CITY GRAPPLES TYPHOID MENACE

State Health Officer Here Working With City Health Officer, Dr. A. H. Fortner on Matter

SEND SAMPLES TO AUSTIN

Warn To Boil All Milk While Samples Sent to Austin to Ascertain Cause Typhoid Epidemic

A concentrated drive against disease in general, and typhoid in particular, was launched in Sweetwater following the arrival Thursday of Dr. J. E. Steele of the State Health Department at Austin, who, with City Health Officer A. H. Fortner, will urge the full co-operation of every citizen in combating disease.

Dr. Steele came to Sweetwater at the request of city authorities who hope to prevent a recurrence of the annual typhoid epidemic.

Accompanied by Dr. A. H. Fortner, the State health official went over local sanitation thoroughly Wednesday and Thursday. Particular attention was given to water and special excreta from local dairies. Samples have been, and are being sent to the State laboratories at Austin and when a report is forthcoming—within the next few days—Dr. Fortner hopes to be able to locate the source of the infection resulting in typhoid germs.

In the meantime, as a matter of precaution, Dr. Steele stated that it would not be unwise for citizens to bring milk to a boiling point before using. "This is merely a precautionary measure," Dr. Steele said. "As soon as the specimens sent to Austin have been returned your City Health Officer, Dr. Fortner, will be in a position to properly advise you."

Dr. Fortner and Steele met with the City Commissioners Tuesday afternoon to discuss the various local sanitary conditions. They were assured the fullest co-operation of that body.

Dr. Steele visited local public schools Friday and talked to the pupils on general health conditions.

It was also pointed out that hotels, restaurants and every housewife should pay strict attention to garbage, endeavor to maintain at all times a sanitary condition in the rear, as well as on the front and inside of their places.

"During the past three years Sweetwater has had an annual epidemic of typhoid," Dr. Fortner said. "For that reason we called on the State Health Department to send a representative here to assist us in preventing a return of the disease. In launching a crusade against disease we especially urge the full co-operation of every citizen in an effort to successfully combat all diseases."

Since this is the typhoid season and in view of the fact that Sweetwater has thrice been visited with this epidemic we are particularly anxious to stop it in its infancy. Typhoid is an infectious due to the typhoid bacillus and is carried in food; it is transferred by food, fingers and flies. We are going to attempt to control this in the dairies and those who are taking milk from dairies should return bottles in a clean sanitary condition.

Swat the fly and watch your garbage cans," Dr. Fortner concluded.

The State Health Department is always willing to furnish a representative to any community free of charge and Dr. Steele is no exception. "I am entirely at your services," Dr. Steele said Thursday. "While Dr. Fortner has covered the situation well, I would particularly urge that every citizen co-operate fully in this health drive. It also is well to remember that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

HEAR PROPOSALS

Foreign Relations Committee Hold Hearing on U. S. Entering World Court—Harding's Wish

FOUR LOSE LIVES IN COTTAGE FIRE

Widow and Three Children Cremated in Blaze That Destroyed Frame Cottage in Copeville

ONE MEMBER ESCAPED

Neighbors Make Vain Attempt to Rescue Victims—Lack of Fire Department Proves Fatal

COPEVILLE, Texas, April 18.—Mrs. Wm. McSpadden, widow, and her three children were burned to death today in a fire which destroyed their small frame cottage.

Auburn McSpadden, 14, one of the widow's sons, was the only member of the family who escaped the flames. He called neighbors who made vain attempts to rescue the woman and her children.

The bodies were later removed from the ruins by volunteer fire department fighters. There is no fire department in Copeville.

The dead, beside Mrs. McSpadden, were: Eileen, 16; Hussie, 10; and Lockett, 15.

COMMISSION MET

Order Delinquent Tax List Published; Grant Easement to Santa Fe to New Warehouse, Etc.

Plowing through a maze of details the City Commission Thursday was in session nearly three hours in the semi-monthly meeting at the City Hall.

Among other things the commission ordered the delinquent tax rolls for 1922 and 1923 published. These rolls, it was stated, will be ready for publication within the next ten days.

The Santa Fe was given an easement along Cypress street to build a commercial track to the new Sweetwater Transfer Company warehouse. It also was decided to follow the usual custom and send City Fire Marshal Bob Withers to the State Volunteer Firemen Convention this year at McKinney, Texas, May 14, 15, and 16.

A tentative arrangement was entered into with the Elrod Engineering Co., of Dallas concerning an extensive paving program here. It is likely a representative of that firm will come to Sweetwater in the near future to go over the situation when it is thought bids will be submitted.

With reference to issuance of building permits the Commissioners pointed out that in the past there has been some neglect on the part of persons contemplating erection of residence and business properties requesting permits. In order to keep an accurate record of building in Sweetwater the ordinance requiring permits will be more rigidly enforced in the future, it was stated.

