**MITCHELL DENIES** PRESIDENT CALL

Brands as Untrue Report That He Had Been Summoned Before President for Reprimand.

RESUMES AERIAL ATTACK

Assistant Chief of Air Service Says United States Has No Defence Against Air Attack.

By United Press.

WASHINGTON Feb. 19-Brigadier General William Mitchell, assistant chief of the Air Service, today told the House Aircraft Investigation Committee that he had not been summoned to the White House by President Coolidge as reported. Thereupon, Representative Per-

kins, New Jersey, chairman of the investigation committee, assumed full responsibility for the circulation of the report that Mitchell was called to the White House to be offered his choice of resignation or demotion for giving out information unauthorized.

Mitchell, while on the stand, revealed that General Patrick, chief of the air service, had recommended his reappointment as assistant air chief after March 26.

## MAY CHARGE FEE AT TOURIST PARK

Board of City Development Says Small Sum Will Be Charged Campers This Season.

Traveling Increases Greatly in Last Two Weeks-Plan Improvements For Camping Grounds.

There has been a number of tourists camping at the park throughout the winter, but travel during the past few days has increased considerably. From six to twelve parties are camping at the City Lake every night at present, it is reported, while this number will steadily increase with the coming of warmer weather.

According to the Board of City Development, a fee will be charged for camping this year at the park, or else the park will be closed. It is believed, however, that by the time the tourist travel is well under way, some arrangement will have been made by the trganizations in charge of the camp, in the way of a camping fee.
