**Picnic Supper For Guest.**

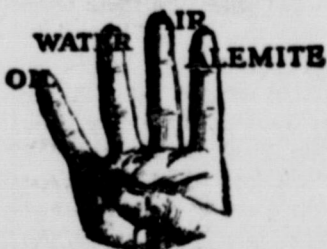

**EXPECT LARGEST FAIR**

West Texas Fair Officials Busy In Preparation.

ABILENE, Texas, Aug. 15.—With a record of some 65,000 people in attendance at the All-West-Texas Fair of 1923, officials of the fair for this year are making extensive plans for the most complete and well-balanced programs of education, entertainment, amusement, and exhibits ever attempted at an All-West-Texas function of this type.

With little better than five weeks before the fair gates swing open on the annual trade mart and festival, already there is much activity at the office of the West Texas Fair Association. Exhibitors of livestock, poultry, agricultural displays and manufacturing and industrial interests have been in session with fair executives arranging for space at the fair. Several West Texas Counties are planning special exhibits, and have assured officials of their support.

**Oklahoma Daily Production Hikes**

TULSA, Ok., Aug. 15.—That Oklahoma again is over the 500,000 barrel mark in daily output, it being the second time it has surpassed this figure, has been estimated by a statistical agency, which says the daily crude oil production of Oklahoma is approximately 510,000 barrels.

Conceding that the 500,000 barrel figure has been passed, Oklahoma stands in a fair way to set a new daily production mark, as a number of new wells about ready to drill in the sand in the Tonkawa and Cromwell fields will register a further increase, it was said.

tion the President proposed adherence to the world court, but re-affirmed his intention to remain aloof from the League of Nations.

He expressed hopefulness that the Dawes plan would solve Europe's difficulties and again announced his intention of sponsoring another disarmament conference when the plan appears to be in operation.

Agriculture, he said, has seen "a partial relief come in a natural way." And declared the path to greater prosperity lay through "more organization co-operation, diversification," a "wise skilled and unselfish leadership" and continued protection by tariff.

Concerning his determination to further reduce costs of government and taxation, he said:

"Taxes take from every one a part of his earnings and force everybody to work a certain part of his time for the Government."

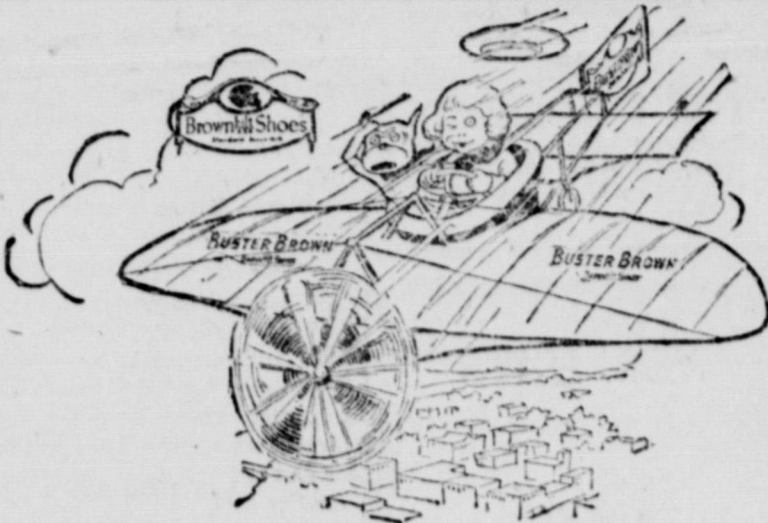

tants who stood for these things. He gave klan propaganda credit for the passage of the recent bill in Congress, restricting Japanese immigration. He reviewed the famous \$156,000 case in which he stated the brewers said they had given Ferguson the money as a legitimate expense "for buying legislation in Texas," and closed his address with the prediction that the voters of the state would not vindicate Ferguson.

The speaker was introduced by J. H. Beall. At the close of his address, on motion of R. C. Crane, the chair was authorized to appoint an executive committee of a Robertson For Governor Club to function during the remainder of the campaign.

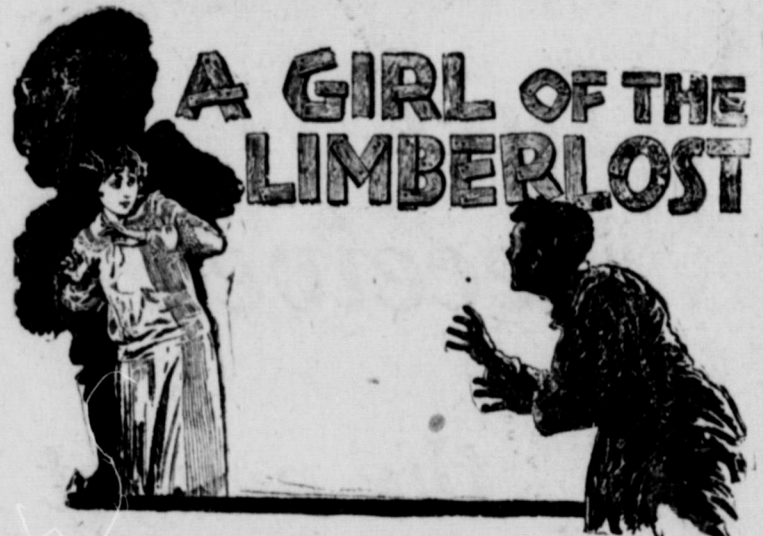
