JURY UNDECIDED ON AYRES CASE

Out Nearly All Day Saturday, Fail to Reach Verdict in Station Robbery Charge.

AYRES ALIBI UNSHAKEN

Was in San Angelo Night of Robbery Here, Defendant Testifies—Former Mrs. Toland on Stand.

The jury in the case of State of Texas vs. George Ayres, charged with robbery with firearms in connection with the Santa Fe station hold-up here last December, seemed hopelessly locked at a late hour Saturday. After being out since 11 o'clock Saturday morning, the jury appeared before Judge Leslie at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon and declared that they were unable to reach a verdict.

Judge Leslie instructed the jury to return to the jury room for further deliberations. "There is no reason and I have no authority to excuse you at this time," he stated. "Retire to the jury room and try to reach a verdict."

R. D. Cox Jr., made the first speech to the jury for the State Saturday morning. He was followed by A. J. Anderson of San Angelo, counsel for the defendant. District Attorney Brooks closed the argument of the State with a long speech. He recommended the death penalty.

The State and defense both rested their cases at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon after examining about 20 witnesses during the day, and the court recessed for Judge Leslie to prepare the charge for the jury. The maximum punishment for the crime is life imprisonment or death.

SENTENCE WOMAN AS ACCOMPLICE

Jury Returns Same Verdict, Second Degree Murder, Given Farm Youth Convicted as Slayer.

PLEADS LIFE OF TORTURE

Defendant Also Says She Was Named Unjustly as Instigator in Murder of Husband.

MIDDLEBURG, Pa., Oct. 18.—The same verdict given Ralph Shadde, the farm boy who killed Harvey Willow, was returned by the jury late today in the trial of Mrs. Anna Willow as an accomplice in the crime.

She was convicted of second degree murder, with from 10 to 20 years in the penitentiary. The jury deliberated six hours.

Mrs. Willow had to be assisted from the court room after she heard the verdict. She made a dramatic appeal that she be freed because of her "life of torture" with Willow, and declared that Ralph had implicated her unjustly as the instigator of the murder. She claims no previous knowledge of the crime.

OUTRUN EPINARD

French Colt, Given Odds as Favorite, Finishes Fourth in Field of Seven at Laurel.

T. C. U. Back Runs Through Entire Team 55-Yards For Lone Counter at Abilene.

ABILENE, Texas, Oct. 18.—Simmons held the T. C. U. Horned Frogs down to the danger line today, allowing the visitors to nose out a 7-0 victory.

T. C. U. scored their only touchdown in the first quarter, when Taylor raced 55 yards through the Simmons team for a touchdown and Cantrell kicked goal.

Three thousand spectators saw the game. Neither team gained with consistency and were forced to punt constantly as a means to keep the ball out of their territory.

An even break in the punting duel kept the ball in mid-field most of the time.

TEXAS DEFEATED BY S M U ELEVEN

New Page of Southwestern Conference History Written When Mustangs Trample Longhorns.

FEATURE AERIAL ATTACK

Both Teams Take Air in Hard Fought and Thrilling Grid Battle—Stands Call For "Wop."

FAIR PARK STADIUM, Dallas, Texas, Oct. 18.—Fighting consistently for every gain, the Southern Methodist University Mustangs triumphed for the first time in Southwestern Conference football history over the University of Texas eleven this afternoon with a 10 to 6 win.

The determined Methodists threatened the Texas goal in the first quarter, when a pass, Stollenwerk to Henry, carried the ball to the Texas 17-yard line. In attempting to pass again for a touchdown, Stollenwerk passed over Bedford's head and behind the Texas goal line.

This gave the ball to the Longhorns on their own 20-yard line, and Thompson, right half back, kicked hastily out of danger and Texas entered the enemy's territory, remaining there the rest of the period.

Open Aerial Attack.
Not until late in the second quarter did the Mustang quarterback find a successful opening for the aerial attack for which this team is noted, when a pass was completed, Stollenwerk to Reiser, and the ball was carried to the Texas 13-yard line, and a touchdown looked certain.

MA HELD ELIGIBLE BY COURT RULING

All Questions Raised in Dickson Injunction Suit Decided in Favor of Mrs. Ferguson.

ALL QUESTIONS ANSWERED

Judge Cureton of Supreme Court Denies Injunction—"Ma" Receives Glad Tidings.

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 18.—The Supreme Court today decided all questions in favor of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Democratic candidate for Governor, which were raised in the Dickson injunction suit. Mrs. Ferguson was held to be eligible to hold the office of Governor, and she has the right to have her name printed on the ticket.

All the certified questions which came to the Supreme Court from the Court of Appeals were decisively answered. The case started when Charles M. Dickson, San Antonio, sued in the 53rd District Court for a writ of injunction to enjoin the name of Mrs. Ferguson on the grounds that she was not eligible to hold the office of governor on account of her sex.

