STONE PICKS ONE PAPER FOR SUIT

To Test Conflict of Statutes in Rulings on Publication of Income Tax Payments.

FIGURES NOT AUTHORIZED

Publication Not in Accord With Present Laws, Attorney General's Personal Opinion.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 29.—Attorney General Stone today studied lists of newspapers which printed income tax payment figures with the view of choosing from them one paper against which suit will be brought by the federal government to settle the conflict of statutes on tax payment publicity.

Personally holding that the publication of the figures is not authorized in conformity with the laws as they stand, he will ask the courts through the medium of the suit what the intention was in authorizing limited publicity and at the same time fixing a penalty for publication.

WRIT REFUSED

Supreme Court Upholds Reversal of \$10,000 Libel Suit Against Houston Chronicle.

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 29.—By refusing a writ of error, the Supreme Court today upheld the decision of the Court of Civil Appeals, in reversing the judgment of the trial court in the \$10,000 libel suit brought by Henry Thomas against the Houston Chronicle Publishing Co. The trial court gave Thomas the decision.

RUSH SPECIAL INVESTIGATORS

Governor Sends Corps to Scene of Trouble as War Between Klan and Anti-Klan Factions Looms.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 29.—A corps of special investigators was ordered to Niles, O., today by Governor Donahey following the bombing of the mayor's home there and the report that rioting between Klan and anti-Klan forces was imminent.

Police and county authorities at Niles were searching for the men who bombed the home of Harvey Kistler, Mayor, during the night. The dwelling was damaged to the extent of \$1,000.

Mr. and Mrs. Kistler were sleeping in an upstairs room, but were uninjured.

COURT CONTINUES

Wright Case Will Probably Run Through Week—Mrs. Plumlee Seeks Damages From Railroad.

The Wright case proceeded in District Court through Wednesday and Thursday with several witnesses placed on the stand both days, and with indications that the trial would not be completed until the last of the week.

Another case is set for hearing next week, to start Nov. 4, it being a damage suit of Mrs. Plumlee administration vs. the G. S. & S. F. railroad. Mrs. Plumlee's husband was killed on a train near the New Mexico line some time ago when the boiler of the engine exploded, it is alleged, and she is asking \$75,000 damages.

FAIR READY TO OPEN THURSDAY

Grounds a Scene of Activity as Army of Workmen Add Finishing Touches For Opening.

BIG DAY THURSDAY

Band Concerts, Parade, Circus Performance, and Football Game Features For First Day.

A small army of workmen, scores of automobiles, hammering and sawing carpenters, flapping canvas, all marked a scene of bee-hive activity as Sweetwater entered upon the home stretch in preparations and final last touches for the Nolan County First Annual Fair that will open Thursday morning for three days of program events, farm, agricultural, livestock and commercial exhibits for the people of Nolan County and West Texas.

The long exhibit building is beginning to show many evidences of the gala occasion as colored cheese cloth and crepe paper are lavishly used about posts, windows and booths, setting off a colorful background for the many and varied exhibits and displays that will grace the stands and tables when the throngs begin to file in tomorrow morning.

Electricians were still busy in arranging the lighting system of the grounds as well as the exhibit building, and both will be as light as day, far into the night, while doubtless thousands view and enjoy the fair. A telephone has been installed in the exhibit building, and other conveniences are being arranged for the fair visitors.

A few farm products had already arrived from over the county Wednesday morning, and all the entries will be in place by Thursday morning. Automobile dealers were arranging their models in place on the south side of the exhibit building during Wednesday.

A fence has been erected about the fair grounds which will be entered through a large gate at the southwest corner. The parking problem may cause some inconvenience, but efforts are being made to provide plenty of space at the grounds for the automobiles. Extra traffic policemen have been added to the local force and with the co-operation of drivers, it is hoped that accidents will not mar the pleasures of the occasion.

Most of the judging will take place Thursday, the first day, and the exhibits and winners will probably be completely in the foreground during the three days. Band concerts will also be features of the first day. The Hagenbeck-Wallace circus will stage an up-town parade at 11 o'clock Thursday morning, followed by their afternoon show at 1 o'clock. At 4 o'clock, one of the headline attractions of the three days will take place in Swatter Park when the Sweetwater High School eleven will meet the team from Roscoe in what is promised to be the hardest and most thrilling game of the season here. Roscoe, fresh from their victory over the Salty Pups at Roscoe last week, will come here with sharpened spurs to make a great fight to snatch the second game from the Sweetwater team. Practically the whole city of Roscoe will be here to root for their team, and a hard, scrappy and thrilling game is certain.

The Sweetwater schools will have a whole day off Thursday, and the students will be free to take in the parade, circus, ball game and other fair events.

