## World Flyers Visit Sweetwater Field

### Famous Aviators Break Long Hop to El Paso—Refuel Planes, Take Lunch at Landing Field.

### PHOTOGRAPHIC PLANE WRECKED

### Forced Landing in Dog Town Tears Up Machine—World Flyers In El Paso 7:13 p. m., Saturday.

EL PASO, Texas, Sept. 20.—The American world flyers completed their 625 mile hop from Dallas, landing here at 7:13 Central Standard time. The weary flyers crawled from their planes and were greeted by 10,000 persons who had waited since early afternoon to catch a glimpse of them.

The airmen were met at Sierra Blanca, 90 miles east of here. The 625 mile hop from Dallas required ten hours and two minutes by six planes from Fort Bliss and escorted to the landing field.

One hour and ten minutes was taken at Sweetwater where the flight was held up while the machines were refueled and oil changed in the engine of the Boston.

Tentative plans called for the departure of the flyers for Tucson at about 10 o'clock Sunday morning.

The photographic plane piloted by Lieut. George Goddard was wrecked at 5:40 when a landing was forced at Barstow by engine trouble. The plane landed in a prairie dog town, and was so damaged that further flight was impossible. Neither the pilot nor the mechanic was injured.

Circling gracefully over the Sweetwater landing field, while thousands cheered, the American "Round the World Flyers" landed in Sweetwater Saturday at noon, breaking their long flight across Texas from Dallas to El Paso. They arrived here at 12:37 p. m., making the 230 odd miles from Dallas in just three hours, following their hop-off at 9:10 a. m.

The three "Round the World" flyers were accompanied by three escort planes, who arrived at 10:15 a. m., 12:15 p. m., and 12:30 p. m. respectively. The first plane, piloted by Lieut. Moffett, left shortly after arrival, after having secured necessary gas, oil, etc.

The other two planes, however, hopped off with the "Round the World" flyers, all five planes getting away at 1:50 p. m.

They passed Colorado at 2:19 p. m., and Big Spring, 70 miles west, at 2:48.

A pilot plane driven by Lieut. Wright and a photographic plane driven by Lieut. Goddard, were refueled and re-oiled here, as were the others. The Boston II oil tank was drained and refilled with 20 gallons of oil. A broken valve spring on one of the other planes was also repaired while the flyers were here.

Had Lunch at Field.

The airmen declined an invitation to partake of a special lunch that had been prepared for them at the Hotel Wright pleading lack of time. They all gathered in the shadow of a wing of one of the gigantic planes, however, and drank coffee and ate sandwiches and cake hastily prepared for them by the American Legion Auxiliary, Mrs. Warren, Clara May Warren, and Miss Stella Watson.

Mayor Joe H. Boothe, James Henry Beall, president of the Luncheon Club, and other city officials were on hand to greet the visitors who were also remembered with cigars and cigarettes.

It was not certain that the flyers would land here. Efforts to that end had not met with encouraging results but a wire received by the Sweetwater Vulcanizing Co., early Saturday ordering gasoline and other supplies to be in readiness advised that the world flyers "might land."

Sighted at 12:30.

An enormous crowd gathered at the landing field after the rumor was passed that the flyers might stop here. Shortly after noon came the De Haviland flown by Lieut. Wright, followed a few minutes later by Goddard with the photographic outfit that has accompanied the flyers since their arrival in the United States.

Shortly after 12:30 the three "Round the World" Planes, flying in formation, were sighted to the eastward. There was a signal of trailing smoke from one of the planes. They swung on and on, without sign of turning in to the landing field. Just as it seemed they would pass on by, the trailing plane began to circle and soon landed, its wheels kissing the ground at 12:37 p. m. It was driven by Lieut. Leigh Wade with Lieut. Harry Ogden, mechanic.

It developed that this plane was having trouble with the oil feed and

### HUNT WITH TRACTORS

### Alligator Hunters Get New Wrinkle on Sport.

ORANGE, Texas, Sept. 20.—Alligator hunters have introduced a new innovation in the sport in this section. Light weight tractors are now being used by the hunters both to drag the animals from their dens and to chase them out of dry swamps.

The tractors are said by the hunters to be the only force effective in pulling some of the old 'gators from their dens with safety to the operator who opens the throttle with every lunge of the beast. Hunters testify that the animals make the metal construction of a tractor ring with their tails when they slap them at close range and operators have learned to drive their tractors out of the way if possible.

Veteran hunters estimate that 15,000 alligators have been killed in the swamps of southeast Louisiana in the past year but that the number apparently hasn't diminished.

## THREE MISSING

### Search For Woman and Two Men Missing Since Hotel Fire Given Up By Officers.

MC ALESTER, Ok., Sept. 20.—Officials who began the search of the ruins of the Busbee Hotel destroyed by fire Monday abandoned the search tonight for the bodies of three persons missing since the fire.