Judge George Calhoun denied the injunction, holding that Mrs. Ferguson was eligible. And appeal was taken and the Third Court of Civil Appeals certified six questions to the Supreme Court which it took under submission last Saturday at a special session.

The opinion of 34 pages written by Associate Justice P. T. Greenwood was concurred in by Chief Justice C. T. Cureton and Associate Justice William Pison. In deciding that Mrs. Ferguson was eligible (Continued on page four)

BIG KONKLAVE

ATTACKS GOP CAMPAIGN FUND

Robert La Follette Charges Republicans Spending \$10,000,000 To Defeat Will of People.

TESTIFIES THROUGH WALSH

Progressive Party Presidential Candidate Sends Lawyer to Appear Before Senate Committee.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 18.—The Republicans are dumping more than \$10,000,000 into the present campaign, Senator Robert M. La Follette, charged through his attorney, Frank P. Walsh, before the Senate campaign fund committee today.

"I regret that Senator La Follette is unable to be here," Walsh said. "I am here as his attorney. Senator La Follette told me to tell this committee that more than \$10,000,000 is being spent by the Republicans in this campaign to defeat the will of the people."

"All the evidence has been secured from creditable witnesses and reliable sources and leads us to believe that the charge is a fact."

DENIED BAIL

Arkansas Man Who Killed Another in Quarrel Held For Murder—Victim Was Unarmed.

TEXARKANA, Ark., Oct. 18.—Robt. Mills was denied bail today following a municipal court hearing in connection with the fatal shooting of Dr. Will Barber, near Bielos Mills early in the week.

A dispute over live stock caused the slaying. Barber was unarmed at the time of the shooting, according to witnesses.

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 18.—Admiral Sir Percy Scott, in charge of the gunnery defense of London against aircraft attack during the world war, died here today.

GET LABOR OKEH

Nearly 300 Candidates For House and Senate Endorsed in Official Labor Organ.

PLANS COMPLETE FOR NOLAN FAIR

Committees Report All in Readiness For Nolan County's First Annual Fair 12 Days Distant.

EXPECT MANY EXHIBITS

Farmers Over This Section Preparing Products For Show—Entertainment Program Completed.

All plans and preparations for the first annual Nolan County Fair, less than two weeks away, are practically completed, and all is in readiness for the opening of the fair grounds and exhibit buildings in north Sweetwater early Thursday morning, Oct. 30, according to members of the central committee Saturday.

With over a month of extensive preparations, the heads of the various sub-committees have worked their departments into definite shape for presenting and taking care of exhibits of various natures. Advance reports from the committee chairmen indicate that an unusually large number of exhibits will be entered into every department, considering that this is Nolan County's first fair. Farmers all over this section have taken a great interest in the proposition, and many have been busily preparing their exhibits and will doubtlessly make the contest for the winners a close one. The community farm exhibit is attracting much interest throughout the county, it is reported, and some keen competition from the many progressive communities in the county for first honors is already starting. NOT GUILTY IS SWEETIN PLEA

Woman Declares Innocence of Poisoning Husband With Arsenic—Confessed Crime Three Weeks Ago.

CONFER WITH LAWYERS

Elsie Sweetin and Unfrosted Minister Go Into Conference With Attorney and Judge For Trial Date.

MT. VERNON, Ill., Oct. 18.—Elsie Sweetin today pleaded not guilty to an indictment charging the murder of her husband with arsenic, to which she confessed three weeks ago.

Judge Kern in the Jefferson County Circuit Court over-ruled the motion to quash the indictment, and the lawyers for Elsie and her paramour, Lawrence Hight, unfrosted minister of Ina, Ill., then went into conference with the State's attorney and the Judge to set the date of the trial.

Both Hight and Mrs. Sweetin were in the court room, which was jammed to the doors with many waiting outside. Hight, who confessed that he furnished arsenic for Elsie Sweetin to poison, is expected to plead guilty, but the plea may be made at a later date.

SOLON KILLED

State Representative Fields of Giddings Shot to Death Over Football Game Argument.

GEORGETOWN, Texas, Oct. 18.—As the result of an argument arising over a football game here between the Giddings and Georgetown football teams, State Representative Charles Fields of Giddings was shot to death, and his brother, John Fields was seriously wounded. A. Townsley, said to be a special officer at the game, was taken into custody.

The street was crowded with football fans at the time of the shooting which occurred outside the ball park after the game. The trouble is said to have started in an argument during the progress of the game, and was resumed after the men left the park.

Townsley was taken to Austin and lodged in the Travis County jail. Feeling was said to be running high in Giddings.

Some very interesting questions would have been raised if the Supreme Court had held differently, not only regarding the Democratic nominee for Governor but all other past, present and prospective women office holders in the State.

