STATE HIGHWAY CONTRACT IS LET

Brown, Abbot and Co., of Loraine Low Bidders on Bankhead Highway West of City.

FOR DIRTWORK AND BRIDGES

State and Federal Highway Engineers Inspect Highway Route North of Town Saturday.

The Nolan County Commissioners were in session at the court house throughout Saturday when bids were received for the grading and bridge work on Highway No. 1 from Sweetwater west to the Mitchell County line, and after much consideration, the bid of Brown, Abbot Co., Inc., Loraine, was accepted and the contract let.

The bid of this company for the work was \$29,432.77, and was the lowest of 18 bids submitted. Other bids ranged up to \$42,000.

A large number of representatives of various companies were in Sweetwater Saturday to enter bids, and were present when the bids were opened. Ed Abbott, of Brown, Abbot Co., Inc., represented his company at the session.

This contract is for the grading of the road, and for the bridge work. Contract to surface the highway will probably be let later.

Abbott is well known in Sweetwater and West Texas, and his company has done considerable road work in this section. All the present bridge work from Sweetwater to the Mitchell County line was done by them. They also built the bridge across the Colorado River at Colorado, and have been active in bridge construction in Tom Green County.

This marks the second contract of the million and a half dollar road building program in Nolan County for which bonds were voted nearly a year ago. The first contract was for paving in the city of Roscoe, which is now well under way. This being done jointly by Roscoe, Nolan County and State and Federal aid.

It has not been announced just when the work on the highway will begin, as certain preliminary steps must be taken before actual construction gets under way. The contract and the bidder's bond must be sent to Austin for the approval of the highway Department. Work will begin shortly after this is granted, it is expected.

It has not been decided whether the grading will be started from the Mitchell County line or from Sweetwater. This will depend on which end of the highway is prepared for work first, such as the moving of posts, fences, etc., according to the plans. The road will be practically identical as the present route, with a few changes in corners and curves. This part of the work was completed some time ago by surveyors and the county engineer.

O. B. Kercher, Federal engineer, and A. F. Mousund, State engineer, were in Sweetwater Saturday when the contracts were let. While here, the engineers, in company with County Engineer Focht, County Judge Mauzey and the County Commissioners, made an inspection of the highway north of Sweetwater to the Fisher County line. This highway will receive Federal aid when it is improved, but may undergo changes in route. A plot of the road will be made, and the engineers will select the new route, if one is made.

A number of Sweetwater business men met with the engineers and County Commission at the court house Saturday afternoon, when road building was discussed.

PLANE EXPLODES IN DAYTON RACE

Fuselage Hurtles Down in Plain Sight 60,000 Spectators—Find No Trace Airman's Body.

RACING FOR PULITZER PRIZE

Victim is Bert Sawtelle, Pilot From Selfridge Field, Michigan—Lt. Mills Wins Race.

By The United Press. DAYTON, O., Oct. 4.—One of the most dramatic airplane tragedies since the World War marked the closing of the International Air races here today. Bert Sawtelle, Army Air Pilot from Selfridge, Mich., was killed in mid-air when his plane collapsed and exploded while he was contending for the Pulitzer trophy.

Forty thousand spectators including the pilot's wife saw the fuselage of the Curtiss racer come hurtling down out of the sky in a shower of wreckage. A cry went up from the crowd as it was realized what had happened. No trace of the plane nor the body could be found. A geyser of mud shot up from the boggy field as the plane weighted by the 420 horsepower motor buried itself in the ground.

Lt. H. H. Mills flying a Sperry racer won the Pulitzer event with a speed of 216.72 miles per hour, 30 miles slower than last year in St. Louis.

PREVENT FIRES

Sweetwater Will Observe Fire Prevention Week Beginning Monday, October 6 to 11.

The week of Oct. 6-11 will be observed in Sweetwater, as well as throughout the country, as National Fire Prevention Week, and during this week, a general clean-up and inspection campaign will be carried on. All property owners are expected to see that all possible fire hazards are removed from their homes and premises.

The city is expecting a general clean-up of down-town alleys, as well as premises in the residence district during the week. The inspection of wiring in all buildings is urged.

During this week, Sweetwater Boy Scouts will make inspection of the premises in the residence section and report any fire hazards that are found. Students in Sweetwater schools will also have a part in the week's program. They will be supplied with blanks to be filled out concerning the condition of their respective homes in regard to dangers of fires, and will also write articles dealing with general fire prevention.