TELEPHONE CHAT BARED IN SENATE

Tax Expert Relates Story of Penrose Phone Conversation With Wood Eve of Election

REFUSED MAKE PROMISE

Alleged Overtures Made in 1920 Republican National Convention When Harding Nominated

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 18.—The Senate oil committee today heard round-about stories alleging that overtures said to have been made to General Leonard Wood by the late Senator Boies Penrose of Pennsylvania at the 1920 Republican national convention.

According to the account, Penrose called the Wood headquarters by telephone the night before the late Mr. Harding was nominated and asked to know if Wood, if elected, would give "us" three cabinet members.

Though assured by one of his advisers that his consent would mean his election, Wood refused to make any promises.

The story was told the committee by T. A. Harmon, a tax expert of Indianapolis, who said he obtained the account of the telephone conversation from James L. Nimrod of Moose Heart, Ill., who was confidential worker in the Wood headquarters and who claimed to have taken the message from Penrose at Wood headquarters.

Soapman in Denial

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 18.—Col. Wm. Cooper Proctor, millionaire soap manufacturer, today denied before the Senate oil committee that any oil "deal" offer had been made to Gen. Leonard Wood at the 1920 Republican National Convention.

Previous witnesses have said that Wood turned down an offer by the late Jake Hamon of money for the promise of the Secretaryship of the Interior if Wood was elected.

"I don't know anything about any such offer," Proctor declared.

BACK HONIHARA

Japanese Government Will Not Recall Ambassador to United States For Letter to Hughes

TOKIO, Japan, April 18.—There is no present intention on the part of the Japanese government to recall M. Hanihara, Japanese Ambassador to Washington, Premier Kiyoura, formerly announced today.

Possibility of its recall had been discussed by the Japanese Press as a result of Hanihara's letter to Secretary Hughes on the American-Japanese exclusion measure.

Dying Negro Asks To Be Buried With White Gloves, Sox

Before dying in the electric chair for the murder of his mother, Curry requested that he be buried with white socks and white gloves on. It was his last request—and was granted.

DIAMOND JOE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

Notorious Oklahoma Bandit Meets Death in Little Rock Death House Friday Morning

MEETS DEATH CARELESSLY

Walked to Death With Air of Gay Ease That Astonished Attendants—Killed a Detective

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 18.—"Diamond Joe" Sullivan, last of the Southwest's notorious outlaws, went to his death here in the electric chair today—Good Friday—without an outward sign of the "yellow streak" attributed to him by his underworld associates.

The prisoner walked to the electric chair with an air of gay carelessness and ease that astonished the spectators. He maintained a calm and unconcerned attitude as the adjustments were made until the great switch was turned on.

At 5:37 a bolt of electricity, 2350 volts strong, was sent through his body and he paid the penalty for a career of crime and banditry extending over the last decade.

He was electrocuted for the slaying of a Little Rock detective last year.

SCORES DEALERS

Auto Industry Being Spoiled by Long Time Terms to Buyers—Convention Condemns Practice

FORT WORTH, Texas, April 18.—Sale of automobiles to people unable to afford them was scored in an address to the Texas Auto Dealers convention today by J. N. Mitchell, of Waco.

"Some dealers are spoiling the auto industry by extending long time terms to buyers," he declared.

Following Mitchell's speech the convention adopted the resolution condemning longer than the standard terms to automobile buyers of one-third down and the balance in 12-month payments.

Dempsey's Boss Defies Coppers In Street Brawl

By The United Press. LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 18.—Jack Kearns, internationally known boxing promoter and manager of heavyweight champion Jack Dempsey, was lodged in the city jail here today on a charge of being drunk and disorderly.

Kearns was arrested shortly before 7 a. m., while sitting in an automobile with five other men.

When the patrolman attempted to arrest the sextette, Kearns, emulating his protégé, charged upon them using some of Dempsey's choice up-pecuts and crosses and it took two policemen to subdue him, they said.

In the machine was found a quart bottle of whiskey, the police said.

Kearns was brought to the city jail and will not be admitted to bail until the customary five hours has passed.

CYCLONE WRECKS LOUISIANA TOWN

Suburb New Orleans in Lake Pontchartrain District in Grasp of Furious Twister—Much Hail

MORE THAN 50 INJURED

Police Checking Up Damage Which Includes Leveling 25 Dwelling Houses—Many Windows Broken

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 18.—A cyclone, hail and rain storm swept over the section of the city near Lake Pontchartrain destroying approximately 25 small homes, injuring 50 persons and doing damage that may total \$500,000.

Police early today had been unable to check up on the total damage done by the brief storm. None of the injured are believed seriously hurt, a woman with a broken leg is believed to be the most seriously injured.

