> Under pressure from the State Department at Washington, Acting Governor T. W. Davidson Saturday reversed his decision of Friday and notified Secretary Hughes that Texas would permit the passage of Mexican troops from Sonora via, Columbus, Ariz., and Douglas, New Mexico, to El Paso. The troops are expected in El Paso Sunday over the El Paso Southwestern and will be taken to Juarez immediately. The movement isover strong protest from citizens at Columbus, victims of Villa in 1916, and other cities along the border.

The United States Government has ordered seven warships to proceed at once from Colon, Panama to Vera Cruz to protect American lives and property. He is now a junior at Baylor University and pastor of the Bosqueville and Erath Baptist churches.






Bass Viol so Large Player Stands on Pedestal


