THE BUFFALO BILLS are the sports-world's latest team to wear the tag of not being able to "Win the Big One."

Down through the history of sports, there have been a lot of teams in this category, including the Minnesota Vikings, who were the first pro football team to lose in four Super Bowl appearances.

Minnesota's Bud Grant, who was in the news as being installed into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, is one of the winningest all-time football coaches, and ranks right up there with George Halas, Tom Landry and Don Schula. But in Super Bowl games, Grant was 0-4, and unfortunately that's how he is remembered by a lot of fans.

Today's "new generation" of Dallas Cowboy fans may not even realize that the Cowboys, and especially their longtime great coach, Tom Landry, was in the category of having the tag "Can't Win the Big One" during the first decade of their existence.

The Cowboys dropped two straight heart-breaking games to the Packers at Green Bay, in the finals of the National Conference. The second was the famous "Ice Bowl," played in below zero chill factor. Dallas led that one until the final play of the game, when Packers quarterback Bart Starr scored on a quarterback sneak to give Green Bay a come-from-behind win.

Green Bay went on to win the first two Super Bowl games, and Dallas fans suffered.

When Dallas finally made it to the "Big One," in Super Bowl V, the Cowboys should have beaten a rag-tag Baltimore Colt team, but lost 16-13 on a field goal in the last five seconds.

Although the 'Boys won two Super Bowl games under Landry, they dropped a pair of games to Pittsburgh, one on a last-minute interception in the end zone (1976), and another by a dropped touchdown pass by Jackie Smith (1979). Those losses haunted Cowboy fans throughout the 1980s, when they never made it back.

Marv Levy appears to be a nice sort of a guy—with the kind of qualities old Cowboy fans grew to like in Tom Landry. But he can't win the Big One.

Friona Woman Charged In Hit And Run Death

A Friona woman, 22-year-old Edith Medina, is charged with leaving the scene of an accident resulting in death in an incident in Clovis last Saturday night.

Medina, of 1602 James Street in Friona, was arrested after she admitted hitting the pedestrian, who was walking along the 3800 block of Mabry Drive in Clovis.

Ms. Medina was originally held at the Curry County Detention Center on a \$50,000 cash-only bond. But the bond was lowered the next day from \$50,000 to \$10,000, and she was released after posting the required 10 per cent cash bond.

Manuel Gonzales, 43, of 133 El Camino in Clovis, was the victim. The mishap happened at the 3800 block of Mabry Drive.

Leon Morris, spokesman for the Clovis Police Department, said Medina told investigators she thought she had struck a cow and kept on going. The car was a blue 1990 Ford Mustang. Police said it had extensive front-end damage.

Gonzales suffered multiple injuries. Medina was arraigned in Magistrate Court by Judge Richard Burke. The arraignment is actually a first appearance for a suspect, during which he or she is informed of the charges and bond is set.

A Magistrate Court spokesperson said that Medina's next appearance will be in the next week.

Gun Confiscated On School Property

The Friona Police Department confiscated a small calibre pistol in possession of a juvenile student at Friona High School on Wednesday.

Four students were involved in the episode, and have been expelled from school for the rest of the spring semester. "That's the maximum suspension we can give," said Friona ISD Superintendent Hal Ratcliff.

Meanwhile, the four juveniles were charged in Parmer County Juvenile Court with "possession of a firearm in a prohibited place." They were to appear in a hearing in the juvenile court on Thursday. The offense is a third-degree felony.

The weapon was loaded when it was confiscated, according to officials. It was in one of the student's vehicles.

High school principal Cliff Stephens was tipped off on Tuesday night that a high school student had a gun on school property that day.

Friona Chief of Police John Taylor and Captain Randy Gerjes responded to the school's call.

The investigation showed that a different student had the pistol Wednesday morning. While he was being summoned to Stephens' office, a third student apparently removed the weapon from a locker and placed it in a vehicle on the parking lot.

The juveniles involved were all either 14 or 15 years of age, according to Police Chief Taylor.

Astronaut Harris Is Big Hit With Kids

Since Astronaut Bernard Harris, M.D., visited Friona I.S.D., the stars in the Milky Way shine brighter, the mistique of the universe is clearer, and the future of the space program is promising to the students, faculty and community.

Dressed in a blue flight suit, Astronaut Harris reflected upon his own childhood dream of becoming an astronaut. His dream was fueled by the Apollo Program, Star Trek, and a family trip to the Johnson Space Center.

Harris' message encouraged students to stay in school, choose to be drug-free, plan for an early career, lift all racial barriers and boundaries, and concentrate on math and science. He also inspired students to "believe in themselves and dream dreams."

