RESURRECTION IS RAYBURN THEME

Evangelist Preaches on Life Beyond the Grave and Nature of the Body After Death, Wednesday

MANY ARE CONVERTED

Eighty Young Folks Pledge Lives to Christianity at Afternoon Service and Eight at Night

A critical point in the Rayburn revival meeting was reached Wednesday night. As Rayburn expressed it there are two roads open and upon the one taken depends the success of the meeting. Rayburn stated that he knew a revival when he saw it and that none was yet taking place here. The juniors held their services Wednesday afternoon, and after the evangelist had finished his sermon eighty young people over ten years of age responded and gave their lives to Christianity.

At the men's services Wednesday at 10 a. m., 193 were present. Today Rayburn spoke to the men at J. P. Majors' store on "The Man Up a Tree." The women's prayer meetings Wednesday were attended by 287 persons. One hundred and sixty-one were present at the 2:30 Bible study. At 7 o'clock in the afternoon 45 men met in prayer in the Texas Bank & Trust Co. building.

Today at the Bible study class Rayburn lectured on "Satan," the first of two talks on that subject. The second will be given in the class tomorrow.

Wednesday night Rayburn preached on "The New Body," taking for his text, "Why should it be thought a thing incredible to you that He should raise the dead?" He first explained the present of many mysteries both in the Bible and resurrection, and in the numerous things of the common life. "The doctrine of resurrection is, besides a fundamental of the Bible, the only thing that meets the longings of every man in every age," said Rayburn.

"There is no ghost life of the soul," he said, "for the body is raised, as well as the soul saved. Resurrection means the rebirth of something and the soul has not been dead. God redeemed the whole curse upon man; the curse upon the body was also removed."

He explained the nature of qualities of the resurrected body as being: first, a spiritual body under a spiritual law suited to a spiritual life in a spiritual world; second, the same body; here he went into detail concerning the meaning of the word "same"; third, a perfect body, free from any flaw or tendency to the lust of the flesh; fourth, a sinless body, a body tending toward no sin and free from all.

In discussing the doctrines of resurrection as one of common sense, he said that it was founded on sense and reason because we are real "folks" with no ghost form about us; because Christ came to save the whole man, not part of him; because the human is the greatest of God's works next to the powers of reason; and because all recognize the dearness of the human body in the observance of the dead, and protection of the cemeteries.

"There is going to be a resurrection," preached Rayburn, "because God wills it. No one find anything to say about his coming into the world, nor will he have anything to say in the resurrection. He will have to rise either with the first like Christ, or with the second, the resurrection of the damned."

When the call was given eight persons responded.

After the sermon Rayburn spoke to approximately 800 interested men and women. He asked their reasons for the slow progress of the meeting and in return received the following among the reasons given: cold-heartedness on the part of church members; lack of interest; unwillingness to pay the price; too little difference between the Christian and unconverted; unwillingness to bear the burden of souls; and many others.

Before closing several hundred short prayers were given, several people praying at the same time. At the close of this meeting 49 business men of the town with the pastors met in the parlor of the First Christian Church, continuing in prayer without interruption until 1 a. m. this morning.

CHARGE MURDER

Boarder Arrested Charged With Murder of Landlady in Kansas City—Says Innocent Though Fled

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 8.—Roy Hartman was arrested today in connection with the investigation into the murder of Zoe Wilkins, found slain in her home here six weeks. Hartman was a boarder at Mrs. Wilkins' home and is believed to be the "little Tommy" referred to in her diary. He admitted fleeing from Kansas City on hearing of the murder for fear that he might be arrested. He said he knew nothing of the slaying.

DISCREDIT WALSH

Indictment Against Wheeler to Head Off Investigation

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—The Republican national committee wanted to "smear" Senator Burton Wheeler and Senator Thomas Walsh and discredit the investigation they were conducting. A. A. Goraud, former Assistant Attorney General, testified today before the Senate Daugherty investigation committee. Goraud said Blair Gohan, who investigated Senator Wheeler in Montana, had admitted that he never expected the indictment of Wheeler to "stick."

