Supporters of Smith Crowd Convention

Thousands Crash Into Convention Without Tickets To Support Al—Few Delegates Join Unprecedented Demonstration.

START PARADE THROUGH CROWDS

New York Delegation Leads—Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Iowa, Hawaii, Alaska, Minnesota in Procession.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, June 26.—“Our own Al Smith.”

These words, which closed the speech of Franklin D. Roosevelt placing the name of Al Smith before the convention in nomination, touched off a demonstration unprecedented in the history of great political conventions.

It came at 32 minutes after 12. From every corner of the floor arose the shriek of sirens and the blare of horns and whistles. Through it all were faintly heard the mad efforts of several bands.

Promptly came the parade. It was headed by the New York delegation with the banner borne by Joseph Collins, president of the Board of Aldermen of New York City.

Following New York came Alaska, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Connecticut, Illinois, Minnesota, Rhode Island, Wisconsin, Nevada, Vermont, North Dakota, Hawaii and Iowa were among the various state standards which followed the Smith parade.

Now and then from out of the bedlam were heard groups of men singing in unison “The Sidewalks of New York.” Bands would pass a given point playing for all they were worth and then pass from sight and hearing.

When the demonstration had continued 20 minutes it was still as loud as when the first whistle shrieked.

The wildest enthusiasm was manifested by men and women alike but comparatively few of them were delegates to the convention itself.

The greatest crowd that ever packed Madison Square Garden packed into it by noon with thousands more outside clamoring for admission. Police lines around the building stopped all traffic and orders were issued to prevent anyone from approaching the building. Thousands crashed through the doors without admission tickets.

Adjourns.

WOMAN DIRECTS MORNING SESSION

Miss May Kennedy Holds Honor of First Woman to Act as National Chairman in Session.

MAKES “KEYNOTE” SPEECH

Praises Wilson and Pledges Democracy to Not Fail Women of Nation in Deliberations.

By The United Press. MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, June 26.—

Under the guidance of the hand of a woman for the first time in history of the great political parties, the Democratic national convention entered the second day of its session on Al Smith for president day.

Chairman Walsh, after calling the convention to order at 11:23 o'clock, introduced Rev. William Porter of New York to give the invocation. He then turned over the gavel to Miss May Kennedy, of the Bronx, elected yesterday the first woman vice president of a national convention.

Standing behind the rostrum of the speaker's stand, Miss Kennedy made a short address—a woman's keynote. A tall figure all in white, with a mass of Titian hair peeping from under a small white felt toque, and with a basket of beautiful roses at her side, she addressed the greatest crowd that has yet attended any session of the convention.

“The women of the nation are anxiously awaiting the results of the deliberation of this convention,” Miss Kennedy said. “And I am sure that when we adjourn we shall have proved both by our candidates and our platform that the Democrats have not failed nor will they fail in the commitment of their trust.”

“Those who come here from distant parts of this wonderful country of ours to join the deliberations of this convention are under the burden of a tremendous responsibility, for their duty as well as ours is to bring into the homes of the masses the fact that the Democratic party is still the party of the people, and not of privileged groups.”

“Under the leadership of the late Woodrow Wilson the women of this convention gave all in the great world conflict so that the ideals and institutions of the party might be preserved. They did it cheerfully. The broad unitarian principles of Woodrow Wilson appealed to them. They realized that he was their champion, and placed their trust in him.”

“Nor did he fail them, and I feel certain that the nominees and platform of this convention will not fail them. Mine is an unique privilege. It is only another instance of the belief of the Democratic party in equal representation.”

“Upon the granting of the right of suffrage of the woman of this state, the Democrats, realizing their great interest in party affairs, was the first of the great political organizations to bestow upon them equal representation in its councils.”

CLUB OFFICERS ARE RE-ELECTED

Work of Last Six Months Reviewed at Meeting of Luncheon Club—Rapid Strides Made.