INDICT 80 MEN IN HERRIN RIOT

Anti-Klan Leaders Named by "Bloody" Williamson County Grand Jury in Findings.

JUDGE DISQUALIFIES SELF

Judge Circuit Court Refuses to Issue Writs of Arrest—Says Men Named Innocent.

By The United Press. MARION, Ill., Oct. 4.—The Ku Klux Klan forces in "Bloody Williamson" County today won a victory as an aftermath of the street battle in Herrin August 30, in which 7 men were slain.

After two weeks investigation the Grand Jury returned indictments charging first degree murder naming three leaders of the anti-Klan faction, Sheriff George Galligan, State Attorney Delos Duty and City Judge Bowen of Herrin.

Twelve other anti-Klan men were indicted for murder in connection with the riots.

Circuit Judge D. T. Bardwell refused to fix bail for the three leaders, stating that he would disqualify himself. He was positive, he said, that neither of the men were in Herrin at the time of the shooting and that he would testify in their defense. He also refused to issue writs for their arrest. Circuit Judge Somers of Harrisburg will be brought here next week to carry out this duty.

Out of the 80 indictments returned by the grand jury, none were brought against Klansmen. Leaders of both factions are preparing for more trouble.

TEN INDICTED

Grand Jury Returns Number True Bills—Criminal Cases Set For Hearing Week Oct. 13.

Service by the sheriff's department has been made in all except one of the ten counts returned by the grand jury which was in session part of last week. The grand jury reported nine felonies and one misdemeanor, and adjourned until later in the term.

Reports returned by the grand jury include, the State of Texas vs. the following: Ross Beam, driving and operating automobile while under the influence of intoxicating liquor; Wesley Thomas and R. L. Drake; Wesley Thomas, theft of property valued at over \$75; Demento Castro, transporting liquor; Nicolas Naveratte, transporting liquor; J. T. Underwood, possessing, receiving and concealing stolen property; Jim Hughes, theft of over \$50; George Ayres, robbery with fire arms; Dick Toland, robbery with firearms; Mack Lake, unlawfully carrying firearms. All of these are under bond or in jail, with the exception of one.

The criminal cases are set for Oct. 13, the third week in this term of District Court. The docket will probably be set then, it was stated.

District Court has been inactive, with the exception of a few minor civil cases, and one divorce case, the past week. One case, J. L. Wright vs. J. H. Fultz, foreclosure of lien, is set for Monday.

CATTLE KILLED

Another 1,100 Head, Making Total 3,000 Ordered Shot in Hoof and Mouth Plague Fight.

By The United Press. HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 4.—The slaughter of 1,100 additional head of cattle which have been grazing on the 8,500 acre area infected with hoof and mouth disease was ordered today by Dr. Irms, Federal expert in charge of the field force fighting the disease.

With the killing of this herd, the third ordered slaughtered, a total of 3,000 cattle will have been killed in the attempt to stamp out the disease, which was first observed slightly over a week ago.

It was denied that there had been a new out-break of the disease, the order in question being merely in the nature of a precautionary measure.

WALTER JOHNSON HIT FOR HOMERS

Loses Opening Game To Giants in 12 Innings By Score of 4 to 3—Struck Out 12.

GREAT CROWD BLAMED

Erection of Temporary Seats in Left Field Turns Easy Flies Into Run Blows.

By The United Press. WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.—Admiration for Walter Johnson, the idol of Washington, worked with reverse English here this afternoon and turned into grief for the great master who lost the first World Series game in which he pitched to the New York Giants in 12 innings. The score was 4 to 3.

Two of New York's runs came on home runs by Kelly and Terry into left field bleachers and it was the same two who stopped a great Washington rally in the 12th inning and saved the game for the Giants.

There were 38,000 fans packed into the park.

So many thousand had demanded entrance that temporary seats had been erected in left field, extending 18 feet in front of the left field bleacher. Into these temporary bleachers dropped the two flies that became home runs. Washington fans believed that the Washington left fielder would have captured them easily had it not been for the crowd and seats.

The batteries were Walter Johnson and Nehf for Washington and Nehf and Cuddy for the Giants.

HIT BY ORIENT

Train Hits Car in Oklahoma—Wreck at Monument—Change in Train Schedule Begins Sunday.