The Donald McGregor shows are up and running Wednesday and will likely be a special attraction to the fair visitors Thursday and Thursday night.

Traveling Movies Popular.

CAPE GIRARDEAU, Mo., Oct. 27.—Mahomet couldn't go to the mountain, so the mountain went to Mahomet. METHODIST MEET IN CONFERENCE

Hundreds of Pastors and Laymen in Abilene For Annual Meet of Northwest Texas.

DISCUSS HOSPITAL PURCHASE

Proposed Plan is For Church to Take Over and Operate Alexander Sanitarium at Abilene.

ABILENE, Texas, Oct. 29.—Hundreds of ministers and laymen of the Methodist Episcopal Church arrived in Abilene today for the opening of the Annual Northwest Texas Conference, which is to continue through the week.

Decision as to whether the Northwest Texas Methodist Conference shall take over the Alexander Sanitarium at the corner of North Fifth and Victoria streets will be made at the meeting of the Hospital Board at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon when the Conference meets in Abilene.

The Hospital Board met here June 27 and this proposition was presented by local laymen and Dr. J. M. Alexander. The sanitarium was inspected by the board at this time. The proposition is that this Conference of the Methodist Church purchase the sanitarium from Dr. Alexander and operate it under the direction of church authorities. The total consideration for the entire proposition amounts to \$156,000, it is said.

The sanitarium as it now stands will cost \$115,000, and if the Conference takes it over the plans are to erect a second building which will cost \$85,000, and the furnishing is to cost \$6,000. The proposition as made to the Hospital Board in the June meeting was that the church would be given 15 years in which to pay and that the principal is to draw 8 percent interest.

The Hospital Board appointed a committee of three, S. W. Hayne of Amarillo, who is chairman of the board; the Rev. W. M. Pearce, pastor of the First Methodist Church, and H. O. Wooten, to take the matter under advisement until the Conference and make a final and complete report at that time.

This committee has been studying church-owned and operated hospitals since that time and will be ready to make their recommendation to the Conference Wednesday.

If the Conference enters into the agreement as presented by Dr. Alexander they will erect a new building which will add 36 beds to the present capacity of the sanitarium. The sanitarium is a modern 3-story brick building with good equipment.

HAND INJURED

Three Inch Splinter Driven into Hand of Workman.

Although G. L. Staton, truck body builder at the W. D. Sayle garage, has a right arm that has been twice broken and often bruised and battered, he is exhibiting an unusual specimen from his latest accident, a three-inch splinter that was driven between the third and fourth fingers of his right hand while he was planing a four by six plank Tuesday.

The splinter was completely buried in the flesh, and only a small part of it could be seen after the accident. Henry Rape, who works with Staton, pulled the splinter from his hand with a pair of pliers. The wood went straight into the flesh, and did not protrude on either side of Staton's hand.

ENGLAND GOES TO VOTE WEDNESDAY

Twenty Million Voters to Register Approval or Disapproval of Labor Government.

HOSPITALS ARE CROWDED

Many Eyes and Noses Damaged as Election Gets Under Way—Many Women Taking Part.

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 29.—Twenty two million British voters went to the polls today to register approval or disapproval of the Ramsay MacDonald Labor government. Nine million were women.

West London hospitals were flooded with election fight cases during the day, consisting mostly of black eyes and bleeding noses. Many women were among the victims.

There was no indication of how the vote was going, although the Conservatives are considered certain of regaining many seats.

One child was killed and ten persons injured when a wagon advertising the Conservative cause in the Bolton division collapsed.

COTTON CASE UP

Expect Judgment Soon in Unusual Suit Brought by Cotton Bureau vs. Nolan County Farmer.

Judgment is expected to be rendered this week by District Judge Leslie who has had under consideration the case of the Cotton Bureau vs. C. E. Long, a Nolan County farmer. The suit, which is something different from any case of its nature ever heard here, is an injunction suit in which the Cotton Bureau is attempting to enjoin the landlord, C. E. Long, from the selling of cotton on his land to firms, other than the Cotton Bureau. Long, however, has his farm divided up and rented to tenants who pay, it is reported, their rent in one-fourth the cotton and one-third the feed raised on the farm.

Tenants on the farm have been selling the cotton to buyers in the usual way, and placing the landlord's portion of the proceeds in the bank in his name, it is stated. The issue, as argued in the case here this week, seems to be whether the Bureau can force the tenants to hold the cotton for the Bureau, or whether they are not affected by the membership of their landlord in the association.

Fourth Victim Of Loony Gas Dies In Straight Jacket

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 29.—William Kresge died in a straight jacket at Reconstruction Hospital here today, bringing the list of the "loony gas" victims in the Bayway plant of the Standard Oil Co., to four.

