

MRS. CADE TELLS STORY ON STAND

Appears Before Pison Legislative Investigation Committee—Tried to Help Husband Get Pardon.

IN HOPEL WITH MCKNIGHT...

Tell of Her Relations With McKnight, Formerly Lived in Kent County.

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—Testimony that she had had improper relations in a hotel in Houston in August and November with H. L. McKnight, at that time a member of the State Prison Commission was given before the Joint Legislative Prison Investigating Committee today by Mrs. Jim Cade, wife of a convict.

"I believed that he could and would get my husband out of prison. There was no other reason," Mrs. Cade declared.

McKnight, Mrs. Cade testified, had used his influence in Cade's behalf.

A. Arnold, employe of the Houston hotel in question, testified previously that Mrs. Cade and H. L. McKnight had registered at the hotel within ten minutes of each other in August in rooms 230 and 228 respectively. Arnold said that McKnight had stopped at the hotel on previous occasions when in Houston and had always conducted himself like a gentleman.

Mrs. Cade said that Governor Neff, Chairman Herring of the Prison Commission and Walter Sayle had all questioned her months ago and that she had denied her relations with McKnight. She also said she told Mrs. King of the Prison Advisory Board that rumors of her connection with McKnight were untrue.

"I didn't tell them the truth," Mrs. Cade testified today. "I came down here to tell the truth." Mrs. Cade said she went to Houston August 26 at McKnight's suggestion. He told her she said, that Governor Neff would be in Houston August 27 and that he would introduce her to the governor and do all that he could for her husband's pardon.

Mrs. Cade got her lunch after registering and then went to her room. McKnight followed her immediately. Afterward McKnight told her that it would not be good policy to make her acquainted with the governor at that time—"It might look bad" he said.

When she returned to Houston on November 11 she registered at the same hotel as "Mrs. Mary Holton". Mrs. Cade said. There was a woman friend with her. Mrs. Cade said that she went to the room of McKnight where she remained for an hour or two.

Mrs. Cade testified that her husband was serving a five year term for manslaughter at Huntsville and she went to live at Huntsville so that she could be near him. He was later transferred to the Ferguson Prison farm. She remained at Huntsville where she worked in a hotel as a servant.

She testified that C. Coleman of Huntsville and Captain Spear had advised her to make an affidavit as to whether or not McKnight was true or not and that Coleman told her that she would ruin both herself and McKnight. Manager McAdams of the Ferguson Prison Farm also asked her whether or not her story was true and if not then to make an affidavit to that effect.

Lived in Kent County. The witness testified that she had married Cade eight years ago and that prior to her marriage she had served as a nurse and as a school teacher. She and her husband lived in Kent county prior to his conviction of manslaughter. Cade was a foreman on the Kent county ranch of John Beall Sneed.

H. L. McKnight was present when Mrs. Cade testified.

J. S. Cunningham, Abilene attorney testified that Mrs. Cade had a good reputation while living in Kent County but said that he did not know as to her conduct while living at Huntsville.

T. K. Irwin at one time threatened to quit questioning the witness if the committee room door was closed. The suggestion to close the door was made in order that noises in the corridor could be kept out.

NOME EPIDEMIC UNDER CONTROL

No New Cases Reported in Last 24 Hours Since Arrival of Serum By Dog Team.

NOT INJURED BY FREEZING

Diphtheria Anti-Toxin Apparently Effective—Another Million Units Needed.

NOME Alaska, Feb. 5.—Nome's diphtheria epidemic is on a decline today. For 24 hours no new cases have been reported.

Dr. Curtis Welch is confident that the danger of further spread of the disease is becoming less and less.

Dr. Welch is continuing to administer the serum which arrived Monday by dog team after a record breaking trip with good results. The serum, although frozen, is apparently in effective condition. Dr. Welch declared that 1,000,000 units are needed.

JANUARY IS DRY

Shows Gain Over January 1924 However—Total Precipitation Is 31 Inches of Rain

The month of January was below the average in precipitation but showed a gain of .12 inch over January, 1924, according to the monthly meteorological summary which has been issued by the Abilene weather bureau of the United States department of Agriculture. The precipitation was .31 inch as compared with .19 in January, 1924 and a normal of .30 inch.

Snowfall during January measured 3.1 inch this being equal to .31 inch rainfall. The greatest precipitation in 24 hours was .25 inch on January 17 and 18.

