PLAN NEW T-P PASSING TRACKS

Superintendent Pistole Says Texas and Pacific Ready to Co-Operate With City in Every Way.

MAY MOVE YARDS
Consideration is Being Made for Passing Tracks East of Town—Subway Not Feasible.

"The Texas-Pacific stands ready now and at all times to co-operate with Sweetwater in any way possible and especially to make for greater safety. We deeply regret the accidents that have occurred in Sweetwater as we do those that occur anywhere on our lines and the Texas-Pacific has always striven in every way possible to prevent them."

The above statement was made in Sweetwater Saturday by A. E. Pistole, superintendent of the Rio Grande Division of the Texas-Pacific railway, who was here to confer with city officials relative to the grade crossing situation in general and with particular reference to the proposed passing track which the T-P wants to build east of town and upon which work was stopped at request of city officials. Mayor Boothe was out of town Saturday, however, and the proposed conference did not materialize.

Mr. Pistole, however, did discuss the situation in some detail with a representative of The Reporter.

Some six months ago a Texas-Pacific engineer prepared plans for an underground crossing at Lamar street. Numerous obstacles of an engineering nature, as well as expensive property condemnation would be encountered in this proposition, Mr. Pistole said, adding that this particular phase of the situation was under consideration by the management.

In direct reference to the proposed passing track, Mr. Pistole showed the blue print with the new track outlined therein. The new track is to be 5,000 feet or nearly one mile long, if built. It will extend from the present east yard limit to the next crossing beyond Hailey Street. It will relieve much of the congestion due to long freights blocking the Lamar and Bowie Street crossings.

"Freight trains will be parked on this new passing track," Mr. Pistole said, "while the engine comes into town with the Sweetwater cars from this train. The engineer will set these out, pick up the cars waiting here for him and go back to the rest of his train, hook on, and the crossings in town will not be blocked nearly so long as is the case at present."

Mr. Pistole stated that after a train was connected up it required from five to ten minutes longer for the locomotive to pump up the pressure in the air brake system in the train, before it could be started. This delay could also be avoided, he said.

TO MOVE FIELD

Intermediate Depot of Air Service to be Moved, McCook Field, Dayton, Extended.

DAYTON, O., Nov. 29.—According to semi-official announcements, the Intermediate Depot of the U. S. Air Service at Wilbur Wright Field here is to be moved to Middletown, Pa., without delay. This move is said to be made necessary by the proposed relocation and extension of McCook Field, the great experimental laboratory of the air service.

Ballot Slackers Rapped By Daniels In Dallas Speech

DALLAS, Texas, Nov. 29.—"The ballot slacker" was denounced by Josephus Daniels, former Secretary of the Navy, in an address before the Women's Club here today.

"In 1920, less than half the qualified voters exercised the right of franchise," Daniels said. "It seems certain that an equal number failed to vote this year. Among these slackers are college graduates and men of affairs. If men and women of this type advocate such a course of action, it is only logical that selfish interests will rule."

FAHY SENTENCED FOR CONSPIRACY

"Ace of Postal Inspectors" Given 25 Years in Federal Court For Roudout Mail Plot.

MURRAY ALSO GOES UP

Chicago Politician Gets Similar Sentence—McComb Acquitted in \$2,000,000 Robbery.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 29.—William J. Fahy, "Ace of the Postal Inspectors," was today sentenced to serve 25 years in the Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta by Judge Adam Cliffe in Federal Court here for plotting the \$2,000,000 robbery of a Chicago, Milwaukee, and St. Paul railway mail train at Rondout, Ill., June 12.

James Murray, Chicago politician, was given a similar sentence. The pair was convicted Tuesday on the testimony of the robbers and Fahy's associated inspectors.

Walter McComb, Murray's lieutenant, charged jointly with the convicted men in the conspiracy, was acquitted.

COMPOSER DIES

Puccini, World Famous Italian, Suffers Fatal Heart Attack.

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Nov. 29.—An impressive funeral has been arranged by Belgian authorities co-operating with the Italian colony for Giacomo Puccini, famous operatic composer, who died today following a heart attack. The body will lie in state up to the time of the funeral, and thousands of music lovers will pass the bier.

RUSSIA OPPOSED

Arrangements Made to Thwart Any Moves Favoring Soviet in Coming Session of Congress.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 29.—Arrangements are being made to thwart any attempts for action to secure Russian recognition in this Congress, Senator Swanson, Va., Democrat, said today.

He stated that if Senator Borah, new Republican chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, attempted to pass a resolution calling for recognition, a motion will be made to refer the action to the Russian Investigating Committee. Those opposed to Russian recognition will see that the committee's activity is re-opened if any attempt is made to obtain action on the floor of the Senate.

