

## Accuse Senator Edwards Of Being A Bootlegger

### Witness in Trial Weehawken Police Rum Running Scandal Makes Startling Charges On Stand Today.

### EDWARDS SAYS ALL "FRAME UP"

### Counsel For Edwards And Alleged Head of Rum Running Ring Declare Enforcement Official "Framing" Clients

DAVIS CITY, Jan. 20.—Senator Edward L. Edwards of New Jersey was flatly accused today of accepting \$3,800 in payment on the delivery of 100 cases of Scotch whiskey by a witness in the Weehawken policemen rum running trial here.

L. Wilson, an agent of the United States Treasury Department said that in his belief Senator Edwards was the head of the big bootlegging ring.

Wilson was a witness in the trial of 10 Weehawken policemen and two civilians charged with rum running.

The Wilson story was to the effect that he was a general agent for the United States Prohibition Enforcement unit connected with the Treasury Department. At various times during 1923 Williams made a deal with William Griffin, alleged leader of the bootleggers to buy Scotch whiskey and that this alleged leader told him that Senator Edwards was connected with the "ring."

"Then in your opinion Senator Edwards is a bootlegger?" asked counsel.

"Certainly Edwards is a bootlegger," answered Wilson.

Attorneys for Edwards and Griffin accused Wilson of attempting to "frame" their clients.

Charles Hurlbert of Toledo followed Wilson on the stand and told his part of the purchase of the 100 cases of Scotch whiskey.

## IN STOCK YARDS

### World Dependent Upon Fixed Nitrogen For Fertilizer And For Explosive Uses

CHICAGO, Jan. 20 (United Press).—Stockyard chemists have so far failed to commercialize the squeal. But the variety of by-products from the stockyards slaughtering pens now being utilized is one of the greatest achievements of science.

Glands make most money for the packers these days in the way of by-products. Among the most valuable gland extracts obtained at yards is insulin. Insulin is extracted from the pancreas glands of cattle and resembles sweethearts in appearance. Sheep hogs are used principally for the supply because it is preferable to use the pancreas of young animals.

Although insulin is not extracted in yard laboratories, being shipped in the raw state to medical chemists, value of this part of the animal has jumped to nearly 50 times the former price. This item was originally included with material used in making low-grade fertilizer.

Insulin has saved the lives of thousands of persons suffering from diabetes, medical men say. The process was discovered by two Canadian chemists—Drs. Banting and McLeod. The medical world has been aware for some time that the pancreas secretes substances which regulate the amount of sugar absorbed by the blood. The Canadians isolated the secretion of the pancreas gland and obtained a specific for diabetes—a disease where too much sugar gets into the blood.

Suprarenalin is another costly extract derived from glands of cattle and sheep. Suprarenalin is employed in heart disease cases, as it is of great value in stimulating heart action and great use in stopping hemorrhages. About 135,000 sheep are needed to furnish one pound of this extract.

Pituitrin and thyroid extract are also obtained from cattle by-products.

## BUILD RAILWAY LUBBOCK WEST

### Santa Fe Announces Construction New Line Extending Through Hockley and Cochran

### VAST AREA OPENED UP Millions Acres Without Rail Facilities Reached By New Line—Subtle For Farming

TOPEKA, Kansas, Jan. 20.—The first construction work which the Santa Fe railway announces definitely will be carried out this year, calls for a new line extending from Doud, Texas, on the Seagraves branch west through Hockley and Cochran Counties to a point near the New Mexico boundary, a distance of about 65 miles. Plans are being made to proceed with the work at once, according to officials here and in Chicago.

From Doud, which is seven miles southwest of Lubbock, the new line will extend in a generally westerly direction via Levelland, the seat of Hockley County, and via approximately the center of Cochran county to the neighborhood of the western line of the state. It is about 70 miles from Lubbock to the proposed terminus, where another town to add to the steady growth of West Texas, is bound to spring up.

Construction of this line will open up nearly one million acres of territory now without railroad facilities. Practically all of the land is good for grazing and general farming. It has been used up to the present time entirely for livestock purposes, being occupied by large ranches. These tracts are being rapidly broken up and sold as farms which are well adapted to raising cotton and grain sorghums, also wheat and corn.

## THE OATH "MA" TOOK

### AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 20 (United Press).—Here is the oath taken by "Ma" Ferguson:

"I, Miriam A. Ferguson, do solemnly swear that I will faithfully and impartially discharge and perform all the duties incumbent upon me as governor, according to the best of my skill and ability, agreeably to the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this state.

