Just As Floyd Collins Released From Boulder Roof Caves In-Danger Of Suffocation.

CAVE SINCE FRIDAY

When Boulder Pinned His Foot -Squad Rescuers Busy

CAVE CITY, Ky., Feb. 4 .- Just as Floyd Collins was freed from the seven ton boulder that had hold him prisoner since last Friday, the roof of the narrow passage to the surface collapsed!

Collins is now shut in by himself. He faces death by suffocation. Rescuers are unable to determine whether the removal of the debris will require several minutes or several hours. They are lying on their faces

and passing buckets filled with dirt back through the narrow passageway. In the few minutes interval between lease of Collins' leg from the boulder rescuers had wrapped him in blankets and fed him. He was also given a

stiff drink of whiskey. Dr. W. H. Hazlett, Chicago surgeon, arrived here at noon today. The train week marvel at the little man's unusualaise brought special drills from Louisville, Rescuers are afraid to use the drills on the loose earth, however, for fear it will loosen more dirt. Freed from the imprisoning boulder, Collins now faces death by suffocation.