BUY ICE PLANT

Sweetwater Company to Construct 20 Ton Plant at Colorado

"THE ARMY CAN KICK"

Wise Cracks of Officers in France Proved True on Gridiron—Star Ends 8th Varsity Year.

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 29.—Army officers in France had a way of reminding enlisted men, "You fellows always know how to kick."

Among 80,000 persons in the stadium here today to see the Army-Navy game were President and Mrs. Coolidge, their personal guests, Generals, Colonels, Majors, Captains, and lesser officers who shrieked and shouted at the end of the game that the Army knew how to kick.

The army won the game, 12-0, and it was four he man kicks that pushed the nose of the fighting navy team into the cold turf of defeat. Although the odds were 4 to 1 on the army, the navy was able to boast at the end of the game, "You didn't cross our goal line."

The champion kicker of the United States is Edgar Garbiach, of Washington, Pa. Garbiach played four years at Washington and Jefferson College and today finished eight years of varsity football with the record of four field goals in one game.

NOTRE DAME WINS

CAMPAIGN OPENS

Prominent Baptist Sunday School Workers Here For S. S. Enlargement Campaign.

Great interest is being shown here in the Baptist Sunday School Enlargement Campaign which opens at the First Baptist Church Sunday to continue through the entire week. Workers prominent in Sunday School departments over the state are expected to arrive in Sweetwater Saturday night and Sunday to take part in the week's program.

One of the features of the campaign is the Sunday school officers and teachers training school. Classes for those interested in that work will be held at the church daily. Conducted by experienced Sunday School leaders, the classes are expected to have large enrollments throughout the week. Lunch will be served to the classes at the church building each day.

A census which is planned to cover the entire town will be taken at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. The census takers expect to visit each house in Sweetwater for the purpose of ascertaining what people belong to a church, attend Sunday School, where, and other information in this connection. Records will be kept by the census takers, and only matter pertaining to the Baptist Church will be retained. The other information will be turned over to the ministers of the churches to which the cards refer.

NEOSHO PLAN TO BE HEARD HERE

One of Originators of Successful Merchant-Rural Co-operative Move Speaks Dec. 8.

SPECIAL CLUB MEETING

Plan Has Been Adopted by Hundreds of American Cities—Under Luncheon Club Auspices.

City building by the Neosho plan will be explained to Sweetwater business men on Monday evening, December 8, at the Hotel Wright in the person of Gurney Lowe. Mr. Lowe will also explain this plan to Abilene and San Angelo business men on this trip to West Texas. Mr. Lowe will come to Sweetwater under the auspices of the Sweetwater Club whose regular meeting night will be shifted from Thursday at noon to Monday night in order to take care of Mr. Lowe's schedule.

Mr. Lowe's visit to Sweetwater will cost this city nothing and will entail no obligations. The only requirement is that a representative group of Sweetwater business men, as large a number as possible, be present to hear him. A number of Sweetwater men when interviewed Saturday expressed themselves as being much interested.

The so-called Neosho plan was first worked out in the city of the same name, in Missouri. That was eleven years ago. The plan has continued to work very successfully there and has since been adopted in literally hundreds of other places. In brief, it is a plan for city merchant co-operation with the rural sections of the community. Mr. Lowe was among the originators of the plan and has told the story of it in hundreds of cities. His visit to West Texas is being arranged by Alfonso Johnson, financial editor of the Dallas News.

The birds are reported more numerous than in previous years in this section early in the fall, but it is probable that the number has grown smaller in this vicinity with the coming of the open season. The season will close January 31.

Man and Girl Shot To Death - Believe His Love Rejected

Two bullets had penetrated Miss Odem's head. One had killed Bass. Authorities expressed the opinion that he shot the girl and took his own life because she refused to marry him.

MANY KILLED AT GRADE CROSSINGS

Compilations of State R. R. Commission Show Total of 292 Casualties Up to Sept. 30.

MOSTLY TRAIN VICTIMS

Majority of Accidents Result of Motor and Train Crashes—July Toll Heaviest.

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 29.—Sixty-eight persons have been killed and 224 injured, a total of 292 casualties, at railway highway crossings in Texas during the nine months of 1924 ending September 30, according to compilation of the Railway Commission. With few exceptions, the accidents have been the result of the collision of motor vehicles and trains.

The reports made showed the heaviest toll taken at grade crossings in July, when 13 were killed and 33 injured. In August, six were killed and 42 injured, and in September, the same number was killed, but the injured were reduced to 20.