The month was near the average in temperature. The mean temperature was 42 degrees as compared with a normal for the month of 44.2 degrees. The highest temperature was 75 on January 24 and the lowest was 15 on January 27. The greatest daily range was 42 degrees on January 28 and the least daily range was 5 degrees on January 18. The absolute maximum temperature for 40 years is 90 degrees and the absolute minimum for January over the same period is 5 below zero.

Fifteen days of the month were clear. Seven were partly cloudy, nine cloudy and precipitation of .91 inch or more occurred on three days of the month.

The prevailing direction of the wind was south. The average hourly velocity was 9.5 miles. The maximum velocity for five minutes was 31 miles per hour from the south on January 31.

SUBMIT PAVING BIDS THURSDAY

Representatives Paving and Material Companies Attend City Commission Meeting.

TO PAVE SUBWAY APPROACHES

Paving Work on Pine Street Will Begin Monday Announces West Texas Construction Company.

Many representatives of paving and material companies were in Sweetwater Thursday to place bids on the First street paving project with the city commission at its regular meeting Thursday afternoon. The commission will receive bids for the paving of North 1st from Lamar to Musgrove street, South 1st street from Orange to Mu grove and the side street running from 2nd street to the highway on the Texas and Pacific tracks.

The commission will receive the bids late this afternoon, but it is probable that the contract will not be let until Friday morning. The company whose bid is accepted will probably be announced tomorrow.

Bids for paving these streets come as the result of a conference between city officials and President Lancaster, and other Texas and Pacific railroad officials relative to Sweetwater's grade crossing situation. Agreement reached was to the effect that the Texas and Pacific would build a modern concrete subway where the present underground pass is located provided the city would pave the streets leading to it. Begin on Pine.

"Curb and gutter work on the Pine street paving project will commence Monday," Ed Alles, vice president of the West Texas Construction Co. announced today on his return here from Colorado. Alles is here to place the bid of his company for the First St. paving job at the meeting of the city commission Thursday afternoon.

The contract for paving Pine street was let some time ago, and was one of the first contracts made in Sweetwater's paving program. The Third street project was let before the Pine street contract but property owners on the latter street have been practically unanimous in signing up, and therefore this street will be the first to be paved.

Progress Steadily. Preliminary work, which Alles stated would start next week, will include surveys, and the start of curb and gutter construction. The work will progress steadily, it is stated, as the plant of the company is already located on the ground, while the superintendent and foreman of construction will arrive here next week.

The superintendent of construction is R. L. Grimes of Abilene, who will probably come to Sweetwater Monday. D. T. Stewart also of Abilene, will be the foreman. In addition to these two, W. D. Grant will be in permanent charge of the West Texas Construction Co. office in the Aycock building and Ed Alles will also spend a large portion of his time here while the paving is going on.

Properly owners on the east Third street project are being signed and indications are that this street will be the next in which paving work will begin. This project is on Third street from Crane to Beall street.

SEIZE DOPE

Brownwood Officers Locate Quantity of Opium—Watch for Peddler

BROWNWOOD, Feb. 5.—Officers here are making efforts to locate a dope peddler or members of a dope ring, following the raid on a house at 701 Malone St., where a quantity of narcotics was confiscated by city and county officers.

Six bottles of morphine tablets and opium derivatives were confiscated. These bottles contained 20 tablets each, two and three-quarter grains, each of morphine and 30 tablets, one and three-quarter grains, each and about one-half ounce of opium derivative.

BROADCAST TO FARMERS

Missouri College Agriculture Has Farm Radio Program Weekly

COLUMBIA, Mo. Jan 5 (INS).—Eleven branches of the College of Agriculture of Missouri University answered 106,500 letters in 1924 from farmers asking advice concerning their farming problems. Besides answering these hundreds of thousands questions, there is an average of 1,500 bulletins sent out every year. Every Wednesday night the college broadcasts a fifteen minute agricultural talk from station WOS, Jefferson City.

Heavy Taxes Are Levied on Autos In German Nation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Imposition of numerous taxes and fees are a serious impediment to the development of the use of automobiles in Germany, according to advices received by the Department of Commerce by its foreign representatives.

Owners of motor cars are one class that rarely escapes paying taxes, because of the police registration of all motor vehicles. But even before an automobile of German make reaches the user it has been the subject of considerable taxation through the turnover tax that has been assessed upon each transfer of the material going into the car.

With the purchase of the car the buyer must pay a luxury tax of 10 per cent of the selling price. Upon issuance of an operating license and registration, payment of the yearly operating tax is required. As in other countries, except that Germany's is much higher, this tax is based on the horsepower of the engine. The tax on a 6 tax-horsepower passenger machine is 120 gold marks a year, or about \$30. For an 18-horsepower car the tax is \$40 marks, and for a 24-horsepower car, 1,320 marks.