A man and a woman registered under the names of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Earl have been missing since Monday, police said. Employees of the hotel stated that they registered at the hotel shortly before the fire.

Reports reached authorities late today that a man named Fairbanks, said to be a wealthy oil operator of Tulsa and Holdenville had not been located. He is said to have registered at the Busbee Monday night.

## DICKSON FAVORS EQUAL SUFFRAGE

### Director of Injunction Against Eligibility of "Ma" Ferguson Issues Statement.

### DISCUSSES IMPEACHMENT Would Bar Disqualification Six Years After Judgment—Proposes Two Amendments.

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 20.—Charles M. Dickson of San Antonio, plaintiff in the injunction suit brought to prevent the name of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson from being placed on the official ballot as Democratic nominee for Governor because of her alleged ineligibility, today issued the following statement:

"If Mrs. Ferguson should be held ineligible under the constitution to hold the office of Governor, I shall be pleased to join other citizens in urging the next session of the legislature to submit to the vote of the people a proper constitutional amendment making women eligible for public office and placing them on equal terms with men in all political matters as well as in private affairs.

"I would also favor the submission of a constitutional amendment providing that any officer heretofore impeached or hereafter impeached may not be disqualified or debarred from holding public office for a longer period than six years from the date of the impeached judgment."

## JAPS HELP CHANG ACCUSES DAWES

### Use of Manchurian Railway for Transportation Troops Not Neutrality Breach, Declared.

TOKIO, Japan, Sept. 20.—The Japanese government has granted permission to Chang Tso Lin, Manchurian dictator, to use the Southern Manchurian railway in his operations against the Peking government.

Chang requested the use of the railway to transport troops and military supplies early in the week, following his declaration of war upon General Wu Pei Fu and the Central Regime.

"Granting permission for transportation of troops over the Southern Manchurian railway is in accordance with precedent and does not in any way constitute the breach of Japan's neutrality in the Chinese civil war," an official statement said.

## ATTACKING ARMY AT CITY GATES

### Victorious Chi Troops in Shanghai Suburbs—Looting Reported in Native Quarter.

WASHINGTON ANXIOUS

### Fear Consequences of Chang Movement in Stirring up Other Discontented War Lords.

SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 30.—The victorious Kiangsuo troops battered at the gates of Shanghai tonight.

With his armies already entering the suburbs of the city, General Chi consolidated the victories of the day in preparing for the renewal of his attack on the great China sea port at dawn tomorrow.

It is believed that the defeat of the Chekiang allies of Chang Tso Lin, Manchurian war lord, will be complete in a week. The heavy bombardment carried on through the day had lulled as this dispatch was filled, the contending forces apparently too tired to keep up the fighting during the night. There was confusion in the Chinese quarter, with some looting reported.

Washington Worried.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 20.—Government officials were increasingly anxious tonight over the Chinese civil war situation, despite the fact that the fighting around Shanghai promised to end soon with the victory for General Chi, ally of the Peking government.

The war which has begun along the great Chinese wall between Wu Pei Fu and Chang Tso Lin is regarded here as much more serious than the local conflict around Shanghai.

While more American lives and property are endangered in the Shanghai area than in Manchuria, fear is expressed here that Chang's attempted invasion may be the signal for the uprising of all the war lords of Central China who are restless under the Peking government and the military dominance of Wu Pei Fu.

Troops Annihilated.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 20.—Five hundred soldiers of the defeated army of General Lu, refusing to surrender to the Chi forces near Leibo in the battle of Shanghai, were literally annihilated, according to reports received here. The number of wounded was estimated at 1,500 and several hundred were killed outright.

### Wheeler, Independent Candidate, Says Republican Nominee "Lent Himself" to Fraudulent Transaction.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 30.—A charge that Charles G. Dawes "lent himself" to a fraudulent bank transaction that robbed 400 Chicago citizens of their savings, was made in a speech here tonight by Burton K. Wheeler, his independent vice presidential opponent.

Wheeler cited the court records in the Lorimer bank case in his contention that Dawes had conspired to furnish \$1,250,000 for a few hours to a ruined bank without collateral, so that the bank records could be shown to examiners.

The bank went to the wall some months later and wiped out the savings of the depositors.

"The part that Dawes had taken became known to the receiver and he discovered the trick that Dawes and Lorimer had played. He brought suit to hold Dawes' bank liable for the \$1,250 used in the perpetration of this fraud upon the public," Wheeler said.

## GRANTS REPRIEVE TO ACCUSED BOY

### Governor Small Gives Bernard Grant 90 Day Reprieve—Sentenced to Hang October 17.

### GOOD NEWS, BOY SAYS Declares He Believes Small Will Grant Pardon—Mother Weeps When She Gets Word.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Sept. 29.—Governor Len Small of Illinois today granted a 90-day reprieve to Bernard Grant, "back of the yards" boy who was sentenced to hang for the murder of a policeman.

