REPAINTING SAFETY LINES

Work Also Starts on Placing Flag Poles Around Square.

Painters were busy in the downtown section Monday laying off yellow marks at street intersections for safety and parking zones. The old lines of white have been worn away, and are being replaced by the bright yellow marks. The observation of the safety zones is asked in order to do away with "jay walking," a practice that is expected to be decidedly dangerous during the Fair Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Work has also commenced on drilling holes in the sidewalks around the square in preparation for installing the permanent flag displays, a movement sponsored by the Legion Auxiliary of this city. Iron posts will be placed in the sidewalks and from these will be floated American flags during holidays and festival occasions. This system of display is expected to be completed in time for use during the Nolan County Fair.

COTTON REPORT

Texas Crop is 53 Per Cent Normal Estimated 4,350,000 Bales in Latest Report.

Special to The Reporter. HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 27.—The condition of the Texas cotton crop as of October 18 is estimated at 53 per cent of normal, forecasting a production of 4,350,000 500-lb. bales. If the bales should average as heavy as last season, the census report of 3,270,602 bales ginned prior to October 18 would indicate approximately 81 per cent of the crop as already ginned.

HONOR WALLACE IN WASHINGTON

Wheels of Government Halt as Plans For Funeral of Secretary of Agriculture Are Made.

FUNERAL AT WHITE HOUSE

Government Offices Close From 9 a. m. to 1 p. m.—Burial to be in Des Moines.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 27.—Government business halted while the capital paid official homage to the late Secretary of Agriculture Henry C. Wallace, who died Saturday. Funeral services were to be held in the East Room of the White House at 11 o'clock.

Government offices were closed from 9 a. m. until 1 p. m. At 3 p. m., the funeral party was to leave for Des Moines, Ia., where final burial will take place.

SEE WHOLE SHOW

Circus Brings Entire Outfit to Sweetwater Thursday For Greatest Show on Road.

"They don't bring all the show here, do they Mister?"

DECLARES DAVIS CERTAIN TO WIN

Coolidge is Already Defeated, Says C. W. Jurney, Veteran Politician in Touch With Situation.

DAVIS HAS 206 SURE VOTES

If He Fails to Get Majority in Electoral College, Will Win in House in February.

"It is absolutely certain that Coolidge is already defeated," is the assertion made by C. W. Jurney, for many years secretary to former Senator Chas. A. Culberson and now occupying a similar position with Senator Royal S. Copeland of New York.

"This conviction is expressed in a letter to Judge John L. Young of Dallas, Associate Director of Finance for Texas, Democratic National Committee," says a statement issued by J. H. Doseher, County Finance Director, who is urging all Democrats of the county to join the Victory Clubs and by their contributions, however modest, to aid in the election of John W. Davis, the Democratic presidential nominee.

Mr. Jurney, a Texan, who long has been in touch with the national political pulse, wrote Judge Young as follows:

"There is no question about Coolidge's defeat, for Davis has 206 sure votes and LaFollette 60, which makes 266 or a majority of the electoral college which makes it utterly impossible for Coolidge to win there.

"The only question is whether Davis in the remaining weeks can get a clear majority in the electoral college, or whether the contest will go to the House, but in either event, he is certain of selection either in the electoral college or in the House.

"You can put it down that it is going to be President John W. Davis after March 4, for if he fails of a majority on Nov. 4, he will get a majority in the House. There will be a joint session of the House and Senate on the second Wednesday in February, 1925, to count the vote. This falls on February 11, next year, and if nobody receives a majority after the vote is canvassed, the House will then proceed to the election of a President and there is no question that, if it goes that far, Coolidge will be entirely out of it and the only question will be in whether it will be Davis or Bryan. There is no doubt in the mind of anyone in Washington about the result in that sort of contingency, for the Republicans would solidly vote for Davis before they would let Bryan have it. The Democrats are going to win in one of these two ways.

"In the 206 sure votes for Davis that no one can take away from him are not included those of New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Rhode Island, Indiana, Ohio or Illinois, and he has a fine chance to pick up sixty votes in these states and get a clear majority in the college."