"And I do furthermore swear that since the adoption of the constitution of this state, I being a citizen, have not fought a duel with a deadly weapon, within this state or out of it, nor have I acted as second in carrying a challenge, or aided advised or assisted any person thus offending.

"And I furthermore solemnly swear that I have not directly or indirectly paid, directly or indirectly, offered or promised to pay, contribute, or promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected.

"So help me God."

## SCHOOL TO GET ANOTHER COURSE

### Compulsory Physical Training Added In Seventh and 8th Grades With Military Drill, Too

### EAST WARD ON FULL TIME

### Additional Seats Secured For East Ward And Lower Grades on Full Time Attendance

Physical training is now compulsory course in the Sweetwater high school for pupils in the 7th and 8th grades, according to an announcement by Superintendent B. H. McClain, and students taking this course will be given one half credit at the end of the school year.

Students affected by the new ruling are enthusiastic over the course, it is reported, and great interest is being shown in the work. The course for the boys of the two grades commenced this week. Their work will include course in military training in addition to various exercises. The boys will be organized into a company with regular officers and non-coms in charge. Gibson and Freeman of the high school faculty have charge of the company.

The girl's class in physical training will probably be organized next week. Students in the east ward were recently put on half time basis owing to the crowded condition of that school are back on full time this week. The three grades were there affected by the half time section were the first second and third. These three classes in each of the city's three ward schools were divided into sections and attended schools only half a day last week. New seats were obtained for the east ward, however, and the three classes there are back on full time again. The half time arrangement will probably be permanent for the west and south wards.

## HATCHERY OPEN

### Is In Operation Following Addition And Enlargement—Has Capacity of 2,000 Eggs

One of the big incubators at the Sweetwater Hatchery is now under operation with about 3,000 eggs in for hatching, and it is believed that the second incubator will be opened shortly. Although there are only 3,000 eggs on at present, the total capacity of the two machines, when both are permanently opened will be over 20,000 eggs.

The new machine which was ordered some time ago when the hatchery was enlarged is installed and a test showed that the incubator was in splendid working condition.

Both machines are heated by a modern hot water system of pipes while an electric fan keeps the warm air circulating thus giving the interior of the machine an even temperature throughout.

The eggs now on hatch include a large number brought in by various farmers over the county. Others were put in by the hatchery for the purpose of hatching chicks to raise as early broilers. The first bunch of eggs, which total over 700 are expected to hatch by February 3. The Sweetwater Hatchery has recently improved with an enlargement in addition to the installing of new machinery.

## ASK DEPARTMENTAL TEAM WORK

## First Speech New Executive Expresses Her Gratitude For Honors Shown And Desires Co-Operation In Work

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Jan. 20.—It is now "Her Excellency," Mrs. M. A. Ferguson was formally sworn in as the chief executive of the great Lone Star State today at noon by Chief Justice Cretton of the Supreme Court.

For the first time in history, Texas has a woman governor who lacked only two weeks of being the first woman governor in the United States, being preceded into office by Governor Ross of Wyoming.

## MRS FERGUSON ASKS TEAM WORK

### Plea for Co-Operation And Departmental Teamwork Voiced By New Woman Governor

### DELIVERS FIRST ADDRESS

### Promises Detailed Statement Policies Wednesday—Grateful For Honor Bestowed

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Jan. 20.—A plea for departmental team work and consecration of her administration to uphold the state constitution were the outstanding enunciations of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson when she took the oath of office of governor of Texas here today.

Mrs. Ferguson invited the co-operation and advice of the departmental heads during the two years that she will occupy the highest state office.

Her address followed administration of the oath, performed by V. A. Cretton, Chief Justice of the state supreme court, before a joint session of the legislature and hundreds of persons who jammed the galleries of the House.

Governor Ferguson's address followed: "In assuming the duties of governorship to which I have been called by the people of Texas, I find myself overwhelmed with the feeling of gratitude and responsibility.

"Deeply grateful for the honor bestowed and conscious of the solemn oath taken, it now becomes my duty to enter into the service of the people.

"I shall not at this time attempt a detail of plans and policies. But on the morrow I will be in a more definite way to send to the honorable 39th Legislature specific suggestions and recommendations setting forth the hopes of this administration.