TO AID NATIONAL GUARD

Appreciation of Cancellation of Carnival here—Johnson Asks Co-operation July 4.

At the wind-up meeting of six months of activity for the betterment of Sweetwater, marked by the most rapid strides made in its history, the Sweetwater Luncheon Club met at noon at the Hotel Wright Thursday, re-elected its retiring officers for the next six months, heard a general report of the last six months of progress, and discussed several local problems.

Officers re-elected were: James Henry Beall Jr., president; William Wade, vice president; John A. McCurdy, secretary.

In reviewing the last six months work, the secretary commented on the great enthusiasm with which the members of the club had taken an interest in its affairs. This was partly a reaction to the general prosperity in this section of the country, he said, but while some of the other cities in West Texas had reached their climax and started down grade, central West Texas and Sweetwater were going steadily ahead.

McCurdy stated that many investors had been attracted to Sweetwater by its location and its recent remarkable growth. Real estate men from other cities boosted by a temporary boom are now seeking locations here.

He urged that the club membership keep in touch with the country road program and take an active interest in the school tax election July 8, when the vote on the increase of the levy from 50 cents to 80 cents will be taken.

A recent check of the building permits issued for the first six months of the year showed a total of approximately \$200,000, the secretary reported, or nearly as large an estimated value as the entire amount issued last year.

Street paving was stressed as another point in the city's development that needed constant attention. Increased property value and more attractions for trade to the city were two of the benefits cited. The two day trade trip was called the most significant club project.

To Help National Guard.

Chief of Police Johnson pointed out the unselfish action of the local unit of the National Guard in cancelling a carnival booked here during the Rayburn revival, and suggested that since the men thus forfeited revenue with which they hoped to purchase equipment for their summer camp, a committee from the club be appointed to make up the deficit of less than \$150, among the citizens. The motion carried unanimously.

The Chief also asked that every member of the club and every citizen of Sweetwater appoint himself a committee of one to help avoid accidents and disorder here during the July 4th celebration.

Dr. J. T. McKissick addressed the members of the club on the importance of the organization in the community in strengthening the morale for gaining a common goal. He expressed hope in the future for even greater strides than were made during the last six months.

Laurance Davis, a new member of the club, treated the members to cigars. J. C. Babb also became a member. J. P. Aylor was appointed toastmaster for the next meeting.

MELLON DEFENDS

Boy Unconscious 41 Days Dies In Stupor at Houston

By The United Press. HOUSTON, Texas, June 26.—

Manuel Middleton died at 12:45 p. m. today—the 41st day since he lapsed into a coma following an attack of spinal meningitis.

Up until last Sunday it was believed that the 12-year-old boy might recover. He has been sustained by artificial feeding and by hypodermic injections of stimulants.

Last Sunday, however, a high fever developed and the lad began to lose weight. As his body wasted away he showed signs of pain, moaning, and breathing heavily.

Early this morning the spark of life flickered for a moment. He rallied a little under the influence of stimulants but gradually his body turned black, and he slipped back into the valley of death without regaining consciousness.

BIG LAKE OIL TO AID ORIENT LINE

Already Received Large Number Cars From Last Big Producer in That Field Is Reported.

OFFICIALS VISIT FIELD

General Manager Shaufler Passes Through Sweetwater From Wichita Falls—Deal Is Off.

The Orient has already received 19 cars of oil from the big producer recently brought in at the Big Lake Oil Field, E. H. Shaufler, general manager of the Orient told a Reporter representative late Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Shaufler, in company with A. J. Cleary, superintendent of the Texas line of the Orient and A. Hargrove, passed through Sweetwater on a trip to the Big Lake field. They were traveling in a motor car equipped with steel wheels.

Mr. Shaufler expects to return to Wichita Friday.

Crops are in exceptionally good condition all along the line, the Orient officials reported. Wheat harvest is in full swing and loaded cars are moving in north Texas and also farther north. Many cars will come south enroute to tide-water via the Santa Fe at Sweetwater as well as the Katy at Hamlin. Cotton and feed crops are in exceptionally good shape.

