Creamed Cabbage: Quarter me dium size head of cabbage and let stand in cold water until crisp, drain good and put in sufficient boiling water to cover and boil twenty minutes in covered sauce pan. Of one cup of milk, half cup. of water, one teaspoon, level, of salt and two round tablespoons of flour and two tablepoons of butter make a cream sauce. Lift cabbage from boiling water into deep dish and pour sauce over it Serve

Peanut Cabbage Salad: Two cups chopped cabbage, half cup cracker crumbs and one and one half cups ground peanuts, salt. Sufficient Mayonnaie to mix well.

For Sunday Dinner Potato and Cheese Soup Celery Toasted Wafers \_\_ Hamburg Roast Creamed Asparagus on Toast

Coffee Potato and Cheese Soup Three cup milk, 1 small onion 1,1-2

cups mashed potatoes, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon of flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teapoon paprika, 1-2 up grated cheese.

Scald onion with milk. Remove onion and add potato and seasoning. Melt butter without bubbling, stir in flour and slowly add hot milk, stirring onstantly. Cook five minutes. Add cheese and cook over hot water until heese is melted. Serve with toasted

Hamburg Roast

One and one half cups round steak ground fine, 5 thin slices fat salt pork 3-4 cup stale bread crumbs from milk, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, few drops onion juice, 1-2 tea spaan salt, 4 ta-

ble spoons dried bread crumbs

Chop two slices of the pork very per, onion juice, milk and egg and damp on the reverse side. mix thoroughly. Shape in a loaf roll top with remaining pieces of pork. Roast fifty minutes in a hot oven, bast ing every ten minutes, first with boiling water and then with the drippings in the pan.

Creamed Asparagus on Toast One medium sized can of asparagus flour, 1 1-2 cups milk, yolk of one egg, 6 triangles of toast, salt and pep-

Turn contents of can into a colander and dip into a large pan of cold water. Drain gently to prevent breaking heads of asparagus. Melt butter, sai in flour, and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Season with sait and pep per and cook until thick and smooth Heat asparagus over a hot fire and ac range on hot buttered toast. Add soft part of loaf, 1 egg, 4 tablespoons the fire and beat well. Pour over asparagus and serve at once.
