There are about as many different kinds of paving as there are streets in Sweetwater, and the costs vary on each kind. Some are good and some are not. There has been an awful lot of poor paving put down in many cities during the past quarter of a century. Traffic and heavy foads wear out quickly a pavement that would have stood up under horsedrawn traffic indefinitely. The action of water and frost must also be guarded against. We cannot afford to experiment in Sweetwater. We have done some experimenting already. City property will bear the investment of paving just about once. Therefore it is essential that the correct type of paving be adopted the first time. It stands to reason that a type of pavement which has given good service in other cities will do likewise here and it also stands to reason that the cost thereof will be be just about the same, subject to conditions peculiarly local.







The weather of the past week has been conducive to plant growth, and with the flower show only twelve days off, there is promised a display more profuse and gorgeous than has ever been seen here.