## SURVEY MAY SET NAVAL POLICIES

### President Recalls Secretary of Navy From West Coast to Begin Comparative Survey.

STUDY PLANES, SHIPS, SUBS

### Would Determine Relative Value in Naval Warfare—Naval Board Will Analyze Material.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 20.—Secretary of the Navy Wilbur today took the leadership in an expert study which may do much to settle the future of the American naval policy.

At the direction of President Coolidge, Wilbur inaugurated an intensive survey of the relative importance of air craft, battle ships, and submarines in naval warfare.

Having set in motion the machinery for the accumulation of the essential data Wilbur next week will appoint a board of naval officers to analyze the material. He had a long conference with the president today and at its conclusion announced that the sole reason for his sudden recall from California was the President's desire that he begin the survey at the earliest possible moment.

## FIRST GAME IS EASY FOR PUPS

### Baird Coyotes Fail to Score, Come Out on Short End of 87-0 Count—First Quarter, 26-0.

SECOND TEAM STEAM ROLLER

### Subs Crush Lighter Opponents—Sweetwater Backs Gain Consistently Through Line.

The Sweetwater Salty Pups drew a bleeding howl out of the Baird Coyotes at Swatter Park Friday afternoon, and romped away with the opening game of the season, with the staggering score of 87-0. The Baird high school eleven, light and inexperienced, showed good stuff and determination, but could make no dent in the heavy line of the fighting Pups, who showed up well for so early in the season.

The first score came in the first three minutes of play, when, after Baird kicked off and the ball was returned for a good gain by Rogers, the Pups carried the ball to the 30 yard line by a series of line plunges, followed by a 30-yard run by Toler who carried the ball across for the opening count. Sheppard kicked goal.

The second count came when, after Sweetwater got the ball on a Coyote fumble, Buster Mitchell went through the line in a head-long plunge, plowing his way across the goal line, and Sheppard again kicked goal.

The Coyotes received the kickoff and returned the ball for 20 yards then punted on the first down. After a few ground gaining line plunges, Mitchell raced 30 yards for the third touch down. Sheppard failed to kick goal. Baird received the kick off and punted on the first down, Mitchell returning the ball 15 yards. Toler made the touch down on the fourth plunge and Sheppard missed goal. Sweetwater kicked off and Baird returned the ball for 30 yards then punted. The first quarter ended, Salty Pups 26, Baird 0.

The Coyotes were penalized for holding in the opening of the second quarter, advancing the Salty Pups to the 5 yard line, and Johnson carried the ball over for the fifth touchdown and Sheppard kicked goal. Sweetwater continued their steady advances and touchdowns through the first half, piling the score up to 60-0 at the end of the half.

The second team of Salty Pups was put in against the Coyotes by Coach Gibson in the second half, and the subs duplicated the first team advances and touchdowns throughout the last half. Boyles and Toler opened the half with long gaining runs after which Boyles went across for the second team's initial score and Toler kicked goal. Baird punted after the kickoff and Boyles carried the ball over for the second count with an end run.

The Coyotes broke the line plunges and end run plays in the last quarter by opening up an aerial attack. A series of forward passes failed, and the Pups continued their steady scoring. Boyles carried the ball across the line for the last touchdown, and Sheppard kicked goal. The Coyotes were on the 30-yard line when the whistle blew.

**FLYER**

Sweetwater's location, its landing field, no less than the facilities available here for furnishing service to aviators in the way of gas, oil and other supplies were deciding factors in enabling this town to be gloriously privileged Saturday when it was host to the 'Round the World flyers. Sweetwater is the smallest town in the United States to be thus honored and is one of but three in the large State of Texas. And for the moment this town was permitted to share in the fierce glare of publicity with which the flyers' triumphant return across the United States is being featured in the press of the day.

The only regrettable feature is that advance notice of the landing here could not be given so that the many thousands in West Texas eager to pay homage to these American heroes could come to Sweetwater.

However Sweetwater met the demands of the situation easily and sent the flyers on their way with their every need taken care of and with the knowledge that they were indeed welcome here.

And residents of Sweetwater and their children will have something to cherish in their memory as long as they live—something as epochal as if they had been allowed to see Magellan four centuries ago, or the Pilgrim Fathers when they landed on bleak New England shores.

**BOOTLEG**

It has been the history of oil fields that they prove fruitful fields for the bootlegger and the hi-jacker, and it appears that the Reagan county field, newest and largest oil area in the United States, is to be no exception. Bootlegging, according to complaint made by operators in the field, is on the increase. Being an unwelcome addition for the law abiding element there, they have petitioned Barton to send Rangers, which, according to press dispatches, has already been done.

While it is to be regretted that lawlessness ordinarily accompanies oil field development, it is a mighty acceptable thing to see the attitude of Reagan county citizens in their strong effort to stamp it out before the lawless element obtains a foothold. Strict enforcement of the law, without fear or favor will keep Big Lake and other oil field towns much cleaner than many of their predecessors in Texas have been.