Herbert Fuson, one of the 19 victims of the strange gas, is confined in a straight jacket and is not expected to live. Six of the men are reported to be in a "serious condition."

ACTORS FIGURE IN SENATE QUIZ

Charge Theatrical Publicity Offered to La Follette Forces for \$50,000 By Agency.

PRESIDENT'S PARTY AIRED

Investigating Senators Hear Testimony Concerning Coolidge's Affair For Actors and Actresses.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 29.—The charge that theatrical publicity had been offered for sale to the La Follette forces for \$50,000 by a prominent agency was today laid before the Senate committee investigating campaign funds.

The party given by President Coolidge for a group of actors and actresses was also aired before the committee. Rhinelander Waldo of Garrison, N. Y., testified that he had arranged for the party with C. Bascom Slemph, the President's secretary, and stated that he had paid \$1,297 for railroad expenses and meals for the actors and actresses.

The testimony included that of William L. Ramm, Lawrence, Mass., supporter of La Follette, who said that he had been offered \$22 a day by H. G. Drew, Republican organizer, to make speeches and work among the railroad men for the Coolidge and Dawes ticket.

H. L. Brunson of the International Machinists Association testified that he had collected \$120,000 for the La Follette campaign from trade union members. He said that 94 percent of the amount had been in \$1 subscriptions.

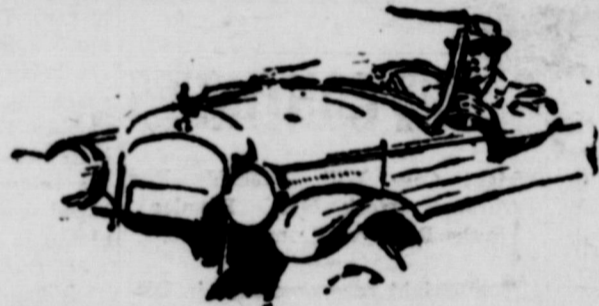

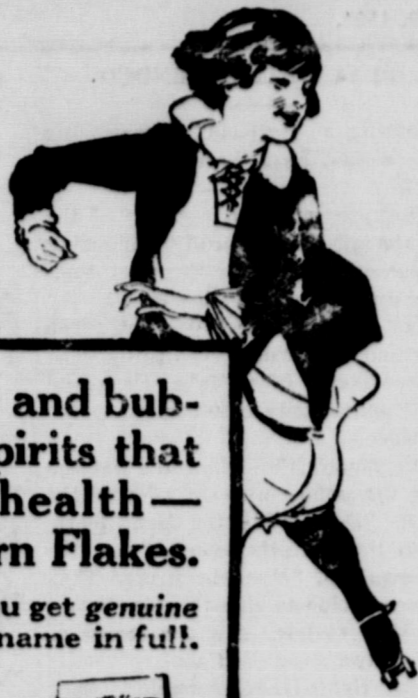

Lighting the Living Room

The living room is usually not only the largest room in the house, but it is also the room that is most used. In most homes it serves as the sitting room, the parlor, the library and the music room.

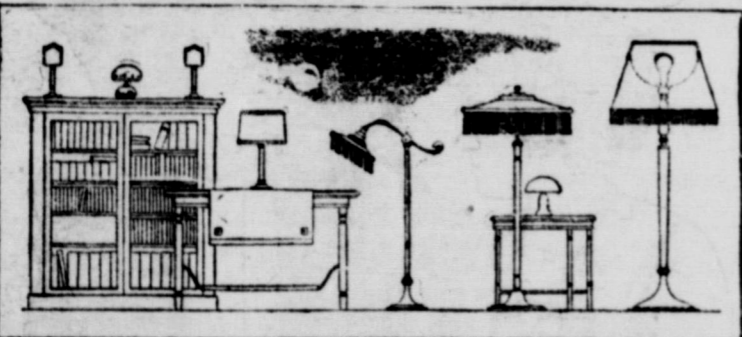
Because we do so many different things in this room, we need lighting that can be changed and varied to suit our purpose. For example, if we wish to entertain our friends by dancing or playing cards, we should be able to flood the whole room with plenty of soft, cheerful light; if we wish to read or sew, we should be able to have the light come over the shoulder from behind a favorite chair; if we wish to play the piano and sing, we should have the music well lighted. At all times the lighting effect should be pleasant and attractive.

To get these effects, we need three different kinds of lighting equipment in the room. First we have a fixture hung from the ceiling with which we can flood the room with light; then we have table lamps and floor lamps which are portable and can be moved about as furniture is rearranged, to give a good reading light. Finally, we may have bracket fixtures on the

walls, which give us charming spots of colored light—never too bright and only used to add attractive decoration to our other lighting.