Students explored space with Astronaut Harris as he narrated the film clips of Spacelab D-2. Harris blasted off on his first space mission on board the Columbia with six other astronauts to research the various ways the microgravity environment of space affects the human body.

The highly skilled crew conducted 90 experiments. Fifty percent involved medicine, within ten exciting days in space.

Students were intrigued as they learned how astronauts managed zero gravity and day to day routines such as eating, sleeping, exercising, showering and working.

Dr. Harris also described the effects of zero gravity on the plants, fish and tadpoles that were part of the lab experiments. The shuttle was equipped with a ham radio that allowed the crew to establish contact with 14 or 15 schools.

Since the shuttle was travelling 17,500 m.p.h. around the earth, the crew could view a sunset and sunrise every 45 minutes.

Astronaut Harris' eyes sparkled as he described his next space assignment. In January, 1995, Harris and other American astronauts will join two Russian cosmonauts as they will travel to the Russian space station. Harris is hopeful that he will get to participate in a space walk.

At the close of each program Dr.

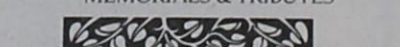
Harris presented each campus with a colored autographed picture and a patch that depicts the D-2 mission. At the community reception, Dr. Harris presented Hal Ratcliff, superintendent of Friona ISD, with a pictorial collage of the mission.

Quint Ellis, junior high student council president, presented Dr. Harris an American flag that will travel into space on his next mission.

Star-struck students received a glimpse of the space frontier and many will "dare to dream" and some will touch the stars!



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Happy Homemaker

Many thanks to each of you who have expressed appreciation for our Happy Homemaker column. I'm glad you like it and am looking forward to having more of you share recipes with us for it.

Several of our recipes this week came from present and former teachers in the local school system.

From Kay Sneed, we have:
QUICHE LORRAINE
CHEESE PIE

- 1/4 to 1/2 cup chopped bacon
- 1 cup flour
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 stick margarine (1/2 cup)
- 3-4 tablespoons cold water
- 1/4 lb. grated Longhorn cheese
- 3 eggs
- 1 can evaporated milk (13 oz.)
- 1 teaspoon tarragon

Fry chopped bacon. Drain and cool on paper towel. Meanwhile, into large mixing bowl combine flour and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Cut in margarine (1 use hand mixer). Sprinkle cold water over pastry mixture. Form into ball and roll out into 8" pie pan. Fold edge to form rim and flute. Using same bowl (unwashed) grate cheese. Place bacon and cheese in pastry lined pan. Still using same bowl, beat eggs; add evaporated milk, salt and tarragon. Blend and pour over bacon and cheese.

Bake at 400 degrees for 35-45 minutes. Cool slightly before slicing. Also good served cold.

It sounds like Kay is a proponent of economizing on dishwashing duties. Another recipe she uses often is:

CHICKEN CALIFORNIA

- 1 cooked chicken or 4 whole chicken breasts
- 1 cup chicken stock
- 1 pint sour cream (or half & half works fine)
- 2 teaspoons salt
- pepper to taste
- grated Monterey Jack cheese
- Paprika for dusting
- chopped green onions
- flour tortillas

Combine chicken stock, sour cream, sweet cream, flour, salt and pepper and bring almost to a boil. Dip tortillas in cream mixture. Put onion and cheese in center. Roll up and place in casserole. Cover with cream mixture and a little cheese, then dust with paprika. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until bubbly.

Martha Bates, who retired a few years ago, makes a delicious

FRUIT SALAD

- 2 eggs beaten
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 tablespoons vinegar

Combine in top of double boiler

and cook to custard consistency over boiling water. Set aside to cool.

Drain juice from 29 ounce can of sliced peaches; 13-1/2 ounce can pineapple chunks and small bottle maraschino cherries, which have been cut into two pieces.

Whip 1/2 pint cream. Fold into custard, then combine the mixture with the fruit mixture. Add 8 ounces miniature marshmallows. Chill thoroughly before serving.

Martha makes the following suggestion. "Also delicious served with angel food or plain cake as a dessert."

Linda Griffin's Mexican Hot Dish makes a hit with family members or guests whenever it is served.

MEXICAN HOT DISH

- 1 pound ground beef
- 1 large chopped onion
- 1 can chicken soup
- 1 small can taco sauce
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 pound grated cheese

Brown beef and onion. Mix soup, taco sauce and milk and add to first mixture.

In a casserole place a layer of broken tortillas, then meat mixture, ending with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

This freezes well.