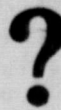

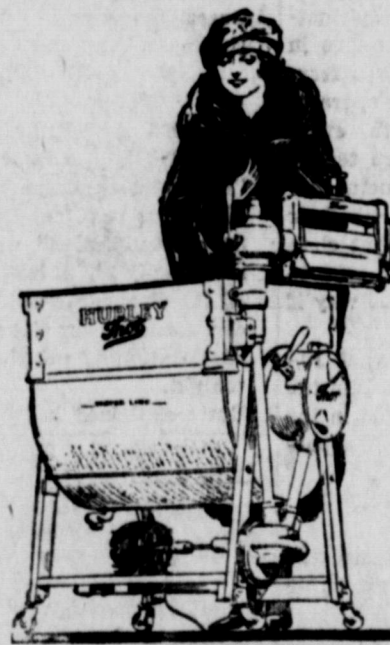

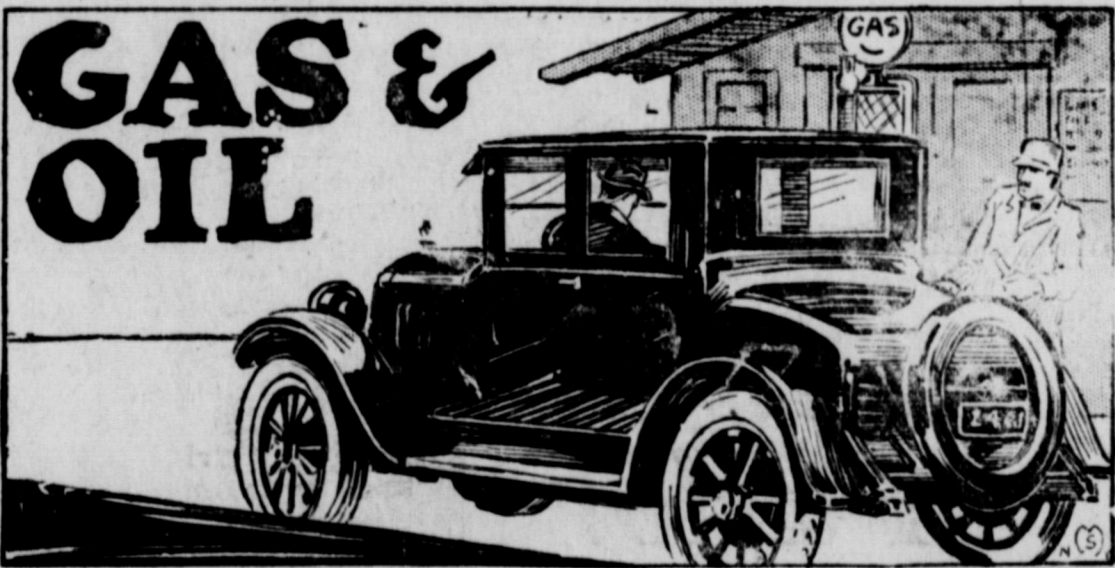

his statement that he had "no political ambitions, but I am taking a sporting chance in what I believe to be a great and righteous cause, preservation of constitutional government in Texas."

The Republican nominee charged former Governor Ferguson with "subterfuge" in placing the name of Mrs. Miriam Ferguson on the ticket, and declared the act was "in effect a subversion of the laws and constitution of the state," inasmuch as the former Governor had been barred from holding office in the state courts.

Butte reiterated the statement that he was not a member of the Ku Klux Klan and would "never have any alliance with it." In that connection, he declined to re-open the Klan debate, declaring that a newer issue than the one decided August 23 confronts the people.

"The issue today," the statement said, "is whether the people of Texas are so concerned with party consistency that they are willing to sacrifice righteousness and decency, ignore the courts of Texas, and the fundamental law of the land, and put the stamp of approval on Mr. Ferguson and all he has stood for in Texas."

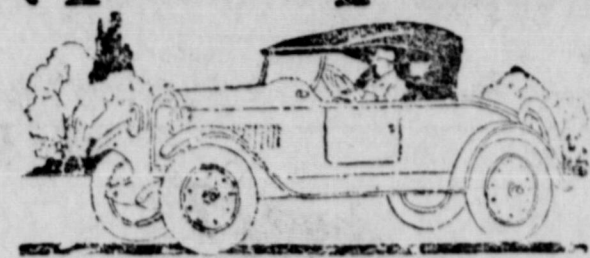

**REVOKE FUNDS**

**Commissioners Withdraw Annual \$1,200 Appropriation For Home Demonstration Agent.**

At a recent meeting of the Commissioners Court, the \$1,200 appropriation set aside annually out of the funds of Nolan County to supplement the funds of A. & M. College and the U. S. Department of Agriculture in paying the salary of the Nolan County Home Demonstration Agent, was revoked, to become effective December 1.

