COTTON AS FOOD

Cotton as a food as well as a textile is emphasized by the South to the nation. Southern leaders in every field urge recognition of the importance of the cotton both to the health of the nation and the economic life of the South, according to a striking survey by the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce. Among those represented are chambers of commerce, health authorities and women club leaders.

Last year's cottonseed products amounted to about \$275,000,000, estimates S. M. Collins, Secretary of the Monroe, La., Chamber of Commerce, who says, "This is a proposition of no mean importance to the people of the South."

It is from the oil of the cottonseed that a large per cent of vegetable fats is obtained. More than one and one-half billion pounds of cottonseed oil are now produced annually in the South, and yet it was only a comparatively few years ago that the seeds of cotton, being thought useless, were thrown away in such quantities that streams became stopped up and legislation governing the disposal of this "waste" had to be enacted.

"During the past season there was paid in Texas alone \$65,000,000 for cottonseed," according to Z. E. Black of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce.

"It is of vital importance to our new South that public opinion be educated to a fuller appreciation of the utility of vegetable fats from every standpoint," urges Edward R. Diggs, Executive Secretary Danville, Va., Chamber of Commerce.

WOMAN PASSES BAD CHECKS

Ballinger Officers on Lookout For Alleged Forger.

The officers are on the lookout for a woman who put over a crooked check deal to the tune of more than \$300 this week, but have little clue upon which to make the search.

Appearing at a Winters bank the woman represented herself as being the daughter of Dr. E. R. Walker of Ballinger, and drew checks on a Ballinger bank for amounts aggregating \$304. The scheme was so well framed that the Winters bank cashed the checks, and in the process of clearing they soon showed up at the Ballinger bank upon which they were drawn. The crooked work was soon detected and the matter reported to the officers.

The only clue left behind in the transaction is a description of the woman, and it is probable that she is operating in some distant city by this time, and probably a distant State. In the meantime Dr. Walker is trying to figure out why the woman used his name, and how she got the name of his daughter, which she used in putting over the bad check deal.

It is reported that a woman, a stranger to this part of the country, recently transacted some business with a Ballinger bank, and left souvenirs in the form of bad checks.

ORGANIZING I. W. W.

Branches of the Wobblies Established in Texas.

DALLAS, Texas, Jan. 13.—Two I. W. W. leaders are in Dallas organizing the first of a series of branch unions, labor officials here declared Monday afternoon.

At the same time John T. Fitzgpatrick, Atlanta, Ga., general organizer of the iron workers union, arrived here to investigate a rumored influx of "wobblies" into Texas.

Dallas labor leaders accused I. W. W.'s of dropping an 800-pound beam recently from the twentieth floor of a new bank building here with intentions of killing union men.

First reports said the beam slipped derrick fastenings and crashed through the steel skeleton to earth.

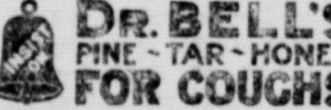

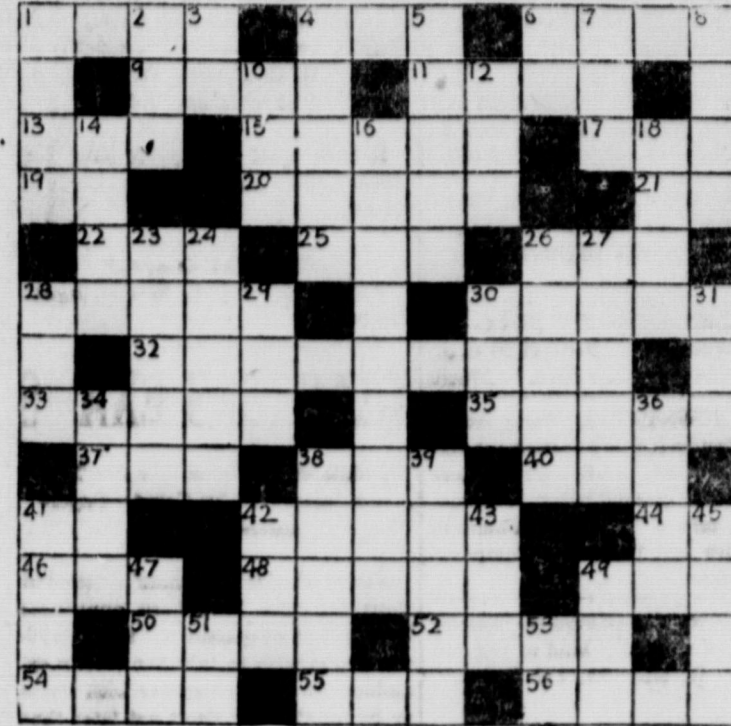

TEACHERS EXAMS

Schedule of Examinations for Teachers Announced by County Superintendent Scott.

Schedules for teachers' examinations for 1925 have been announced by the State department and applicants who wish to take the county examinations should register with County Superintendent Scott not later than the 20th of the month preceding the examination which the applicant desires to take.

The dates for the examinations for teachers' certificates are February 6 and 7; April 3 and 4; June 5 and 6; July 10 and 11; August 14 and 15; September 4 and 5; December 4 and 5.

The subjects and schedule for the examinations follow:

Friday forenoon: Spelling, physiology, music, elementary composition, higher English composition, physical geography, botany, English literature, solid geometry, methods of teaching applied to the elementary branches, geology.

Friday afternoon: Texas history, elementary grammar, descriptive geography, plane geometry, American literature, bookkeeping, English history, biology, advanced grammar, child study.

Saturday forenoon: Arithmetic,

writing, methods and management, reading, civics, modern history, psychology, chemistry, history of education, zoology.

Saturday afternoon: United States history, agriculture, drawing, ancient history, algebra, physics, plane trigonometry, school administration, economics, school law.

Building in Sweetwater is Starting off Briskly With Permits Totalling \$15,640.

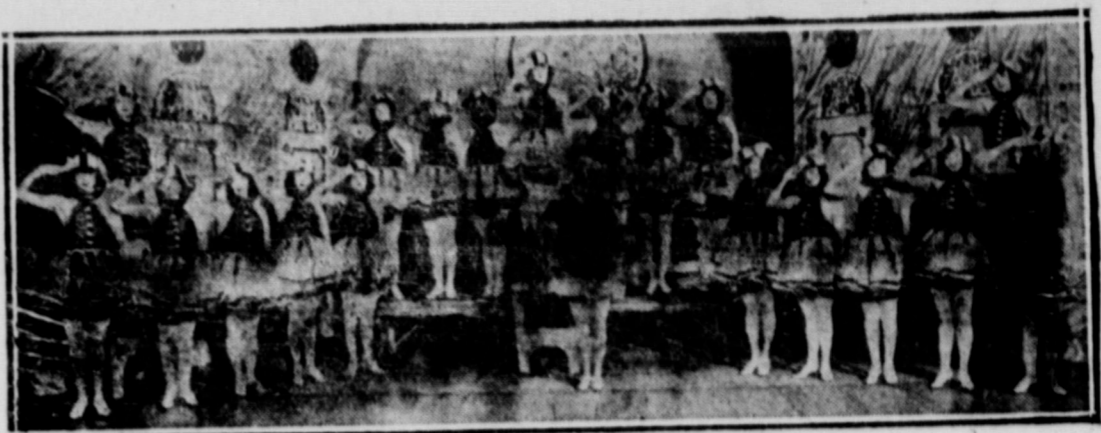