"Bulbs" are known by the amount of electricity it takes to light them. The unit by which they are classified is the "Watt" and bills for electric lighting current are rendered in terms of a "kilowatt-hour," which is one thousand watts for one hour, or one hundred watts for ten hours.

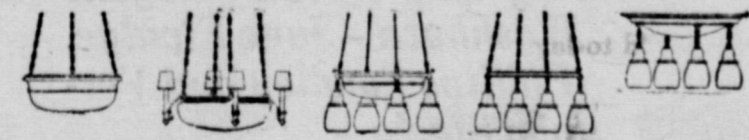
The total watts needed in any room depends upon size of the room, the kind of fixtures used, the color of the decorations and the lighting effect wanted. In most rooms good lighting may require as little as one or as much as five watts of bulbs for each square foot of floor area in the room. Here are the things to think about when we want to be sure we have

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good lighting in the living room. 1. Do we have plenty of light when we need it? 2. Are all the bulbs well shaded so that we do not have any glare? 3. Does the lighting equipment look well in the room, and does it fit both limited and unlighted with the furniture and woodwork?

THE CEILING FIXTURE
Unless the living room is very large only one fixture is needed on the ceiling. However, if the room is long and narrow—perhaps twice as long as it is wide, two ceiling fixtures

should be used. There are several kinds of fixtures which will provide good lighting in the living room. Some of these are shown in the Home Lighting Primer on page 23. Some are shown in the next picture. The bulbs in these fixtures vary in number, but the total watts necessary for good lighting is from 100 to 250 watts. The shades may be of glass, silk or parchment. They should completely hide the bulb and should be dense enough so that the whole surface of the shade is evenly lighted. A bright spot in the center of the shade means that the shade is not dense enough, and that some glare is present. The use of all frosted bulbs will often do away with shadows of chains which would otherwise be cast on the ceiling.

PORTABLE LAMPS
Portable lamps include floor lamps, table lamps and small pedestal lamps, candlesticks, torches, etc., for mantle and bookcase. The best portable lamps have shades which are deep enough to hide the bulbs and dense enough to prevent glare. Some are built to send more light up toward

the ceiling as well as down toward the table or floor. These use large bulbs and are designed to provide general lighting by reflection from the ceiling as well as local lighting. Portable lamps from which more is required than merely decoration will need bulbs which have a total of 50 to 100-watts or more; in the interests of economy, those which are merely a decoration do not need more than a 25-watt bulb. Duplex outlets in the baseboard permit the greatest convenience and use of portable lamps for lighting.

WALL BRACKETS
Sometimes people try to provide general lighting for the entire room with wall brackets. Except under unusual circumstances, this leads to one result—the use of larger bulbs whose brightness is annoying. It is most important that these be well shaded, so that glare does not prevent their effectiveness as a beautiful decoration. The use of bulbs larger than the 15 or 25-watt size cannot be recommended.

AMUSEMENTS

One of the scenes in "Temptation" that will arouse considerable curiosity is that showing a flood of gold. This production comes to the Lyric Theatre commencing today.

With the reading of the script of "Temptation" an order was placed with a stamping mill for several tons of metal disks corresponding in size to \$20 gold pieces. It was discovered later that the disks lacked the shiny qualities of gold pieces, whereupon they were sent to an electro plating plant and there given a nickel plate coating.

Eva Novak plays the part of the girl who is submerged by this shower of money and the scene in question is easily one of the most unusual ever flashed upon a screen.

In addition to Miss Novak the cast contains such famous stars as Bryant Washburn, June Elvidge, Phillips Smalley and Vernon Steele.

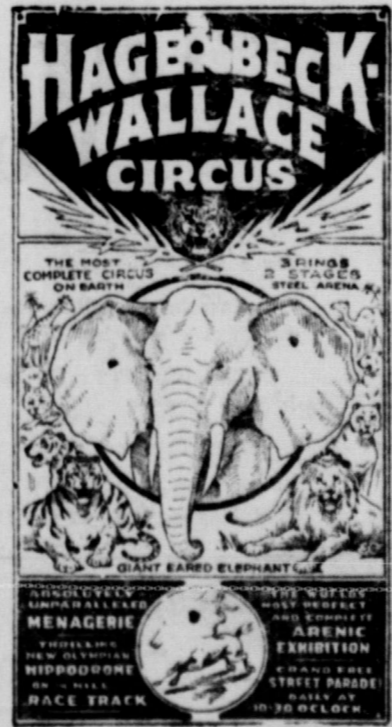