The appropriation of this sum began in 1921, it was stated, and has been a part of the salary paid the Home Demonstration agent. In the act, which was passed by the Commissioners in that year, reservation was made that the appropriation might be revoked on an order from the Commissioners Court.

Whether or not this will do away with the office of Home Demonstration Agent, held by Miss Mable Spann, will depend on whether another appropriation is made. If no other funds are set aside for this office, it will be automatically discontinued December 1.

This ruling does not effect the office of County Farm Agent.

Recent changes made in court house offices by the Commissioners' Court include the moving of the County Superintendent's office and equipment to its original room in the basement. The Farm Demonstration and Home Demonstration Agents' offices were moved from the second floor to the third floor in the County Surveyor's office. The office and equipment of the U. S. Revenue Collector has been moved to the Justice of Peace office in the basement.

The dancer, according to court attaches here, alleges she gave Tremaine the bonds to take care of and she has heard no more of them, and that he has refused to render an account of return the securities. She divorced Tremaine several years ago, and later married her present husband, a wealthy Chicagoan.

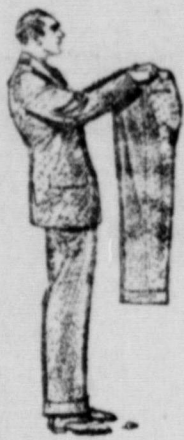

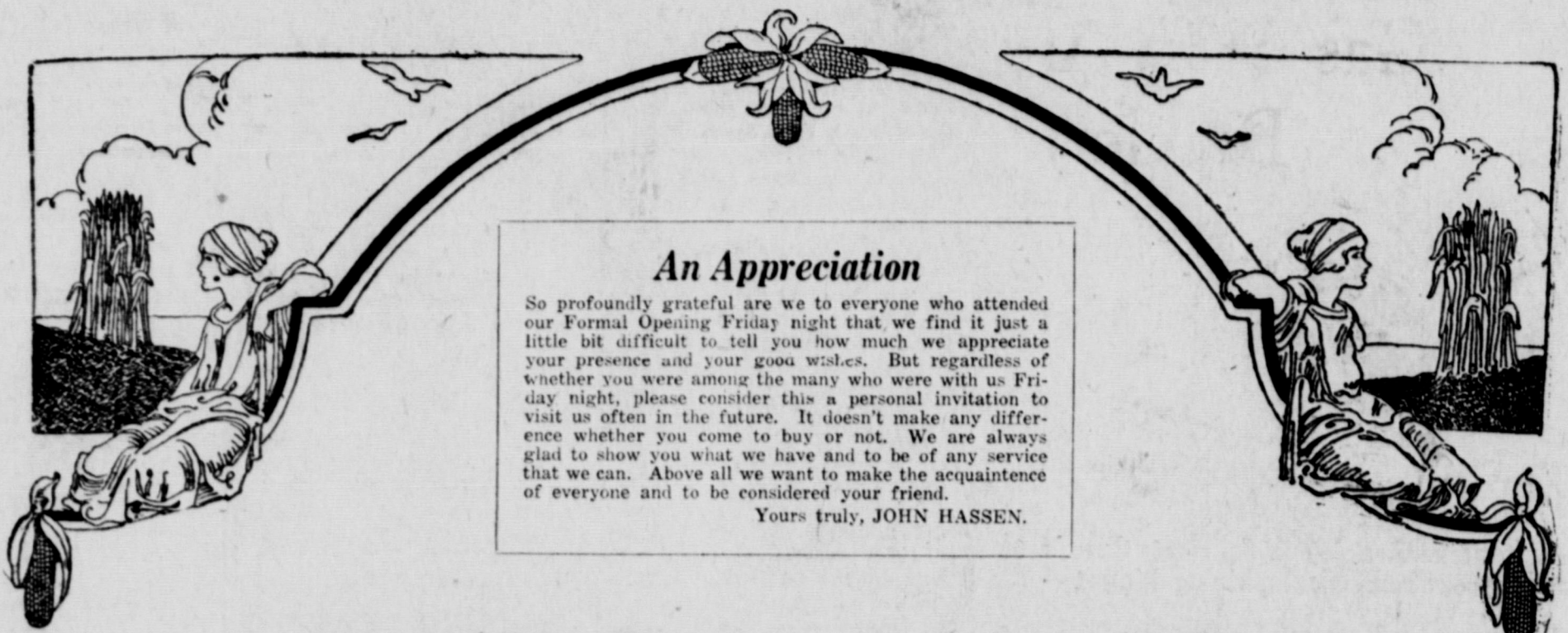

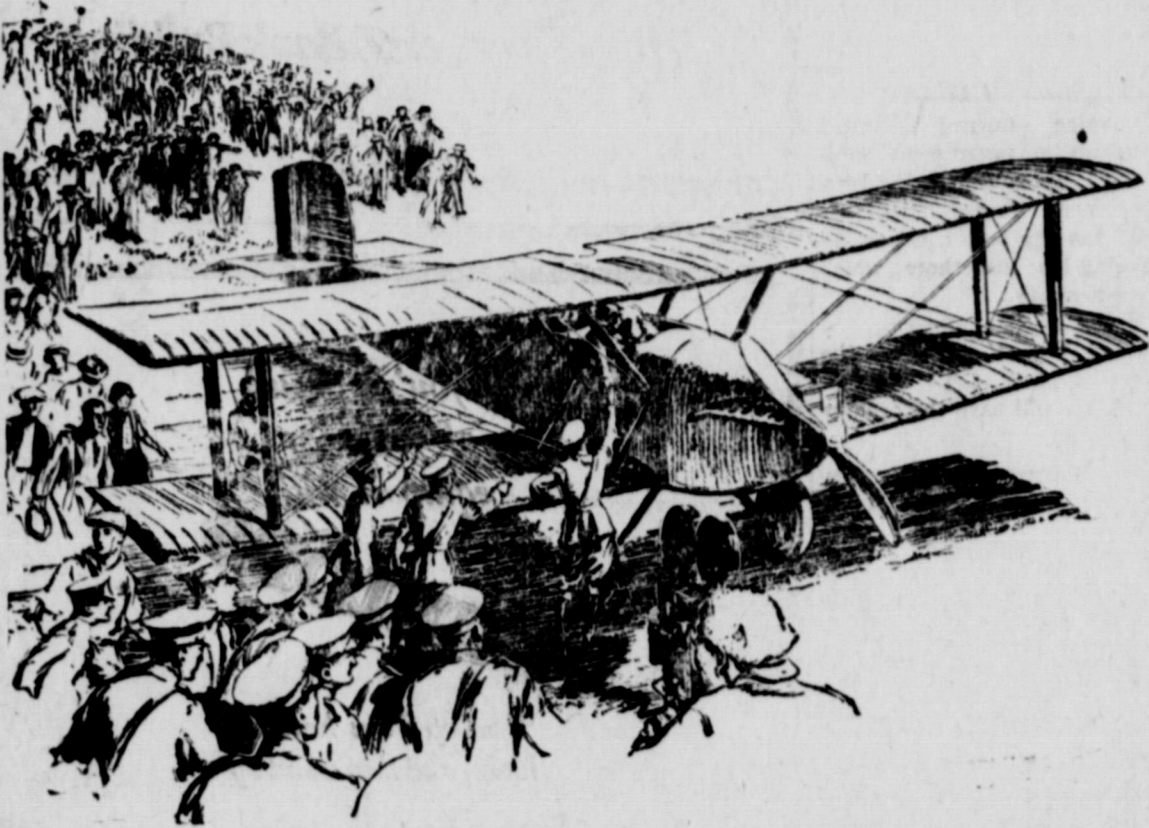

### "TAMERLANE" FOR A SHILLING.

British Museum Obtains Copy of Poe's Poem Worth 2,350 Pounds.

Milton Waldman in the London Mercury.

The history of "Tamerlane" is unique among American books. Until the early eighties it remained totally unrecognized because of its anonymity. Even Duyekink's classic, Cyclopaedia of American Literature, which was completed in 1866, makes no mention of it.

