## TRADE TRIPPERS AT LUNCH CLUB

Final Plans Discussed at Regular Meeting at Hotel Wright Thursday at Noon

PREPARATIONS COMPLETE  
Union Evangelistic Services, Bankhead Highway First Monday Trades Day—Other Matters

Final plans for the Trade Trip next Monday, a talk on the Bankhead Highway by Judge De Armond of Midland, talk on the coming union evangelistic services, First Monday Trades Day and the customary interchange of personalities featured the regular meeting of the Sweetwater Club at the Hotel Wright Thursday at noon.

R. M. Chitwood presided as toastmaster and told of the Monday Trades Day which led the itinerary committee to change the dates slightly and start the trips with Blackwell as the dinner point on the first day instead of the second as originally planned.

J. P. Ayler told of the success of the solicitation committee and that 130 cars were signed up to go each day and but four business men had refused.

J. A. McCurdy said that the ladies at Blackwell would provide eats on the first day, a ladies organization at Rotan and at Snyder would take charge the second and third days' dinners respectively, the proceeds to be used by them for church or other local work. The cost of the meals was not announced. It was necessary, Mr. McCurdy pointed out, that every man register at the Board office before Monday, so that the ladies would be prepared to provide enough dinner for the entire party. Mr. McCurdy said that those who agreed to go and did not have cars would be assigned seats in other cars when they register at the office of the board.

R. M. Chitwood was unanimously elected Grand Marshal of the Trade Trip and details concerning the whole proceedings left up to him.

Rev. Ashley Farnham of Duncan, Okla., told of the plans for the union evangelistic meeting to begin here April 20.

M. C. Manroe pointed out the success of the First Monday Trades Day in March which was due he said to the Old Fiddlers' Reunion as a drawing card to the crowds. He suggested that similar entertainment feature each Trades Day and offered \$10 as a prize toward conducting a Baby Show the next First Monday.

Judge De Armond of Midland briefly outlined the history of the Bankhead Highway from its inception in the brain of Senator Bankhead of Alabama back in 1913 on down thru the years, reviewed the scrap with Oklahoma in 1920 over locating the route of the highway through Texas rather than Oklahoma and paid tribute to R. M. Hubbard of the State Highway Commission on his work for the Bankhead and other highways of the State. Judge De Armond is in Sweetwater in the interest of the Bankhead Highway. He predicted that the 40,000 out of the State cars which traveled the Bankhead in 1923 would be swelled to 100,000 in 1924 and increase each year.

## TAX BILL DOOMED ON SENATE FLOOR

Three Substitute Amendments Submitted by Senator Simmons—Is Presented With Mellon Rate

DIFFERENT SYSTEM SURTAX

Democrats Present Provisions Running High as 40 Per Cent on Incomes More Than \$500,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—Senate Democrats made public today the tax rate which they demand in the bill which come up in the Senate next week.

Three substitute amendments were submitted by Senator Simmons, ranking Democrat on the finance committee, just a few moments after Chairman Smoot presented the bill with the Mellon rate.

An entirely different system of surtax proposals by Democrats with the percentage running to 40 per cent on incomes of more than \$500,000. Simmons claims this simplifies the actual rate of surtax, causing a material reduction.

May Compromise

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—The new Mellon tax bill was presented to the Senate today.

Chairman Smoot, of the finance committee, reported on the bill and its provisions were officially made public.

While the income, surtax and inheritance tax provisions are not expected to survive the Senate, Republicans are preparing to fight hard for them in order to obtain the best possible compromise.

Chairman Smoot said the bill would be up for debate early next week.

The income tax exemptions are the same—\$1000 for single persons; \$2500 for married persons with \$400 for each dependent. A 25 per cent reduction on 1923 income taxes payable this year was announced.

## PLAN WAREHOUSE

W. B. Jobe Will Erect Forwarding Plant East of Santa Fe—Ample Storage Facilities

Another modern warehouse and forwarding plant is being added to the commercial structures of the city by W. H. Jobe.

The new warehouse is under construction just east of the Santa Fe freight depot and is 50x120 feet in size with a platform 50x20 for loading. It will be two stories in height and will cost approximately \$16,000 when completed.

Mr. Jobe expects to act as local agent for firms desiring distribution in West Texas and who wish to take advantage of the common point freight rate enjoyed by Sweetwater. Commodities can be shipped to this town from north and east at the same freight rate as to Dallas or Fort Worth and the distributed from this town at a proportionate saving on freight rates.

