RAIN IS RECORD FOR MANY YEARS

Drenching Here Reaches 3.53 Inches at Noon Friday With Steady Drizzle Continuing

WILL PUT CROPS OVER

Only Damage to Cotton Slight Lowering of Grade—Seasons Ground, Helps Pasturage.

Sweetwater's share of a statewide rain broke West Texas rain records for many years when 3.53 inches of rain had been reported here by noon Friday. With the skies still cloudy and a drizzle continuing, more than 24 hours of steady rain was in prospect.

Starting with a slow, steady down-pour early Thursday night, rain fell in Sweetwater throughout the night and totaled 3.23 inches at 8 o'clock Friday morning, according to the register of the Sweetwater Vulcanizing Co., volunteer weather observers. This brings the total rainfall of the year to 15.79 inches as compared with 23.72 inches for the same period in 1924. The mercury had fallen to 56 degrees at 9 o'clock Friday morning.

Rain was general east and west of Sweetwater, according to reports from the T-P railroad, with heavy rains as far west as Midland, and east to Baird.

Northeast Texas cities received good rains, according to reports from the Sweetwater Cotton Exchange, with all-night rains at Fort Worth, Dallas, Greenville, Texarkana, Corsicana, Paris, Kaufman, Terrell, Hubbard City, Mansfield, Waco and San Antonio.

Local cotton men are of the opinion that the rain will do slight damage here, although it will probably lower the grade of cotton, it is reported. It was stated that the rain would be beneficial further west if followed by warm weather.

The rain damage of lowering the grade of cotton will be greatly outweighed by the benefits to the entire section, it is stated. Water holes and tanks will be filled, and some water added to the lakes in this vicinity. The rain also assures plenty of fall pasturage and will greatly benefit the grazing country.

Reports to the Santa Fe from Slaton were that the entire division received a good rain that will average half an inch.

The rain extended south to Temple, where rain began falling at 7 o'clock Friday morning and continued throughout most of the day. Rain that began falling at 4 o'clock Friday evening in Brady was general over the entire section and was reported as reaching nearly an inch over the entire section.

No rain report was available from the Orient, due to wire trouble.

Dickson Seeking Earliest Possible Presentation of Case—May Set Date Today.

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 12.—Judge George Calhoun, of the 53rd District Court of Travis County, who returned from a fishing trip today considered the petition filed by Charles Dickson of San Antonio, asking for a writ of temporary injunction against placing the name of Miriam A. Ferguson on the official ballot as a candidate for Governor.

The petition was presented to Calhoun immediately after his arrival at the court house and he was expected to issue an order today setting the case for hearing. Dickson is seeking a hearing at the earliest possible time.

INVITE FLYERS

Chief of Air Service and Flight Commander Asked to Route World Airmen Here.

Following the announcement that the American 'round the world flyers would be routed through Texas on their flight to the Pacific coast, a number of telegrams were at once sent to the Chief of the Air Service and to Lieut. Lowell Smith, commander of the expedition, inviting them to stop in Sweetwater on their jump from Dallas to El Paso. No reply had been received at noon Friday but a message is expected shortly as to whether the famous aviators will alight here.

Stressing Sweetwater's facilities as to an ideal and well marked landing field, and ability to quickly furnish a supply of gasoline, oil and water at the field, Guy E. Morris, agent of the Texas Company here, sent a telegram to the Chief of the Air Service at Washington, inviting the flyers to alight here. Similar messages stating this city's location as nearly midway between Dallas and El Paso, on the T-P railroad between the two cities and that the landing field was recommended by Kelly Field and other transcontinental flyers, were sent by the Board of City Development and The Sweetwater Reporter.

WONT DISCUSS KLAN

He Really Can Not Say Why G. O. P. Selected Him—To Make First Statement on Texas Soil.

By The United Press. NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Informed by radio of his nomination as Republican candidate for Governor of Texas, Dr. George C. Butte, dean of the Law School of the Texas State University, accepted the nomination upon his arrival here today on the Holland-American liner Rotterdam.

Dr. Butte had been abroad attending the Bar Association meeting in London and putting his 20-year-old son, George Jr., in Oxford University. He expressed complete surprise at the nomination, saying that he had never held office, and that he had not asked the chairman of the Texas state committee to be present to meet him. "But it's worth a try" he said in announcing that he would resign his position and open his campaign for Governor in which he is to oppose "Ma" Ferguson.

Pressed for a statement on political views, he declined, saying: "I have nothing to say now. This thing came to me out of a clear sky. When I have a statement to make, I will make it to the home folks on Texas soil."

Asked why he was selected as Republican nominee, he said, "I certainly can not say. I have never been in politics, and the only public office I ever held was to organize the oil and gas department of the Texas Railroads at the State Railroad Commission's request."

As he left to find where the first train would get him to Texas, Dr. Butte said over his shoulder: "I will not discuss the Ku Klux Klan."

CLAIMS VICTORY

Chinese General Says Troops Are Advancing on Chang Chow—Protect Americans.

By The United Press. SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 12.—The most important victory to date of the war in the Kiang Su province was claimed today by General Lu, who announced that his troops had captured Irsing Kaiho, and were advancing on Chang Chow.

The movement is to cut the line of communication of the army of General Chi, who is attacking Lu here in Shanghai.

