PERSHING PASSES

Friday night after the Defense Day tests were in, General John J. Pershing locked up his desk at the War Department and officially ended the greatest career in American military history for several generations.

Born on the Missouri frontier in a region of strife between the Abolitionists and Slave Holders, he overcame hardships, early in life, and learned the mastery of himself and others.

After graduation and five years in Indian fighting on the Mexican border and in the Northwest, Pershing was assigned duty at the University of Nebraska, where he took advantage of the opportunity offered and completed his work for a law degree. Ever eager to work, learn, and advance in the service, he was given the coveted post of instructor at West Point by General Miles, Chief of Staff. 

Then from the crowd step out three or four "doers." They put their shoulders to the wheel lending both effort and example until others follow them. The thing begins to move—gains momentum as all things do when once out of a rut.

And so, also, it is with civic progress—community movements, local enterprise—when "doers put their shoulders to the wheel."





Thomas was born in Ohio, educated in Colorado, Indiana and Illinois, and was a newspaper man in Colorado and Chicago. He was at one time a member of the faculty of Princeton University.
