LABOR TO RETAIN PRESENT POLICY

Federation Will Not Support New Political Party, Leaders Say on Eve of Convention.

MEXICANS ALSO IN MEETING

Special Precautions For Juarez Visitors—Report Plot to Assassinate President Calles.

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 15.—The American Federation of Labor will not support a new political party but will continue its non-partisan policy, it was learned tonight on the eve of the 44th annual convention which opens here Monday.

The executive council, it is reliably reported, has instructed President Samuel Gompers to present a report to the convention reaffirming emphatically labor's strict non-partisan political policy. Approval of this action without serious opposition on the convention floor is predicted.

President Johnston of the Machinists' Union and chairman of the national committee for Progressive Political Action said that a new party composed of wage earners probably would be launched, but denied that it would become identified with any one party.

While more than 400 delegates to the convention had been registered here, delegates to the Mexican Federation of Labor convention, to meet in Juarez, were arriving. Military protection was offered the delegates following the shooting in Mexico City of Luis Morones, Mexico's foremost labor leader. Rumors were current that an attempt would be made to assassinate President-elect T. Elias Calles when he comes to Juarez to address the convention, but he has given no indication that he would abandon his plan.

Special precaution will be made to protect Americans expected to visit Juarez. One thousand troops will patrol the city, augmented by a police force of 100 uniformed officers, and 100 secret service operatives.

Italian Envoy Quits.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—Prince Gelasio Cetani, Italian Ambassador, will give up his post and return to Italy after January 5, he said upon leaving the White House today after calling on the President. His successor has not been appointed.

Seek Planes From Which Wild Ducks Reported Snared

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 15.—Three airplanes which have been snaring ducks in the air with long nets fastened to the lower wing of the plane, are being sought by special game wardens armed with high power rifles. It was reported that in one instance, only two of a flock of 30 ducks escaped the net dangling from one of the swift planes. The State Game Warden has issued orders to have the planes shot down.

BAYLOR IN TIE—T C U DEFEATED

S. M. U. and Baylor Battle to 7-7 Score—Lack Punch When Within Striking Distance.

MARLEY IS STATE STAR

Captain Shows Up As Longhorns Beat T. C. U., 13-0 in First Conference Victory of Season.

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 15.—Baylor University and Southern Methodist University battled to a 7-7 tie here today before 15,000 persons, leaving their conference standing unchanged. Both teams have perfect records in the conference for the season.

S. M. U. drew first blood with a touchdown in the first quarter and added an extra point with Riesor's goal kick. Baylor came back with a like score in the second quarter. Neither team was able to make an effective attack when in scoring position.

State Loses Jinx.

FORT WORTH, Texas, Nov. 15.—Texas University threw off its hard luck jinx of the season here today and tumbled the T. C. U. Horned Frogs at the Horned Frogs Stadium, 13-0. Today's game was the first conference victory for the Longhorns.

MRS HARDING IS LOSING STRENGTH BY BOOTLEGGERS

Wife of Former President Takes Little Nourishment, is Lapsing into Coma Rapidly.

Robert Stewart Dies in Hospital After Gun Battle With Gang to Protect Husband.

DOUBT HER RECOVERY

Fails Precipitously Through Day Saturday—Grave Fear That She May Not Live Through Night.

STEWART IS PREACHER

Raiding Parson Threatened by Band of Bootleggers Who Attempted Kidnapping—Two Wounded.

MARION, O., Nov. 15.—After failing perceptibly through the day, Mrs. Warren G. Harding was believed tonight slipping slowly into a coma, and fear was expressed that she would not live through the night.

Dr. Carl Sawyer's evening bulletin stated that she was "very exhausted and weak." Her pulse is very weak and slow. She took a small amount of nourishment during the day.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 15.—Mrs. Robert Stewart, who fought a gun battle with a band of bootleggers and prevented the kidnapping of her husband, "The Raiding Parson," died at a local hospital today.

Mrs. Stewart was brought here by her husband after the attempted abduction of the pastor and the shooting which occurred in the Stewart home at Drake, Wn. Ga.

She had been shot through the lung by one of the bootleggers after two of the band had been wounded by shots she fired from her husband's revolver to prevent his being kidnapped.

Physicians in Constant Attendance of Woodruff Child.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 15.—An unusual snow storm swept over Maryland and northern Virginia today, obscuring football games and horse races in a wet veil of heavy flakes. Though the snow was heavy, it disappeared nearly as soon as it reached the ground, and President and Mrs. Coolidge who had planned a week-end trip on the Mayflower, with a party of friends, did not let the snow deter them.

