## ADVERTISE FOR HIGHWAY WORK

Plans on Bankhead From Sweetwater to Mitchell County Line Approved by Federal Department.

### OTHER PLANS READY

Section 12 Miles Blackwell to Sweetwater and Road From Blackwell to Taylor County Await Okeh.

With the approval of the Federal Highway Department of the plans for the improvement of the Bankhead Highway from Sweetwater west to the Mitchell County line, Judge A. S. Mauzey Friday advertised for bids for the grading and drainage structures on the work.

The plans were approved by the State in July, and the approval of the Federal Department was all that held up the advertising for bids by county officials.

Bids for surfacing the 15.2 miles on the Bankhead Highway will be advertised for next spring, after traffic has settled the dirt work on the highway, County Engineer John A. Focht stated. The curves at the underpass west of Sweetwater will be made flatter, the County Engineer said, and going west from Roscoe, the road will take a diagonal course at the Field's property, rather than turning due South.

"The paving work in Roscoe is progressing," Focht stated. "Excavation has been completed in two blocks, and the contractors expect to start laying the concrete base Monday. Fifteen cars of brick are on the job now."

Other road development is reported by the County Engineer's Department. Plans for the 12 miles of road from Sweetwater to Blackwell are expected to be returned from Austin, where they have been preliminarily checked by the State Department, Friday or Saturday, and will be inked in and returned to the capital for final approval. The county expects to start the job within 30 days. The road runs from Wildcat Mountain South.

Plans on the section east on the Blackwell road to Taylor County are about ready to send to Austin for preliminary checking. The crossing on the T-P near Trent has yet to be worked out with Taylor County officials.

### CATCH MANY PARROTS

Largest Shipper of Chattering Birds at Laredo.

LAREDO, Sept. 5.—The largest shipper of Mexican parrots in the United States is located here. Throughout Mexico, Central and South America purchasing agencies for this company are located.

The birds are taken mostly by night while they are roosting in trees. Their incessant chattering after night fall makes it very easy to locate the roosts, the trappers say, and large numbers are easily caught.

## Turtle Cleans Out Pipe, Makes Block Every 45 Minutes

CANTON, Kas., Sept. 4.—Canton city officials have found a new way to clean out clogged sewers. This week when one of the city's sewer pipes became stopped, a live snapping turtle was caught, a rope tied to his tail, and the animal then was placed at one end of the pipe in question. The turtle then was released in the pipe and started for the other end at a lively gait—for a turtle—with 350 feet of rope attached to his caudal appendage. He made the first block in forty-five minutes and proceeded at this speed for two more blocks until the pipe was again functioning properly.

## BIRDMEN ON LAST JUMP HOMEWARD

Leave Pictou Harbor Friday Morning, Expected to Reach Boston This Afternoon.

### WADE JOINS COMPANIONS

Aviator Who Lost Plane Has Difficulty Taking Off—Pass New Brunswick at 2 p. m.

PICTOU, Nova Scotia, Sept. 5.—America's round the world flyers are winging their way southward on the jump that will bring them to their home shores. Late today they were due in Boston.

The take-off from Pictou was at 11:14 this morning. Lts. Lowell Smith and Eric Nelson were joined by Lt. Leigh Wade, whose original plane sank on the Faroe Islands. Lt. Wade flew in a plane sent him here.

The flight from Pictou got under way officially at 11:44 a. m., Atlantic Standard Time. Wade's plane, the Boston II, left the water with difficulty, only after reaching the open sea even with the Pictou light house.

The American flyers passed over St. John Harbor, New Brunswick, at 1:50 p. m. Eastern daylight time. They were sighted at Albert, New Brunswick, at 2 p. m., Eastern daylight saving time.

## BLAST IS FATAL

Explosion of Powder Factories at First Blamed to Communists—Hundreds Killed.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 5.—The country side around Constantinople was shaken for miles, many workmen were killed, others died in hospitals, and a town was practically wiped out when powder factories about 20 miles from the former Turkish capital blew up, according to a Central News Dispatch today.