Even after these taxes are paid the automobile owner still has the burden of paying turn-over taxes on gasoline, oil, spare parts, tires and accessories.

Find Steps To Ancient Temple Of King Solomon

LONDON, England, Feb. 5.—Steps to the temple of Solomon have been discovered during the modern excavation in Jerusalem.

Workmen were exploring the foundations of the Mosque of Omar when at the bottom of one of the arches they came upon a succession of small pillars. Further digging showed an ancient staircase. This it is believed, was one of the entrances to the ancient temple of Solomon.

The Mosque of Omar stands on the site of the Temple of Israel built by Solomon. The temple was destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar, but was rebuilt on a less magnificent scale by Zerubbabel.

ASSOCIATED WITH OWENBY

Colorado Oil Promoter Claims That Stone Unethical in Suit Involving J. P. Morgan.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—An 11th hour sensation was sprung at the capitol today as a climax to the Senate consideration of the nomination of Attorney General Stone to be Supreme Court Justice.

Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, read a letter from Representative Willis G. Sears of Nebraska, Republican, charging that he had been shadowed by government sleuths since he was seen in the company of James A. Owenby, Colorado oil promoter who has made a fight against Stone's confirmation.

"I am quite sure that this espionage emanated from the department of justice, or at least that they had cognizance of it," Senator Norris said.

Owenby charges that Stone had played a part against him when heirs of the elder J. P. Morgan had brought suit against him to deprive him of his fortune.

FORBES GETS 2 YEARS

Former Head of Vets Bureau Fined \$10,000 by Court

CHICAGO, Feb. 5.—Charles R. Forbes, former director of the veterans' bureau, and John W. Thompson, wealthy St. Louis contractor, today were sentenced to two years imprisonment in Leavenworth penitentiary by Federal Judge George A. Carpenter.

TAKE LONGHORN FROM LAGRANGE

Authorities Fear Mob Violence And Remove Max Charged Murder School Girl.

TOOK GIRLS FOR AUTO RIDE

Took Them Out After School Basketball Game—Killed Elder Girl—Beat Sister.

LAGRANGE, Texas, Feb. 5.—Fearful mob violence from scores of persons enraged at the brutal slaying of Valeria Zapala, 17 year old school girl and the attack on her 15 year old sister, Minnie, W. H. Longhorn, Jr., 25 charged with the crime, was spirited away from the Fayetteville County jail here early today.

Dozens of people are still coming into LAGRANGE this morning and feeling is running high. Sheriff William Loessin told the United Press this morning.

The prisoner was taken from LAGRANGE after excited street meetings were held and threats to take Longhorn's life became general.

Valeria and Minnie Zapala were taken for an automobile ride after a high school basketball game Tuesday night. Valeria was shot four times when she interfered with attacks on her sister. She crawled from the road into a seat of the car and died there. After attacking the younger sister, Longhorn beat her on the head with his pistol. She is still in a critical condition at a LAGRANGE sanitarium from injuries to her head and spine.

The girl, almost nude, managed to make her way to a farm house where she told the story of the crime. Sheriff Loessin was summoned at once after an eight mile chase, during which Longhorn was slightly wounded by bullets from the Sheriff's gun and the gas tank on his car was pierced, he surrendered. The body of the dead girl was found in a ditch by the side of the road where Longhorn had pitched it out.

Longhorn has made a complete confession of his crimes, according to District Attorney Blundell.

Longhorn's parents, Dr. and Mrs. W. H. Longhorn of Chappell Hill came to LAGRANGE late Wednesday but were not permitted to see their son.

A special session of the Fayetteville County grand jury will be called for Monday. Special precautions will be taken at that time to guard Longhorn from the mob. Sheriff Loessin said today. Longhorn had lived in LAGRANGE a short time.

LOCKHART, Feb. 5.—M. H. Longhorn Jr. accused of the killing of Miss Valeria Zapala and injuring her sister, Minnie, is in the Caldwell County jail here where he was spirited to prevent mob violence. Longhorn was shot in the shoulder while endeavoring to make his escape from Sheriff Loessin. His wound was dressed here.

SIMMONS UNIVERSITY

Status of Abilene Baptist College Is Raised by Endowment Fund.

ABILENE, Feb. 5.—Effective June 1 the name of Simmons College will be changed to Simmons University in accordance with the plans made some time ago when the campaign for a half-million dollar endowment was launched. It was decided Tuesday at a meeting of the board of trustees of the college.