The Rock Island Railway Co., no longer is interested in the Orient, and English capitalists, who had been planning on re-organizing the road, have cabledgram that they too no longer are interested, it was indicated by Mr. Shaufler.

Since the public sale of the road in March, there has been a great deal of comment about the English capitalists reorganizing the road and in an attempt to save part of the \$12,000,000 which they have invested. The road was sold in Wichita on March 27 to satisfy a government lien of approximately \$3,000,000. Confirmation of this sale to C. C. Histed, attorney for the Orient, cannot be made until October, when federal court convenes after its summer adjournment.

Since its sale the road has been making operating expenses, which is better than it had been doing for some time, according to Mr. Shaufler. The Rock Island had considered buying the road to allow it a more direct route to California and better connections with Mexico, which is reported to be staging an agricultural “come back.”

An extension of differential rates with connections, which was recently lost by the Orient in the United States supreme court, will be reviewed again by the interstate commerce commission, according to Mr. Shaufler, who explained that a reverse of the decision would mean thousands of dollars to the road. Until the road is reorganized or sold it will continue to operate under the hands of the receivers. All profits will go toward the general development of service.

FINAL TOUCHES ON PICNIC PLAN

Contracts For Rodeo Let—To Include Riding, Freak Races, Wild Cow Milking, Other Stunts.

HARRY TOM KING TO SPEAK

All Attending Urged to Make Day Basket Picnic Affair—Announces Swimming Prizes.

Practically all plans for the American Legion Picnic and Rodeo to be held here July 4th have been completed, according to reports of the various committees, whose members state that all is in readiness for one of the biggest days in the history of Sweetwater. The complete program in detail for the Fourth will be printed in The Reporter Sunday.

A contract was made Wednesday with S. B. Weatherby to stage the rodeo here on that day, the contract calling for at least five events. These events will probably include broncho riding, wild steer riding, wild mule race, cowboy potato race and wild cow milking. Efforts are also being made to obtain two famous trick riders to perform here during the celebration.

A broad athletic program has been arranged, including track and field events and diving and swimming contests. There will be ball games July 3 and 4 and horse races on the Fourth. Invitations have been issued to golfers in surrounding towns to play here on the big day, and the country club links will be opened to all visitors.

Announcement has been made that Judge Harry Tom King of Abilene will be among the prominent speakers here for the occasion. He will speak in interest of his candidacy for State Senate.

The American Legion is urging that all who attend the celebration here bring lunches to the picnic grounds and spread them there at noon, as an old fashioned picnic is to be one of the main features of the occasion.

Once more, abandoned by the English bondholders, as well as not considered of value the Rock Island following inspection of that system, the Orient is once more on its own hook, under the guidance of W. T. Kemper, who has barely managed to keep the road in operation all these years.

While enough business has been coming to the Orient to very nearly enable it to make both ends meet, all business men know that it is not sufficient income to enable it to continue indefinitely. Rolling stock and equipment will wear out and unless there is sufficient income to make replacements, eventually operations must cease.

West Texas has stayed right with the Orient through all these years of hardship. It realizes the value this road has been in the development of the territory. And now while this section is on the very eve of coming into its own, in the greatest period of its development, there must be no withdrawal of that support which has meant so much in the past. Leniency in taxation, liberality in freight and other support, must be continued so that the communities that are utterly dependent upon this road, no less than all which are benefitted by it may continue to develop.

