DOLLARS

American churches in 1923 received 550 millions of dollars from their congregations. It requires no expert statistician to figure that meant about 10 cents per week for every man, woman and child in this great nation of ours. A significant sum for a prosperous country.

Three hundred and fifty billions of dollars were spent by Americans during the same period. Therefore, one dollar of every 636 went to the church. Leading one to believe that the domain ruled by Uncle Sam pays more attention to spiritual than material things.

During the year that has just faded out of the picture Americans gave 2250 millions of dollars to charity and education, not including funds raised by taxation and bond issue.

Admitting that this is a larger sum than in any previous year it does not necessarily reflect stupendous generosity. It merely represents one dollar out of every \$155 spent by the public, an amount which is considerably less than one cent on the dollar. Charity alone should get ten times as much.

Prof. E. R. Gables of the College of Industrial Arts will be in charge of the survey of Jones County.

Dr. George A. Works, director of the survey, will likely not visit Jones County.

The larger towns of Jones County, Anson, Stamford and Hamlin, have offered to assist the survey workers especially in the matter of transportation.

News reports indicate that the party will reach Jones County for work by Monday, January 21.

Newsie Sells 124,000 Papers in Buffalo When McKinley Assassinated

HOUSTON, Texas, Jan. 17.—The "King of Newsboys"—Jack Lloyd—paid Houston a visit recently.

Lloyd, whose temples are slightly gray and who gives his age as 49, won the title of "Newsboy King" when he sold 124,000 papers in 24 hours at Buffalo when President McKinley was assassinated. He had a crew to help him but he personally sold 12,000.

The high spots of Lloyd's life are: Began selling papers on the streets of New York at the age of 8.

Only American newsboy in Johannesburg, South Africa, during the 1901 diamond rush.

Made record sales during the San Francisco earthquake.

Veteran of two wars—The Spanish American and World War. Was in France and was wounded twice.

"I'm never going to grow old," Lloyd said. "Work with the kids and you'll stay young."

FLASK SAFE

New Federal Prohibition Enforcement Agent Makes Drastic Rule

HOUSTON, Texas, Jan. 17.—The pocket flask is safe in Houston. Bracey Melton, new Federal prohibition group head, will go after the "big fellow." The "small fry" will be left alone—that is for the present.

"There will be no clogging of the Federal courts with petty cases of liquor violations," Melton said. "There has been too much of this in the past and we have learned our lesson."

Melton said the entire energies of the Houston district force will be directed towards the moonshiner and the places that habitually violate the law.

"We want to reach the moonshiners—the rings that make and control distribution of poison booze," he said. "We are also going after the habitual violator. We will ask the Federal court to padlock every place where we find liquor sold day after day."