PORCUPINE BALLS

- Combine:
- 1 pound ground beef
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup Minute Rice
- chopped onion & chopped green pepper

Form mixture into balls. Pour 1 can tomato sauce and 1/2 can water over and bake 1-1/2 hours at 325 degrees.

The NEED curriculum presents facts behind energy issues so that students have unbiased information. In the six-week course, equal

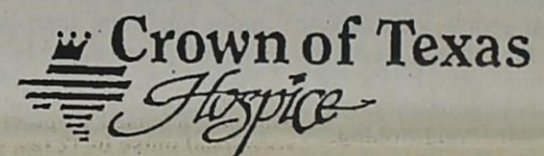
weight goes to wind, solar, geothermal, coal, nuclear and petrochemical energy sources.

Newsletter Takes Stand For "Traditional Values"

There are many reasons for Americans to be worried in today's world. Federal, state and local welfare spending has increased from \$53 billion in 1970 to \$172 billion as of 1991. During this time, over \$2.3 trillion has been spent on welfare programs, and yet the problems continue to get worse.

All this spending has actually encouraged dependence on the government rather than on family and community. American families are breaking apart and we seem to be more racially segregated than ever. For example, our welfare system pays a woman money if she is single and has children but if she becomes married...the money stops coming in.

In addition, crime has gotten to the point that people are afraid to go out on the streets at night. Children cannot play in the yard alone. Gangs are tearing our cities and towns apart. Drugs and alcohol are still ruining the lives of both the young and old. Citizens are told that they need to be more "understanding" to rapists and murderers. There are those who believe that more money needs to be spent to solve these problems. There is another group of people who believe that it is not money but values that are lacking.

Groups throughout America are beginning to stand up to support "traditional values." They believe that unless a society is guided by fundamental principals and values,

it will destroy itself. These people have formed groups that are fighting for values such as self-reliance, honesty, integrity and hard work.

Peter Griffith, who publishes a monthly newsletter called *The Southern Trumpet* which is concerned with "traditional American values", feels that while there is much that is discouraging, there is also much to be encouraged by. "People are sick and tired of hearing about how bad America is, how anyone who believes in traditional values is wrong, that business and businessmen are bad, that "Big-Government" is our friend, that the only way to solve the education problem is to throw more money at it, that animals are more important than people, and that America should be part of the "New World Order", said Griffith in a recent interview. As a result of his beliefs, Griffith began publishing *The Southern Trumpet*, a 12-page monthly newsletter dedicated to applying traditional values to the problems facing America today.

Griffith (age 27) accuses institutions like MTV and Hollywood as well as Washington politicians of belittling traditional values. He went on to say that "The politicians want the security and justice that morality brings but they are unwilling to take a stand. They know that things are not right. They only want to hear

themselves talk. It is a complete lie to pretend that there can be justice and goodness in a society unless it is based on something greater than ourselves. It is not by luck that America became a great nation."

"I believe that what we are seeing is that Americans are beginning to stand up and say 'enough is enough'. What we've found as we worked on *The Southern Trumpet*", continued Griffith, who reads many periodicals and enjoys researching the issues, "is that there are a lot of people who are sick and tired of what is happening in America today. They are interested in publications that explore today's issues from a traditional values point of view." Griffith is very pleased with the response to his publication. "I believe there is much to be encouraged by, and Americans are not ready to give up....quite the contrary, I think

Tulia slowly built a lead that reached seven points at 33-26 with 2:37 left in the third quarter, before Keri Reeb scored on a pair of layups and Miss Downey sank a pair of free throws to get Friona back close at 32-35.

Tulia scored a quick basket for a 37-32 lead to start the fourth quarter, but the Squaws turned up their defense a notch at this point, and the offense also responded.

Miss Reeb made another pair of timely jump shots, sandwiched around a basket by Kristi Meyer, and Dalluge received her fourth foul with 6:30 left in the game.

The Squaws ran off eight unanswered points, to take a 40-37 lead.

But Friona's scoring machine was turned off for the last 5:48 of the game, and Tulia cashed in on free throws by Tulia's Keisha Nolen, to reclaim the lead for the Hornettes. She then grabbed a rebound off a missed shot and laid it in for a 43-40 Tulia lead with a minute left, and that was about it.

Miss Nolen's free throws came after Miss Looper's fifth foul, and her loss hurt the team from a rebounding standpoint in the final moments of the game.

Miss Looper paced Friona's scoring with 15 points. Miss Reeb added ten, and Miss Downey, with somewhat closer scrutiny than she had had against Littlefield, was held to nine points.