CONGRATULATIONS

Just at the present time the congratulations of this city are due those residents of Pine Street who worked up the paving project for that street—and for the residents of Third street who are also participating in a paving program. Here's hoping that Elm Street will soon be on the dotted line also, as well as other streets of the city. With hard surfaced highways leading into Sweetwater from all directions—and leading into without pavement or dirt or mud—what a contrast!

COSTS

There are about as many different kinds of paving as there are streets in Sweetwater, and the costs vary on each kind. Some are good and some are not. There has been an awful lot of poor paving put down in many cities during the past quarter of a century. Traffic and heavy loads wear out quickly a pavement that would have stood up under horse-drawn traffic indefinitely. The action of water and frost must also be guarded against. We cannot afford to experiment in Sweetwater. We have done some experimenting already. City property will bear the investment of paving just about once. Therefore it is essential that the correct type of paving be adopted the first time. It stands to reason that a type of pavement which has given good service in other cities will do likewise here and it also stands to reason that the cost thereof will be just about the same, subject to conditions peculiarly local.

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HAS OLD HUNCH

Brennan Says Davis Will Carry Illinois and Nation in November Election.

Predicting that John W. Davis, Democratic presidential nominee, will carry Illinois in November, George Brennan, veteran political leader of that State foresees also a national Democratic victory at the polls, and says he has the "hunch of 1912" says a statement received by J. H. Doscher, county finance chairman, from W. L. Clayton, director of finance for Texas, Democratic National Committee, now engaged in organizing Victory Clubs and raising funds for the Democratic campaign fund. The statement says:

"The majority of those voters who reserve judgment until the situation is finally developed will support John W. Davis because he not only is the best man in the field, but also because he is the only one of the three who can win the electoral college," contends Brennan, who says the voters are beginning to realize that plunging the election into Congress would disturb business to the extreme, and that they are not going to take the risk.

"Mr. Brennan, veteran of many political campaigns, waves aside straw votes, declaration of racial groups, and other minor considerations, and outspokenly proclaims his hunch that the Democrats are going to win.

"He says that Davis will 'grow' on the voters from now until election day, and that they will 'discover' President Coolidge before November 4.

"We are requesting Democrats, by contributing to the campaign fund, to aid in the final drive toward that end."

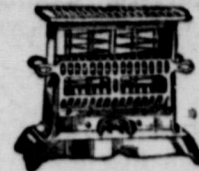

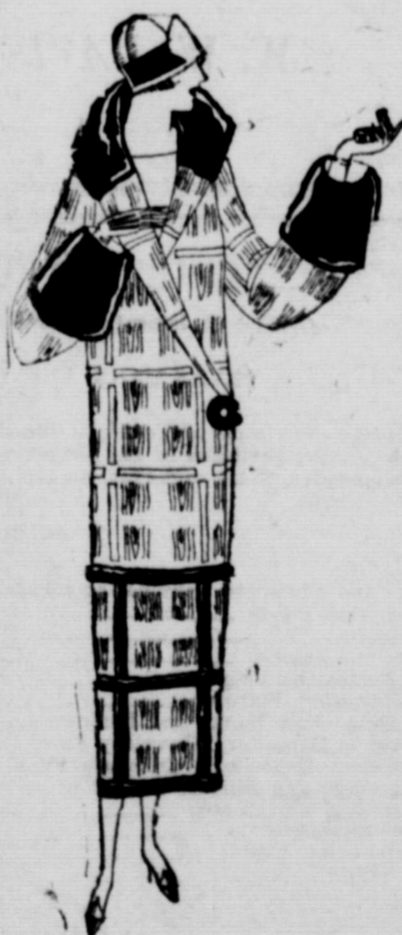

The half ended S. M. U. 3, Texas 0, and both teams had drawn repeatedly on their reserves.

