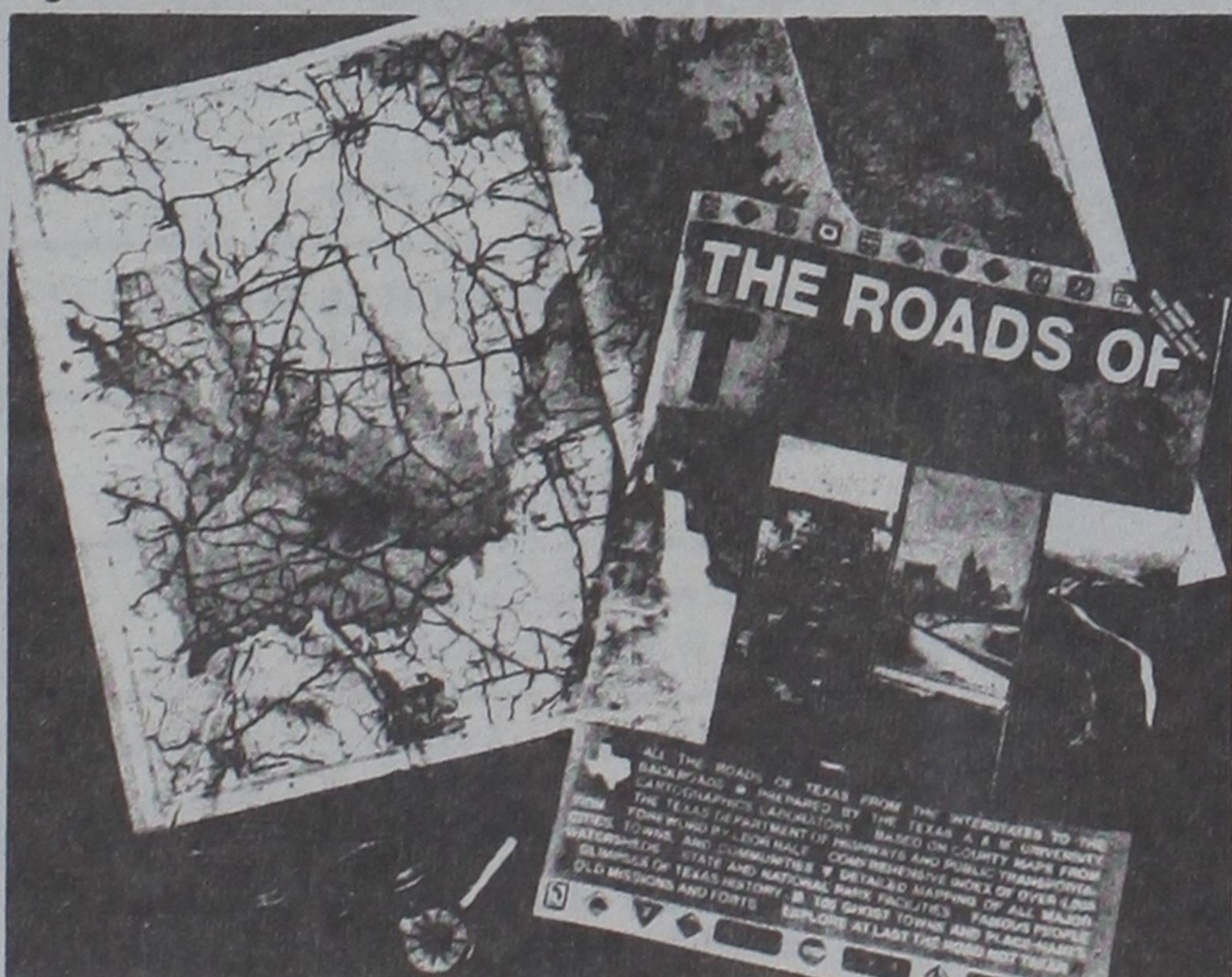

Officials To Receive Pay Hikes

The proposed 1990 budget for Parmer County includes five per cent pay raises for elected county officials.

Last week, it was reported that other county employees received three per cent pay hikes in the budget.

County Judge Porter Roberts said he supported the higher pay raises for the elected officials because he considers it "incentive pay." He noted that the elected officials have to pay \$600 filing costs when seeking office, and that the salary difference between the elected officials and their chief deputies needed to be widened.