TEAMS/TAAS Tests Available In March

Friona High School Counselor Jackie Morgan has announced that those high school students who have met all requirements for high school graduation but have not yet passed one or both sections of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) may take the test in March.

During the March 1994 TEAMS administration, the English language arts test will be administered on Wednesday, March 9th, and the mathematics test will be administered on Thursday, March 10th. During the March 1994 TAAS administration, the writing test will be administered on Tuesday, March 8th; the reading test will be administered on Wednesday, March 9th; and the mathematics test will be administered on Thursday, March 10th.

Beginning last Fall, all who wished to take the TEAMS test(s) had to register in advance. This included those currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as those who have completed all other high school graduation requirements. The only individuals who must register for the TAAS test(s) are those who are no longer enrolled in school and who have not met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test.

Registration forms must be completed and returned in the pre-addressed envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa no later than five p.m. on February 15, 1994. The Texas Education Agency and National Computer Systems will not be responsible for registration forms that are delayed or lost in the mail. It is suggested that individuals registering for the test make arrangements with the appropriate postal agent for a proof of delivery notice.

YOUR EYES

New Research On Myopia



Why are some children nearsighted? In modern research funded by the National Eye Institute, scientists came up with a few answers: the incidence of myopia has a strong genetic component; and using the eyes for reading and video games seems to promote nearsightedness in some.

A long-term study at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Cornell University found that two out of three of the babies tested at a few months were myopic or astigmatic. By age 3, the myopic babies had normal eyesight, and astigmatims were reduced or eliminated by age 5. The surprise was that by age 10 to 12, the children who had been myopic as babies were nearsighted again! The researchers report a mysterious ability in the eye to maintain 20/20 visual acuity even though the eye is growing rapidly.

Nationally, one in four American adults is myopic; the higher percentage among parents and children tested in Cambridge, Massachusetts, seems to point to a genetic role.

Mutual Funds Are Not For Trading

The rise of the mutual fund industry is a financial success story. During every decade since the 1930s, when mutual funds were introduced, their total assets have grown. From a modest beginning of \$100 million in 1930, the total amount invested in mutual funds has grown to more than \$1 trillion today.

For the most part, this growth has been fueled by an industry that has provided a convenient, reliable way to invest money. In addition, mutual funds typically deliver a fair return to their shareholders.

When will the bubble burst? Perhaps never for those who continue to select their mutual funds with a specific objective and the patience not to expect immediate wealth.

Mutual funds are typically long-term investments. This means if you don't plan to invest your money for at least five years, you should possibly look at other, shorter-term alternatives.

Long-term investing is the philosophy that built mutual funds into the mammoth industry that it is today. Mutual funds never were intended as "trading" vehicles. Yet today, as staggering numbers of new funds are offered regularly, more and more brokers, advisers, newsletters and others are urging investors to start trading.

The idea of trading mutual funds is not new. It generally resurfaces after prolonged bull markets such as we have experienced for the past 10

years. A recent advertisement for a mutual fund "timing system" promised "a virtually guaranteed way to identify market peaks... and absolutely safeguard your mutual fund investment." By charting the past performance of volatile mutual funds, it is easy to show what might have happened if you would have been luck enough to consistently sell high and buy low. This is the elusive dream of every get-rich-quick artist.

The new breed of mutual fund traders would have you believe that traditional buy-and-hold strategies will not work in the 1990s. In truth, they have worked successfully since the 1930s.

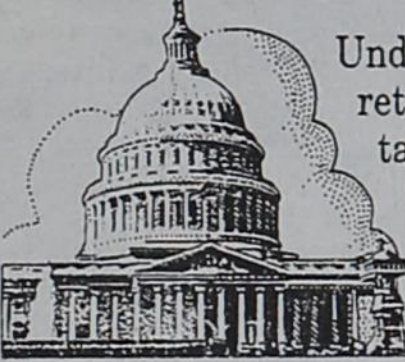
The fact is that no one can realistically guarantee profits in any mutual fund.

The safest way to select mutual funds is to look for those that meet your objectives and risk tolerance. Study the historical performance of the funds through good and bad markets --- the longer the history, the better. Of course, past performance is not an indication of future results.

The key is consistency, and your challenge is to have the patience to let the fund's managers work for you. This discipline will greatly enhance your chances for profit and the safety of your investment (although these are never guaranteed.)

Mutual funds are not an appropriate parking place for overnight investors. Those who try to make funds fit that mold usually find the frustration of trying to put a square peg into a round hole.

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