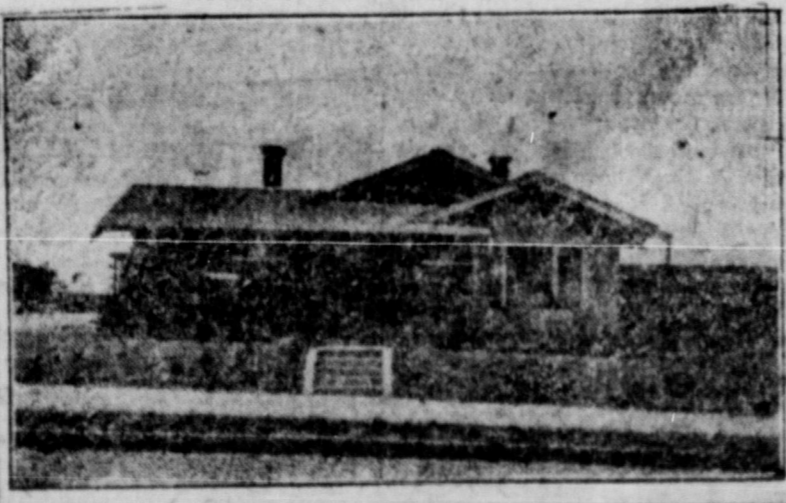

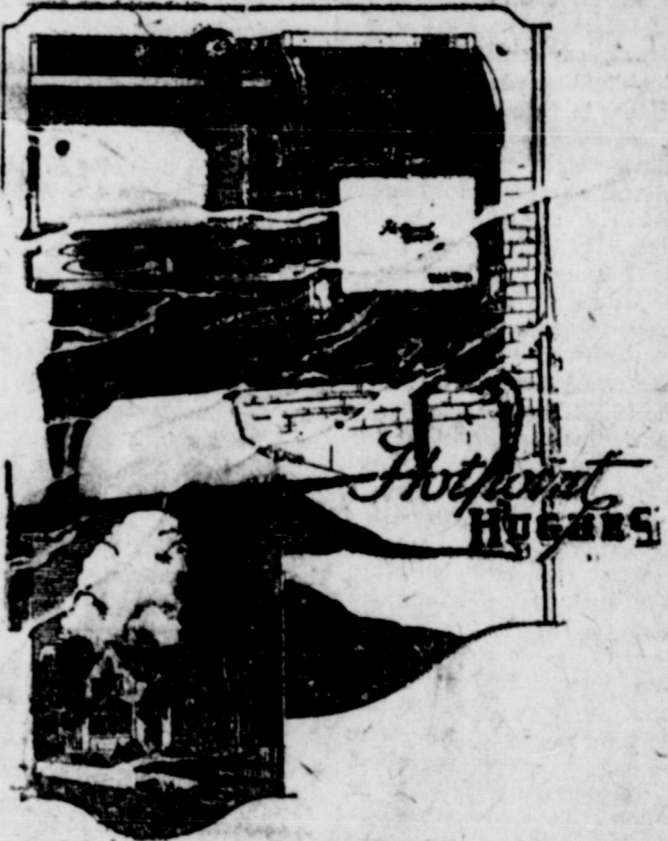

KLAN BIG ITEM MAYFIELD CASE

Will Figure In Senate Investigation Now Under Way To Determine Whether Seat Retained

POLITICIANS ENJOY ROW

Republicans Figure On Using Mayfield Case to Offset Recent "Newberry Scandal" in Senate

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 17.—The Mayfield-Petty senatorial election special senate committee, is being tions contest, under investigation by seized upon by Republicans as "campaign thunder," in case the Democrats bring the Newberry case into the 1924 campaign.

The Republican party wants to balance the "Newberry" cry caused last year by the investigation into campaign expenditures of Senator Truman M. Newberry of Michigan.

A national campaign of publicity will be given the revelations before the committee.

Every detail of the investigation into the election of Senator Earle B. Mayfield of Texas is being conducted along lines followed in the Newberry investigation.

The situation has been aired in Texas courts through many suits and counter-suits.

The Texas court suit fight started in the fall of 1922 in Corsicana, when Judge Hawkins Scarborough of the Navarro County district granted a temporary injunction, restraining election officials from certifying the name of Mayfield on the ballot.

Hearing was set for 10 days later. The injunction was granted on the ground that the amount spent in Mayfield's behalf in the primary campaign was in excess of \$100,000 permitted by state law. It was generally admitted by both sides, however, that the real motive behind the matter was to defeat Mayfield because of his connection with the klan.

Claim Klan Spent Money. The contention is similar to the Newberry case—that Mayfield may not have spent the money himself, but that it was spent in his behalf. The senate refused to oust Newberry because it was argued that he had no cognizance of the expenditure.

During the hearing in Corsicana, the Ku Klux Klan was often mentioned. Mayfield himself was examined about it and his testimony has been produced in a preceding article. The first time the Klan question came up was during the cross-examination of a witness who had just given testimony favorable to Mayfield.

"Are you a member of the hooded order known as the Ku Klux Klan?" the witness was asked.

The witness appealed to the judge: "I don't have to answer to that, do I?"

"You do," the judge ruled. "I am," said the witness.

The same matter is expected to come before the senate investigating committee when it will be determined whether or not any witness will have to admit his connection with the secret order. Prior to the Corsicana incident, judges had held to a rule that a witness could not be forced to admit membership in any order which prohibited it.

Injunction Granted. When the hearing was concluded, Judge Scarborough ordered the jury to bring in an instructive verdict of guilty. After deliberating 53 hours they did, and the judge made the injunction permanent.

But one day later the state supreme court set aside the permanent injunction, on a writ issued by the Court of Civil Appeals in Dallas.

The Peady men sought a new injunction, but failed.

After that followed a series of injunctions and vacations of injunctions, which ended in the state supreme court just before election day.

Peady Files Protest. The election was held and Mayfield elected and the next step came when Peady arrived in Washington and had his official protest against Mayfield filed with the Senate.

Some dispute arose as to how the matter should be brought up on the floor. Finally it was decided that Senator pro tem Cummins would produce the protest and refer it to the senate privileges and elections committee. This was done, and Senator Spender, Missouri, Republican, appointed himself chairman of a special subcommittee to carry out the present investigation.

Finally the United States Senate unanimously voted to hold an inquiry into the right of Mayfield to hold his seat.

PARK IS PLANNED

East Getting Restless And Want To Be Included In System of National Parks

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The proposal to establish a National Park in the east is receiving renewed consideration.

Several bills providing for funds and locations have been introduced in this session of Congress. Sena-

tor Swanson of Virginia has a bill providing for the use of 5,000 acres centering about High Knob mountain, Virginia, to be known as Appalachian National Park.

Other bills would authorize the creation of a park of 15,000 acres in the Cumberland Gap region of Virginia, Kentucky, and Tennessee, to be known as Lincoln National Park and the acquisition of the land including Mammoth Cave, Kentucky, to be known as Mammoth National Park.

"The recommendation of the Director of the National Park Service in his annual report that a section of the Appalachian Range be established as a national park has created widespread interests," said Secretary of the Interior Work, outlining the proposals under way.

"The existing National Park System is the finest in the world. In making any additions sites should be chosen that will be in every respect up to the standard, dignity and prestige of the existing National Parks and National Monuments. A thorough study therefore will be necessary before any definite conclusion can be reached.