Casualties in other months were: January, eight killed, 42 injured; February, 13 killed and 22 injured; March, four killed, 22 injured; April, three killed, 19 injured; May, 10 killed, 14 injured; June, five killed, and 20 injured.

SEAMEN LOST

Two Members of Crew, Overboard, Believed Drowned or Eaten by Sharks Off Tampico Bar.

GALVESTON, Texas, Nov. 29.—Two seamen jumped overboard and were either drowned or eaten by sharks when the Ward liner Esperanza went aground on Tampico Bar Tuesday, according to the crew of the tank steamer Barstow, which docked here today.

Both the Barstow and the tanker Baldhill were in sight of the passenger vessel when she struck, flooding her engine rooms and causing a bad list.

Two life boats from the Baldhill attempted to reach the vessel, but failed. One was capsized by a wave and V. H. Wortham, seaman, Savannah, Ga., was forced to swim two miles to shore.

Passengers Injured.

SAGINAW, Mich., Nov. 29.—Thirteen passengers on two interurban trains were injured in a collision at Franksmith Junction near here. Two of the injured are not expected to live. The wreck occurred directly on the junction, where the cars crashed. Both cars were demolished.

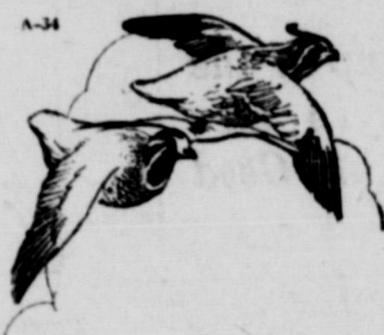

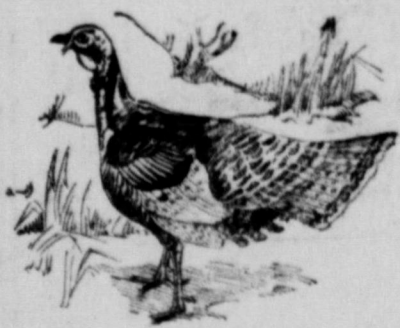

LAY NAVY PLANS

Must Modernize Older Ships, Secretary Says—Air Arm Important to Modern Fleet.

By The Associated Press.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 29.—Modernization of the six older battle-ships of the American fleet is essential, Secretary Wilbur declared in his annual report, "if our ratio of naval strength is to be maintained." He indicated his intention to renew the department's much debated recommendation for a special appropriation for that purpose.

The report omitted the annual study of the Navy General Board relating to supplementary construction required to round out the fleet, and made no direct reference to the program of ten cruisers and sundry auxiliary craft which failed of passage in the final hours last session. The secretary is understood to have decided to treat this subject in a special report sent to the House sub-committee on naval appropriations. Neither did he include in his annual report any recommendation for a change in the Navy's authorized personnel of 86,000.

While the report of the General Board for the current year thus is withheld from publication, it is said in naval circles to have stressed the increasing necessity for expediting a construction program to correct deficiencies in the fleet which, the board felt, now prevents the United States from maintaining its proper ratio under the limitations treaty.

With respect to aircraft, Secretary Wilbur said the special board appointed to develop had not completed its work, but had gone far enough to make certain that the navy already recognizes the importance of the air arm to a modern fleet. The recent contract for a patrol plane capable of a sustained flight from San Diego to Honolulu is believed to have had more than casual connection with this study.

SIMPLE CEREMONY

First Woman Governor to Take Office in Brief Inauguration.

CHEYENNE, Wyoming, Nov. 29.—When Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross is inaugurated Governor of Wyoming, January 5, the ceremony will be as simple and brief as the occasion will permit.

Mrs. Ross will be in mourning for her husband who died less than eight weeks ago. There will be nothing in the way of merriment.

The oath of office will be administered at mid-day by the chief justice of the State. Then the Nation's first woman governor will take the chair of her dead husband.

Mrs. Ross, now in Memphis, Tennessee, will not return to Wyoming for several weeks. She has not yet been given a certificate of election, pending the completion of the official count next week.

LUBBOCK, Texas, Nov. 29.—An appropriation of \$1,650 from the funds of Lubbock County has been authorized by the County Commissioners to employ a public health nurse in the county. An amount equal to the sum spent by the county will be expended by the State for the work. The nurse who will have charge of the work is expected to begin her duties December 1.

Rail Work Starts Soon.