RATS GUILTY OF ROBBING MAILS

Members of Egan's St. Louis Gang, Including Leader, To Be Sentenced in Federal Court.

TRY FORMER INSPECTOR

Spectators Searched as They Enter Court Room Where Fahy is Accused of Planning Job.

QUINCY, Ill., Nov. 15.—William Colbeck, St. Louis politician and head of the powerful Egan's Rats gang of that city, and eight of his associates, were found guilty of the \$54,139 Staunton, Ill., mail robbery in May, 1923, by a jury in federal court here today.

Eight of the defendants, including Colbeck, were found guilty on four counts of the indictment charging robbery of a custodian of the mail and possession of stolen mail. Sentence is to be imposed later by Judge Luis Fitzhenry.

Search Spectators.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 15.—Spectators at the trial of William J. Fahy, former postal inspector, and two associates, Chicago politicians, charged with plotting the \$2,000,000 Rondout, Ill., mail train robbery, were searched for guns as they entered the court room, under orders from Judge Adam Cliffe.

The search order was issued after government attorneys intimated that a plot of incrimination against witnesses was feared.

The prosecution has accounted for \$764,085 in cash and government bonds that the robbers secured. Government attorneys hope to prove that the lot totaled \$3,000,000 instead of \$2,000,000 as announced by postal inspectors investigating the robbery.

NAB SWINDLERS

Ohio Men Plead Not Guilty to Counterfeit Charge in Connection With \$5,000,000 Fraud.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 15.—J. Z. Zottarelli, local attorney, and two of his confederates, today pleaded not guilty to charges filed by federal officers accusing them of engaging in the operation of "a \$5,000,000 nation-wide counterfeiting ring."

The U. S. Commissioner set the bond of Zottarelli at \$25,000 and the bonds of the other two men at \$3,000 each. The trio was arrested by a U. S. Secret Service agent and deputy marshals after the discovery of hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of counterfeit 1919 War Savings Stamps of the \$5 denomination in many parts of the country.

HOLDING NEGROES

Accused of Assault With Intent to Kill After Affray—Two White Men in Hospital.

LA GRANGE, Texas, Nov. 15.—Fred Prince and Sylvester Simms, negroes, were held here today waiting action of the grand jury on a charge of assault with intent to kill growing out of an attack on two white men following an altercation near here.

George and Harvey Miller were in the hospital suffering from injuries sustained in the attack.

UNIT OF STATE LEAGUE FORMED

Teachers of County Meet and Form Organization of Interscholastic League Here.

ELECT DIRECTORS

McLain Director-General—Interscholastic Meet Will Probably Be Held Here Next Spring.

Over 25 school teachers representing several schools in Nolan County met in a called session at the court house auditorium Saturday afternoon when a unit organization of the Interscholastic League was completed. Plans for the interscholastic meet to be held in the spring were also discussed, and officers were elected for various divisions of events.

Among the towns represented here by the teachers at the meeting were Sweetwater, Nolan, Dora, Hylton and Roscoe. Superintendent B. H. McLain acted as chairman of the meeting, and the following directors for the organization were elected: Director General, B. H. McLain; Director of Declaration, Mrs. Curry, Sweetwater; Director Debating, T. H. McDonald, Dora; Essay Writing, English teacher of Roscoe High School; Director Athletics, Joe Gibson, Sweetwater; Director Spelling, Superintendent Slover, Blackwell; Director Arithmetic, Mr. Ramsey, Roscoe; Director Music Contents, Mrs. Dolby, Nolan.

A discussion of events to be held at the meet in the spring was held, and plans for entering new contests were made. The date of the meet has not been announced but will be decided upon later. The meet will probably be held in Sweetwater.

Information was given the various teachers present concerning the class of schools to compete in the contests, and the fees that are paid to the Interscholastic League, Austin, by schools who enter the association. All schools must pay fees according to their classification before being allowed to compete at the county meet, it was announced.

The schools entering the contests are classified as rural schools, ward schools, high schools and common schools.

Rural schools are classified as not having over three teachers and not being in an incorporated town. Ward schools are schools having a separate principle and being in a separate building from the high schools. The High School was classified as being one where the time of at least one teacher was devoted to the teaching of one subject above the 7th grade. Common schools are so named to distinguish from the independent schools.

These schools will be divided into Class A and Class B, according to their standing, during the Interscholastic meet here, and the contests for the two classes will be held separately.

COURT MONDAY

Large Number of Cases on Docket For November Term of County Court—Many Carried Over.

The November term of County Court will open Monday, and two juries of 15 members each have been selected for the first and second weeks of the term.