Diploma issued next June will bear the name of Simmons University instead of Simmons College, though the work is being done by the students while the institution is still a college. The institution is chartered under the state laws and it is planned to have the charter changed so as to include a university by June 1.

AFTER CARELESS DRIVERS

New Law Would Charge Reckless Drivers With Negligent Assault

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—"Negligent assault" may be the charge preferred against careless motorists and other vehicular directors who collide or cause injury to another vehicle under a bill passed by the senate and sent to the house.

"Negligence" as inserted in the bill would be defined as other than such such action as reasonably prudent and careful person would take under trying circumstances.

Conviction under the bill would carry a fine of not less than five dollars or more than \$200 with jail sentences ranging from ten to ninety days. Both sentences would be imposed upon aggravated cases.

\$50,000 Currency Carried Through Streets of Ranger

RANGER, Feb. 5.—Fifty thousand dollars carried through the streets of Ranger in perfect security. This is a feat that would seem very difficult today in many of the large cities of the country, but it was accomplished without trouble in Ranger.

W. W. Housewright, active vice president of the Ranger State Bank wired to the Federal Reserve bank at Dallas for \$50,000 in currency, thinking it might be needed for emergency. He did not specify how the money was to be sent, but supposed it would come by express. It had not arrived early the following afternoon, and he was about to start a tracer after the janitor walked in with two packages marked "From the Federal Reserve Bank," placed them on the table. They were opened and contained \$50,000.

The money had been sent by registered mail, daylight run, and had been delivered to the janitor by postoffice authorities who knew he was employed by the bank as its messenger to collect the bank's mail. The janitor signed for the money without knowing whether it was money or bonds.

RESCUE COLLINS DEAD OR ALIVE

State of Kentucky Pledges to Rescue Imprisoned Cave Explorer Regardless of Cost.

COMPLETELY SHUT IN

Narrow Tunnel Bulged in Preventing Access to Man Shut in for More Than 140 Hours

CAVE CITY, Ky. Feb. 5.—Dead or alive, Floyd Collins will be taken from Sand Cave where he has been imprisoned for more than 140 hours.

The state of Kentucky officially pledged itself to bring him out but eve with the vast resources of the state as well as the Federal Government, Collins will probably perish if he is not already dead.

The tiny frigid tunnel through which he was burrowing has swollen shut.

Roy Hyde, expert miner, on his return from his last trip into the cave resorted into the open air. "That is my last trip," he said. "I never come out alive if I tried it again. I could not get my hand through the opening left."

The only means of rescue left is through a new shaft which must be cut direct to the spot where Collins is.

TO OPEN PARK

65,000 Acre Wichita Game Reserve Near Lawton to Be Thrown Open to Tourists.

LAWTON, Okla., Feb. 4.—(United Press).—The 65,000 acres in Wichita national game reserve, in the Wichita Mountains, near here, will be thrown open to vacationists this summer.

Thousands of dollars are to be spent during the coming months in beautifying the national park and in restoring Lost Lake. Many winding roads will be constructed through the wooded hills of the park.

For those who want to get back to nature, the park will be one of the most enticing in the United States. There are hundreds of ideal places among the hills where the vacationist can exclude himself in a quiet respite. Modern camping conveniences are to be installed for those who do not care for the more rugged life.

Lost Lake, for many years in the past one of the most famous water holes in the Indian territory is to be restored. The sands from mountain torrents have gradually filled its bed until the lake has nearly vanished.

A dam will be constructed and the lake restocked with fish. It will be approximately one and one-half miles in diameter. Many other choice fishing places are offered in the streams in Medicine park, nearby, and in Lake Lawtonka.

The national reserve now has 175 head of Buffalo, 300 elk and 200 deer in addition to hundreds of wild turkey and a rapidly increasing herd of antelope. Raccoon, possum, and squirrels are plentiful.

The park is known as one of the best duck hunting spots in the southwest. No fees are charged for use of the park.

ENGLISH ESTATES CHANGING HANDS

Ducal Land Owners of Old Being Driven Out by Newly Rich Who Are Buying Property.

MOVEMENT IS SLOW

Change Started in 1807—Charles Phillips Says Sale of Agrical are Land Increasing.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—England's is changing hands.

The ducal landowners of the old order who have held most of England for generations are being driven out.

Thousands upon thousands of acres of English park and agricultural land have been bought up by the newly rich.

