GET COMPENSATION

A number of the adjusted compensation certificates to former service men have been received in this section the past week.

The certificate is of heavy parchment paper interwoven with silk threads, as gold and silver bank certificates. On the back of the certificate is the coat of arms of the United States, across which is written, "The United States of America, Adjusted Service Certificate, World War Adjusted Compensation Act." To the right of this is a picture of American doughboys carrying Old Glory "over the top."

Naturally, the ex-service men who may receive compensation certificates during the coming year, will be interested in knowing something concerning the amount of money they will be able to borrow on their policies. According to the Director of the United States Veterans' Bureau, there will be no loan value until after the policy has been in the possession of the veteran for at least two years.

The government has authorized National banks, or trust companies incorporated under the laws of the States to make a loan to individual veterans. After the first two years have expired .08754 per cent of the face value of the policy can be borrowed, the veteran making a note to the bank and giving his policy as security. This amount increases yearly at an average rate of about five per cent. After nineteen years 90 per cent of the face value can be borrowed. The certificate will be held as security and the note will be paid by the government in case the veteran fails in his obligation, if the certificate is sent to the Veterans' Bureau. There will then be deducted from the face value of the certificate the amount of the note and the certificate will be sent back to the veteran.

The policy cannot be sold. There is only one possibility of disposing of the policy in this way, and that is by transferring the policy to some one who is willing to pay cash for it. This can be done only with the approval of the Director of the Veterans' Bureau. However, it is understood that his approval can be had in case the veteran wishes to purchase real

estate or a business by giving the policy as part payment.

Full face value of the policy will be paid at the end of twenty years to the holder. In case the veteran dies before the maturity of the policy, the beneficiary will receive the full loan value of the policy at the time of his death, and at the maturity of the policy will receive its full face value. In case the beneficiary dies after the maturity of the policy, cash will be paid the veteran's estate.

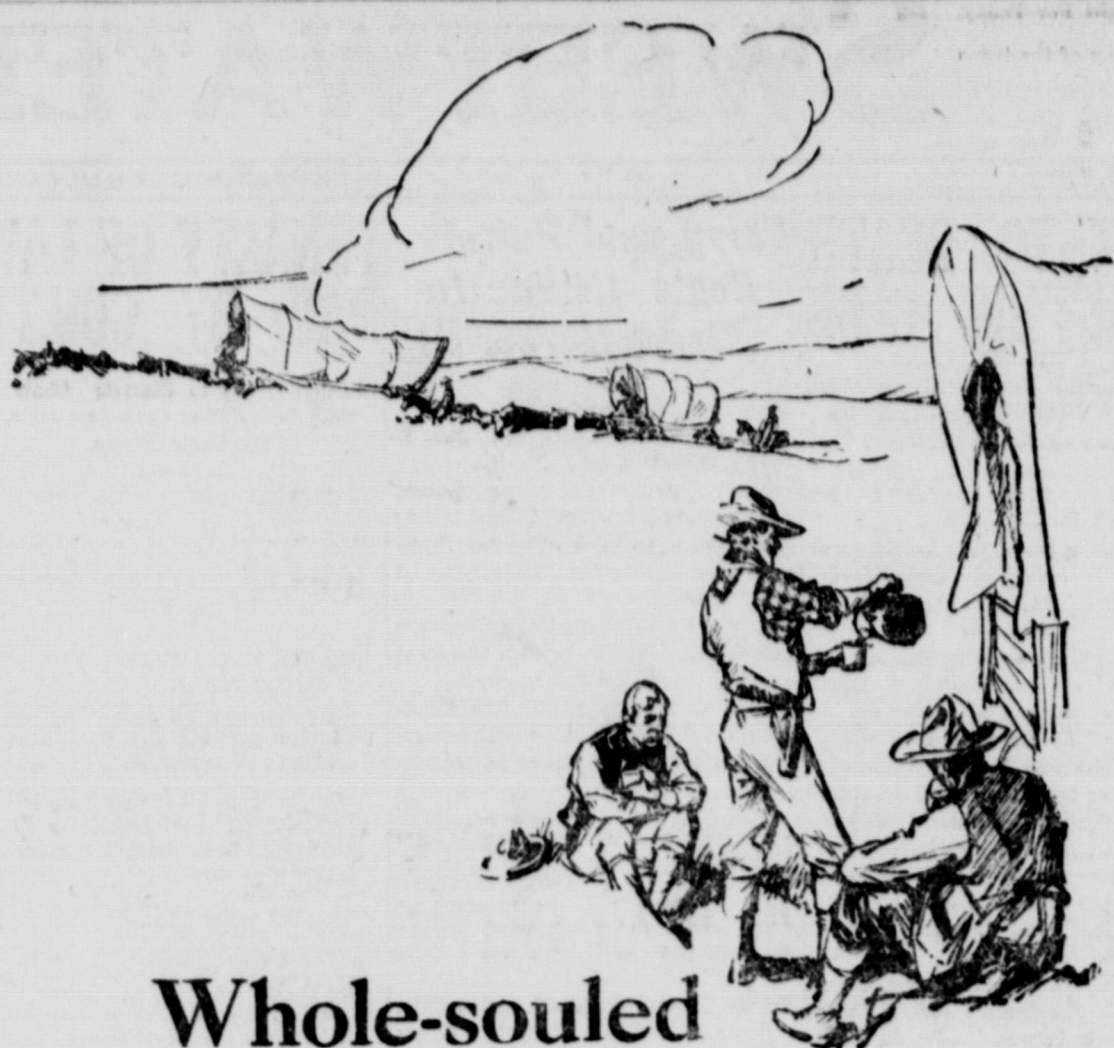

NOTICE
By the City Commission
To Building Contractors and Others
Erecting or Repairing Buildings in the Fire Limits of Sweetwater:
The following is an ordinance of the city that is being violated by builders and contractors, and the city commission hereby notifies each of you, that in the future, any and all violations of this ordinance will be prosecuted.