A large number of civil and criminal cases have been entered for calling, and the docket will probably be set the first day of court, Monday. A large majority of the cases are those which have been continued from previous terms of court. It is probable the only a few of the cases now entered will be tried this term.

The civil suits include eight jury cases, and eleven non jury cases. There are fourteen appearance cases entered.

A total of 27 criminal cases have so far been entered, most of which have been continued. This number includes several swindling, theft and gaming cases.

STOCK SHOW ON

Special Trains Bring Finest Animals to American Royal Show in Kansas City.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 15.—Preparations are complete for the opening of the annual American Royal Live Stock show here today.

All week, shipments of show cattle and horses have been arriving from points as far distant as Maine and California. A 19-car special train bringing the prize exhibits from the Pacific International Show is due to arrive today. Many of the animals on the train are insured against injury or loss for \$10,000 or more.

The first horse show program of the show is scheduled for tomorrow night when the wives and children of the Fort Leavenworth army officers demonstrate their equestrian ability. Twenty-one daughters of officers will participate in the exhibition, wearing white and green jerseys.

Another new feature of this year's show will be exhibition drills by Kansas City's mounted police and a regulation indoor polo game between the County Club team of this city and the Fort Leavenworth service team.

Stock judging will start tomorrow morning, the judges being representatives from ten of the nation's principal agricultural colleges.