As this land changes hands from hereditary land barons to the new tenants the old feudal system dies with its final gasp.

All this is the way Charles Phillips general manager of one of the largest real estate firms in Great Britain, summarizes one phase of England's pressing land question and looks forward to the new year.

"This is not a new movement" said Phillips. "It has slowly cumulated to its present importance. The year 1907 may be taken as the approximate date when sales of agricultural land began to increase in a marked degree. This increase was immensely stimulated by the war and post-war conditions.

"No official figures are available to show the acreage sold or the amount realized. It is doubtful in view of the enormous activity in land movement, if any comprehensive record exists or could be compiled. Our own firm from 1913 to 1922 sold 2,365,000 acres, realizing 31,231,052 pounds. It is evident that a vast extent of British land has changed hands in the last ten years."

"One great estate we handled was lions each of which throws light on the problem.

First. What caused the movement? "Taxes" said Phillips. "The greater part of the area sold is made up of estates which generally had been owned by members of the same family for long periods—often for centuries.

"As a rule owners showed great reluctance to part with the estate, as they had a deep and strong attachment to their family home.

"However, pressure of circumstances, largely economic, but partly political, compelled them to sell. The principal causes are the burden of death duties, tithes and rates, increased cost of maintenance, higher mortgage interest and taxes.

"Not all our clients are noblemen" taxed 13s. 6d. on the pound—almost 75 percent. Another, 5,000-acre ducal park in Warwickshire, averaged in taxes the incredible sum of 18s. 8d. on the pound. The Duke of Beccleuch's published returns show that 19s. 7d. in pound is extracted from him for tax and super-tax."

Second. Who are the landlords forced to sell?

Phillips pointed to an issue of The Times which contained a full page of classified advertisements offering great estates for sale. Viscount Elibank was offering Darn Hall in Peebleshire. A Scottish nobleman was offering 64,000 acres of hunting ground in Argyleshire. Lord Woolavington was offering his 17,000 acres of park land in Leicestershire. And so it goes.

"Not all our clients are noblemen," said Mr. Phillips. "It is true, however, that many of the old landed gentry are being forced to sell."

Who are the buyers?

"The buyers of the great estates are often newly rich millionaires. Some of them are Americans. Some of them are war profiteers. Some of them are the top peak of those Englishmen who have risen through the social crust by the war.

"Also it must be remembered that many of the great landowners are selling their farms to their own tenants. That is they are selling out, right the land which they have rented for generations.

"In many cases our clients insist that their own tenants be given first chance at the portions of the land we sell."

Fourth. What are the social and expected during 1925 and ensuing years of this change of property? "It ends the old tradition" said Phillips. "Whether it is a good or bad thing is hard to say. In many cases this sale of land to former tenants is increasing agriculture. "The effect upon a man, previously a tenant farmer, who becomes an owner occupier must normally tend to increased production.

**AGAINST CHILD LABOR**  
**Bill Would Prohibit Labor of Children**  
Under Certain Ages and Conditions

AUSTIN, Feb. 5.—A state child labor law is ready for final passage in the house session after a lengthy debate over amendments.

Children under fifteen years of age were singled out in the bill as being entirely out as employees in any factory, mill, workshop, laundry or theatre and their employment as messengers in cities of more than fifteen thousand persons was forbidden. In less arduous types of labor the younger class would not be allowed to work more than eight hours daily.

Children under 17 years of age would not be allowed to engage in any industry where there exists an element of chance, such as in mines where explosives are used.

Children under twelve years would only be allowed to work for the family benefit with the permission of a county judge upon a written statement from the parents.

Violations of the law would be prosecuted as misdemeanors.

**COTTON CONTEST**

Oklahoma County Offering Thousands Of Dollars for More Production Cotton Per Acre.

ARDMORE, Okla., Feb. 5 (INS)—December 1924 saw the finish of Carter County's first cotton contest. \$1,000 was offered and paid in premiums to the contestants of the five acre tracts during the past year and there were fifty seven entries.

Twenty five prizes ranging from \$200 to \$15 were awarded at the annual Farm Congress convention held here in December.

As premiums for the ensuing year \$2,000 is being offered and already more than 400 have signed contracts when they became contestants.

As a result of last year's contest it was proven that with practically no extra work good sandy upland as well as bottom land could be made to produce more than a bale to an acre. This year the contest is confidently expected to bring double those results given the past one.

It has, however, been decided that this year the contest shall not be strictly confined to cotton as \$1000 goes to cotton, \$500 to corn, \$300 to oats and \$200 to alfalfa.