Mrs. J. L. Woodward, 69, Dies After Sunshine Special Strikes Wagon In Which She And Husband Are Crossing Tracks

HUSBAND ALSO SEVERELY INJURED

Woodward Thrown From Wagon, Wife Carried By Train Into Tank Car—Returning From Church at Time of Crash

Mrs. J. L. Woodward, 69, is dead, and her husband, J. L. Woodward, is in a serious condition after the light farm wagon in which they were riding home from church was struck by the T-P Sunshine Special No. 1 at the Lamar Street crossing shortly after 10 o'clock Sunday night. Woodward was thrown from the wagon to the ground after the collision, while the wagon with Mrs. Woodward was carried down the track for about 15 yards, finally dashing her against a tank car. She died a few minutes later in a physician's office.

RUSSIA CHARGES LETTERS FORGED

Sends Note to Great Britain Branding Communist Propaganda "Impudent Forgery."

CLAIM THRUST AT PEACE

Punishment of Citizens and Officials Implicated Demanded—Suggest Impartial Court.

MOSCOW, Russia, Oct. 27.—A note dispatched by the Russian government to the British government completely repudiates the "Zinozief" letters, brands the letters as an "impudent forgery" and demands an apology and punishment for both private citizens and officials implicated in the forgery.

Russia proposes an impartial court of arbitration to affirm the fact that the letters are a forgery and an attempt to disrupt Anglo-Russian amity.

INJURY FATAL

Luisa Pares, 16, Dies of Injuries Received in Car Collision Near Colorado October 19.

COLORADO, Texas, Oct. 27.—Luisa Pares, 16, of Fort Stockton, died here today from injuries received near Colorado October 19, when the car in which she was traveling collided with another machine and was demolished. Three other persons seriously injured in the same crash will recover.

Wins Amateur Prize.

The hearty applause of her friends made little Miss Mary Bennett winner of the five dollar prize given Friday night at the Hefner's Comedians performance, where Miss Mary gave a reading. She was a proud little girl and wishes her friends to know of her appreciation of their part in helping her win the prize.

Plan Church Picnic.

At the First Christian Church Sunday an indoor picnic, was announced for the church and Sunday school, to be held Wednesday evening in the Hubert Toler automobile show rooms, next door to the Christian Church, beginning at 7:15 o'clock.

The platform on which Premier MacDonald was standing fell near London the other day, which may or may not be ominous for the platform on which he is running.

The couple, both of whom are old, were returning home from church and the team they were driving was traveling at a brisk trot as they neared the crossing, according to spectators of the accident. Just as they reached the first side tracks before getting to the main line, W. N. Carter, watchman at the crossing, waved his lantern and shouted a warning, he stated. Mr. Woodward commenced whipping the team at that instant, and the wagon moved on directly in the path of the train, which was slowing down for the depot.

The train and front part of the wagon cleared the tracks, but the engine struck the rear wheels and carried the wagon on down the tracks. The engineer shot on the brakes instantly and the train was brought to a halt after only two or three cars had passed the crossing. Members of the train crew and others at once rushed to Mrs. Woodward who never regained consciousness, it is reported.

The couple were rushed to a physician in a Wright ambulance, but Mrs. Woodward died shortly afterwards. Her injuries included a broken leg, fractured skull and many lacerations in the scalp. One gash extended through the ear up across the head. Woodward sustained a lacerated scalp and injuries about the chest, but is expected to recover.

The train, which was westward bound, was running late, it being due here at 9:20, and arrived at 10:03. The watchman, when the train neared the crossing, gave the "ston" signal, he stated Monday, and waved his lantern aloft in an effort to stop the oncoming wagon. Seeing that they gave no indications of seeing him nor of stopping, he shouted several times, but the wagon continued its course and a second or two later the crash came. It is not known whether the driver of the wagon believed he had ample time to cross before the train, or failed to see the watchman's signal or observe the coming train.

The wagon was smashed into pieces, the rear wheels being shattered and the bed torn from the wheels. Broken spokes and other pieces of the vehicle were scattered for several yards up the tracks. The wagon was torn loose from the mules which broke into a run down Lamar Street.