The proposed budget is \$2,503,351, up from this year's \$2,164,915. With an increased assessed valuation, the final tax rate is expected to be within a penny or two of this year's rate.

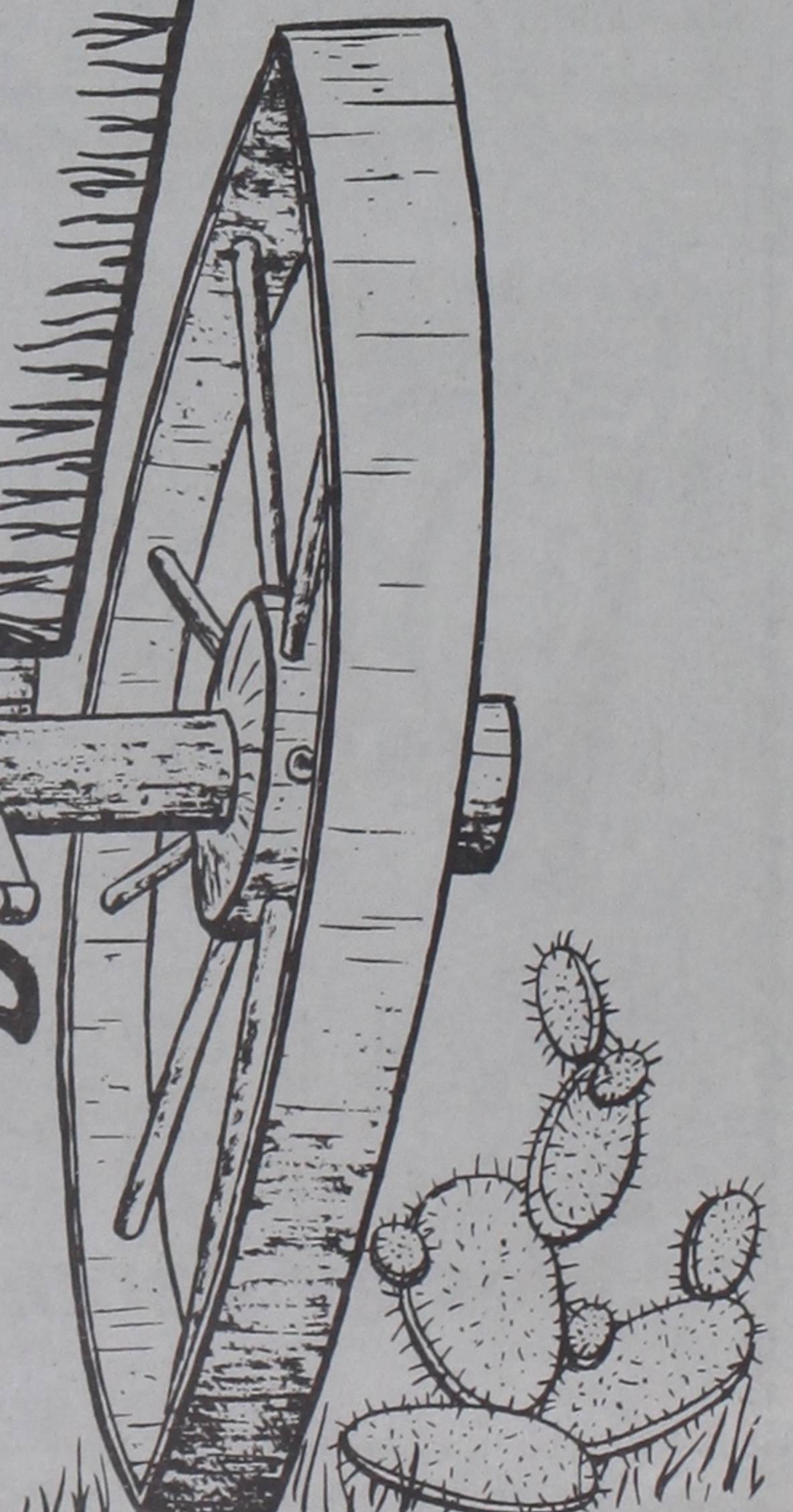
