## WEBB ADDRESSES LARGE AUDIENCE

Assistant to President of T-P Speaks at Last of Special Baptist Church Services.

### CONSIDER OTHER FELLOW

Man Becomes Like Things He Thinks Most About, Business Man Tells His Hearers.

"We think about God sometimes—some of us; we think about ourselves all the time—most of us; but how many of us ever think of the other fellow at all? And isn't it true that if we thought more about God we would be bound to think more about that other fellow, for whom God, in His infinite love and mercy, gave His Son to die, the same as He did for us?" was the challenging statement with which O. B. Webb, assistant to the President of the Texas & Pacific Railway, opened his address at the First Baptist Church last night, his subject being "God, Us, and the Other Fellow."

Paying tribute to the Book of Romans as the great foundation Book in which the Christian business man, wanting to serve his Lord, should be rooted and grounded, Mr. Webb dealt with the law as a means of salvation, showing that the law was not given for that purpose, but as a "schoolmaster to bring us to Christ" and "through the law cometh the knowledge of sin," but that by the "keeping of the law should no flesh be justified in His sight" that "Christ is the end of the law of righteousness to everyone that believeth." The speaker then pictured the impossibility of a man, with his mind and heart set on the things of the world—on getting rich, or becoming famous, or doing those other things that cater to and magnify self, being used of God to His glory; that a man slowly but surely becomes like the things he thinks most about, being moulded from within into a likeness of his thoughts—and that the only way to abiding happiness was to train one's self to think much above the things of God, to set one's mind on the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God.

There was a large audience present, including the pastors and many members of the other three leading churches of our city, and the earnest words of this Christian business man made a profound impression, backed up as they were with illustrations and experiences out of his own life.

A short business session was held at the beginning of the service, at the conclusion of which Dr. Hestir, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Dr. Henson, pastor of the Methodist Church, and Dr. McKissick, pastor of the Christian Church, all paid tribute to the beautiful new workshop just completed by the Baptist folk, and wished them Godspeed in their work of service to Him.

At the conclusion of the service, one young man, a member of the Baptist Church, declared before the congregation his intention, with God's help, to live closer to and make his life count more for Him from now on—and the church voted to include in a message to the lad's mother, now ill in a distant city, and to whom the church was wiring their sympathy, the glad tidings about the boy. Last night's services completed the "Dedication Services" planned by the pastor, Rev. Morony, which began last Sunday, lasting through Wednesday, which services have been intensely spiritual, and have, the pastor believes, set the Church on a higher plane for service. Dr. Morony was granted a vacation at an association meeting held before Webb's address. He plans to spend several weeks in revival work in New Mexico.

## PUT IN EXCHANGE

Hotel Wright Adds One of Largest Private Exchanges For Additional Rooms.

One of the largest private branch exchange telephone switchboards in West Texas with places for 320 telephones, is being installed at the Hotel Wright this week by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.

The new switchboard was made necessary by the additional story with added rooms, all of which will be equipped with telephones. There are two main trunk lines leading from the switchboard to the Sweetwater exchange as well as two separate long distance leads. There are also several telephones leading to the hotel in addition to those on the switchboard.

Work of installation will not be completed until the end of the week.

## PLANS READY FOR FARM LOAN MEET

Over 100 Officials of National Farm Loan Association Expected Here For Convention Saturday.

### IS FIRST CONVENTION

Many Cities in Central West Texas to be Represented—Houston Bank Officials Coming.

Preparations are practically complete for the first annual convention of the Central West Texas district of the National Farm Loan Association here Saturday, according to J. L. Ross, secretary-treasurer of the local branch. Advance information indicates that about 60 secretaries and treasurers from Central West Texas cities will be here, in addition to other officials of the association which may run the attendance to over 100.

This is the first convention of the Central West Texas group, and Sweetwater members and officials of the association are planning to put the meeting over in fine style. Sweetwater was chosen as the first convention city because of its central location and railroad facilities, it was stated.

According to information received by Mr. Ross, Judge M. H. Gossett, president of the Federal Land Bank at Houston, together with other officials of that bank, including John D. Van De Mark, secretary; R. D. Johnson, treasurer, and J. M. Neely, director, will attend the Sweetwater convention.

The delegates will register upon arriving in Sweetwater, and the convention will formally open with a business session Saturday morning. The business meetings during the convention will be held either at the court house auditorium, or at the Hotel Wright, Mr. Ross stated. Another business meeting will be held in the afternoon.

Officials attending the convention will be the guests of the Sweetwater Luncheon Club at a luncheon at Hotel Wright Saturday noon, according to Mr. Ross. Other entertainment features planned for the visitors include a ride over the city, and a possible visit to the United States Gypsum Co. plant.

## COTTON REPORT

Texas Crop 52 Per Cent Normal, Forecast 4,237,000 Bales—Rain Benefit Problematic.

HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 25.—The first report of condition for this date makes the Texas crop 52 per cent normal which forecasts a production of 4,237,000 bales of 500-lbs., gross weight. For the United States, the condition is 55.4 per cent, forecasting 12,596,000 bales. The number of bales ginned prior to Sept. 16 totals 2,662,636 compared with 958,204 running bales ginned prior to Sept. 1, 1924, and 1,142,660 bales ginned prior to Sept. 1, 1923. The Texas ginnings prior to Sept. 1, 1924, were 630,842 bales and 1,089,530 bales prior to Sept. 1, 1923.

While heavy rains fell beginning on the night of the 11th, effectually breaking the drought in most of the Texas counties, the benefits resulting are problematic. The plants are reviving where they were not too far gone, premature opening was checked and bolls can now develop normally, but the grade of the open cotton was lowered, some was beaten out and bolls resting on the ground have rotted. It is believed that a late frost will add considerably to what might be made with frost at the average date. Even the very small bolls may make bollies or snaps with frost holding off until late. Bollworms, leaf-worms and weevils have increased since the rains began and no further frutation is expected in those localities where this increase has been rapid.

Judge Calhoun Will Render Decision in Ferguson Hearing Monday Morning at 10 O'clock.

### UNDER ADVISEMENT TODAY

Charles Dickson of San Antonio Would Bar 'Ma' From Holding State's Highest Office.

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 25.—District Judge George Calhoun will render a decision on the petition of Charles Dickson of San Antonio contesting the eligibility of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Democratic candidate for Governor, at 10 a. m., Monday, September 29.

Calhoun took the case under advisement at the close of the injunction shortly before noon. The hearing began Monday.

### URGES PROPER DETOURS

Judge DeArmond of Midland Visits in Sweetwater—Heads Bankhead.

Judge J. M. DeArmond, head of the Bankhead Highway Association was in Sweetwater this week on business. He reports greater interest in the Bankhead on the part of tourists than ever before and predicts that as soon as the hard surface road is completed through Nolan and counties to the east, that the road will be taxed to capacity to take care of the traffic.

Judge DeArmond especially urged that detours be carefully planned and kept up, while the highways are under course of construction. Unless this is done, he said, motorists will dodge the Bankhead route with consequent loss of business along the route.

## WATER GRADE A

Sweetwater Supply Ranks With Best in State—Abilene Graded B by Health Authorities.

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 25.—Classification of all municipal water supplies in the State into grades A, B, and C, has been announced by Dr. Malone Duggan, State Health Officer. Sweetwater's supply is in Grade A.

Grade A represents those water supplies that are reasonably safe for drinking purposes at all times; it also indicates that monthly reports are submitted by these towns to the State Board of Health, giving data concerning daily operation of the water plant and the method of laboratory control.

Grade B represents towns whose water supplies do not come up fully to the State Board of Health regulations, but suggested improvements are being made.

Grade C indicates that the public water supply in the listed towns has been found unfit for drinking purposes except when boiled or otherwise treated.

The demand upon the State Board of Health for analysis of water specimens has become so great that Dr. Duggan has found it necessary to adopt certain standards to be observed by cities shipping water. A standard shipping case has been adopted which can be constructed at a nominal cost, the plans for construction being furnished by the State Board of Health upon request, together with other necessary requirements for shipping.

Included in the Grade A supplies are those of San Angelo, Brownwood, Breckenridge, Childress, Cisco, and Lubbock. Among the larger cities of the state are Dallas, Fort Worth, Waco, and San Antonio.

Abilene leads the list of Grade B water supplies. Also in this group are Anson, Ballinger, and Eastland.

Nine Texas cities have been placed in Grade C so far. They are Burnett, Donn, Gonzales, Luling, Marble Falls, Pharr, Toyah, Weslaco, and Wharton.

## American Mixed up In Chinese War, Forms Chink K K K

SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 25.—Lawrence Kearney, grizzled American sea captain and adventurer is directing the artillery fire of General Chi's army before Shanghai, the United Press learned today.

Hardened freebooter who has seen service in the Canadian, Chelian, and Chinese navies and spent 40 years filibustering in the Orient, Kearney was organizing a Chinese branch of the Ku Klux Klan here three months ago. He joined the Kiangsu forces at the outbreak of hostilities, and became Military Adviser to China. American Consul General Cunningham today refused comment on this newly discovered competition.

## BREAKS RECORD

Mitchell County Fair Opens With Heaviest Attendance in History—Sweetwater Day Saturday.

COLORADO, Texas, Sept. 25.—The third annual Mitchell County Fair opened here this morning with the largest attendance record in history. Fair officials express the belief that attendance will surpass the peak of last year by not less than 100 per cent.

Traveling in 75 automobiles and accompanied by the Midland Chamber of Commerce Band, the Midland delegation arrived this morning at 10 o'clock and paraded through the business district and to the fair grounds.

Tonight at an open air arena on the fair grounds Miss Clippie Bennett, of Colorado, will be crowned Queen of the Fair. One hundred people are included in the cast for this elaborate program.