## TRADE TRIPPERS ANNOUNCE PLANS

Itinerary Committee Arranges to Get Away One Day Earlier Than Originally Planned

VISIT BLACKWELL MONDAY

More Than Hundred Gayly Decorated Automobiles Expected in Line—Concerts in Every Town

In order to visit Blackwell when that city is entertaining a large part of the surrounding territory from Runnels, Coke and the south end of Nolan with a Monday Trades Day and Rodeo, the itinerary committee planning the Sweetwater Trade Trip has shifted the schedule slightly.

## GERMANY FRETS AT DAWES PLAN

Objects on Grounds That Definite Reparation Sum Not Fixed and Various Other Sums Too High

FRANCE KICKS TOO

Says Moral Guarantees Valueless From Germany and Germany Won't Carry Out the Proposals

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—Germany was busy today giving reasons why the Dawes report will not be accepted. Three main objections were:

First: A definite total reparation sum should be fixed so that Germany might have a mark at which to shoot.

Second: France and Belgium should be required to take their troops out of the Ruhr.

Third: Practically all the various sums demanded should be reduced.

France Kicking

PARIS, France, April 10.—France keeps pace with Germany in objecting to the reparation commission's proposal.

The Dawes plan was based upon co-operation and restoration of confidence. The principal French objection, voiced by the press today, was: First: That moral guarantees were valueless so far as Germany is concerned.

Second: That the Germans could not be expected to carry out the expert's recommendations even if they did formally accept them.

Dawes Glad

PARIS, France, April 10.—"Well, the job's done and I am happy that we at least reached unanimous conclusions that we recommended," Charles C. "Hell and Maria" Dawes made this prayerful comment following submission of the report of his committee of experts to the reparations commission. M. Barthou, chairman of the reparations commission, paid high tribute to the work of the American committee of experts when the report was formally submitted.

## FOR CENTENNIAL

County Meetings to be Held in Every County in State Saturday Afternoon at Two O'clock

DALLAS, Texas, April 10.—Extraordinary enthusiasm has attended the preparations made for Texas Centennial conventions called to be held at the seat of government at every county in Texas Saturday afternoon, April 12, at 2 o'clock it was announced by Chairman Cato Sells of the Texas Centennial Celebration. Correspondence of Chairman Sells and Secretary Lowry Martin through headquarters here discloses an ever heightening interest in the proposal to carry the story of Texas' gigantic accomplishments to the frontiers of civilization through the medium of a world challenging celebration, comprehensive enough in its scope to mirror on a huge scale a century of Texas life.

"Against a background of historical accomplishments more heroic in outline and detail than any other of the colonization enterprise of 'white men' one man has written Centennial headquarters 'We Texans have an opportunity now to demonstrate that Texas is as rich in material achievement as in its treasure house of romantic endeavor. Building on the foundation of rich romance and untouched resources that our fathers and their fathers prepared for us we have brought Texas to flower for a new era of pioneering. Let no man fancy that pioneering is a part of the misty past. When we show Texas to the world in the way it is proposed for this Centennial celebration we shall see Texas speedily filling up with new millions of peoples who will bring with them quality of pioneers embarked on the adventure of bringing new glories to Texas' program of great endeavor."

Present Plans Indicate Soldier Bonus Document to be Laid on President's Desk Within Two Weeks

TO BE GIVEN PREFERENCE

Lowest Estimate on Total Cost \$2,519,000,000—Treasury Thinks Will Reach Nearly Five Billion

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—The soldier bonus bill was taken out of the pigeon hole today to be rushed through the Senate.

Republicans are agreed upon the bill as it was brought over from the House and it is probable that the Senate finance committee will report on it immediately.

Little discussion is in prospect in the bonus commission meeting called by Chairman Smoot for this morning as both sides agree that the bonus bill should be shot through before the tax bill is thrashed out.

The lowest estimate for the bill is \$2,519,000,000 by the Veterans' Bureau accountants while the Treasury Department thinks the cost, as at present outlined, will reach \$4,800,000,000.

If present plans are carried out the bonus bill will be laid on the desk of President Coolidge within two weeks accompanied by a challenge from Congress that he veto it if he dares.

K K K REFUSED BAIL

Appeal Probably to be Taken Supreme Court Behalf Rioting Klansmen

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., April 10.—Appeal to the Supreme State court probably will be taken in behalf of the 26 Ku Klux Klansmen refused bail on charges of rioting and murder in connection with the clash at Lilly Saturday night. Following a habeas corpus hearing the klansmen were committed to the Cambria County jail.

