

ATTEMPTS SUICIDE AT NOON

Murderer Endeavors Take Own Life While Accomplices Being Hung-Unidentified Hangman

By The United Press.

AMITE, La., May 9 .- As the clock on the tower tolled twelve the death march of six Italians, sentenced to hang for the murder of Dallas Calmes, began.

An unidentified hangman, wearing a mask which was simply a square of and once the articles were accepted black silk cloth with two slits for the eyes and jacket holes through which a sandy mustache protruded, took his position at the "chopping block," a keen bladed axe to cut the rope which sprang the trap of two gallowes, ending two men to death simultaneously.

> Seven official witnesses took chairs on the small walled enclosure around the scaffold. They included two doctors, two civilians and three newspapermen.


The traps were swung and two men, Natale Deamore and Roy Leona, went to their death with broken' necks at 12:01.

'Andrea Iametia, one of the six prisoners, has shot himself."
