The burden of proof should not be on the recipient any more than one should be forced to take the risk when receiving greenbacks or silver. And something in that nature should be provided for the person who knowingly gives a check that is not good.

A certain amount of accommodation is expected of the man in business to serve the public but cashing fraudulent checks is not one of them. Efforts of the present legislature to put the required amount of teeth in the bogus check law to where it will do some real good will meet with the approval of everybody but those in the habit of using "cold" checks.

AUSTIN, Jan. 19.—The Court of Civil Appeals will be asked to set aside the decision of the 57th District Court at San Antonio which decided Saturday that the State Ranger Law as it now stands is unconstitutional. State Attorney Dan Moody announced today that the case will be carried on up to the Fourth Court Civil Appeals. In the meantime the state is without a ranger force and all law enforcement is up to the local authorities.

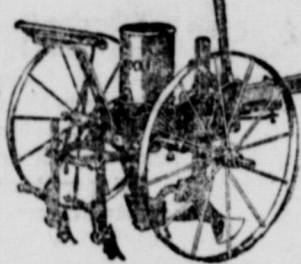

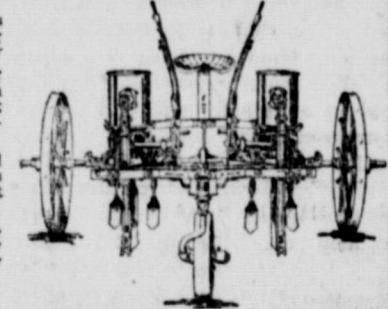