By The United Press. SENTINEL, Ok., Oct. 4.—Mrs. Orville Hall, 35, was killed and her husband and four children seriously injured when the car in which they were returning to Sentinel was struck at a grade crossing by a K. C. M. & O. train last night.

Hall and two of the children are not expected to recover.

Wreck at Monument.

By The United Press. SAN ANGELO, Texas, Oct. 4.—A. H. Steger, Orient engineer was seriously injured when he jumped from his engine a few seconds before the train he was driving split a switch at Monument, 40 miles west of here, and struck a train load of oil well supplies enroute to Big Lake.

Schedule Changes.

Sunday marks the change of the Orient railway schedule. The southbound train No. 1, which formerly left at 6:30 evenings, will arrive at 5:40 a. m., hauling the Fort Worth-Sweetwater Pullman to San Angelo. The northbound train No. 2, will arrive Sweetwater 9 at night and leave at 9:45, instead of in the morning as heretofore. This train will leave San Angelo at 6 p. m.

JERRY RUST DIES

Pioneer Independent West Texas Telephone Lines Succumbs.

SAN ANGELO, Texas, Oct. 4.—Jerry Y. Rust died here tonight. He was one of the three Rust brothers who came to West Texas in 1898 and built the independent telephone system radiating out from San Angelo to Sweetwater on the north and to the border on the south—the largest independent system in the state. Jerry Rust later sold his interests in this system to his brother, John Y. Rust. At the time of his death he was building a five-story office building in San Angelo. This will be completed.

Friends of both the principals in this event are taking intense interest in the proceedings, and with rivalry so keen, there is no question but a tremendous audience will be attracted to witness the contest, which is already overshadowing in importance many other attractions scheduled at the fair.

Railroad officials said the switch lock had been filed through.

FLYERS COMING

Gates Flying Circus to Give Exhibition Here Today—Thrilling Program is Promised.

With a large sized program of aerial thrillers promised, "Upside Down" Pangburn, stunt aviator and the wing-walking Diavolo, are scheduled to appear in Sweetwater for an afternoon program today.

These men are the two chief attractions with the Gates Flying Circus of which Pangburn is chief pilot and part owner. They are on their way from the Lubbock Fair to the San Angelo Fair and are stopping over here for the one day's exhibition.

MERKEL DEFEATS SWEETWATER HI

Salty Pups Unable to Break Heavy Merkel Line and Lose Second Game 26-0.

BREAKS AGAINST LOCALS

Fatal Fumble and Hoodoo Jinx Help to Oust Sweetwater Aggregation—Use Aerial Attack.

Unable to make any decisive gains through the heavy Merkel line, combined with a number of unlucky breaks, the Sweetwater Salty Pups suffered their first defeat of the season at the hands of the Merkel eleven to the tune of 26-0 in a non-the-less thrilling battle played on the enemy's grounds Friday afternoon. A Salty Pup jinx seemed to have followed Coach Gibson's men over to Merkel Friday. Every break was against the local aggregation in a not-to-well refereed game. But in spite of hard luck, the defeat was the result of a weak line that seemed to have been broken at Merkel's will.

Line plunges gave Merkel her four touchdowns and constituted her chief method of play. The first count came in the first four minutes of play, when Merkel marched down to the Sweetwater goal in successive line plunges and carried the ball over for the opener, and kicked goal. The Pups showed some brilliant playing at times, through the remainder of the first quarter. The ball zig-zaged up and down the field with numerous punts, but the Pups were unable to get within scoring distance.

Merkel scored again in the second quarter by line-plunging their way across the goal line and kicked goal. The Sweetwater machine settled down to some stiff playing following the count and opened up an aerial attack that dazzled the opponents who were caught unawares. The first forward pass of the Salty Pup's season was completed. Sheppard to Toler, in the last of the second quarter, and the ball was carried for a 20-yard gain. The dose was repeated for a 40-yard gain and after a line plunge, the Pups were on the Merkel 8-yard line with Pup rosters yelling "touchdown." It seemed certain that Sweetwater, on their second down and 8 yards to go, would make the count which would doubtless have put confidence into the team and possibly made a different result in the final score. All set for a line plunge for the goal line, the ball was snapped, fumbled by the Pup quarterback, and Merkel covered the ball. Merkel punted and the half ended with the ball in Sweetwater's possession in mid-field, and Merkel leading, 14-0.