Communists were blamed at first, but the disaster was later attributed to carelessness on the part of workmen.

## SAYS FORCE ONLY PEACE SECURITY

France and England Take Opposite Views in Debate Before League of Nations Body.

### MIGHT WEAPON OF RIGHT

Herriot of France Says That Justice Needs Force to Back it Up—Dangerous, England Says.

GENEVA, Sept. 5.—France favors force as a guarantee of peace. Britain opposes it.

Spokesmen of the two nations voiced diametrically opposite views in the debate on security and disarmament at the League of Nations Assembly today. Premier Herriot of France declared his nation's conviction that justice required force to back it up; that might was the proper weapon of right.

Lord Tarmoor, speaking for Britain, declared that it was imperative to separate force from the league. The danger of the mutual guarantees pact, the subject of the debate, was that it was based on force, he declared.

The speakers agreed otherwise on world peace and solidarity. "Justice without force is insufficient," Premier Herriot declared. "We must combine right with might. We must make what is right mighty. It is necessary that force be justice, and that justice be strong. Arbitration, security, and disarmament, are all inseparable."

### Heads International Court.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 5.—M. Huber, of Switzerland, was elected president of the International Court of Justice at the court's meeting at the Hague today, according to a Central News Dispatch. M. Weiss, of France, was re-elected vice president. Huber will hold office for three years.

## CANCEL KLAN DAY

"Not Always Wise to Repeat" Says Dallas Secretary in Making Official Announcement.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 5.—Klan Day at the State Fair has been called off, Earl H. Silven, secretary of the Dallas Klan announced today.

The day was one of the biggest at the fair last year, from point of attendance. Klansmen from all parts of the state gathered here. "You know it is not always wise to repeat," Silven said.

### Blaze in Car.

The Sweetwater Volunteer Fire Department was called out at noon Friday to extinguish a blaze in a Maxwell touring car on the Gyp Plant road. The car is reported to have been driven by a man named Williams for a service car company. The blaze was thought to have originated in the wiring, and was put out before much damage was done.

Melon Grower Loses \$20 on Prize Specimen.

But luck was against the successful grower, for the melon had already been sold for \$5.

### Coal Mine Breaks Record.

MC ALESTER, Ok., Sept. 5.—All previous records for a mine owned by the Rock Island Coal & Mining Company of Hartshorn, were broken this week when 1325 tons of coal were mined. Three hundred men are employed in the mine.

## CIVIL WAR RAGES WITH NEW FURY

Attacking Forces Drive Forward on Shanghai, Reach Forts Near The City.

### NATIVES PANIC STRICKEN

U. S. Destroyers Dispatched to Woo Fung For Protection of Colony There Near Forts.

SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 5.—Kiangsu forces bent on storming the city drove forward late today in a new advance that brought them close to the Woo Fung forts, within 10 miles of Shanghai. Heavy firing on the front where the defense troops are falling back has been heard here all through the day.

The native city was panic stricken at the advance of the enemy. Business was suspended and thousands of Chinese fled to the foreign settlement undisturbed by the presence of the terrified refugees.

Three of the American destroyers at Shanghai were dispatched to Woo Fung where they took up a position near the fort, prepared to land Marines to guard the border of the American settlement if the defense army retreated farther.

So far no landing parties have gone ashore from the U. S. ships. By 10:30 p. m., heavy fighting was under way along the entire front. Many wounded soldiers and civilians were brought here.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 5.—Shops are already displaying their Fall frocks in spite of warm weather and many women are buying their Fall things now before the newer models have been picked over.

The Fall silhouette is quite varied both in the imported and the domestic models. There are numerous models which continue in straight, narrow lines both in unbelted and narrow string belt types. Skirts of these models are shorter and they are more scant than ever, if that can be possible. Other models follow the tunic lines which are never newer than the straight-line models.