LUBBOCK, Texas, Nov. 29.—Work on the Memphis, Lubbock, and Roswell Shortline Railway will begin within the next two months, according to the announcement of officials on an inspection trip here recently. 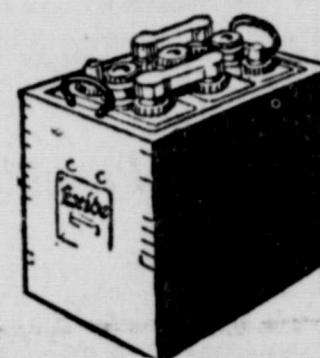

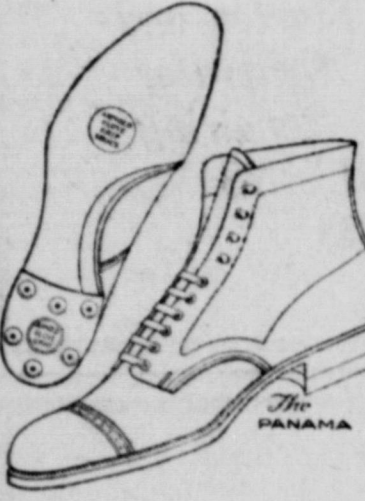

BASEBALL OFFER

Ballinger Refuses Proposition of Des Moines, Ia., Team to Train There Next Spring.

In reply to a telegram from the Des Moines, Iowa, baseball club offering to bring its team here and spend thirty days training in Ballinger for a guarantee of \$3,000, the Young Men's Business League wired the club Tuesday declining the offer.

DUCKS ARE DYING

Game Wardens Sample Water in Lakes Near Happy Where Hundreds of Birds are Dead.

Government chemists at Washington, D. C., will make a thorough analysis of the water at lakes near Happy, to ascertain, if possible, the cause of the death of hundreds of ducks which has occurred at the lakes recently.

B. G. Garmon, game warden for this district, who lives at Panhandle, and George M. Ridding, federal game warden for Texas, with headquarters at Houston, who is now in the city, yesterday made a trip to Happy to look into the mysterious death of ducks in that region.

They visited two lakes, where they found, according to their report made on their return here, that it is a fact that hundreds of ducks are dying in these two lakes.

The banks of the lakes, they say, are lined with dead ducks, and the people of the vicinity are picking the feathers from the ducks to make feather mattresses and pillows.

The wardens took two jars of water from each of the lakes, and are sending these to Washington, D. C., for analysis. They also brought one of the dead ducks back with them. The birds' wings are paralyzed at first so that they cannot fly, and eventually they die, they report.—Amarillo News.

NO FAMILY DOCTOR

Present Trend of Specialization Doing Away With Old Timers.

By The United Press. CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 29.—A shortage of all around family physicians who can treat everything "from ear ache to gall stones," was reported by President Walter Dill Scott of Northwestern University.

The present trend toward specialization is creating a dearth of family doctors, President Scott declared, in announcing plans for new new medical buildings at the university where "old fashioned doctors" will be trained.

"This does not mean," Dr. Scott said, "that one will not be able to take specialized training at our school. We will teach specialists. It means that we will also teach men to become doctors who can administer to the needs of a family, whether they need a cure for ear ache or gall stones."

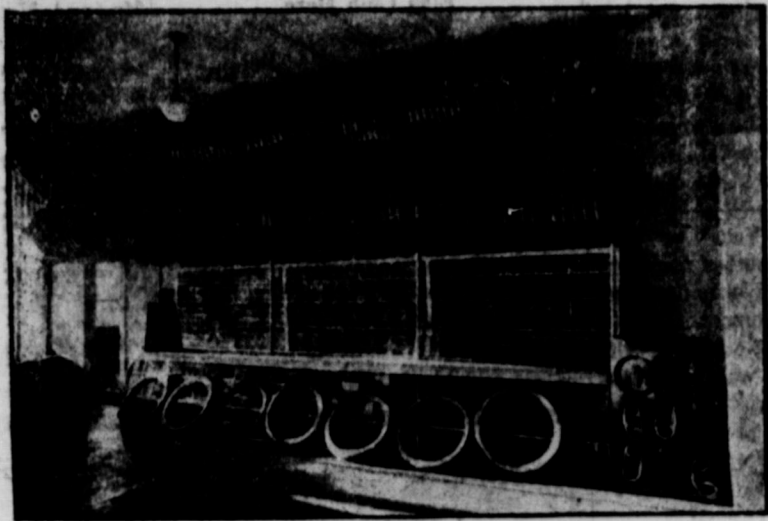

ONE SAFE IN 100

Adds Against Booze Drinkers, Prohi-
bition Chief Says.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Of one
hundred drinks taken by those who
"scoff" at the prohibition laws but one
is genuine, according to Federal Prohi-
bition Commissioner Roy A. Haynes.
"Less than one per cent of the more
than 7,000,000 gallons of illicit liquor
seized by federal agents during the
last year was genuine," Haynes said.
"We have examined over 90,000 sam-
ples in the chemical laboratories of the
Internal Revenue Bureau."