Just before the fatal accident occurred, Mr. and Mrs. Woodward took their daughter, who had been here on a visit, to the Orient station where she was to take a train to Altus, Ok. After the accident, their daughter was notified at Hamlin, and immediately returned to Sweetwater.

Besides her husband, Mrs. Woodward is survived by three sons and two daughters, all of whom are expected to be here for the funeral. The funeral arrangements have not been completed.

The home of the couple is in the south part of town, and they have lived here for some time. Mr. Woodward is a janitor at a local church.

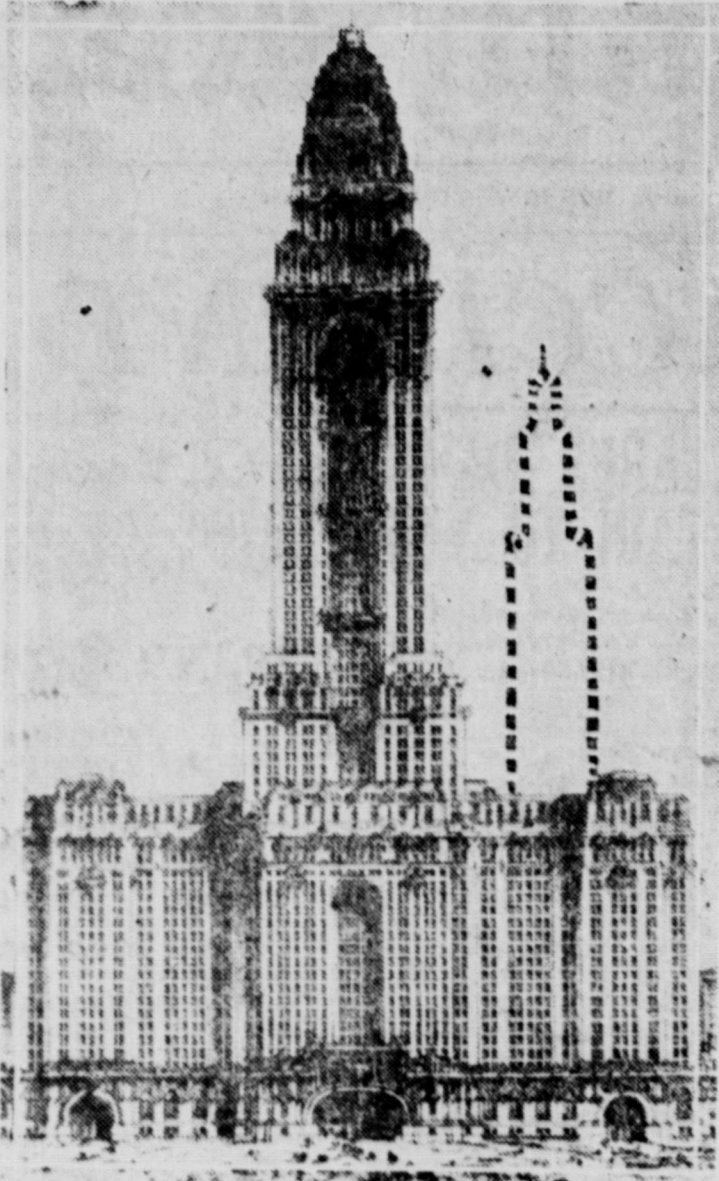
AN APPEAL TO BOLTERS

Stepping from the pulpit and his work in the education of young people in West Texas, Dr. J. W. Hunt, president of McMurry College, Abilene, has headed for the 'all political timber, but after beating his way about in the brush on the outside of the forest, has been forced to content himself with mounting a stump, from which lofty position he assumes the role of Thor, the Thunder God, and hurls more or less effective bolts against the nominee of his party for Governor. Here is an appeal made to the Democracy of Texas by a Christian gentleman and a scholar, who so far reverses his teachings of loyalty and honor to ask members of his own party to break the pledge of fidelity made to the organization, a sacred bond in the hearts of true Democrats of Texas. There is no doubt that Dr. Hunt is a successful preacher and educator. It appears incongruous that a man of his intelligence and honor should enter the field against his own people and take up the standard of a party steeped in graft and corruption, a party whose national record is practically certain to defeat it at the November election. Thus has the Thor of Texas descended from the chair of the learned to the mighty heights of the stump, to cast his bolts among those he believes to be either nuts, bolts, or bolters. Dr. Hunt decries Fergusonism as one of the greatest moral issues ever faced by the people of Texas. He appeals to Democrats to support a Republican. He says that there is a higher law than the party pledge, but he does not say who made the law. The voters of Texas registered a majority of nearly 100,000 against this law and Dr. Hunt's teachings in the primary election. Let Thor hurl his bolt where he may; it's a long throw from the top of the stump to the top of the ladder. All true Democrats should keep their pledge and support the nominees of the Democratic party in accordance with the appeal made by Clem Shaver, National Chairman. Should Texas go Republican, and we won't admit for a moment it will, it could be considered nothing less than a calamity to the party nationally.

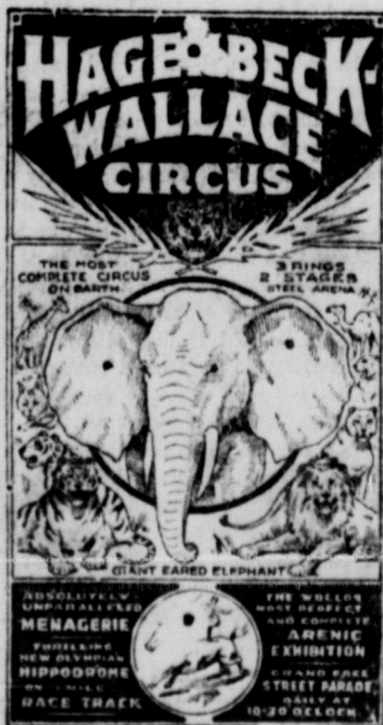

Lighting the Kitchen