Th hail stones were as large as goose eggs, observers of the local weather bureau said. Although lasting but a brief time, stones smashed windows in many local business buildings.

WRECK SCHOOL

Fort Worth Students Take Out Grevance on Interior

FORT WORTH, Texas, April 18.—Disgruntled students who held a grievance not yet divulged, completely wrecked the interior of the New Hope school here when they broke all the windows, and threw the desks and other equipment out of the building.

The affair occurred before the arrival of teachers and was termed by probation officers as a "raid." Several confessions as to those who were present and enjoyed themselves are being held by school authorities.

Lol's Wife Lands Local Negro Into Deep, Deep Trouble

Looking for all the world like a steam roller had attacked him on the blind side and carrying a load of vanilla extract that was unevenly balanced, John King, negro porter, staggered into the City Hall Thursday afternoon, closely trailed by Buck Johnson, and explained "how come" a flock of knots to suddenly protrude on his dome.

"We niggers is members of de same church," King told Judge Yantis. "And we wuz jes' havin' a fren'ly argument on de scriptures when Raz hauls off and busts me 'tween the horns."

"Who hung that croquet ball on your head?" he was asked.

"Raz Mingo. He acted like he was Cain and I was Abel. Jes' cauz I said Lott's wife wuz too curious," King exploded.

"How many times did he strike you?" queried the Judge. "That nigger ain't never strucked me—he hauled off and busts me in the talking organ; this knot on the back of my head is where I lit on the groun' and thissun on the front is where I bounced."

Both colored gentlemen were fined \$12.75 and advised to study law.

Big Structure Seating 2,000 Located North West Third Street—1019 Converted at Albuquerque

With the expected arrival of Rev. J. A. Rayburn Saturday night everything is in readiness for the great Union Revival which will begin Easter Sunday with the first service scheduled at 10:30 a. m.

Rev. Rayburn has just closed a similar meeting at Albuquerque, N. M., with 1019 conversions. Sweetwater Dry Goods Co. Plans Expenditure \$10,000 Putting in Modern Improvements in Store

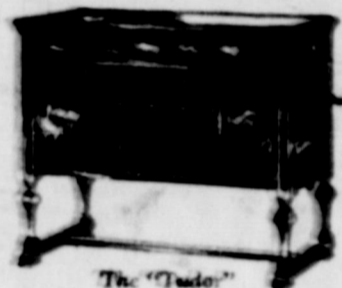

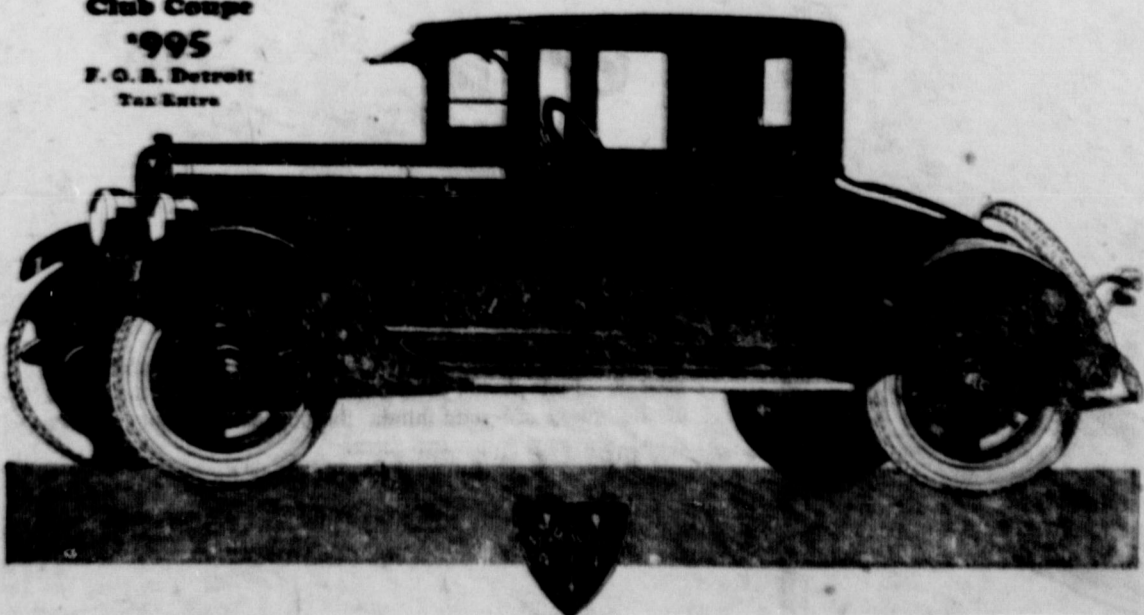