"While our government is divided into three distinct parts—the judicial, executive and legislative—yet I hope and pray that there is to be that friendly co-operation of each, that will inspire the confidence of the people in the administration of their business affairs. One good way to establish this relation is for each department to recognize and respect the rights and powers of the other.

"I extend to the judges of the courts, the heads of departments, and especially, the members of the legislature, a cordial and earnest invitation to visit the executive offices for conference on matters personal and official. We are all humble servants of the great people and we must do our best for the common good.

"The people have spoken, their verdict is plain, their edict is that this must be a government of law founded on the sacred constitution handed down to us by the fathers and mothers of the pioneer days. To this end, let us reconsecrate our lives and all that we possess.

"Recognizing and freely admitting my inexperience in governmental, I must ask advice and counsel of others.

"Perhaps this would not be a bad idea for others to adopt, even though their training and learning may be more than mine, I shall endeavor to make this administration a success by team-work. There is so much to do that no one mind can bring relief to the people. What Texas needs more than anything else at this time is a

**GUARD TRAINS**

Best Lines Carrying Detectives Who Watch For Pickpockets, Luggage Thieves and Oother Crooks.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 20 (United Press)—Pickpockets, luggage thieves, confidence men, scheme and card sharks find slim picking on transcontinental trains now where they used to make a fat living.

Practically all of the best trains carry detectives who travel like passengers and keep on the watch for the slick dressed and versatile tongued crooks.

"It's a great life," said one of the detectives back here from a trip to the east. "We go out on the passengers, dressed like an ordinary traveler, watching for the crooks that make their living off the rich on trains."

"It's a battle of wits to catch those fellows, because they are the brainiest of their kind," he said.

"The trips out are probably less exciting than the return as detectives are then assigned to freights carrying 'hot' cars. A hot car is one loaded with valuable merchandise like silk, costly tobacco or furs.

"When you meet up with a bunch of box car thieves you had just as well prepare to shoot it out," he said. "These thieves usually have a gang and play for big stakes. They work on moving trains. One or two will stay on top of the train and watch for the detective. When the train slows down on a hill two or three others will break into the cars. They throw the merchandise out where a wagon road parallels the railroad and confederates pick it up."

The detectives told of a recent trip he made on a train that was carrying four cars of sealskins, valued at \$100,000 a car.

Detectives of the Kansas City division are proud of their record. Regardless of the fact that there are numerous organized bands of robbers in the vicinity, a moving train has not been robbed in a year and a half around Kansas City.

DEAR FRIENDS—

I wish to express my opinion of the Good Maxwell to which I was chained during my 100-hour drive. There was no doubt in my mind before starting this race, that it required an automobile which would stand up under the severe and gruelling test which I gave it. The Maxwell, stock standard touring car; 1925 model, which I drove was picked from 25 new Maxwell cars of Toler-Motor Company of Sweetwater, Texas, on January 8th, 1925, by myself. The car was then given a general service, which is afforded all Maxwell and Chrysler customers, upon the purchase of a new car, and was turned over to me on January 13th, at 12:30 p. m., by George F. Mulkey, Lubbock Dealer. I was chained to the wheel by Chief of Police, T. E. May, at 12:59 p. m. of that date. Six (6) quarts of oil was placed in the crank case—the breather pipe and hood of motor was also sealed, thus precluding any opportunity to make a replenishment of oil for the entire 100 hours continuous driving. I was on my way at 1:05 p. m. of same date and at no time during the run did my car cease motion; in as much as gasoline and water was supplied to me by Magnolia Petroleum Company while car was in motion.

in the state's history. The woman governor lost the distinction of being the first of her sex to assume the office in the United States to Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross, who was sworn in as chief executive of Wyoming two weeks ago.

C. M. Cureton, chief justice of the State Supreme Court administered the oath of office to the woman executive at high noon in accordance with the states constitutional provisions. Officers of the House and Senate were grouped upon the speaker's platform together with members of the governor's family.

Following the oath, Mrs. Ferguson made a brief speech to the legislators. Her written message will probably be sent to the solons tomorrow. Barry Miller of Dallas was sworn in as lieutenant-governor at the conclusion of the governor's speech and the legislators adjourned for the day.

The Inaugural Ball The official ceremonies incident to installation of the two highest state officers opened the inaugural, which will be concluded with a ball and reception tonight. The entire second floor of the capitol will be thrown open

The doors have been ordered open to all comers, as the woman executive promised the state an open inaugural and dance in event of her election.