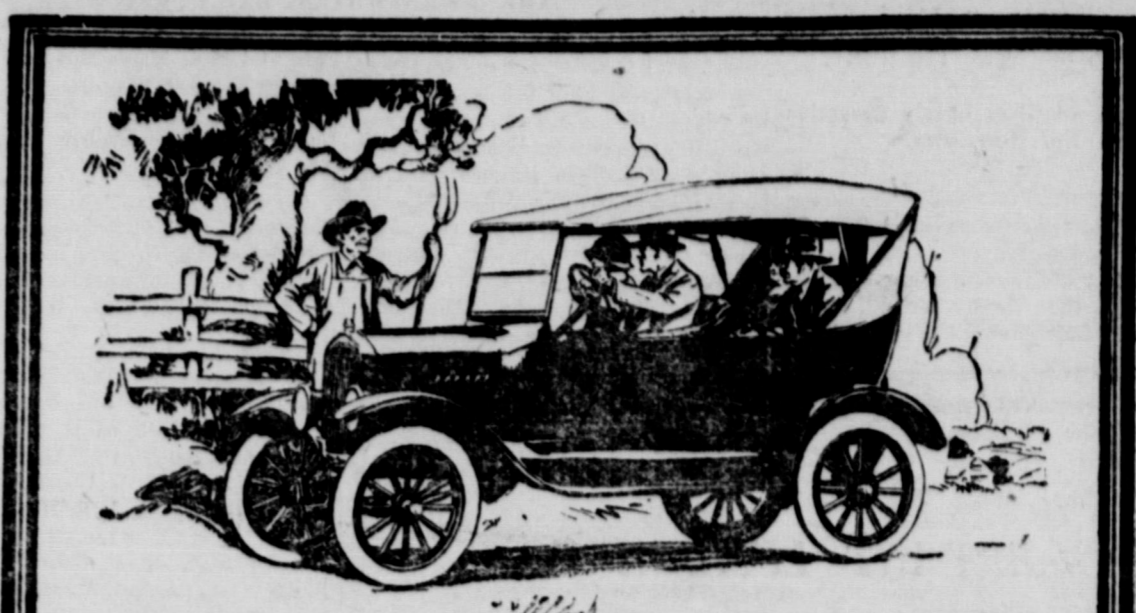
had decided all the questions raised in the injunction in her favor.

Ayers in San Angelo. They were followed by Ayers who was on the stand for a hard cross examination by District Attorney Brooks. Ayers is 34 years of age, he stated, and has lived in San Angelo 15 years where he has been employed chiefly as service car driver. It was in that capacity, he testified, that he was hired by Mr. and Mrs. Dick Toland to drive them to near Sweetwater to see Toland's brother. They drove to Blackwell, he stated, and from there came to Sweetwater where they purchased food. From there they went to the home of Toland's brother in Fisher County and spent the night. He slept in his car that night while Mr. and Mrs. Toland stayed with their brother, he declared. The next day they came to Sweetwater, from there went to Blackwell and back to San Angelo that night he stated, which was the same night the robbery occurred. His testimony was practically unshaken by the cross examination.

Mrs. John Tollet, formerly Mrs. Dick Toland, and who obtained a divorce the past summer and married John Tollet of San Angelo recently, was a witness for the State, and in a straightforward manner told how her former husband and Ayers planned the robbery while in San Angelo. Her story of the trip to Blackwell, Sweetwater and Fisher County was similar to Ayers' testimony. When they left Toland's brother, however, she stated they drove to Sweetwater, then to Blackwell, and came back to Sweetwater that night. They drove the car to a spot between the Orient and Santa Fe stations, she stated, and stopped. Ayers and Toland left the car and went towards the Santa Fe station, she swore, directly they came back with a small leather bag of money and one of them stated that they would "livide it fifty-fifty."

FLOWERS READY PUPS BEAT ROBY

With Show Only 12 Days Away Plants in Good Condition For Exhibition Long Stems Important.

The weather of the past week has been conducive to plant growth, and with the flower show only twelve days off, there is promised a display more profuse and gorgeous than has ever been seen here.

There will be ample room at the exhibit, and it is urgently desired that everyone who has flowers take particular care in their culture, that they may be entered. Practically every variety is eligible for a prize.

Those in charge of the show advise that if you want longer roses, faithfully pinch off every bud except one on the stem, thus concentrating the growing power. In cutting, long stems are much to be desired and will count in the winning.

It is also suggested that fertilizer be put on top of the ground around chrysanthemums, without touching them. With plenty of water given the plants through this top dressing, and the pinching of all buds except the ones the growers wish to force, gorgeous flowers are produced.

The flower division will be under the auspices of the Sorosis Club and it extends an invitation to every grower of either blooming or foliage plants to bring in exhibits. There is no entrance charge. There will be about \$50 set aside for flower premiums, for different classes of roses, chrysanthemums, pot plants, ferns and cut flowers.

All potted plants must be entered not later than 7 o'clock Tuesday the 28th, while cut flowers will be received Oct. 30, and they will be judged and prizes awarded that day.

COTTON IS GOOD

Majority of Crop Received Here of Good Grade—Stream of Bales Continues.

The majority of cotton coming into Sweetwater from this section is good grade, it is stated, running from fair middling to middling.

The rains of the past month have only slightly slowed up the general movement of cotton, it is declared by cotton men, and has not lowered the grade to a great extent.

Cotton was bringing from 22 to 23 cents in Sweetwater Saturday.

Up to 2 o'clock Saturday, 75 bales had been received during the day at the cotton yards, and later receipts ran the day's total to over 100 bales. Some of the cotton brought here goes from the gins to the compress, and other is sold through the Bureau. The Sweetwater Compress has handled enormous amounts of cotton so far this season, many bales coming here from towns throughout West Texas. The local cotton yards delivered 114 bales to the compress Saturday.