ADJOURN COURT

All Cases Pending in Local Court Including Wright Suit Postponed—Judge Leslie Taken Home Ill

Postponement of all civil cases being tried in District Court until the October term, was announced Wednesday by District Judge W. P. Leslie who returned to his home in Colorado last night ill with flu.

Judge Leslie, following an attack of flu Wednesday, was taken home last night in a closed car by C. S. Perkins and C. E. Mays.

The final case remaining on the civil jury docket, that of Rufus Wright and others vs. Isham Wright and others, was necessarily postponed. The only other issues due to be passed on this term are motions for new trials of Bill Meador, sentenced to 10 years imprisonment for the alleged slaying of Asa Rawls, and Ben Scott, who was recently sentenced to three years for the alleged theft of an automobile.

Both motions were set for hearing next Monday.

## BORAH TO DIRECT WHEELER PROBE

Senatorial Investigation of Montana Democrat's Indictment Gets Under Way—Committee Named

TO ASCERTAIN TRUE FACTS

Wm. J. Burns and Telephone Employee Testify That Republican National Committee Knew of Indictment

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 10.—Senatorial investigation of the indictment of Senator Wheeler, Montana, was started from two angles today. Senator Cummins, Iowa, president of the Senate, named the committee which will ascertain for itself the facts concerning the charges against Wheeler.

Cummins put at the head of the committee Senator Borah. His selection was generally applauded as assuring not only a thorough inquiry but also completion of an impartial one.

Shortly before the Borah committee was named the Brookhart committee investigating Daugherty began to look into the Wheeler case and from Wm. J. Burns and an employe of the Telephone Co., got evidence that the Republican national committee and Daugherty were fully informed of proceedings against Wheeler.

Involves Letter

GREAT FALLS, Mont., April 10.—Indictment of Senator Wheeler was based partly on a letter from Washington to Gordon Campbell, oil operator, stating that the Senator had just appeared before the Department of Interior with reference to oil matters, a Federal district official declared here today.

He stated a letter along similar lines is in possession of the prosecution.

NEFF TO SPEAK  
Governor Announces Speaking Tour to Advocate Uninterested Delegation to National Convention

AUSTIN, Texas, April 10.—Furthering his vigorous advocacy for the sending of an unstructured delegation from Texas to the national Democratic convention, Governor Neff's speaking schedule beginning Monday, April 14, will embrace thirteen towns before concluding his week's tour at Belton or Temple Saturday.

His schedule is: Cleburne, Monday night; Glen Rose, Tuesday morning; Granbury, Tuesday afternoon; Weatherford, Tuesday night; McKinney, Wednesday afternoon; Sherman, Wednesday night; Waxahachie, Thursday afternoon; Hillsboro, Thursday night; Mart, Friday morning; Groesbeck, Friday afternoon and Carlin Friday night; Cameron Saturday afternoon, and Belton or Temple Saturday night.

His speaking tour will be brought to a definite close May 3. Governor Neff expects to visit over the entire State before concluding his program.

**WATER IN THE DESERT**

The cactus is the camel of the American deserts insofar as its water storage powers are concerned.

The plant is prolific in growth and shares the intense heat and aridity of our American deserts with the tortoise, the lizard and rattlesnake.

The plant itself is constructed for life on the desert, although it grows rapidly elsewhere. The cactus in reality is all stem and no leaves, that is, the different shoots off the main stem have the appearance of thick rounded or elongated leaves. These apparent leaves are really a part of the trunk or branches and the prickly spines on them are in reality the leaves.

The cactus is a great manufacturer and hoarder of water. In some varieties the pithy interior of the main stem contains water sufficient for the relief of a thirsty man.

In many sections of South America where the plant thrives, the cactus is utilized in the making of a sort of whitewash that gives to buildings and other things on which it is placed an intense whiteness.

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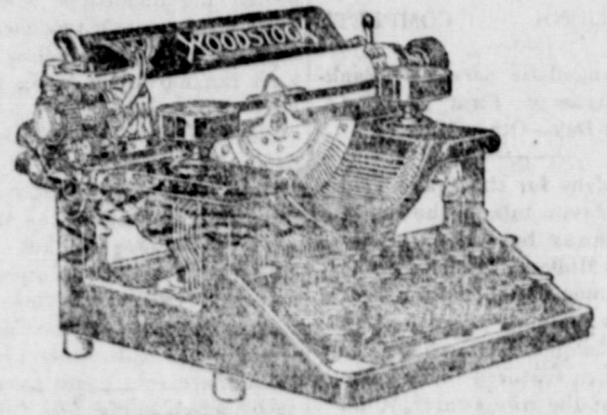