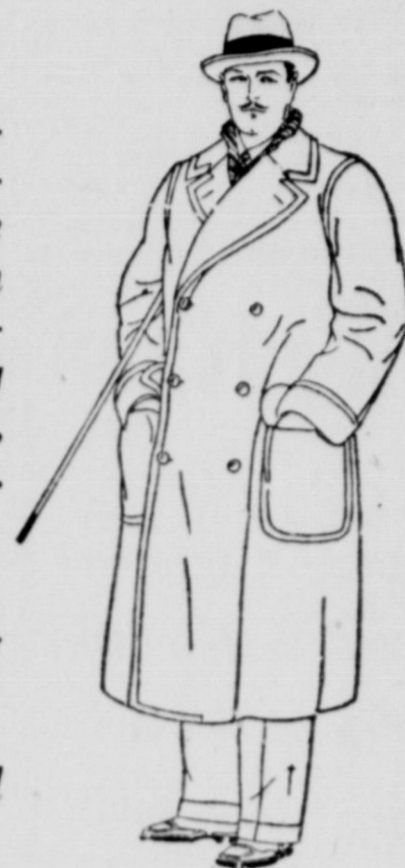

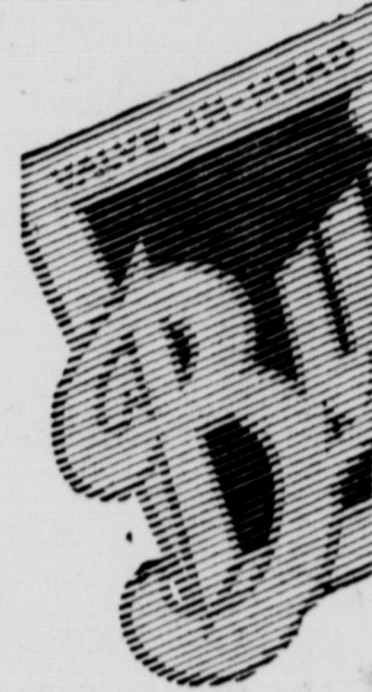

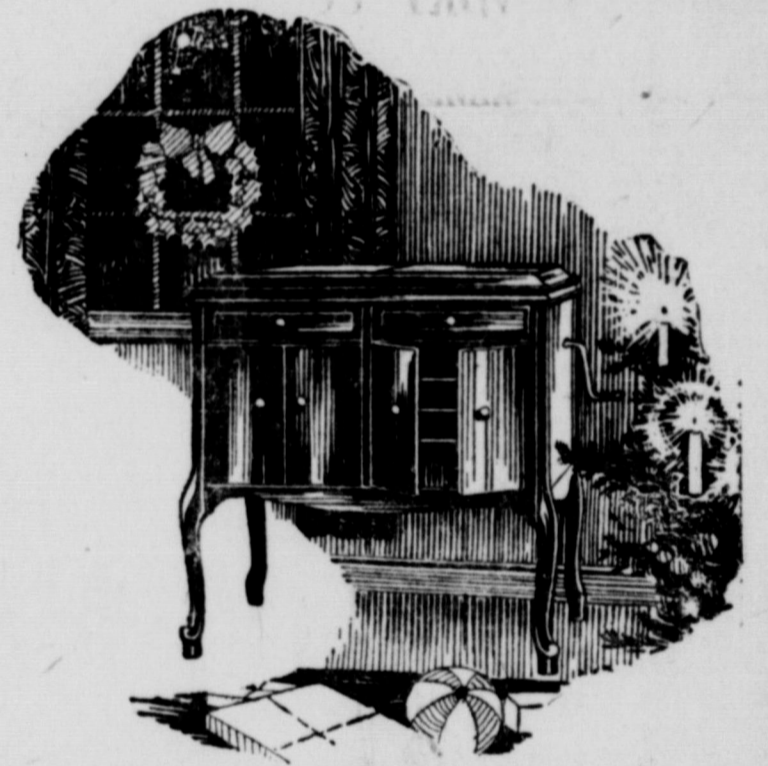

MORE REVENUE

Railroads of State Show Gain of 40 Per Cent in First Eight Months.

By The United Press.

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 15.—Operating revenues for Texas railroads increased 40 per cent or from \$124,301,000 to \$176,223,000 during the first eight months of 1924 as compared with the same period a year ago, according to a consolidated report of the railroad commission.

Operating expenses were \$109,278,167, leaving a net from revenues for this year of \$27,045,570. Freight revenues showed a 12 per cent gain but passenger revenues were nearly one per cent less this year than last.

LOSES PIPE

Hell and Maria Gets Excited When Girls Surround Him.

COTTON FIRES COSTLY

Losses in October More Than \$200,000 State Inspector Says.

HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 15.—Cotton fires have taken a toll aggregating more than \$200,000 for the month of October, according to Dabney White state inspector, who has recently returned from Houston. Oklahoma has suffered even more greatly from fires in cotton gins and warehouses, White reports.

Texas losses in the destruction of gins was placed at \$200,000, and losses in compresses and warehouses was placed at fully \$1,000,000.

In almost every instance according to White, the fires were started from discarded cigarettes discarded by employees.

BUILDING BOOMS

Renewed Activity in Southern States Reflected in Record Building During October.

Special to The Reporter.

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 15.—Renewed development activity throughout the southern states is reflected in building permit totals for the month of October, which reached a new high figure of \$53,015,132 in 106 cities according to records compiled by the survey department of G. L. Miller and company, real estate mortgage bond house, of this city.

This total is as large as the figures reached during the leading building months of the spring building season, is ten millions ahead of the totals for September and forty-six per cent in advance of the building for October, 1923. One of the features of the report is that the gains have been uniform throughout the territory, with only a third of reporting cities showing a loss, and these in very small amounts. Also noteworthy are the large number of cities showing huge totals for the month, and the improved condition in construction in several states which have recently fallen below their 1923 permits.

The month is dominated by the nine million total from St. Louis, where a single permit for the five million dollar office building for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company dominated the situation. Washington came next, ahead of Baltimore, with the aid of a single permit of a million dollars for the Hecht company store, and several others of goodly size. Dallas continued to lead the cities of the farther south with approximately three millions, of which half represented the addition to the Hotel Adolphus.

LEOPOLD ON FACULTY

Loeb Also to Become Instructor at Joliet Prison.

JOLIET, Ill., Nov. 15.—Nathan Leopold, serving life in the state prison here for his share in the murder of Robert Franks, is now a professor of English in the prison faculty.

Next week Richard Loeb, partner in the crime, will also become a member of the faculty and act as teacher in mathematics.

The teaching will not conflict with their regular work in the prison factories, Warden Whitman stated in announcing the step. Leopold gives two hours a night to prisoners interested in acquiring a better knowledge of