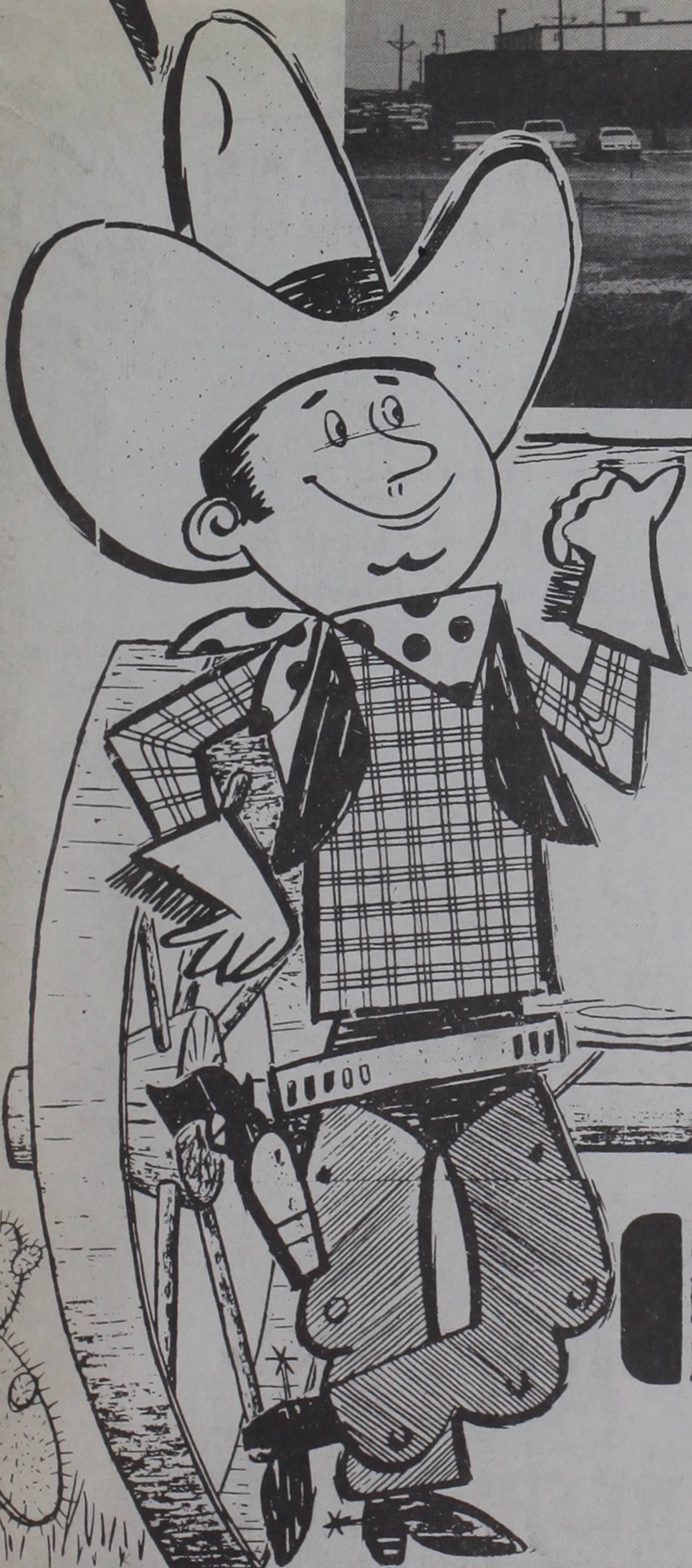
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LITTLE MISSES...Halley Rector, left, is shown crowning Audra Dee King as the 1989 Friona Little Miss.

