

On many of the Marquese group the women's clothing consists of scanty woven grass garments. They don't worry about Paris fashion changesfor a new dress they go out and pull a bunch of grass.

In these islands, one's life is fairly secure, while on others a faithless husband may be turned into stew at any time.

Captain Campbell states he finds these conditions where steamships do not visit and tourists do not come in contact with the natives. To know the real situation one has to get away from the ebaten track.

In spite of the barbarism of some of the islanders, they are surprisingly advanced. For instance, Captain Campbell said, they have a written language and have a religion that has many merits.

The islanders, however, have no moral conception, he declared. This is particularly true where the contact with other people has left no traces. In other parts where the white man has left his imprint, the islanders have acugired all his vices, but none of his virtues.