Merkel kicked off to open the second half and a Sweetwater linesman fumbled the kick-off and the ball was covered by Merkel. The enemy got their line-plunging machine to working again, and plowed down to the Sweetwater 25-yard line, then fumbled with Sweetwater covering the ball. The Pups punted, and Merkel again fumbled with only a 5-yard gain off the punt. Merkel punted, but the jinx stepped in again, the Pups fumbled the punt and Merkel covered the ball on the 15-yard line. A succession of line plunges put the huskies over the line again for the third touchdown, but Smith failed to kick goal. Merkel kicked off in the last quarter, and Sheppard carried the ball for a 20-yard gain. Two forward passes failed and Sweetwater punted with Merkel fumbling the punt but recovered it in mid-field. The Merkel plays were thrown for three straight losses after three subs were sent for with the ball in Merkel's possession in mid-field.

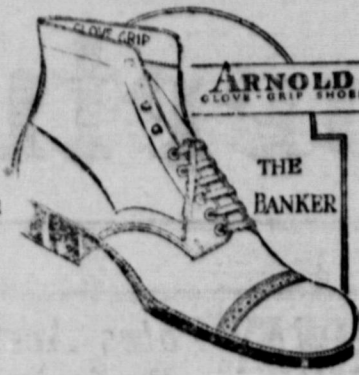

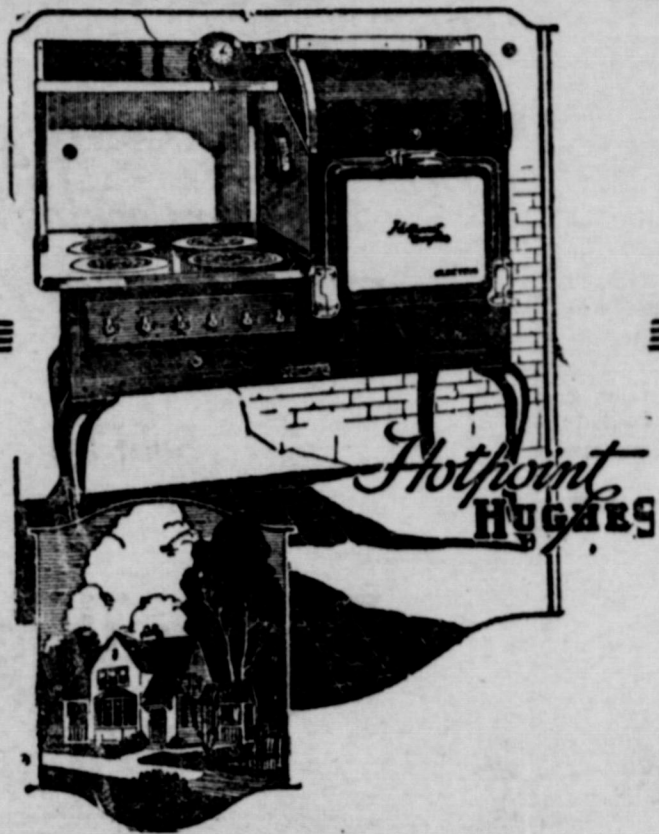

MANY DIVORCES

Texas Record For 1923 Show One in Five Ratio—Low Record Shown For Nolan County.

There were 69,243 marriages, and 14,641 divorces granted in the calendar year of 1923 in Texas, according to a report made by the Department of Commerce, Washington, D. C. For the year 1922, 61,730 marriages, and 12,527 divorces were reported. The increase in divorces in 1923 over 1922 was 16.9 per cent, while the increase in marriages for the same year was only 12.2 per cent.

There were 238 marriages in Nolan County in 1923, the report showed, and 12 divorces. In 1922, there were 194 marriages and 20 divorces.

Scurry County had a total of 290 marriages in the two years and only 10 divorces, according to the report, while Mitchell County had 314 marriages and 40 divorces during the two years. Fisher County had a report of 141 marriages in 1923 with 12 divorces, and 114 marriages in 1922 and 10 divorce.

Harris County had the high record, with a total of 7,975 marriages for the two years with 2,513 divorces. Every marriage in Reagan County in 1922 resulted in divorce. But they had only one marriage that year.