CONDEMNS LAW

Department of Justice Interpretation Sherman Anti-Trust Law Scored in Cleveland Speech

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 8.—The Department of Justice's interpretation of the Sherman "anti-trust law" was condemned in a speech today by Geo. T. Buckingham, Chicago attorney, before the U. S. Chamber of Commerce convention here. Buckingham attacked the Department's stand that the gathering and dissemination of statistical information by the Trade Association constituted a violation of the Sherman "anti-trust law."

"The result is," Buckingham said, "that business becomes a battle royal between blindfolded gladiators in the dark."

DALLAS, Texas, May 8.—The queen of Texas co-eds will be coronated on "All-College Day" at the Texas State Fair this fall. She will be the "most beautiful college girl" in the state, picked by a corps of experts on pichitude from photographs submitted by the various colleges and universities throughout the state.

An elaborate ceremony by beautiful "duchess" from each college will add color to the occasion.

The coronation is part of the "All-Collegiate" festivities on Saturday, October 18, which include a circus, football game and various other "stunts."

Prizes of \$3,500 will be awarded the collegians who stage winning presentations.

MCADOO RETURNS TO TEXAS TODAY

Paid High Tribute to Texas Democrats in Speech to Crowd Who Greet Him at El Paso Depot

APPRECIATES SUPPORT

Says Texas Democrats Did More to Nominate Wilson Than Any Other State—Hoped For Repeating

EL PASO, Texas, May 8.—William Gibbs McAdoo returned to Texas today and again paid tribute to Texas Democracy. "I hope your 40 delegates will be as strong for me as they were for Woodrow Wilson and I believe they will," he told a group who greeted him here at the station. "Texas did more to nominate Wilson than any other State." McAdoo is en route to Tennessee. He will also make stops at Austin and San Antonio.

W. L. Darnell & Company, betting commissioners, said there are no bets on the Republican nominee which is conceded to Coolidge. In the Democratic race odds on the nomination of Governor Smith are 1 to 3; Senator Ralston, 1 to 4 1-2 and on McAdoo, 1 to 4.

LODGE REVIVES PLAN FOR COURT

Massachusetts Senator Introduces Substitute For Harding's World Court Plan in Senate

WOULD CALL CONFERENCE

Nations to be Invited to Meet at Hague and Form an International Court of Justice

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—A substitute for the Harding World Court was introduced into the Senate today by Senator Lodge, chairman of the Foreign Relations committee. It authorizes President Coolidge to call a world conference at the Hague to organize an international court of justice, divorced from the League of Nations. The resolution provided that a judge may be selected by an electoral commission of each power and that each power shall have one vote and one judge and that the personal of the court be limited to 16 members, representing the 16 leading powers. The 16 powers would be 12 judges and four deputy judges.

Strike in Ruhr

Practically all mines were idle today, dispatches said.

CRIMINAL DIES

Sophie Burke, One Time International Crook, Dies in Cleveland Hospital—Foul Play Suspected

DETROIT, Mich., May 8.—Despite statement of police that Sophie Burke, one time international known criminal, died a natural death, many believe that she was a victim of three bandits who accused her of "squealing."

For the last 40 years Sophie Burke had gone straight and had accumulated a fortune but still befriended erring brethren and strove to give them another chance.

She died in a local hospital yesterday from cerebral hemorrhage, according to her physician, Dr. C. H. Campau.

Dr. Campau said there were no marks of violence and that he believed high blood pressure overcame her. Mrs. Burke was 76 years old.

PLEA IS GUILTY OF CONSPIRACY

Ohioans Charged Jointly With Congressman Langley With Illegal Withdrawal of Liquor Confess

PLEAS WERE UNEXPECTED

Huth and Carey Were Indicted With Congressman and Two Others—Sentence Deferred Temporarily

COVINGTON, Ky., May 8.—M. D. Huth and Walter Carey, charged jointly with Congressman John W. Langley, Kentucky, with conspiracy to illegally withdraw liquor from government warehouses, pleaded guilty today. Sentence was deferred temporarily. Huth and Carey were two of the five, including Langley, now on trial. The pleas of guilty were unexpected.