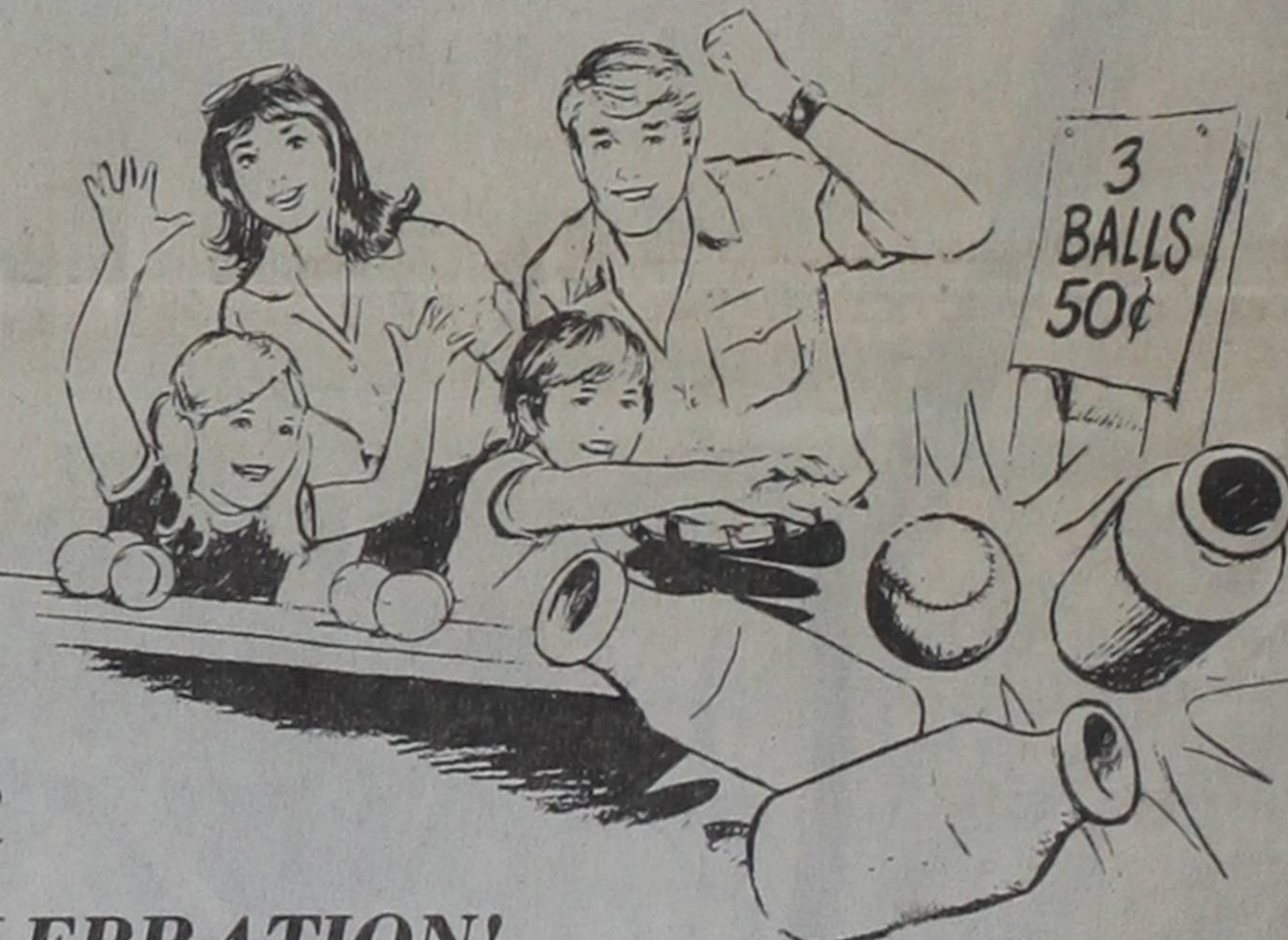

PCS Health Agency To Close Sept. 30

According to Johnny Raymond, Panhandle Community Services' Executive Director, workers compensation costs has forced the closing of PCS Home Health Agency which serves 25 counties of the Texas Panhandle. The decision made by the agency's board of directors will affect over 1,200 elderly clients and 2,000 immediate family members Panhandle wide.

Raymond stated that clients served by the agency are elderly, disabled and low-income. The services provided by the agency include: meals preparation, house cleaning, general errands, bathing, medication, physical therapy and doctor's orders for medical services. "These services paid for by the Department of Human Services and Medicare are designed to assist the elderly to stay in their homes and not be forced into convalescent homes," Raymond stated.

The PCS executive director stressed within the last seven months worker compensation costs amounted to over \$91,000, in just the health related programs. The Department of Human Services does not allow for such unforeseen and uncontrollable costs. They are held to a maximum hourly rate for services. In addition, delays in payments from Medicare have caused our agency serious cash flow problems, Raymond stated.

Raymond said that of the 470 employees being affected by the termination, many are elderly people hired by the agency on a part-time basis. "These people are living on a fixed income and really depended on the 15 hours per week to supplement their meager earnings."