The first known copy came to light in London some time shortly before 1884. At that time the British Museum had a contract with Henry Stevens & Son, whereby the book-sellers were to supply it with all American pamphlets, which it did not possess, at a shilling apiece. Among a bundle so delivered was "Tamerlane and Other Poems," by a Bostonian, which the museum's librarian promptly recognized; what

the ignorance of Stevens' clerk cost his firm will appear shortly.

Of the remaining three copies extant, two were formerly in the possession of Mr. Frederick Halsey, the well-known New York collector; one of them he bought at the Ives auction in 1893 for 370 pounds; the other, known as the McKee copy, he acquired in 1890 for 450 pounds. Mr. Halsey sold both copies to Henry E. Huntington, who kept one and later resold the other to Mr. Halsey. At the sale of the remainder of the latter's library in 1919 it was acquired by the late George D. Smith for 2,350 pounds—the highest price ever paid for a book by an American author.

"Tamerlane" was published in 1827 in Boston, where Poe had gone to enter the army. Just before his enlistment he had become friendly with a youth about his own age, Calvin F. S. Thomas, the proprietor of a newly opened printing shop. The first creation of the young poet was

the first and only venture of the young printer in the book trade. The result was a sad failure for both; the verses fell into speedy oblivion, the friendship terminated abruptly, and Thomas moved West; he never thereafter referred to his association with "Tamerlane" or its author.

to insure remedying it, a fresh twenty gallons of oil was put in its tanks.

After circling the field several times, the "Chicago" driven by Lieut. Lowell Smith, flight commander, landed, followed within two minutes by the "New Orleans," driven by Lieut. Nelson, with Lieut. Harding as mechanic. The mechanic with Lieut. Smith was Lieut. Leslie Arnold. A broken valve spring on the New Orleans was replaced also while the flyers were here.