Following the announcement that the American round the world flyers would be routed through Texas on their flight to the Pacific coast, a number of telegrams were at once sent to the Chief of the Air Service and to Lieut. Lowell Smith, commander of the expedition, inviting them to stop in Sweetwater on their jump from Dallas to El Paso. No reply had been received at noon Friday but a message is expected shortly as to whether the famous aviators will alight here.

Stressing Sweetwater's facilities as to an ideal and well marked landing field, and ability to quickly furnish a supply of gasoline, oil and water at the field, Guy E. Morris, agent of the Texas Company here, sent a telegram to the Chief of the Air Service at Washington, inviting the flyers to alight here. Similar messages stating this city's location as nearly midway between Dallas and El Paso, on the T-P railroad between the two cities and that the landing field was recommended by Kelly Field and other transcontinental flyers, were sent by the Board of City Development and The Sweetwater Reporter.

A personal message was sent to Lieut. Smith by a friend of the aviator's during war days at Kelly Field.

BUTTE SURPRISED AT NOMINATION

Republican Candidate For Governor Accepts on Arrival in N. Y.—First Political Venture.

WONT DISCUSS KLAN

He Really Can Not Say Why G. O. P. Selected Him—To Make First Statement on Texas Soil.

By The United Press. NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Informed by radio of his nomination as Republican candidate for Governor of Texas, Dr. George C. Butte, dean of the Law School of the Texas State University, accepted the nomination upon his arrival here today on the Holland-American liner Rotterdam.

Dr. Butte had been abroad attending the Bar Association meeting in London and putting his 20-year-old son, George Jr., in Oxford University. He expressed complete surprise at the nomination, saying that he had never held office, and that he had not asked the chairman of the Texas state committee to be present to meet him.

"But it's worth a try" he said in announcing that he would resign his position and open his campaign for Governor in which he is to oppose "Ma" Ferguson.

Pressed for a statement on political views, he declined, saying: "I have nothing to say now. This thing came to me out of a clear sky. When I have a statement to make, I will make it to the home folks on Texas soil."

Asked why he was selected as Republican nominee, he said, "I certainly can not say. I have never been in politics, and the only public office I ever held was to organize the oil and gas department of the Texas Railroads at the State Railroad Commission's request."

As he left to find when the first train would get him to Texas, Dr. Butte said over his shoulder: "I will not discuss the Ku Klux Klan."

CLAIMS VICTORY

Chinese General Says Troops Are Advancing on Chang Chow—Protect Americans.

By The United Press. SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 12.—The most important victory to date of the war in the Kiang Su province was claimed today by General Lu, who announced that his troops had captured Irsing Kaiho, and were advancing on Chang Chow.

The movement is to cut the line of communication of the army of General Chi, who is attacking Lu before Shanghai.

Nangkin, from where Chi started his march to Shanghai, is unprotected. If Lu's army has really succeeded in turning Chi's left flank, the Nangkin railway is threatened.

There are many Americans in Nangkin, and American destroyers have rushed up the river to protect them, in the event Lu's army captures the city.

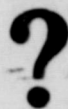

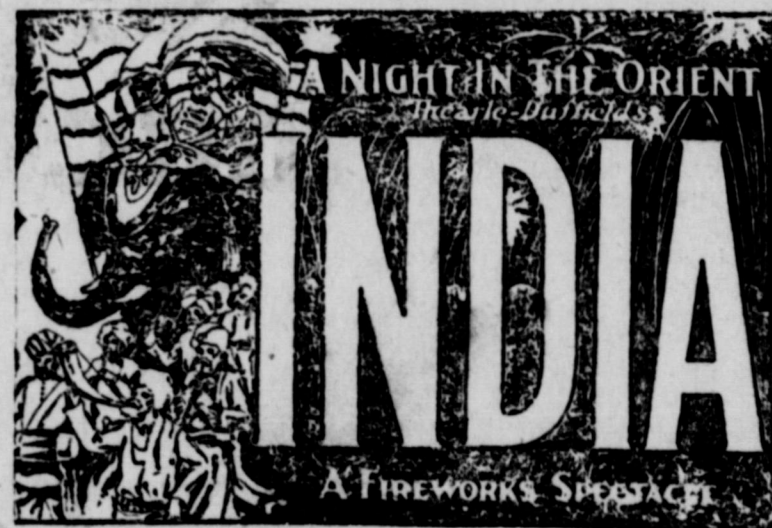

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 12.—Louie England, 38, widely known leader in state labor circles, dropped dead in a hotel here Thursday. Death was due to natural causes, it was stated.

FILIPINO OUTBREAK

National Guards and Laborers Clash—16 Killed.

HONOLULU, Sept. 12.—National guard troops have been rushed to the island of Lihue Kauai where riots between striking Filipino plantation island workers and members of the constabulary have resulted in three police and thirteen Filipinos killed. Scores of strikers have been wounded, according to official reports.

The trouble started when police sought to free two Filipinos held by strikers at their headquarters against their will. When police arrived to free the men, other strikers attacked them with knives and clubs. Police resisted and when strikers opened fire, they replied to the volley, killing

thirteen, and losing three of their own numbers.

This is the first serious outbreak since 1913.
