

work for child's welfare." The speaker covered a vast and illuminating subject briefly and especially well. She dwelt principally upon the great necessity of education for the child. She especially emphasized the fact the children—yours and mine—are real "developers of character" and cautioned against permitting children under 10 years of age being permitted to too freely attend the movies. "Our boys and girls will be strong-

er, mentally, physically and morally, in the next generation," Mrs. Marrs said, "if not, then we truly have failed in our efforts. And, in this connection, too much stress cannot be brought to bear on the great responsibility of parenthood."

Bursts of applause greeted the "Greetings of Spring," by the Colorado, Snyder and Sweetwater Choral clubs.

Dr. Morelock, president of Sul Ross State Teachers' College, delivered an appealing address dealing with the welfare of the child. "This is the age of inquisitiveness," Dr. Morelock said, "folks question religion, children question parent authority and everything else seems to be questioned, more or less." Quoting the well known Bernard Shaw, Dr. Morelock said, "Did you know that that 'impudent' Irishman brought the wrath of many down on his head when he said that 'some parents don't deserve to be respected' but did you know that, in the years that followed that remark, a great many deep thinkers have come to see his view of the matter?"

Dr. Morelock's talk was straight and to the point, his remarks were crisp and fairly glittered with good old common sense. He spoke the truth when he said that "children are the most important thing in the world" and drew merited applause when he remarked that "we are awake to that fact and daily striving to better child's welfare."

Federal and State Engineers Going Over Road Plans Highway 1

F. J. Kercher, Federal Highway engineer from Fort Worth arrived Wednesday morning and A. S. Mour-sand, District State Engineer, was scheduled to arrive some time Wednesday for what is known as a "plans in hand" inspection of the State Highway project from Sweetwater west to the Mitchell County line.

Plans for this road, which is scheduled for construction first in the county's million and a half dollar road building program, have been completed by the county engineering forces under direction of John Focht. The Federal and State engineers will go over these plans carefully, and after any recommendations they make are incorporated therein, the plans will be forwarded to Austin and to Washington, for final o. k. before the project can be advertised for contracts.