Panhandle Community Services, which has delivered home health to 25 counties for 15 years, has notified the funding sources of its intent and all contracts will be terminated September 30, 1989. "My hope is that another agency will assume this vital program and not allow these elderly people to suffer and be without these vital services," Raymond stated. "We had no choice."

Raymond blames workers compensation costs as the primary reason for the closing of this program and added, "We were hoping the legislature would provide relief on this problem. Instead it appears an additional 30% increase is facing everyone

beginning January 1, 1990." Every county in the panhandle and several hundred clients and their families will be affected by our closing of these services. Expenses of convalescent homes that our clients may have to enter will be devastating, much less the trauma of having to leave their homes. That would be the tragedy!"

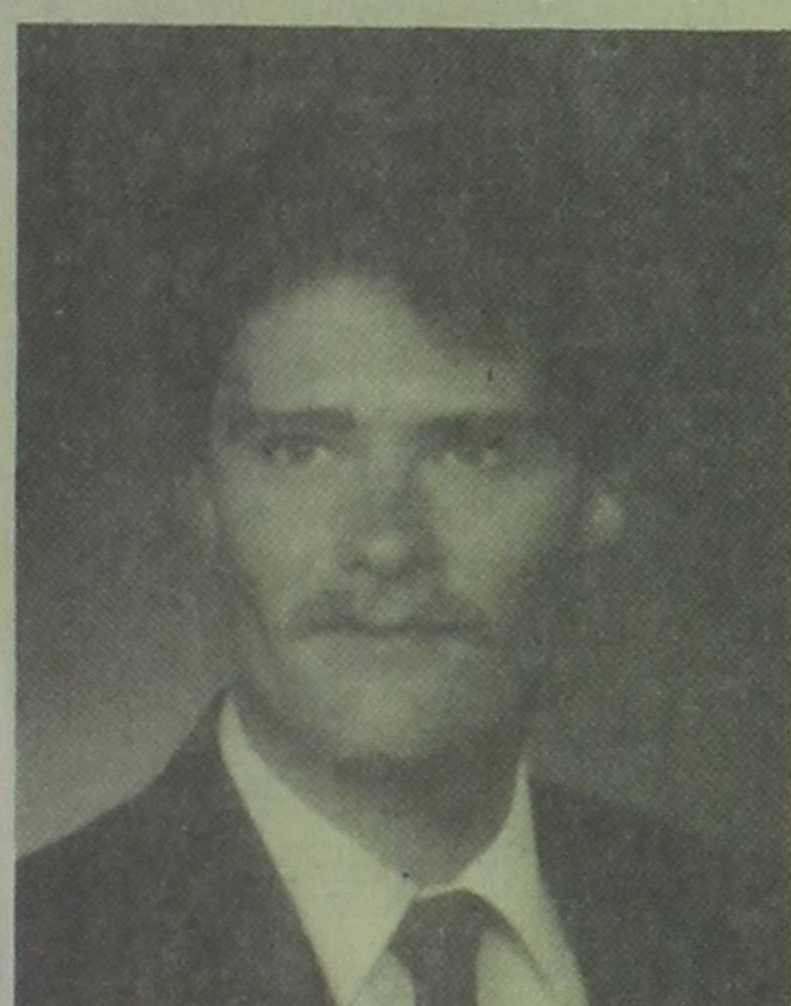

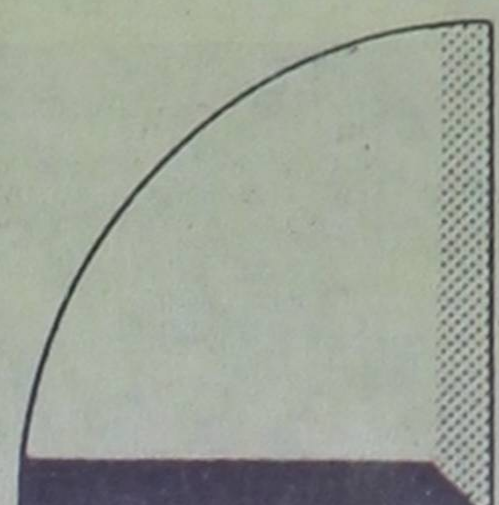