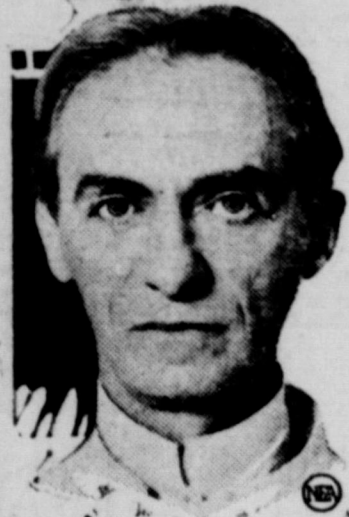

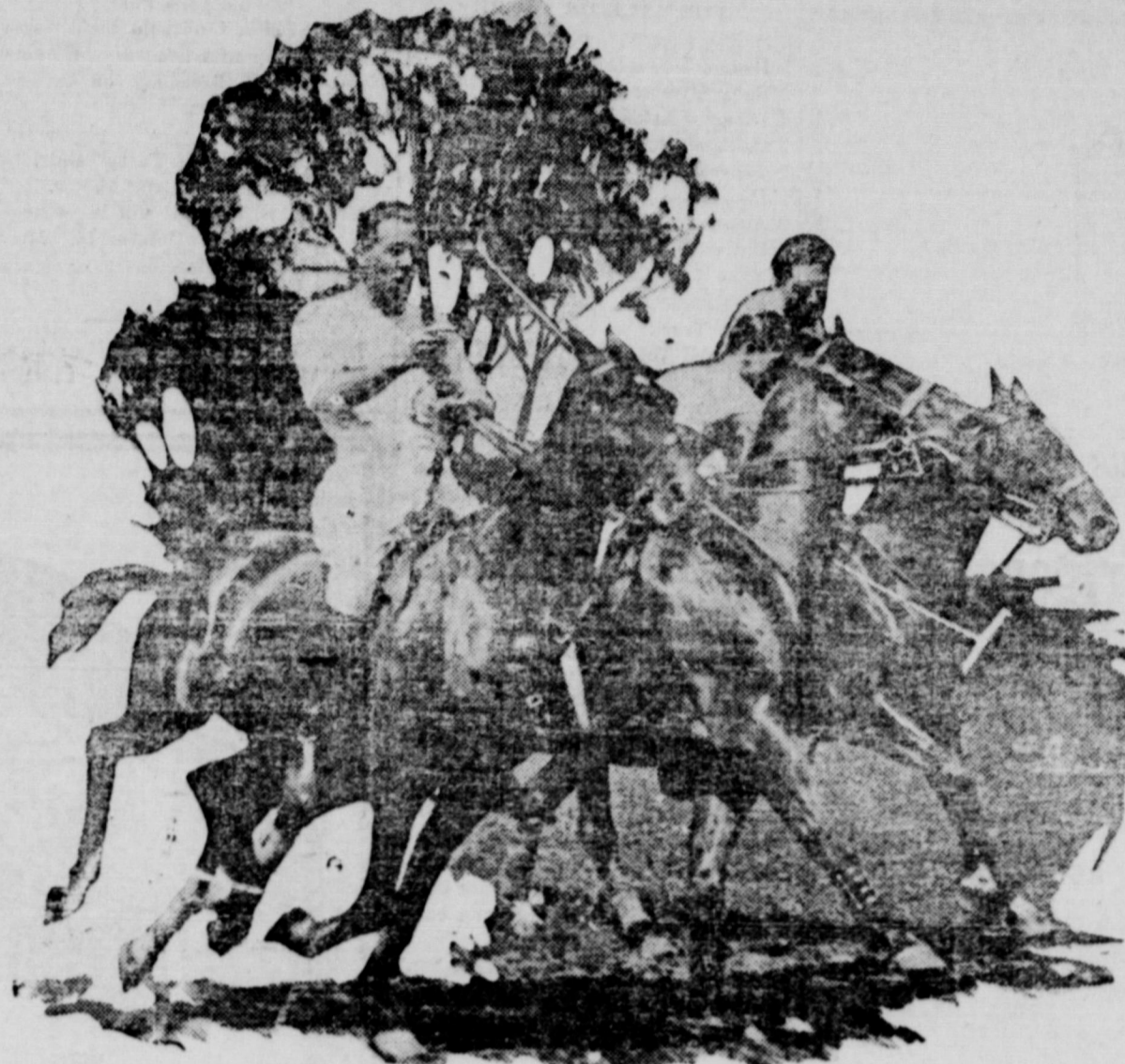

They'll Swing Mallets At Fair



FORT RENO ARMY POLO TEAM IN ACTION.