It may seem a bit odd to start with the kitchen instead of with the living room for our lighting lessons, but the kitchen is a room of importance. A home may be built without a sun room or a living room, but without a kitchen, never!

And this is the room in our home where somebody must work a good many hours each day. In most families that somebody is likely to be Mother. Winter mornings there's breakfast to get by electric light. There's always kitchen work to do after dark in the evening and there are gloomy days when artificial light is necessary almost all day long in the kitchen.

Factory work rooms are compelled by law to be at least reasonably well lighted, but the work room of the home, the kitchen, often is very badly lighted just because Mother never has complained about it. To be well lighted, there should be a flood of soft, even light in the kitchen that gets into every nook and corner. When you stand at the sink while washing the dishes, there should be no deep, black shadows on the dishes. It should be impossible to "stand in your light" so as to throw a dense shadow on your work anywhere in the room. You should be able to open the oven door and actually see in.

Many kitchens are lighted with a fixture like the one shown in this picture. No kitchen can be well lighted

Changing the old style fixture to this modern kitchen light will make a



surprising difference in the appearance of the kitchen and in the ease with which kitchen work may be done.

In order to be sure that there is plenty of light at the sink, and no bad shadows, it is usually well to provide in addition to the light at the ceiling, a bracket fixture on the wall over the sink, or, if that is not possible, another light hung from the ceiling, which will be over the sink. This light should be just high enough above the head to be out of the way. This fixture should have a deep, open bottom, dense milk-white glass shade. It may have an insulated pull chain switch. In some kitchens a fixture like this may be needed over the kitchen stove.



Just as a 100-watt lamp bulb in the ceiling fixture will give proper lighting, so a 50-watt white bulb is excellent for the fixture over the sink or the stove. Some people prefer a 150-watt day-light or blue bulb in the center fixture and a 75-watt daylight or blue bulb in the fixture over the sink or stove. The use of daylight or blue bulbs makes a well kept kitchen look even more spick and span and gives to it, night or day, a daylight cheerfulness.

When using an electric iron or any other appliance, we need all the light we can get. Therefore, it is not a good thing to remove a bulb to connect the iron. Have a convenience outlet just like this in the wall near



the table, about 36 inches or more above the floor.