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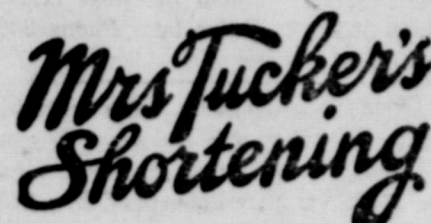
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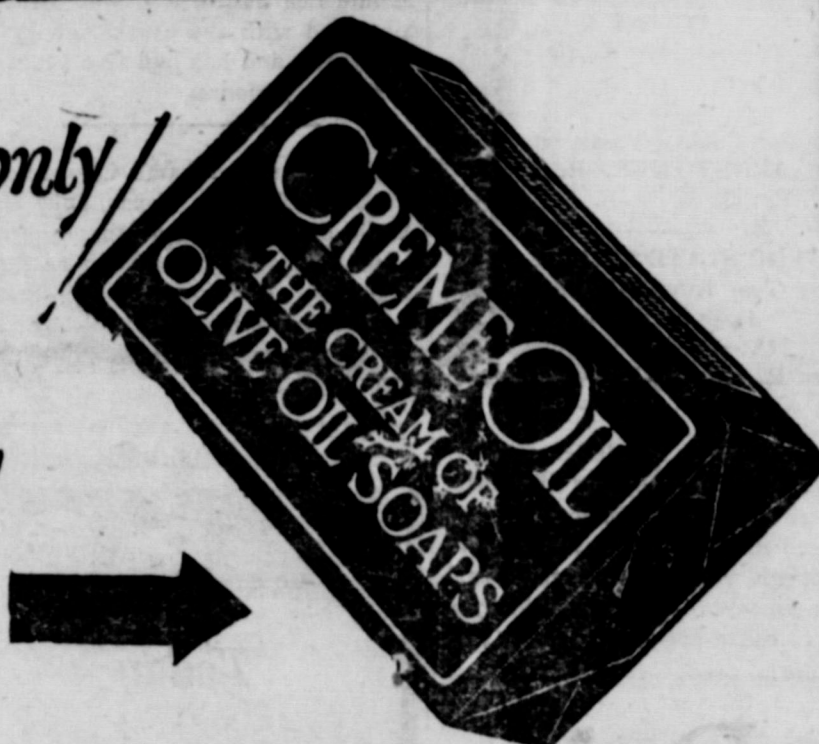

Good Use for Old Carpet Sweeper

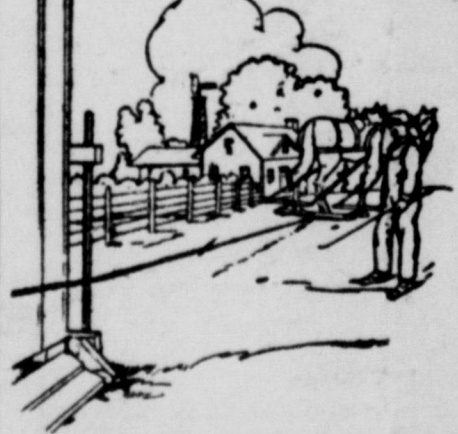
When a carpet sweeper no longer sweeps it is usually thrown away. Upon examination, it will be found, however, that quite some bristle is still left on the roller, which may be used a few more years as a push brush of the kind shown in the drawing.



the brace are two small holes that were previously used to hold spring wires. Small wire nails are driven through these holes into the wooden part of the brush so that it cannot turn when in use. After one side of the brush has been worn down, the nails are simply removed, the brush turned around and again fastened as before.

Roller Protects Barn Corner

Farm buildings sometimes are so arranged that when hay is hoisted into the barn the team must be driven around a corner of one building in order to avoid another. This causes the rope to rub hard



against the corner, not only wearing it out quickly but also bruising the corner. In one case injury to both corner and rope was prevented by arranging a steel roller vertically along the edge of the building as shown. The roller consisted of a 4-ft. length of 2-in. iron pipe, turning on bolts fitted into the ends. The bolts were in turn held by short pieces of 2 by 4-in. wood, nailed securely to the barn. The roller has been in use for two or three years and has never failed in its purpose.

Putty for Floor Cracks

Cracks in a floor that is stained and varnished may be filled with a putty consisting of 2 parts of glue, 14 parts of water, 4 parts of plaster of paris, and 2 parts of litharge. This putty will take the stain and varnish.