Two majors and a captain of cavalry from the United States Army stationed at Fort Reno, Ok., will pit their skill at polo against a civilian team representing San Angelo, captained by a member of the American team in the recent Olympic games, when this sport is dished up at the All-West Texas Exposition at San Angelo, Oct. 6-11, inclusive. Polo was popularized in Texas outside of army circles at the San Angelo fair in 1922 and tightened its hold on the public last fall. It is certain to be a still greater feature next week, with players of both national and international prominence in the leading roles.

The army team, two members of which are shown in action above, will be composed of Major "Pappy" Week, in command of the army remount station at Fort Reno; Major E. G. Cullum, in command of purchases and breedings in the States

of Oklahoma, Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico and Arizona; and Captain H. B. Bridges, assistant to the commanding officer at Fort Reno. Major Cullum was on the All-American army polo team last year while assistant chief of the remount service, stationed at Washington, D. C. He also played two years ago on the club that won the Mid-Western polo tournament at Denver and Colorado Springs, Colo. Richard S. Waring of San Angelo captained that club. San Angelo's civilian team that will meet the army trio will be composed of Fred Roe, Robert Lee, Coke County, banker, ranchman, raiser and trainer of polo ponies; Richard S. Waring of San Angelo, also raiser and trainer of polo horses and a polo player of exceptional ability, and Delbert Walling of Robert Lee, who exhibited his skill in matches here both in 1923 and 1922. Mr. Roe recently returned home

from the East, where he witnessed the United States' polo triumph over England. He had then just arrived from Paris, where he played on the American polo team in the Olympic games. This team defeated England, France and Spain and lost in the finals to Argentine by one goal. Polo games at the fair will be staged on Tuesday, Oct. 7, and Thursday, Oct. 9. In the event a third match is required to decide the series, it will be held on Friday, Oct. 10. Polo requires expert horsemanship, agile and well trained mounts. West Texas is primarily a live stock country, producing some of the best polo horses raised anywhere. These reasons combined account for polo's steadily growing popularity at the oldest, largest and most representative fair in West Texas—the All-West Texas Exposition.

Anti Still Out

The time for filing certifications expires October 3. After that time all

candidates whose applications have been denied must resort to court proceedings to compel the Secretary of State to place their names on the official ballot.

"I will not, in the future lend a farmer a dollar unless he agrees and does raise his food and feed; I will encourage and help him in dairying three to five cows, or one to three acres of strawberries or tomatoes, rad-

ishes, cabbage or fruit. In other words, I will stand ready to help those that help themselves—and withhold credit from slothful."

RABBITS BAD

FORT WORTH, Texas, Oct. 5.—"The rabbits are destroying the crops in this country enough to become a nuisance. Shooting and poisoning them is not effective, and it is expensive," declares Col. C. C. French of the Fort Worth Stock Yards Co. "It seems from statements made from responsible ranchmen that with not a very great additional expense, the present fences can be made rabbit proof; fencing the rabbits out makes a hog pasture for the farmers' little pigs; giving the pigs the run of the farm at some season of the year will cheapen the cost of producing the feeder pig."

"There is no telling," Col. French stated, "how many millions of larva of crop destroying insects the pigs will destroy when given the run of the farm, to say nothing of the insects the pigs will destroy."

"The pigs will not damage the cotton, but will eat the grass and weeds."

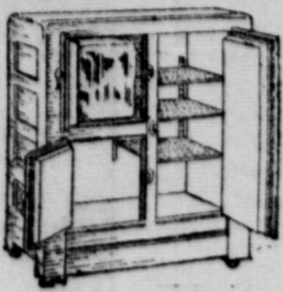

FINISH WORK ON BOWEN BUILDING

Structure Presents Improved Appearance After Extensive Remodeling—Has New Brick Front.

SECOND FLOOR IMPROVED

Modern Throughout With All Conveniences—New Stairs, Side Walk, Awning, Lights and Steam Heat

Improvements and remodeling of the Bowen building on Oak street, which were begun some time ago, are practically completed, and the building now stands complete and modern in every detail, with convenience not usually found in tenement buildings. The structure, with a new brick front, re-modeled offices, new sidewalk and stairway, has been declared by many to be one of the most modern and well furnished buildings and drug stores west of Fort Worth.

The second story of the Bowen building is reached by a new stairway from the Oak street sidewalk. The old steps on W. N. 2nd street have been torn down.