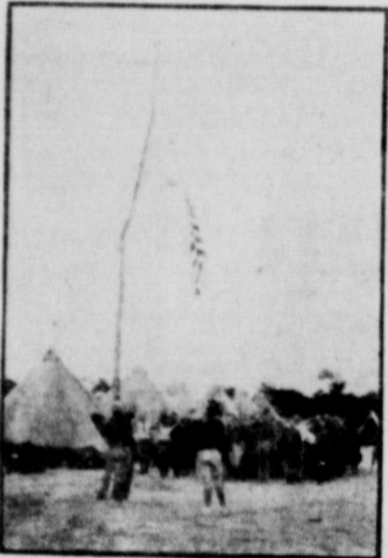

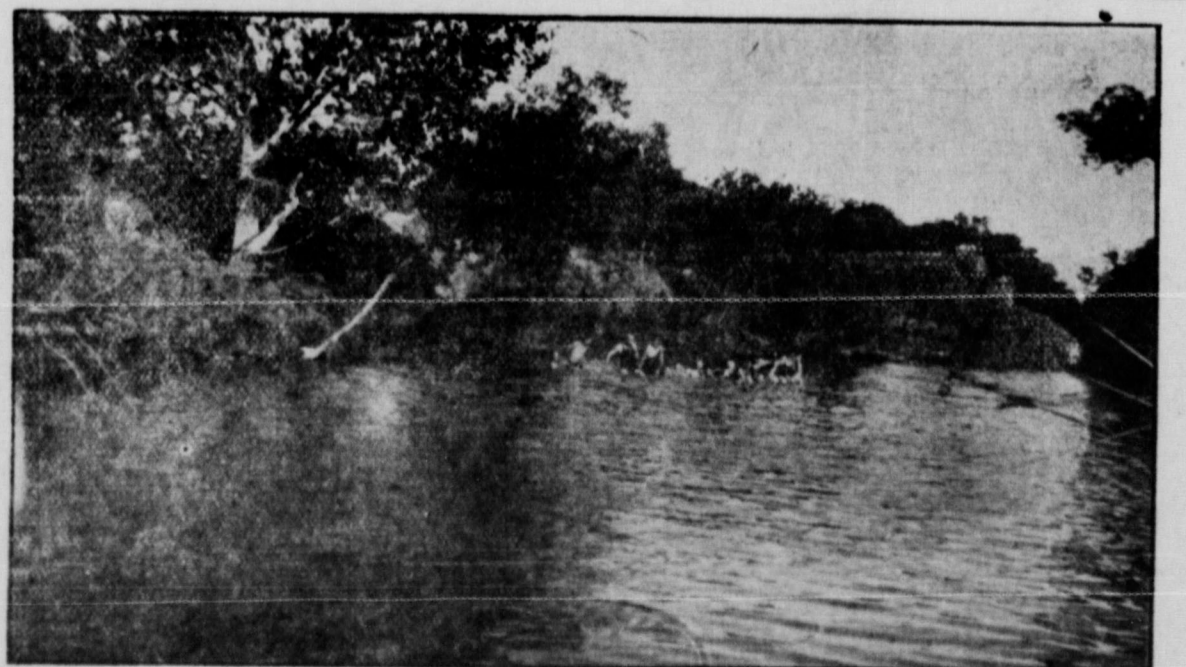

GAME PLENTIFUL

Many Hunters En Route to Happy Hunting Grounds Where Deer, Turkeys, and Quail Abound.

The Texas game regions are daily drawing scores of hunters from the east and north, bound for southwest Texas in search of deer, turkey, ducks

and other game. Cars loaded with hunters, camping equipment and provisions are passing through Sweetwater almost daily enroute to points further west and south where game of all kind is reported to be plentiful. The county clerk has issued a number of hunting licenses for use outside Nolan County to Sweetwater people since the opening of the deer season, and a number of hunting par-

ties have gone out from here loaded for bear. Many nimrods have been taking advantage of the favorable weather in this section, and are getting out to take in the season's limit of game from southwestern game ranges. According to reports from hunters who have been on the grounds, duck, turkey, deer, quail and plover are plentiful in several counties in the south-

western part of the State. Sportsmen seemed to have increased in number this season, according to local hunters, for an unusually large number are already in camps over the best game sections and others are seen on the roads daily enroute for the annual hunt.

A big buck seems to be the dream of most hunters on their annual jaunt, and the deer season, which opened the first of the month to run until December 31, finds the animals unusually plentiful in the State. The quail season will open December 1 to January 31, and the open season on duck, geese, brant and jack snipe opened Oct. 15, to run until January 15. The season for wild turkey opened the first of the month and will close December 31. Several counties in the State have special seasons for the birds which is March 1 to April 30th.

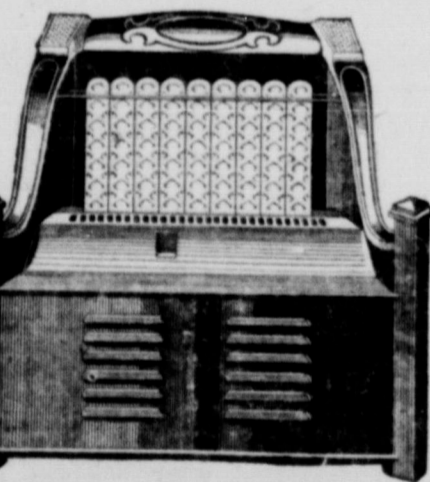