### Find Friends Here.

There were many photographs snapped of the historic event. Perhaps the most interesting meeting was between Lieut. Smith and Dr. G. Burton Fain who recently moved to Sweetwater from Blackwell. These two served together at Mather Field near Sacramento, Calif., for 18 months back in 1918, 1919. J. A. McCurdy, secretary of the Board of City Development, was also personally acquainted with Lieut. Smith, they having served together at Kelly Field at San Antonio during the war while Mr. McCurdy was in charge of student flyer training in Texas.

Rev. J. T. McKissick found a friend in the person of Lieut. John Harding whose home is at Nashville, Tenn.

The Douglas planes, which carried the world circlers, were a surprise to the crowd when they landed. Those present had expected to see something big in the way of airplane, but they had not expected to see a machine almost as stupendous as a modern railroad locomotive, with wings that might shade a respectable truck garden. The pilots and their mechanics, sitting in the cockpit as the planes were taxied in, looked almost as if they were in the second story of a house. One had to crane his neck back and lift his chin to the sky to see the faces of the flyers. The front cockpit of any one of the huge flying machines appeared nearly eighteen feet from the ground.

The portion of the machines covering the motor and containing the cockpits was painted a silver color. From here back to the rudder the color of each plane was the olive of the army, while the wings were also olive. The rudders were red, white and blue, while the horizontal "tail" of each plane was a bright yellow. Just below the cockpits of each ship there was painted a picture of the earth, with two American eagles surrounding it with their wings, one eagle on either side. Above the representation of the globe were the words: "Air Service, U. S. A.—World Flight."

### Fastest Plane in U. S.

It was not learned until the World Flyers landed that the plane driven by Lieut. Moffett was probably the fastest plane in the United States. It recently made the round trip from Boston to New York in less time than

required by a train to make the trip one way. It is a Curtiss plane powered by a Curtiss motor, of a much heavier type than the big Liberty motors in the Douglas planes of the World Flyers and the De Havillands of the escorts. It made the trip from Dallas to Sweetwater in two hours and just "loafed" Lieut. Moffett said.

That is flying at the rate of around 125 miles an hour. It is known as the new United States Scout plane. Its speed is well over 200 miles an hour.

### Photo Plane Wrecked.

Special to The Reporter. BARSTOW, Texas, Sept. 20.—Forced to land by engine trouble, the photographic plane accompanying the round the world flyers on their jump from Sweetwater to El Paso, landed in a prairie dog town near here at 5:40 this afternoon, and was wrecked. The plane was piloted by Lieut. George Goddard. Neither Goddard nor his mechanic were injured.

Over 250 gallons of gas and 30 gallons of oil were taken aboard the various planes during their stay here. The Round the World Flyers took 25 gallons each. Lieut. Moffat in the fast Curtiss plane took 40 gallons, Lieut. Wright 63 gallons and Lieut. Goddard 74 gallons. While the stop in Sweetwater was unscheduled and unofficial it followed many days of personal effort on the part of Guy Morris, who has made several trips to different cities in the interest of Sweetwater.

Earl Freeze returned Saturday morning from a government sanitarium at El Paso where he has been under treatment. Freeze is looking fine and has gained considerable weight during his stay there which lasted over a month.

