Rescue Workers British Navy Battle Huge Seas In Attempt to Rescue Men Entrapped

HIT BY SHIP OFF PORTLAND

Men Aboard Wrecked Underwater Boat May Number 50-Mine Sweepers Locate Spot

By The United Press.

PORTLAND, Eng., Jan. 11.-Heavy seas breaking over the spot where the British submarine L-24 sank yesterday after a collision, carrying 43 men to a probable death, prevented divers from descending to grapple for the lost craft.

Mine sweepers located a heavy object on the ocean floor yesterday near where the submarine went down after it had been rammed by the warship, Resolution.

As if the seas were jealous of its victimes, storm swept waters raged today in defiance of all efforts to send Crews Several Vessels Missing From down rescuers.

The imprisoned crew is believed yet to be alive, as it was thought the craft went to the bottom with all her hatches closed. Frantic efforts are being made to make a rescue. It is feared, however, that the men are doomed.

The battleship Resolution hit the underseas craft while the L-24 was partly submerged. The submarine sank immediately.

The lighter Moordale and other craft were immediately sent to the rescue and began an effort to get grappling gear on the sunken boat.

Divers went down from the Moordale, trying to get a cable around the submarine, but were hampered by the rough weather.

The Mooredale is especially designed for raising sunken submarines. The L-24 was lost while the sub ine flotilla was making a mine attack against the grand fleet.



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

COST TO FRANCE IS HEAVY

Over \$50,000,000 Spent By the French To Maintain Troops in Germany Sabotage Ceases

PARIS, Jan. 11 .- One year after France, with her Belgian ally, went into the Rhur to compel Germany to denounced as illegal and likely to lead and coke to the extent of several thousand of tons daily toward the reparations account.


