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LAW RIDDEN

Former Senator Albert J. Beveridge of Indiana tells Americans that they are law ridden. His word to this effect is offered at the right time. For in nearly every state a legislature is in session creating new laws and regulations as fast as the machinery can grind them out. In Nebraska a legislator intent upon reducing traffic accidents, proposed a law that would require every farmer to hang lights on his cattle when he drives them into a highway. And this was not done for the usual joke. Limiting the output of new laws is something which Americans forever demand but never enforce. In the result they deserve the harsh criticism of the former Indiana senator that while boasting that theirs is the land of liberty, they are forbidden to do more things, and, by law, ordered to do more things than was the case in Russia under the czar, or Turkey under the sultan. It has come to pass, the senator said, that the mass of American legislation is restrictive. Administration of the laws has become "peremptory insolent and autocratic" until officials have become vexatious tyrants and citizens cringing subjects. As remedy for this condition Mr. Beveridge suggests that for every new law passed, an old one should be repealed. He suggests that while we complain of lawlessness is not excess legislation a basic cause of lawlessness? How can anybody obey every law when nobody knows there are or what they command or forbid? What are the legislatures doing to improve this situation? In some states, for example, a daily column of small type hardly serves to bring to the attention of the people the mere titles of all the new bills introduced, and other legislatures are not less enterprising in the same line of misdirected energy. And an occasional speech from a statesman will not stop it.

A COUNTERFEIT "LIBERTY" After near two years of "liberty" following his jail break, Gerald Chapman, notorious criminal, has been returned to Atlanta prison. The papers all refer to the young man's life out of jail as "liberty" but in effect it was far from that. Three federal detectives were constantly on his trail as well as fifteen inspectors in as many different states. In addition to this watch, the government sent out 50,000 circulars, giving the portraits of Chapman, the record of his crimes, and a \$2,000,000 mail robbery, and the large rewards offered for his capture. These things interested thousands of local police officers in pursuit of the fugitive. Crooks have a difficult time eluding federal vigilance when there is a real determination to bring them to account. "The emperor has a thousand eyes" was the slogan used throughout centuries of Chinese government. Modern government has a million eyes, when it wants to use them. Their only infirmity is that they see with clear vision and never grow weary when spectacular crooks like Chapman happen to be their quarry, but are dim and inefficient when it comes to detecting the larger offenders who help themselves to billions—within the law.

THE PRISONER

In an effort to determine how prisoners may be kept at work without becoming a disturbing competitive factor in certain lines of industry, the Department of Manufacture of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States has embarked upon a study of the problem of prison labor, which has gone unsolved for forty years. The Board of Directors of the National Chamber, in directing the continuation of this study, said: "Prison idleness is unthinkable, but we believe care and study can devise some proper measure, both of educational training and prison employment, the production of which shall be devoted primarily to State use and not for general sale." This plan has already been adopted in some states. None of the prison production is sold in the open market and, consequently, does not come into competition with private investment or free labor.

"Too often," says the Department of Manufacture, "manufacturing has been used simply as an expedient to prevent unemployment. While it is agreed that the prisoner should not be permitted to exist in idleness, a plan should be worked out whereby his activities should be so directed as to result in improvement in his physical and moral condition. It should be the chief objective rather than the utilization of the prisoner to defray the cost of his maintenance."

THE FAIR

For years Nolan county has been demanding an annual fair. For one reason and another, but principally for lack of an organization which to take care of the vast amount of work connected with a fair, none was held. Then in the fall of 1924 a committee from the Board of City Development took hold of the situation. Everyone in the county who was interested was lined up and in a few short weeks a most creditable fair was staged.

What was good enough for the first time won't do for the second. Nothing but a permanent organization, well financed, can hope to put on the kind of a fair that Nolan County wants.

Such an organization is now under way. A plan of organization has been prepared and will be offered the people of Nolan County. A regularly organized stock company, chartered under the laws of the State of Texas, is the plan of procedure, with a capital stock of not less than \$10,000 and with the great blue sky as its limit. Stock will be sold at \$25 share, one half payable immediately and the other half in notes. A temporary board of directors, composed of men who successfully put over the first fair, will present this plan to the people of Nolan County for their acceptance. When the stock is subscribed, then the stockholders will proceed to elect their own board of directors to manage the fair. The folks who put their money into the proposition will have the voice in its disposition.

Nolan county has demonstrated that it can stage a successful fair. Successful, financially, too with a substantial balance to start another fair. Now the proposition is square up to Nolan county as to whether or not it wants to continue having a

fair. And the answer is to be given in stock subscriptions at \$25 a share, payable one half down and the balance on Notes. Nothing can or will be done toward location, buildings or anything else of a permanent nature until the stock is subscribed.

Dried Flies, Frog Skins and Diseases In Ships' Cargoes

LONDON, Jan. 27.—Strange cargoes are brought up the grey old Thames to London-town by ships that have been poking into odd corners of the Seven Seas.

Som of the items from recent manifests were:

Dried Flies, Walrus Whiskers, Frog skins, Tasmanian Devils, Diseases, Sea Slugs, Sharks' fins, Birds' nests.

There are two varieties of dried flies. One comes from old Mexico and is used in the manufacture of paint. The other kind is from Brazil and is ground up into poultry food.

Walrus whiskers—what d'yer suppose? Well you're wrong. They're converted into tooth picks!

Frog skins—brought mostly from India and the Orient—are made into a most beautiful bookbinding leather—soft, delicate and shaded with rare colorings.

Tasmanian Devils are something like the Gila Monsters of the American desert—a bit uglier, if possible. Lots of them are brought here and sent to zoos all over Europe.

The cast listed "diseases" that came from South America not long ago, was vastly more dangerous than a shipload of Tasmanian Devils. It was full of germ cultures of malarial and various other fevers and a number of other tropica diseases. That case was handled more carefully than any dynamite or gold ever unloaded in London.

Exotic edibles pour into London from the Far East to supply the tables of the large Oriental population. Aghen eggs are brought from China—where an egg, like good wine, is relished more and more as it accumulates years. Pickled sea-weed, shark fins, bird-nests, dried snake, of the kind called "mountain eel" in China—are a few of the items.

TRAIN DELAYED

Sunshine Special Late Due to Stalled Freight Engine Near El Paso

Texas and Pacific Sunshine Special No. 2, east bound, was over three hours late Tuesday morning due to delays east of El Paso. The Sunshine arrived in here about 11 o'clock. It is due at 8:37.

A broken down engine of a freight train on the joint S. P. and T. P. line near El Paso was reported to be the cause of delay. The Sunshine made up quite a bit of lost time enroute to Sweetwater.