The Commissioner believes the
samples are fairly representative of
the kind of liquor now on the market
because they represent seizures from
every state. Most of the tests were
made in the Washington laboratory,
but analysis made in the branch labora-
tories in Buffalo, Chicago, Columbus,
Little Rock, Minneapolis, New York,
Philadelphia, Providence and San
Francisco showed the same results.

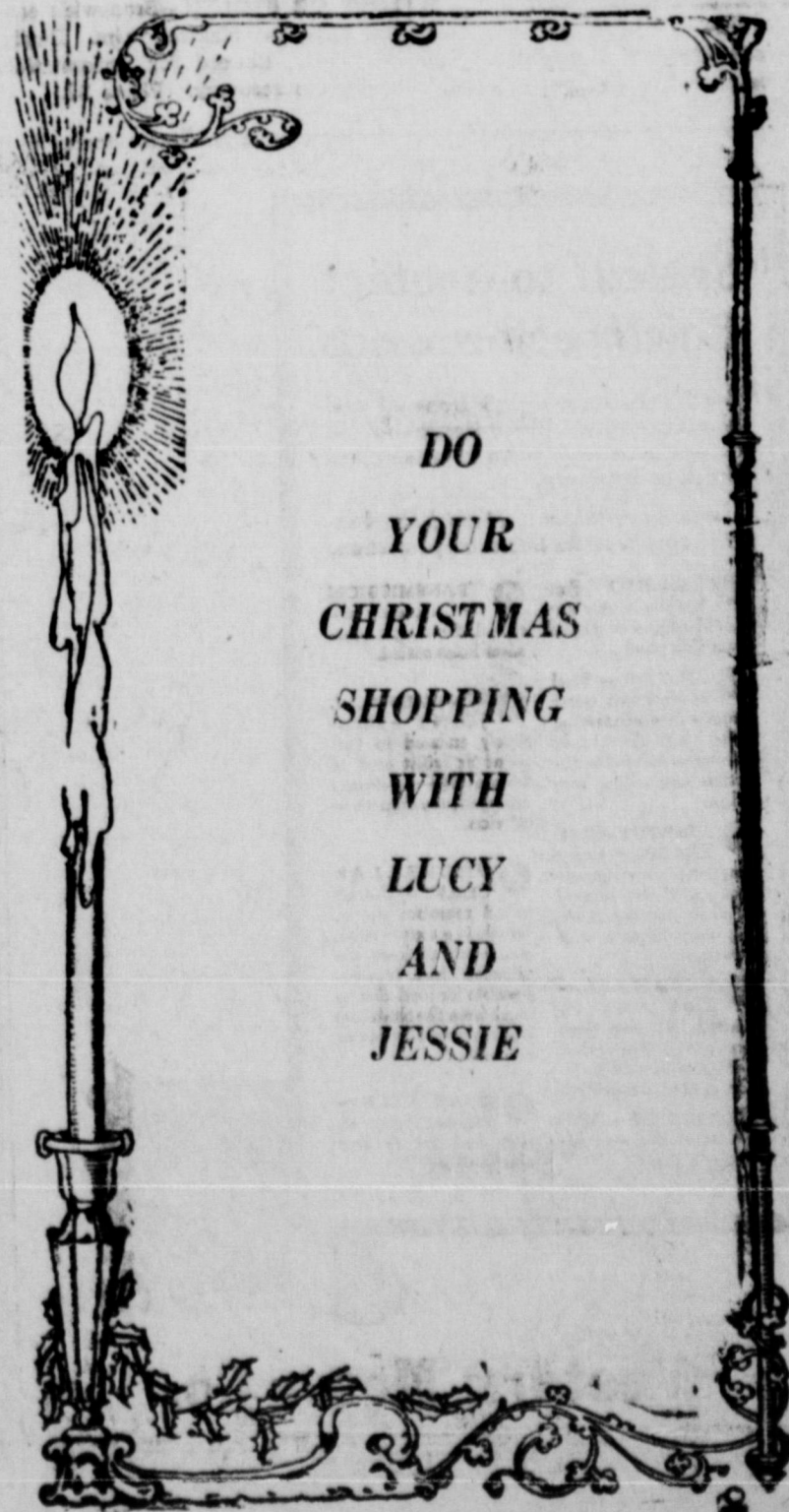