The delayed hearing of further testimony brought a motion from the defense attorneys to strike out much of the previous testimony on the ground that the pleas will alter past rulings.

Huth is from Alliance, Ohio, and Carey from Canton.

STRIKERS QUIT

Workers in Argentine Republic Resume While Mines and Factories in Ruhr Close Down

BUENOS AIRES, South America, May 8.—Work was resumed throughout the Argentine Republic today following a week's strike against the National pension law which would pension all workers who have labored continuously in the country for 25 years.

The strike was called off in all the cities by the National Syndical Union after the police had acceded to the union's demand to release all persons arrested in connection with the cessation of labor.

POSTPONED SPEECH

Joe Burkett, Candidate For Governor, Will Appear Here May 26

Former State Senator Joe Burkett of this district, scheduled to appear at the courthouse Wednesday night in behalf of his candidacy for Governor, announced Thursday morning that he would return to Sweetwater May 26 and deliver a speech in the courthouse auditorium.

Mr. Burkett postponed his talk here when he learned of the revival meeting.

RAISE RESTRICTIONS

Hoof and Mouth Disease Brought Under Control

WICHITA, Kas., May 8.—John Richardson, president of the American State Bank, which closed its doors in June, 1923, with a \$2,000,000 shortage, was sentenced to 45 years in the state penitentiary and assessed a fine of \$45,000 in district court here. Richardson accused of receiving deposits after the bank was insolvent. Richardson's appeal bonds were fixed at \$50,000.

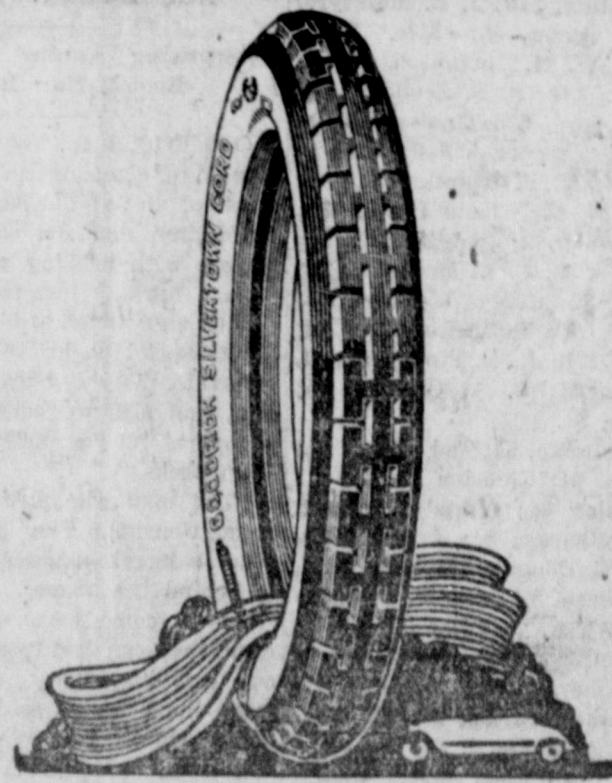

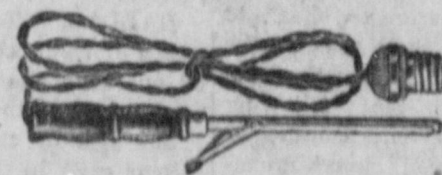

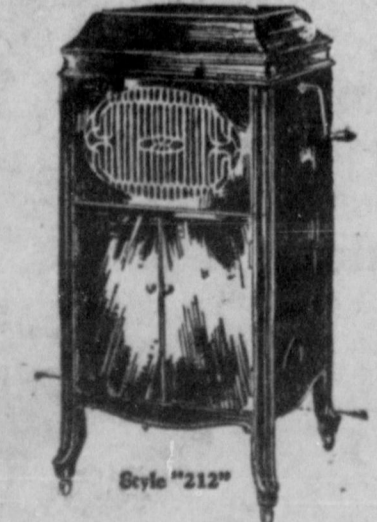