Tunics are all long—extending within four or five inches of the hem of the short underskirt. Sheath frocks which are split up one side to allow freedom of motion are numerous among the imports. These are without belts or any suggestion of a waistline.

Among the frocks designed for young girls are several high or normal waisted models but these are made with the detached string belt so they may also be worn in long-waisted manner. There is no great rush toward the use of the high waist-line. At least it isn't evidenced among the new frocks which all show either the long waist-line or follow the beltless idea. Some of the flappers are striving to introduce the high waist but few are slender enough to find it a becoming style, for in order to effectively wear a high waist-line one must wear a corset of some description.

## Predicts Standing Room on Earth After Year 3,000

LONDON, Sept. 4.—If the human race continues to multiply at its present rate, standing room on the earth will be filled when the population reached 100 billion in the year 3,000.

This is the prophecy made by Professor J. W. Gregor, F. R. S., president of the geography section, in his address at the Toronto meeting of the British association.

"From 1906 to 1910," he said, "the population of the world grew at the rate of doubling in 60 years. If this rate were maintained the 6,600 millions of people which it is calculated is the most that the world can feed would be in existence in 120 years.

"Even if the food supply were indefinitely multiplied by the precipitation of the nitrogen of the atmosphere as a constant rain of manna, standing room on the earth, exclusive of the remote Arctic and Antarctic, would be all filled when the population numbered seven billion in the year 3,000."

## DEAN BUTTE WILL OPPOSE MIRIAM

Head of Texas Law School Chosen by Republicans as Nominee For Governor of State.

### ANTI KLAN, PROHIBITIONIST

Given Nomination in Preference to Zweifel, Federal District Attorney, After Long Session.

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 4.—Dr. George Butte, dean of the Law School, Texas University, was unanimously selected Republican nominee for Governor succeeding T. P. Lee, Houston, resigned, by the Republican State Executive Committee here after four hours session.

Butte was given the nomination in preference to Henry Zweifel, attorney of the Federal District, Northern District of Texas. Butte is an anti-Klansman and a prohibitionist, according to Chairman Charles Boynton of Waco.

## VOTE SEWER LINE

Commission Authorizes Line on Bowie Street—Discuss Paving and Sidewalks at Session.

The City Commission met in regular session Thursday afternoon, and important work transacted included the order to lay a sewer line on Bowie street, discussion of a side walk to the high school building, and discussion of paving plans.

A petition signed by a majority of Bowie street residents asked for the line if it was laid. The commission voted to put in the proposed line and work on it will begin soon.

Sidewalks for various sections of the town were discussed, especially a walk on Crane street leading to the High School building, but no action was taken.

Paving bids were to be received at 9 o'clock Friday morning for 5 blocks of re-surfacing and 4 blocks of new paving work. Representatives of paving companies were present at the meeting and showed samples of paving material of various nature.

Official approval of a local plumbing company was granted and the checking up of August accounts concluded the session. The commissioners were in session again Friday morning to receive the paving bids.

## FOOTBALL OFFERS GOOD PROSPECTS

High School Team With New Coach Starts Work Out in Swatter Park—Good Material.

### LOSE FIVE LETTER MEN

Gibson Has Captain Sheppard, Mitchell, Five Old Line Men and Pair of Backs From '23 Machine.

The thud of toes against pigskin is resounding in Swatter Park again where the hopes of Sweetwater High School's football glory began workout for the coming season Wednesday, and an optimistic outlook is on deck at the start, caused by the excellent material that faces the new coach, Joe Gibson.

Although the team this year loses 5 tried and true letter men, at least ten familiar faces will grace the gridiron when the first whistle blows. Probably more letter men than these will be back this year, according to Ben Daniels, who coached the bunch last season, and he stated that some good men with records at other schools would probably strengthen this year's eleven.