Passing the Plate by Radio

Pessimists say radio broadcasting can not continue indefinitely because there is no way to collect the cost from the ultimate consumer — the listener-in. The Sunday Evening Club, of Chicago, has disproved the assertion by successfully passing the plate to the radio fans when the weekly religious services of the club are broadcast each Sunday night from October to May. The club has never asked the radio enthusiasts to contribute, but each week gets a flood of letters containing donations. "I heard the plate being passed, and here is my donation," is a typical letter. The contributions range from a few cents to as high as \$25, and the appreciation of the audience was proved by the fact that the total amount of their gifts during the eight months of the 1923-24 season was over \$1,200.

Touch on Lever Tilts Auto Lights Ending Glare without Dimming

To eliminate the necessity of dimming automobile headlights when passing other cars, a device has been made with which they may be tilted toward the road by



touching a lever on the steering post. In this way a daylight view of the road is given when meeting other motorists without blinding approaching drivers. By dropping the lights while driving in fog or over rough or muddy places where it is necessary to pick the way, all details of the road immediately ahead of the car become clearly visible.



Light Lifeboats for Seaplanes to Save Wrecked Fliers

To aid in saving lives of aviators who might be wrecked while flying over large areas of water, lifeboats so light they can be easily carried on seaplanes have been designed. Strongly built and equipped with oars and rope, the boat is said to add but little to the burden of aircraft. In case forced landings in the sea are necessary, when planes become damaged, it can be easily unshipped from its moorings and navigated by one man. Constructed with a wide beam, the lifeboat can safely negotiate ordinary rough seas.

Compound for Cleaning Paint on Engines

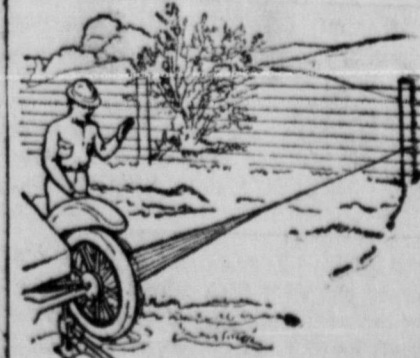
A compound with which engines or other oily machinery can be cleaned thoroughly is made as follows: To 1 gal. of water add 1/4 pt. of lard oil. Mix them thoroughly, forming an emulsion. Rub the painted surfaces of the machinery with the compound and remove it before it dries with a cloth.

Cementing Leather to Iron

To cement leather to an iron surface, paint the iron with a mixture of white lead and lampblack in oil. Then cover with a cement made of the best glue soaked in water until soft, and dissolved in vinegar. This is thoroughly mixed with one-third of its bulk of white-pine turpentine, and thinned with a brush, until it can be spread with a brush. The cement should be applied to the iron box and the leather put on and quickly pressed into place; the parts should be held tightly in a clamp while drying.

Making Stranded-Wire Cables

Having had considerable difficulty in obtaining good seven-stranded cable for guy wires, a mechanic hit upon the following method of making it himself: He jacked up one of the rear wheels of his car and fastened one end of a coil of galvanized-iron wire to one of the spokes, brought the wire around a fencepost, directly in line with the wheel, and attached it to the opposite spoke of the wheel, cutting it from the coil at this point. Two other lengths of wire were run in the same way and also a single length from the wheel to the post. He then started the engine and put it in gear, which caused the rear wheel to revolve and twist the wires as desired, making a



strong cable. With this method he has made cables 150 ft. long.

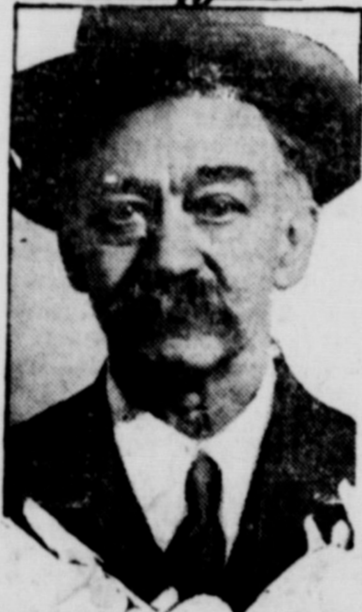
