**ITS MRS. FERGUSON**

Texas made history Saturday when it elected the first woman governor ever to be thus honored, polled the greatest vote in the history of the state, and registered strong disapproval of the Ku Klux Klan as a political organization.

The defeat of the Klan was decisive, in that the wife of a former discredited governor was chosen nominee, while Klan endorsed candidates lost in every instance for state positions. The anti-Klan vote was perhaps strongest in the case of Dan Moody, elected attorney general. Even the popular Will Edwards of Denton, himself not a Klansman, was unable to overcome the handicap that endorsement of the hooded organization proved to be.

With La Follette, Progressive, and John W. Davis, Democratic nominees for president, and C. G. Dawes, candidate for vice-president, expressing disapproval of the Klan in politics, the country will now await similar word from Calvin Coolidge, Republican nominee for president.

In the meantime Texas will watch the return of the Ferguson to power with great interest. Mrs. Ferguson has never been involved in any of the charges leveled at her husband. However much it may hurt masculine pride to admit it, most men have been and are in the position of the man at The Reporter bulletin board Saturday night, who observed that he "had been under petticoat government for the past 30 years and was glad the State of Texas was going to have a two year experience similar to his."

**SERVICE**

Several hundred Sweetwater citizens gathered at The Reporter office Saturday night and remained there until the early hours of Sunday morning, watching the progress of the race between "Ma" and Felix and the other candidates in the run off primary, and enjoying the election service given by The Reporter.

Through the co-operation of the various election judges in the county, complete county returns, with the exception of one box to which there is no telephone, were available early in the evening. The Texas Election Bureau service contracted for by The Reporter gave the crowd the latest information on the race of the state candidates until 1:30 Sunday morning.

Part of a newspaper's duty to its subscribers is getting the news first when it is humanly possible. Sunday papers reaching Sweetwater were several hours behind The Reporter with election returns, as they were mailed out Saturday night when only a comparatively few counties had been heard from.

**JAPAN'S DRINK BILL**

The annual drink bill of Japan now amounts to over 1,000,000,000 yen, according to a report received from Mr. Mark R. Shaw, representative of the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in Japan.

"The money spent for alcoholic drink in Japan is now well over 1,000,000 yen every twelve months."

"This amount is equal to three-fourths the annual budget of the Imperial Government, and an average of about 62 yen per family for the population of the entire empire, in spite of the fact that it has been stated on reliable authority that 92 per cent of the people are trying to exist on less than 500 yen per year; and Osaka Prefecture found that the average annual income of its farmers is only 264 yen. This suggests something of the extent and seriousness of the alcohol problem of Japan.

"Although facing a serious food problem necessitating the importation of 5,000,000 koku of rice annually, Japan each year wastes more than an equal amount of rice (5,630,000 koku in 1922) in the manufacture of sake. This is one-thirteenth of her total rice consumption and would be sufficient food material for five million people, one-sixteenth of the total population.

"The seriousness of the sake problem is further suggested, in view of the scientifically established facts regarding the direct and indirect influence of alcohol in causing disease, by an increasing death rate (22.3 per thousand in 1922). While the population increased 8 per cent from 1915 to 1922, the production of sake increased 40 per cent, and beer 136 per cent. Meanwhile social workers testify that juvenile delinquency is rapidly increasing."

Prominent Rancher Well Known in Sweetwater.

The accident occurred on the Bankhead highway. Poole's neck was broken. Dan Davis, Byron Brant, Charles Goldsmith and Barry Neblett, all prominent Midland men, were seriously hurt. Six members of the Gibson family of Colorado, in one of the autos, were bruised and cut.

Poole is survived by his wife and a 12-year-old daughter.

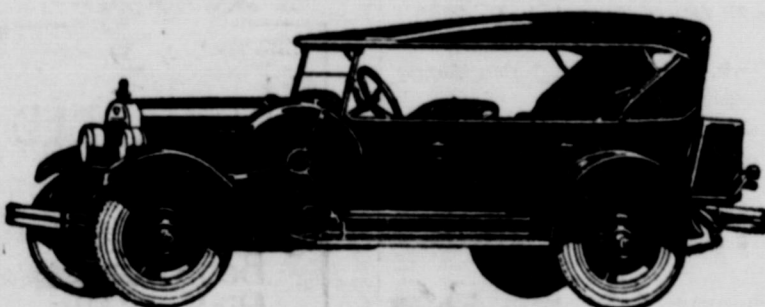

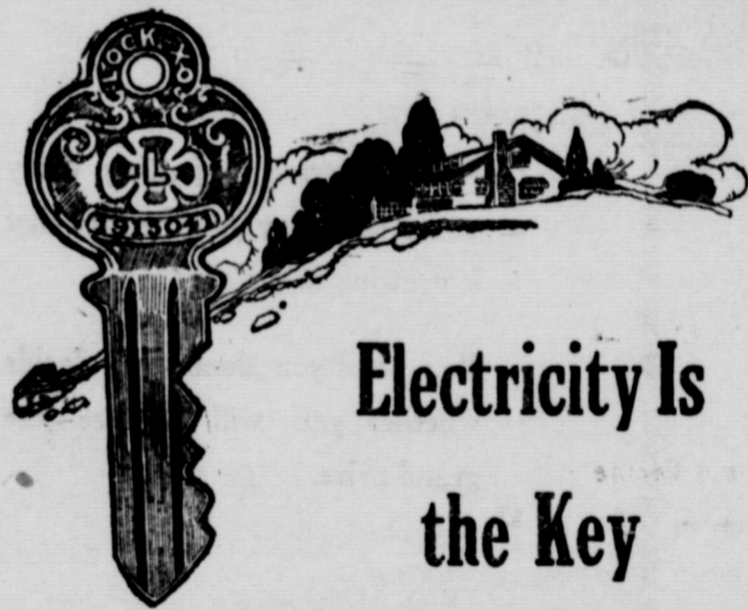