Mrs. Chitwood became widely

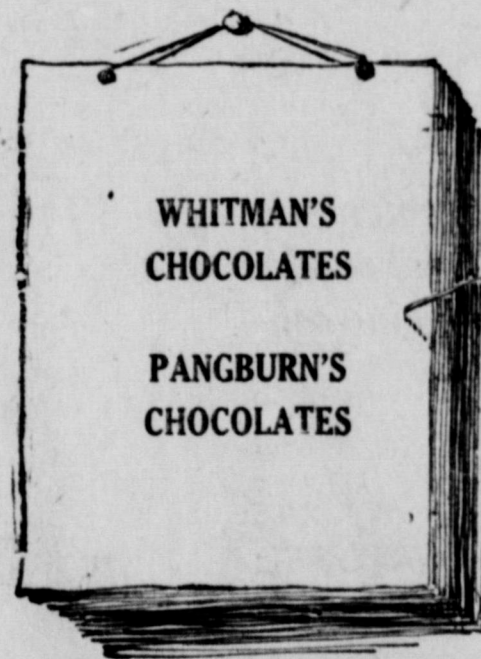

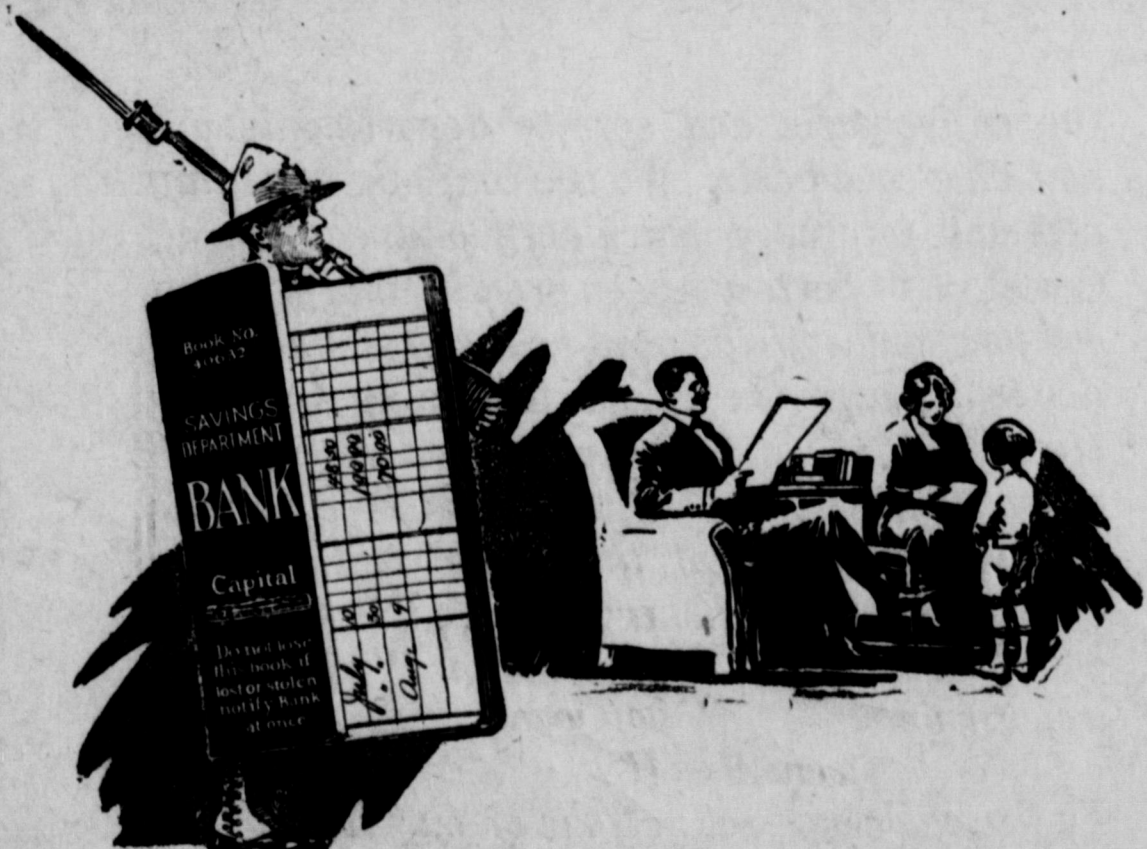

**PLANNING TO AID DAIRY INDUSTRY**

J. M. Walker to Establish Creamery Institute to Show How Best to Profit.

**EXPERT SCIENTISTS IN CHARGE**

Soil-enriching, Profit Making Type of Farming Big Need From Now On, He Says.

By NEA Service.  
CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Dairy farmer will be shown how to profit best in their lines, through the foundation of a Creamery Institute by J. M. Walker, head of a large creamery company here.

In establishing this institute, Walker announces he will be ready to turn over a large sum of money toward development of a greater dairy industry, emphasizing diversification, bal-

anced farming and more efficient methods with dairy cows, hogs and hens.

For the present he is centering his efforts among farmers in the Mississippi valley. Here the institute will at once start an educational campaign to increase the farmers' buying power by showing them how to manage a small dairy herd at a profit. Expert dairymen and trained scientists will be in charge at the creamery institute, which will have its headquarters in Chicago.

**No Longer Pioneers**  
"The time has come when American farmers have definitely passed the pioneer, soil-robbing stage of agriculture," says Mr. Walker. "From now on we must develop a soil-enriching, profit-making type of farming. The experiment stations, agricultural colleges, county agents and farm bureaus declare that the dairy cow offers the quickest and safest

means of insuring a steady and adequate farm return.

"While we should be proud of what has been accomplished in the Mississippi valley, we haven't made it produce half of what it should. To increase the dairy production in this area, as elsewhere, is the purpose of the institute.

**On the Job.**

"We already have men at work making a survey of the situation. It has been decided that a great service can be done for dairying, the best from each, by taking one county to another, thereby raising the standards of all counties in the area. Wealthy farmers will not be helped. The object of the institute is to make the average farmer, the small land owner and the tenant farmer make more money.

"There will be no fine build'ngs, no palace of agriculture. The money to be set aside will be spent right in the field where it will do the most good.

"The institute's research department will constantly seek to discover and collate every fact of moment to the farm dairyman. Our staff of educators will take these facts to every farmer at home and show him how to increase his income, conserve his soil, sell his crops at an advantage, and bring to his family a new measure of economic and social advantage through more intelligent cultivation of the dairy cow."