Large delegations from Big Spring and Snyder are to visit the fair Friday, each bringing bands. Saturday delegations from Sweetwater and Sterling are to visit the fair.

## ORIENT PREPARES ADDED SERVICE

Through Trains From Wichita to Ft. Stockton, Sweetwater, Angelo, Ft. Worth Pullman, Planned.

### T - P CONNECTION HERE

North Bound Train Reaches Here at 9:00 p. m.—Southbound Leaves at 6:30 a. m.

A general change of schedule with the inauguration of through trains from Wichita, Kansas to Fort Stockton, Texas, is impending on the Orient railway October 5, according to semi-official advises in Sweetwater. Pullman service from Sweetwater to San Angelo enroute to and from Fort Worth is also a part of the scheduled changes, it is reported.

At the present time the Orient is operating a train from Fort Stockton to San Angelo, another from Sweetwater to Altus, Ok., and a third from Altus to Wichita, Kansas, northern terminus of the line. The new schedule, if adopted, will operate a train through without change from Fort Stockton, Texas on to Wichita, Kansas. The proposed schedule calls for a northbound train to pass through Sweetwater about 9 o'clock at night and the southbound train to leave Sweetwater about 6:30 a. m.

The Texas-Pacific is operating a Pullman between Fort Worth and Sweetwater, which is set out here and lays over. Under the new arrangement this Pullman, on its arrival in Sweetwater on No. 5 at 5:45 a. m., will be hooked on to the Orient passenger train southbound, and arrive in San Angelo at 9:30 in the morning. It will lay over in San Angelo, leave that city at 6 p. m., arrive in Sweetwater 9:30 p. m., attached to No. 6 on the T-P as at present, leaving for Fort Worth at 10:50 p. m.

While the new schedule will make it difficult for Blackwell and Maryneal and points south to spend the day in Sweetwater and return the same day, the territory to the north of Sweetwater will be opened up. People living in Longworth, Sylvester, McCaulley, Hamlin and points north can spend the day in Sweetwater, shop, attend the show, and leave at a convenient hour for their homes.

A large amount of traffic for San Angelo and the oil fields that has been using the Santa Fe from Dallas, Fort Worth and other points via Temple, and Brownwood, will now pass through Sweetwater via T-P and Orient.

Under the new schedule, the southbound train will leave Wichita, Kansas at 8:15 a. m., Altus, Okla., 9:30 p. m., Hamlin 4:05 p. m., Sweetwater 6:30 a. m., San Angelo, 10 a. m., and arrive Fort Stockton 5:05 p. m.

The northbound train will leave Ft. Stockton 10:50 a. m., San Angelo, 6 p. m., Sweetwater 9:45 p. m., Hamlin 11:05 p. m., and arrive Wichita 5 p. m., the following day.

### CONDUCTOR QUESTIONED

Alleged to Have Blocked Crossing With Freight Train.

Roosevelt's nomination came on the first ballot, receiving 557 votes, according to unofficial figures, when he needed but 496 to win.

A LEADER LOST

In the death of Mrs. W. W. Beall, Sweetwater suddenly lost one of its most beloved, respected, and honored leaders, a woman whose interest in church, home, city and school was illustrated by her untiring efforts for the things that are best and loveliest in the life of a community.

Founder of the parent-teacher work in Sweetwater, she was a pioneer in Texas in the important work that brings the school and the home together for a study of the problems of education, a work that interests both parents and teachers in the welfare of the school child. Her labors in the field of education will long stand as a monument in her memory.

The Christian life was exemplified by the woman who was suddenly called to meet the Master she had so long served faithfully. With a perfect record on this earth, going to her Creator with the esteem and love of all who had known her during life's span, Mrs. Beall whispered that she was ready to go when she was told that her useful career among mortals was rapidly drawing to a close.

A great leader has passed on. While she will be missed in Sweetwater, where she has given freely for her fellowman, we know that the highest reward for Christian life and fellowship is hers. Her life was an inspiration to all who knew her, a wonderful example of love, sacrifice, and service.

During all of Mrs. Beall's club activities, no matter whether it was political, P. T. A., or literary program in which she was taking part, she never lost sight of "The Child in our midst. A friend once said to her that "The Child" subject was a hobby of hers. "Yes," she said, "a child is the most precious thing in the world."

She pled always for the child in the home, school and church. Her plea was for laws protecting the home that every child might be well born and grown up in a normal home environment; for a school curriculum to meet the peculiar needs of the child

that they might develop the God-given talents they possess, but her greatest plea was that the church might throw a more protective arm around its young people, that they might find in the social life of the church an attraction that might save them from the lure of questionable amusements.

Of Mrs. Beall it might be said: "Fearless, distant-visioned, intrepid pioneer, Whom wilderness and mountain could not stay nor stop. Far off she saw the morning breaking bright and clear Glinting with its glory the lofty mountain top."

GROWTH OF ARBITRATION