Besides James (Shep) Sheppard, fast and dependable quarterback of last season and new captain, there is the veteran war horse full back, Buster Mitchell, who is expected to be at his best this season. Graham Beall, guard, is on hand again with his dependable stuff, with two other guards of last year, E. J. Posey and Doyle Hall. Bob Tucker will probably be on the line again as tackle with Perry Bishop, both last season tackles. Dick Mitchell and Merlin Toler will probably be out again for their old positions as half backs, it is reported.

Such men as Mike Trammell, Farris, Kelsey, Aiken and Hill will be hard to replace on this year's team, but besides the letter men back, there are a number of last year second team men and others who are expected to make some one hop to keep their places on the varsity. Some likely prospects who will put up a stiff battle for a place on the eleven this season, it is reported, are Burton Herring, Harry Collier, Willie Robbins, Joyce Johnson, Moye Smith, John Calvert, John Lambert, Ted Lambert, William Boyles, Rogers, Alexander and Willis.

Uniforms were issued to the candidates Wednesday afternoon at the workout at Swatter Park. Much new equipment has been obtained for this year, and the team will start off the season with lots of pep, ample uniforms and equipment, and a new coach who has an enviable football record.

Coach Gibson went to Abilene Friday, where he attended a meeting of the athletic coaches and school superintendents from high schools in this district. The season's football schedule for the Sweetwater High School and other schools of the district were made out at this meeting.

## PLAN JAIL BREAK

Prisoner in Jail With Leopold, Loeb Had Rope Made of Clothing Hidden in Cell.

A long rope made of a suit of clothes was found in his cell, two floors beneath the cells of Leopold and Loeb, sheriff Westbrook announced. Westbrook said he was confident that Leopold and Loeb were not involved.

WHITE RACE MENACED.

Eight causes of racial hatred are discussed by Professor William McDougall of Harvard University. Here they are:

One—Expansion of population.

Two—Sex jealousy.

Three—The assertion or expression of a claim of superiority, associated with race pride.

Four—The claim of political ascendancy.

Five—Differences of religious belief.

Six—Economic rivalry, or exploitation of situation leading to slavery.

Seven—Nationalism (patriotism).

Eight—Desire to defend a national culture against disintegration.

It stands to reason that there wouldn't be any racial antagonism to speak of, if every race had for each of its individual members as much wealth, freedom, intelligence and geographical desirability (including food acreage and fertility) as the individual of other races.

So-called racial antagonism is a highbrow name for jealousy. The supremacy of the white race is menaced because the white race has cornered more than its numerical share of humanity's natural resources, intelligence and desirable climate.

Higher scientists of the white race are worried about the world's constantly increasing population. The more population, the more people to envy white possessions. Asiatic yellow and brown races and the black race in Africa are multiplying much faster than whites. The white man, incidentally, is increasing the numerical strength of his rivals by sending millions of dollars and medical brains to curb disease which for centuries has destroyed a large part of the colored races' over-population.

Whether the white race, in this humanitarian way, is sowing the seeds of its own destruction, time will show.

Even more important than the life-saving is that we—in our desire for foreign markets—are raising rival races to a standard of living beyond what can be supplied by their own acreage and natural resources.

However, nature's law of the survival of the fittest is not going to be repealed.

nission's survey has made him less fearful of a shortage of oil in this country. If and when the present reserve of liquid oil is used up, he says, an ample supply can be developed from shale. These deposits in this country are large, he continues. In Kentucky alone it is estimated that 50,000,000,000 barrels of oil could be produced from shale, while Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and other states have almost unlimited supplies. The admiral urges arrangements to prevent any foreign country from selling American oil in foreign markets while it conserved its own oil. This was actually taking place, he said, because more than 60 per cent of the oil sold in foreign markets by the Royal Dutch Shell Oil Company came from the United States. He has found that the Japanese are using American oil in preference to an import from the Dutch East Indies, but allows the country to draw its own inference of the motive for this heavy draft upon American supplies. This expert authority will put hope and pepper into the American motor trade. No shortage of fuel waits just around the corner. It will be as safe as usual to pledge any tangible assets in sight and invest in a next season's model, or to make an extended week-end trip nowhere.