A partition has been placed down the center of the second story hall, separating the Bowen building and the Bradford building. The walls of the entire second story of the Bowen building are new, made of sheetrock with an ivory color finish. A beautiful color effect with the ivory walls, baseboards of cream color and oak doors, is produced. The hall is a contrast to the general run of halls, in that it is neatly finished, light and airy. Two large sky-lights in the ceiling make the hall well lighted. All the office rooms in the second floor

have sky lights. An office suite of 6 rooms occupy the front of the building, and will be occupied later by Drs. Rosebrough, Fortner and Brann. These rooms are neatly finished, have large reception rooms and will be modern in every respect.

Dr. G. Burton Fain occupies the next suite of three rooms. Dr. Fain's office includes a beautiful reception room with new and expensive furniture, a small business office and a large and well furnished consultation room.

Jesse Taylor and Co., cotton exchange, occupy a large room at the end of the hall and has all modern appointments.

The entire front of the Bowen building has been replaced with new brick and has a very neat appearance. The front of the store has been re-modeled, with tile entrance floor, and the show-window supports are of tiling with marble surface. The show-windows are of circular glass. A new sidewalk of concrete has replaced the old sidewalk, and a new awning and outside lighting fixtures have been added. The front of the City National Bank was also replaced with new brick during the re-modeling of the Bowen building.

The Bowen Drug Store, second floor hall and all up-stairs offices will be steam heated throughout. The heating plant is at the rear of the drug store, walled in with brick and concrete.

The building, with its new appearance and added equipment mark another step in the building progress of Sweetwater, and with the recent extensive re-modeling of the Sweetwater Dry Goods Co., block, that corner of the square presents a very improved appearance. The estimated cost of the placed at \$7,000.

There has been some discussion of the State and Federal engineers routing this highway straight across from north-east Sweetwater to the Bankhead Highway, meeting the latter about one mile west of the U. S. Gypsum plant. Sweetwater business men are seeking to obtain the routing through the city, similar to the present road. It was pointed out that tourist travel along that highway would be swung east of Sweetwater, instead of passing through town, if the above routing was selected.

Both engineers, Kercher and Moulund, assured citizens at the meeting that in all probability, the highway would be similar to its present route, coming into Sweetwater on the north or north-east side. Two plans were under consideration, it was stated. One was to swing the road in straight for Sweetwater from the corner east of the city dump grounds, probably cutting across the present Country Club grounds, and coming out north of the high school building. The other route, which was discussed, was to make a similar cut towards Sweetwater, but to come into town east of the high school, probably on Crane street.

No definite action was taken but only a general discussion of various routes was made by citizens and engineers. The crossing of railroad tracks along this highway was touched upon, and it is probable, that when work begins on this road, underground crossings will be made under the Santa Fe tracks between Sweetwater and Palava, according to statements made at the meeting.

Federal aid will be given on this highway only to the edge of town, it was pointed out, as when the road reaches a district where the houses are less than 200 feet apart, Federal aid stops.

The engineers stated that the route would be selected which seemed to be to the best interests of all, considering distance, economy, and physical conditions of the road.

The next highway work to be done in Nolan County will be on the highway running south from Sweetwater. County officials stated that advertisement for bids on that job would probably begin within a month.

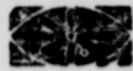

POSTAL RECEIPTS SHOW INCREASE

Every Quarter of Year Registers Gain Over Same Quarter of Previous Years.

NEARING FIRST CLASS
If Receipts For Last Quarter Gain in Same Ratio, Will Have First Class Office.

The postal receipts at the Sweetwater post office for the third quarter of the year, ending Sept. 30, have been announced by Postmaster Howard, and the receipts for this quarter totaled \$11,247.50. This brings the total receipts for the first three quarters of 1924 to \$29,576.69.

The receipts of the third quarter of this year show a decided increase over the same period of 1923, which totaled \$9,621.36.

It was pointed out that all the

quarters this year, so far, have shown such an increase over last year that if the gain is continued through the last quarter, ending December 31, this post office will become rated as first class. The receipts of the last quarter in 1923 was \$9,053.86. To put Sweetwater postoffice in the first class, the receipts in the last quarter of this year must be \$10,423.31. Yearly receipts totaling over \$40,000 is the requirement for a first class office.

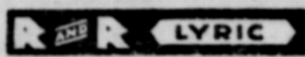
