**MODERN EDUCATION**

The old fashioned plan of giving girls education in only those matters pertaining to their house-wifely duties, such as cooking, sewing and making a home is now giving way to an education which will fit them to take an equal position with boys in the business world. Now girls have a chance to learn these subjects which pertain to business. In fact, the enrollment records of the Kansas City schools show that the girls have even a better chance than the boys.

This year there are 7,424 girls enrolled in the high schools as compared with 6,864 boys, 560 more girls. Last year there were 842 more girls enrolled than boys.

These figures show that women realize that if they are to mingle in the business world they need and must have an education. The girls, who a few years ago, took courses in music and painting, are now practicing shorthand and trying to remember their shorthand symbols.

Records in the elementary school where education is compulsory show that last year there were 25,908 boys and 24,652 girls enrolled. A study of the progress of pupils through the elementary grades in Kansas City reveals that Kansas City pupils complete the seven grades in an average time of 7.45 years. In Kansas City 75 per cent of all school children enter high school and take at least a part of the high school course. In this city 29 per cent of the children who enter the elementary grades complete the high school course. The percentage of high school graduates entering college runs from 41 to 71 per cent, with an average of 57 per cent of the graduates of all high schools.

**COSTS RISE**

Retail Food Prices Higher, Says Dept. of Labor.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 16.—Retail food costs are on the rise, according to the Department of Labor. Out of eighteen cities selected thirteen showed upward moving retail food prices during the month July 15—August 16.

Four of the cities found food two per cent more expensive, six showed one per cent, and two others somewhat less than one-half of one per cent.

The five other cities selected showed a decrease of from one to two per cent.

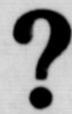

In the center of a table, around which sat a party of men, was a keg of beer encased in a large wooden container packed with ice. Cheese sandwiches were heaped on a side table.

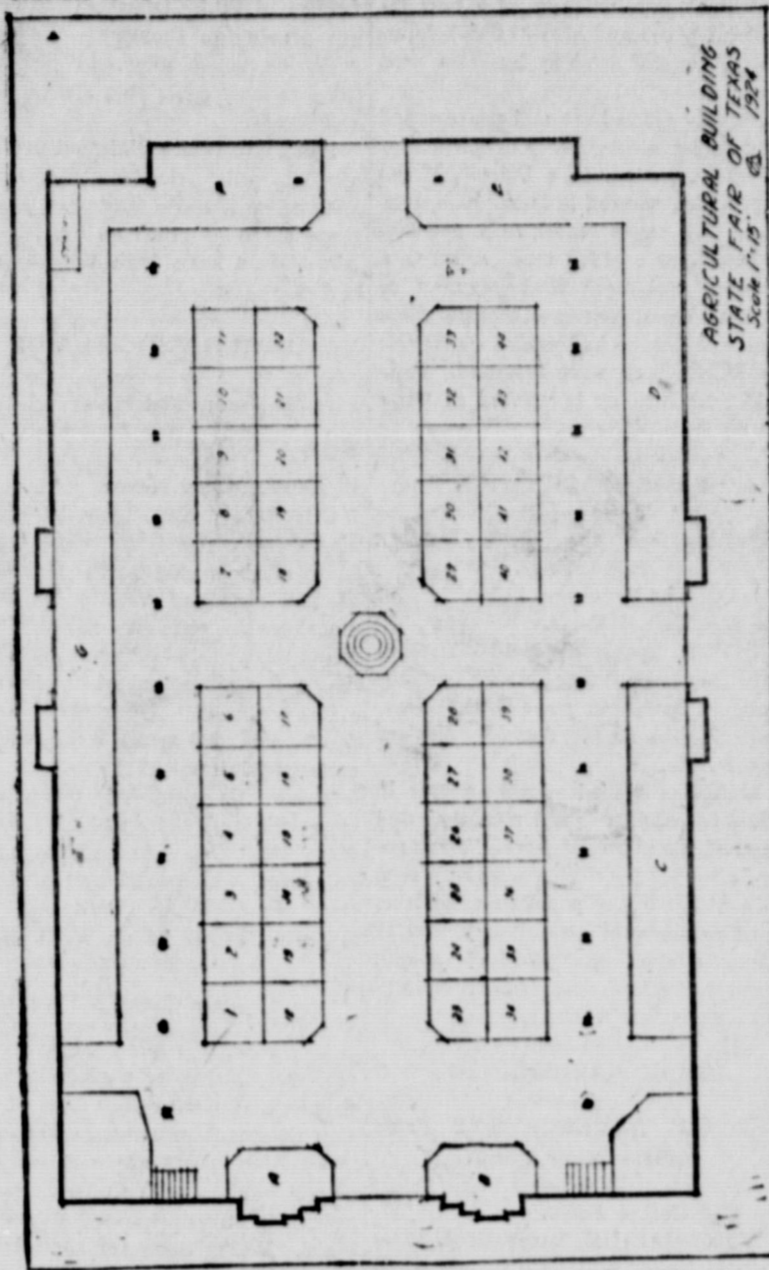
While the officers "looked in" on the party several persons arrived in cars but left when they saw the officers. Three of the party about the table were placed under arrest.

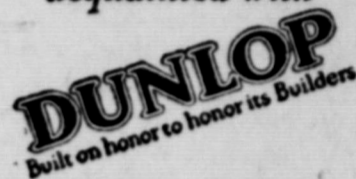

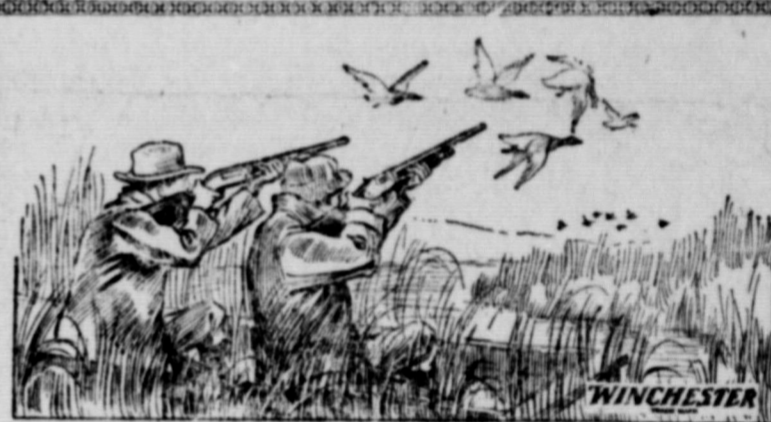

Promoter Leaves With \$1,000—Wanted For Fraud.