ORDINANCE.
Art. 101. "Whenever any person, persons, firm or corporation, shall desire to erect or construct any building within said fire limits, or shall desire to do any external repair work upon any portion of any building within said fire limits, such person, firm, or corporation shall present to the City Commission a written petition for a permit to do such building or repair work, and such petition shall contain the dimensions of the proposed building to be constructed or of the repair work is proposed to be done, the petition shall describe the nature, extent, and dimensions of the repairs and the materials with which they are to be done, and if after consideration of such petition, the Commission shall be of the opinion that such building or repair will be safe and of fire proof material, permit therefor shall be granted. Such petition and the action of the Commission thereon, together with the changes of the specifications therein, if any, as shall be prescribed by the Commission before the granting thereof, shall be entered on the minutes of the City Commission.
Art. 105. Any person that shall erect, build, move or repair any building within said fire limits contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, or shall cause or direct any building to be so erected, built, moved, re-built or repaired within said limits contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, or any person who shall participate in the work of so erecting, building, moving, re-building or repairing any building within said fire limits contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

TAKE TIRE NUMBERS
Chief of Police Warns Auto Owners of Tire Thieves.
Automobile owners make a memorandum of the serial numbers of their tires, is the warning issued Thursday by Chief of Police Johnson. 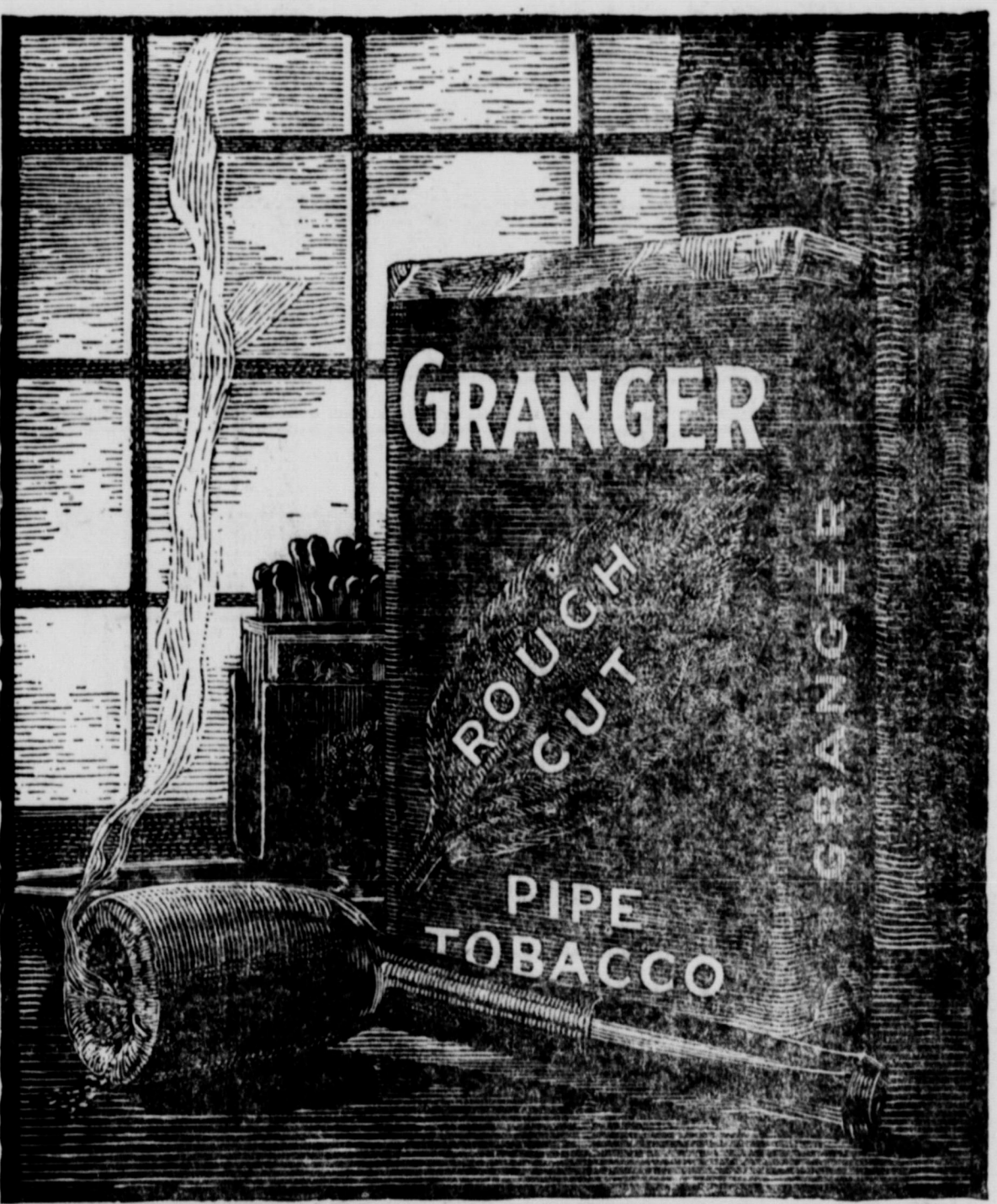
